The ceremony was addressed by Daw Aye Nu Sein and the chief minister, and Rakhine State Deputy Chief Electrical Engineer of Electricity Supply Enterprise U Zaw Moe explained the business operation.

Afterwards, the SAC members and party cut the ribbon to open the transformer, which will supply electricity to Wabo Village. Then, they toured the home weaving business in the village.

Of 3,742 villages in the Ra-

Myanmar traditional hairstyle called Youngpaysu for boys and Sanyitwine for girls (top-knot with a circular fringe) and palm tree climbing occupation and the lifestyle of the villagers are surprisingly attracting the visitors to Bagan cultural zone.

SET-SETYO Village in Nyaung-U Township which is situated five miles from the south of Ngathayauk town and linked with transportation hub, Bagan, is famous for its traditional hairstyles, said U Khin Maung Win, the Ngathayauk town administrator.

The living condition in the ancient village is enchanting with a myth history. Myanmar traditional hairstyle called Youngpaysu for boys and Sanyitwine for girls (top-knot with a circular fringe) and palm tree climbing occupation and the lifestyle of the villagers are surprisingly attracting the visitors to Bagan cultural

zone. They usually drop in the village to observe the unique traditional hairstyles.

The villagers have been preserving the traditional hairstyles for generations to generations. The elderly men are also seen with Yaunggyibwe hairstyle (traditional top-knot hairstyle for men), explained U Aung Naing, the Set-Set-Yo Village administrator.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the tourists and local travellers used to visit the village. Furthermore, filmmakers also come to the village as a film location. It is also a common site for photographers. Some villagers are well

educated and they can communicate with the tourists as well. Earlier, there was water scarcity in the village. Thanks to the good pumps, people living in Set-Set-Yo Village have adequate water supply, and the village has established a village clinic and public library in the present. Although the pace of cultural change influences the young people in the world, the young people in Set-Set-Yo Village are preserving traditional hairstyles.

Some residents in Khatlankan, Taungtaw and Phalankan villages in Ngathayauk are keeping the traditional top-knot hairstyles as well. — KPD/GNLM

319 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 4 February, total figure rises to 537,223

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 537,223 after 319 new cases were reported on 4 February 2022 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, 513,779 have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll still stands at 19,310 without casualties for twelve consecutive days.—MNA

Further State Responsibilities to be discharged (Priority 2)

- The defence services of the country mean to protect the public at the lowest level and our three main national causes at the highest level. We, the military members, discharge defence duties for the sakes of people with our own wishes but not for private intentions.

COVID-19 vaccine drive continues in various regions, states

DOCTORS and nurses from public hospitals, Tatmadaw medical teams, healthcare workers and volunteers are working hard to administer COVID-19 vaccines in different states and regions as the vaccination programme is one of the most important activities in the prevention, control and treatment of COVID-19 disease.

The COVID-19 vaccine is inoculated daily to target groups regardless of race or religion, including Buddhist monks and nuns, local people over the age of 40, students, religious leaders, prisoners, people with disabilities, ethnic armed organizations, people with chronic diseases, people in IDP camps and over 12-year-old students, respectively.

On 3 February and yesterday, doctors and nurses from public hospitals, medical teams from

the Tatmadaw, relevant healthcare workers in collaboration with volunteers injected COVID-19 vaccines to 2,672 people from 11 townships in northern Shan State, 1,834 people from ten townships in Kayin and Mon States, 2,208 people from Myeik Township, Taninthayi Region, 237 from Tamway Township, Yangon Region and 17,320 people from 26 townships in Ayeyawady Region, respectively.

Similarly, healthcare personnel gave the vaccines to 750 students from Namkham and Muse townships in northern Shan State, and 935 students from 26 townships in Ayeyawady Region, at the same time.

It is reported that officials from the respective Military Commands visited the sites and coordinated the necessary work.—MNA

Mann Shwesettaw pagoda festival holds today

THE Mann Shwesettaw pagoda Buddha Pujaniya festival is one of the most unique pagoda festivals in Upper Myanmar. It is planning to celebrate starting from 5 February for a short period of time due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

The pagoda is located in Minbu (Sagu) township, Magway region. The Mann Shwesettaw pagoda festival is one of the well-known festivals that usually kicks off from the fifth day of the waxing of Tabodwe and runs until Myanmar's celebration of the new year.

This year's festival will reach on 5 February. On the first day of the opening festival, the lower and upper shrines will be opened and offered.

"This festival is being planned to celebrate for a

short period. Some small tents have been built for the convenience of pilgrims.

But the shops will not be built as the festival won't be held in a normal fashion this year, said an official from the administrative office in Sagu.

Earlier, the Mann Shwesettaw pagoda festival yearly included over 500 tents and 1,000 shops.

The celebrating festival was closed due to the spreading of COVID-19. In 2021, the festival could not be held as usual and was held as a brief pagoda festival due to the pandemic.

It is also learnt that an elevator tower is being constructed and it is linked from the Hnakeyik Shithsu pagodas to Koekhangyi pagoda. —Aye Maung/ GNLM

COVID-19 vaccines delivered to different states, regions

IN collaboration with civil society associations, COVID-19 vaccines are transported to different states and regions in line with the Cold Trail Standards, which are provided by the Air Force.

Sputnik Light COVID-19 vaccines, which can be given to five people at a time are transported by Cold Chain Delivery Logistics truck by military plane to various regions and states following the quality control standards, officials said.

On 4 February, 3,000 vaccines to Mandalay Region, 1,600 vaccines each to Bago, Thegon, Shwedaung, Thayawady, Minhla, Nyaunglebin, DaikU, Waw, Thanatpin, Kawa and Mingaladon townships respectively were transported by Cold Chain Delivery Logistics vehicle.

Authorities from each township have received all the vaccines and the vaccines will be distributed to the public as soon as possible as per the target population groups, officials added. — MNA

More than 24,000 Myanmar migrant workers returned from Thailand in 6 months

MORE than 24,000 Myanmar migrant-workers returned home from Thailand between 1 August 2021 and 2 February 2022.

Earlier, Myanmar welcomed back 500 people per day. To prevent the spread of Omicron, Myanmar has accepted only 200 people per week.

Those returning to Myanmar through the Mae Sot-Myawady route will have to undergo a nasal swab test at Myawady quarantine centres and they have to undergo the 10-day quarantine. After 10 days, they can return home.

Among the returnees, some of them are unemployed. Some returned from Thailand as their parents are sick. Some were freed from Mae Sot police stations for illegal entry.

In the COVID-19 third wave, the welcoming of Myanmar migrant workers had stopped. But it reopened again on 1 August 2021.

Besides, more than hundreds of people are arrested every day for returning to Myanmar and the illegal border crossing into Thailand. — ACM/GNLM

MoC oversees daily imports of essential anti-COVID-19 equipment

THE Ministry of Commerce is facilitating the importation of essential medical supplies plus anti-COVID devices that are critical to the COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities, including liquid oxygen and oxygen cylinders, through trading posts, international

airports and seaports.

A total of 10 tonnes of masks were imported by two vehicles of two companies via the Lweje trading zone yesterday.

Officials from the relevant departments are cooperating to facilitate and expedite the standard operating procedures for

the import process.

Diesel sold at special prices

UNDER the arrangements of the Ministry of Commerce and Myanmar Fuel Oil Importers and Distributors Association, 26 companies imported diesel at the CBM reference rate. Of them, 11 companies distributed 12.54 million gallons of diesel at 99 fuel stations in regions/states starting 11 January.

The people can buy the diesel at special prices in accordance with the reference prices of the Myanmar Oil and Petroleum Product Regulatory Department and the prices are updated daily at www.mpta.org.mm of Myanmar Fuel Oil Importers and Distributors Association

Illegal timber, unregistered vehicles, foodstuffs, tyres seized

SUPERVISED by the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee, effective action is being taken to prevent illegal trade under the law.

On 3 February, Mon State Customs inspectors and Mayanchung inspection post officials conducted a surprise check and seized K25,000,000 worth of a 12-wheel vehicle carrying K18,600,000 worth of tyres heading from Myawady to Yangon. They also confiscated undocumented foodstuffs worth K1,400,000 from a passenger bus heading to Yangon from Hpa-an township. They took action against K45,000,000 worth of seizures under the Customs Law.

On 4 February, the inspection team led by Myanmar Police Force seized 34 cows worth K34,000,000 in Taze township and took action under the Animal Health and Breeding Development Law. They also seized one unregistered Honda Fit worth K3,500,000 in Sagaing township and took action under the Export and Import Law. Moreover, Sagaing Region Forest Department confiscated K85,000 worth of teak logs (3.166 tonnes) and took action under the Forest Law.

Similarly, Bago Region Forest Department seized 1.2040 tonnes of illegal teak worth of K180,600 in the forest reserve of

Thayawady district and took action under the Forest Law. Thus,

a total of seven arrests (estimated value of K82,765,600) were made

on 3 and 4 February, stated the committee. —MNA

Illegal drugs seized in Ottwin, Mayangon, Tachilek, Monghsat townships

A combined team consisting of members of the Bago Region Police Force conducted an inspection on the Ottwin-Paukaung road near Latpangon village, Pautaw village-tract, Ottwin Township on the afternoon of 2 February and seized 1,760 stimulant tablets with K23,000 from the motorcycle driven by Kaung Pyae Htoo.

According to the investigation, the police searched the house of Yan Naung Tun (a) Akyi Kaung in Kyatthonkhin ward (2), Ottwin Township, and confiscated 170 stimulant tablets worth K0.34965 million and a Honda Stream motorcar. On the same day at around 11:30 pm, a combined team consisting of members of the Yangon

Region Police Force arrested Swan Ye Htet (a) Ko Shee together with 3,800 stimulant tablets and 0.0011 kilogramme of ICE in Mayangon Township.

On 3 February, a combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Task Force conducted a search operation in the house of Aik Non, who lived in Sannar village in Tachilek

Township, and found and confiscated 1,400 stimulant tablets, 0.03 kilogramme of ICE, 2 ecstasy tablets, a gun with a brand logo (Armelegant Ang-5), one magazine of the gun, three rounds of ammunition, one .22 shotgun, one magazine of it and three rounds of ammunition. On the same day, Sai Naw and Aik Kwam (a) Sai

Kaung arrested with 200,000 stimulant tablets from the engine room of his vehicle Vigo, on the Monghsat-Tachilek road near Loipayin village.

It is reported that the arrested suspects are being charged under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law, according to the Myanmar Police Force. —MNA

New export item heirloom beans open at higher price

THE prices of heirloom beans listed as a new export item are rising in the brisk market, Mandalay bean traders said.

The bean has started flowing into the market since January. It fetched only K60,000 per three-basket bag in the corresponding period last year. At present, the foreign demand drives up the price to double (K120,000 per bag), according to the Mandalay Soe Win Myint depot.

“The prices of beans remain bullish during the harvest season. The heirloom beans started penetrating the Chinese market four years ago. It has grasped a firm market share in the present. It can be easily cultivated and they yield splen-

did in alluvial soil. As the bean is a lucrative crop, the locals considered it and called it luck. I am happy with the foreign demand on new export items beyond black gram, pigeon pea and sesame seeds,” an owner of Soe Win Myint warehouse said.

The prevailing prices of beans stand at K126,000 per three-basket bag of pigeon pea, K120,000 per bag of black gram, K115,000 per bag of chickpea and K300 per viss (a viss equals 1.6 kilogrammes) of peanut.

YSX records K282 mln worth of share trading in January

A total of 61,435 shares by seven listed companies were traded on the Yangon Stock Exchange (YSX) in January 2022, with an estimated value of K282 million, according to the monthly report of the YSX.

At present, shares of seven listed companies — First Myanmar Investment (FMI), Myanmar Thilawa SEZ Holdings (MTSH), Myanmar Citizens Bank (MCB), First Private Bank (FPB), TMH Telecom Public Co. Ltd (TMH), the Ever Flow River Group Public Co., Ltd (EFR) and Amata Holding Public Co., Ltd. (AMATA) were traded in the equity market. The share prices per unit slightly fell to K8,000 for FMI, K2,950 for MTSH, K8,000 for MCB, K19,500 for FPB, K2,650 for TMH, K2,850 for EFR and K5,400 for AMATA, respectively, in January.

People like to keep emer-

gency savings and purchase the safe-haven asset gold and hard currency, rather than make investments amid the COVID-19 crisis and political changes.

Regardless of the collapse of the stock markets worldwide, the local equities market has been able to continue operating without stopping trading.

Additionally, YSX launched a pre-listing board (PLB) on 28 September 2020 to provide unlisted public companies with fund-raising opportunities and build a bridge toward listing on YSX. With a view to achieving a better understanding of legal aspects and registration criteria of Myanmar public companies, a free webinar for PLB is scheduled to be held in February 2022, according to the YSX Quarterly E-Newsletter.

Next, the Securities and Exchange Commission of Myanmar

(SECM) has allowed foreigners to invest in the local equity market since 20 March 2020.

Only K4.63 billion valued 887,969 shares by seven listed companies were traded on the exchange in 2021, showing a significant drop of 63 per cent as against 2020, according to the annual report released by the exchange.

In 2020, K12.6 billion worth of 1.87 million shares by six listed companies were traded on YSX, whereas over 2.4 million shares from five listed companies, valued at K13.39 billion, were traded on the exchange in 2019.

The YSX was launched four years ago to improve the private business sector. It disseminates rules and regulations regarding the stock exchange and knowledge of share trading through stock investment webinars and training courses. — KK/GNLM



Myawady border trade up by US\$447 mln as of 28 Jan

THE border trade through the major crossing Myawady between Myanmar and Thailand soared to US\$814.5 million as of 28 January in the current mini-budget period (October 2021-March 2022), reflecting a significant increase of \$447.46 million as against the year-ago period.

The trade through the Myawady border stood at over \$367 million in the corresponding period of the last FY2020-2021.

Myawady-Mae Sot border trade remains normal amid the COVID-19 negative impacts, according to the Myawady Chamber of Commerce.

Myanmar ships tonnes of corn to Thailand through the Myawady border. Thailand gives the green light to corn imports through Mae Sot under zero tariff (with Form-D), between 1 February and 31 August. Myanmar exported approximately 1.6 million tonnes of corn that

were delivered to Thailand in the FY2020-2021.

Next, Thailand is suppressing Intellectual Property infringements at cross-border points to strengthen the trust with the trading partners and create a better investment climate. There are seven border posts between Myanmar and Thailand, Tachilek, Myawady, Kawthoung, Hteekhee, Myeik, Mawtaung and Meisei. The majority of the border trade with Thailand is conducted via Myawady.

Myanmar primarily exports corn, natural gas, fishery products, coal, tin concentrate (SN 71.58 per cent), coconut (fresh and dry), beans, and bamboo shoots to Thailand. It imports capital goods such as machinery, raw industrial goods such as cement and fertilizers, consumer goods such as cosmetics and food products from the neighbouring country. — KK/GNLM

Don't miss an opportunity of learning KG+9 education

EVERY country accepts that human resource plays a crucial role in the sustainable development of the nations. As such, everybody needs to understand the important role of knowledge accumulation through learning education.

The government arranges the plans for school-age children to have a learning opportunity for attending the KG+9 of middle school education. Only when they complete the KG+9 education can they change the learning of knowledge for the vocational training.

As education is of great importance for implementing the issue of Myanmar's democracy and the future of the nation, all citizens should take care of grasping their learning opportunities. If so, they will be able to join the nation-building activities.

Searching the knowledge as well as learning the education is not late for all. All citizens need to fill all sorts of knowledge to their souls in order to apply them at an opportune time for serving the interests of the State and the people.



COVID's pushed us 'further off course' from Global Goals: the deputy UN chief

The triple planetary crisis of climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution is worsening, the deputy UN chief told a new coordination meeting of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) on Thursday, reminding that the world has less than nine years left to reach the ambitious Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

“WE are far from where we should be – and the pandemic has pushed us even further off course”, said Deputy Secretary-General Amina Mohammed, noting that “indicators on poverty, hunger, education and jobs are all moving in the wrong direction”.

Charting a forward path

Although it has taken a great toll on people across the world, particularly those most vulnerable and marginalized, Ms Mohammed echoed the Secretary-General in saying: “We are neither hopeless nor helpless”.

People can resolve these challenges by using the Our Common Agenda blueprint, to chart the path forward and reach the SDGs.

“It provides an opportunity to set the tone for the sessions of ECOSOC and its subsidiary bodies and shape the UN system’s policy and normative work in the run up to the High-Level Political Forum, in July”, said the deputy chief.

Maximizing efforts

Inclusive recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic requires scale and ambition along with the careful calibration of policies and partnerships.

Moreover, institutions must

be strengthened and global financial systems rejigged to ensure that all countries have the fiscal space needed to invest in their people.

And a more effective financing architecture would bolster debt relief, re-direct Special Drawing Rights (a type of extra foreign exchange asset) and boost the resources of multilateral development banks, according to senior UN official.

Opening a new chapter for

While expressing confidence in ECOSOC’s commissions, forums and subsidiary bodies, she conceded that it would “take an effort from all” to accelerate the SDGs.

Ms Mohammed maintained that it would be “crucial” to identify areas where the Council’s commissions can “constructively ignite and support” an equitable recovery guided by the 2030 Development Agenda.

By bringing together specialized agency heads in this meeting,

she stated that it can “mark a new chapter in ECOSOC’s journey”, giving more impetus to ensuring “an integrated and impactful UN response” to benefit countries and regions.

‘One and only’ ECOSOC

ECOSOC President Collen Vixen Kelapile said that while the

task of building back better from COVID-19 is “daunting”, it must be embraced by Member States to accelerate SDG progress.

And as it provides policy guidance, strengthens multilateral cooperation and mobilizes international solidarity — ECOSOC is an important component in achieving the 2030 Agenda, the Addis Ababa Action Agenda for SDG financing, and the Paris Agreement.

ECOSOC is “the one and only platform” that oversees the work of the entire UN system on sustainable development, reminded Mr. Kelapile. “It is the place where UN system entities, chairs of functional commissions and expert bodies... meet with Member States to discuss the major policy issues... [and] instil direction, create synergies, and increase cooperation and coordination within the UN system at large”.

‘Rekindle a spirit of solidarity’

The ECOSOC President reminded that the new so-called Coordination Segment is designed to enhance the body’s leadership, oversight and coordination role to maximize the impact of the entire UN system.

“We need to ensure that the Council’s deliberations during

the coming two days offer clear guidance and inspire fruitful policy discussions leading up to the High-level Political Forum (HLPF)”, he said.

He urged the meeting to identify aspects of the 2030 Agenda that are not receiving adequate attention, such as orphan SDGs and targets, and “find them a home in the ECOSOC system”.

“Above all, we need to rekindle a spirit of solidarity between peoples and countries”, underscored Mr Kelapile.

“Let us utilize ECOSOC to... develop policy guidance... leverage action by the UN system... overcome the pandemic and achieve the SDGs through strengthened international cooperation and solidarity”, he concluded.

Cross-cutting catalysts

Chairing the meeting, ECOSOC Vice-President Suriya Chindawongse urged the participants to identify both overlap and synergies and encouraged greater coordination in women’s empowerment.

“Only through coordination can we be greater than the sum of our parts and thus more effectively sustain sustainability”, he said.

Study finds minimizing long-term lung damage in COVID-19 patients

A NEW research has found that a combined treatment strategy targeting SARS-CoV-2 symptoms and severe lung tissue injury is essential to minimize lung sequelae – chronic complications resulting from COVID-19 infection.

The study has been published in the ‘Clinical Microbiology Reviews Journal’.

Therapy using lung epithelial stem and progenitor cells showed promise for mitigating the potentially lethal and highly damaging virus-induced inflammatory storm that can occur in severe cases of COVID-19, said Huaiyong Chen, PhD, principal investigator

at Tianjin Institute of Respiratory Diseases, and Director of Tianjin Key Laboratory of Lung Regenerative Medicine, Haihe Hospital, Tianjin University, China.

“To minimize the damage to the lung, we should promote tissue regeneration efficiently by activating surviving lung stem and progenitor cells, or else by directly transplanting healthy lung stem and progenitor cells into damaged lungs,” said Chen.

Both cell types can differentiate into lung epithelial cells, which cover the inner surfaces of the lungs where air exchange occurs. In so doing, they can repair lung damage caused by SARS-


CoV-2, including fibrosis.

The first step towards activating these regenerative cells is to prime the tissue environment with mesenchymal stem cells. These cells do not normally reside in the lung, but when transplanted there, they secrete growth factors that support the growth and differentiation of the lung epithelial stem and progenitor cells. That, in turn, can repair the damage. The investigators are currently using animal models to figure out how best to accomplish this.

But in severe cases, these regenerative cells may be damaged by cytokines, which are produced

by immune cells in excessive numbers during lung inflammation, preventing full restoration of lung structure and function.

In such cases, healthy stem and progenitor cells might have to be transplanted into a person’s lungs. However, as with any transplant, immune rejection is likely to be a problem. It may be possible to use gene-editing technology, known as CRISPR, to modify these cells to reduce immunogenicity prior to transplantation, a possibility Chen is investigating. For less severe cases, researchers will need to screen for compounds that boost the capacity of progenitor and

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New 'highly virulent' HIV strain discovered in the Netherlands

OXFORD researchers have found in the Netherlands a highly virulent strain of HIV, the disease which infects white blood cells, like the one seen in the National Institute of Health handout—National Institutes of Health.

Oxford researchers announced Thursday the discovery of a highly virulent strain of HIV that has been lurking in the Netherlands for decades, but because of the effectiveness of modern treatments, is “no cause for alarm”. Their analysis, published Thursday in the journal

“Science”, showed that patients infected with what they call the “VB variant” had 3.5 to 5.5 times higher levels of the virus in their blood than those infected with other variants, as well as a more rapidly fading immune system.

However, the study also found that after starting treatment, individuals with the VB variant had similar immune system recovery and survival to individuals with other HIV variants.

“There’s no cause for alarm with this new viral variant,” said

Oxford epidemiologist Chris Wymant, the lead author on the paper, in an interview with AFP.

The variant likely arose in the late 1980s and early 1990s in the Netherlands, according to the researchers, but began to decline around 2010.

Since modern interventions still seem to work on the variant, the research team believes that widespread HIV treatment in the Netherlands did not contribute to the virus’s evolution, and that early detection and treatment are paramount.—AFP ■

Year of the Tiger comes with China’s triumph in wild tiger protection

IT has been 12 years since China celebrated the Year of the Tiger—a time when the wild Siberian tiger was forecast to vanish from the country. But now, 12 years later, the nation has triumphed in rescuing the endangered feline. In the Chinese culture, the tiger is a symbol of courage and strength, and thus many Chinese couples wish to have babies in the tiger year falling on Tuesday this year. In 2010, 13 tiger-range countries committed to doubling the global population of wild tigers by 2022. Nowadays, China has run ahead of schedule when it comes to protecting Siberian tigers, also known as

Amur or Manchurian tigers. **SETTING UP A NATIONAL PARK**

Feng Limin, a member of a Beijing Normal University research team that monitored these tigers for a decade, noted that with a high demand for territory, the felid will still be disturbed in traditional nature reserves, where land is always scattered and certain human activities still exist. In October 2021, China officially designated the Northeast China Tiger and Leopard National Park, which spans an area of over 1.4 million hectares in the northeastern provinces of Jilin and Heilongjiang.—Xinhua ■

Extreme weather ‘kills 140,000 Europeans in 40 years’

EXTREME weather events such as heatwaves and floods have cost Europe almost 510 billion euros and around 142,000 lives over the past 40 years, according to a new report published Thursday (3 February).

In its study, the European Environment Agency (EEA) called for continued adaptation measures at both individual and state levels.

A small number of extreme events, about three per cent of the total, were alone responsi-

ble for about 60 per cent of the financial damages incurred from 1980 to 2020, the report showed.

When it came to the loss of human lives, heatwaves accounted for 91 per cent, with the heatwave experienced in the summer of 2003 killing around 80,000 people.

Similar heatwaves after 2003 caused significantly lower fatalities “as adaptation measures were taken in different countries and by different actors”, such as installing air con-

ditioners, the EEA noted in a statement. Globally, the World Meteorological Organization estimates that the number of weather-related disasters has increased over the past 50 years, causing more damage but fewer deaths. In Europe, the EEA said the data from the past 40 years does not allow for a definite conclusion about whether the increase is due to climate change because of the very irregular damage recorded in different years.—AFP ■

South Chile blaze razes over 1,200 hectares of forest

A fire in southern Chile’s Tierra del Fuego province ravaged some 1,235 hectares of forest in the commune of Timaukel, the National Forest Corporation (Conaf) said Thursday.

Conaf’s acting regional director John Revello said the fire started 25 January on land owned by a forestry company, and 600 hectares were razed as of Monday. The challenging ter-

rain, vegetation, accumulation of fallen trees and timber, and weather conditions have made it difficult to control the fire in the Magallanes region, Revello explained.—Xinhua ■

Spring Festival celebrated amid targeted COVID-19 control measures

BEFORE the Spring Festival, people across China were in an upbeat mood preparing for the arrival of the Lunar New Year, as targeted COVID-19 control measures were in place to prevent the spread of the virus.

The Spring Festival is celebrated on the first day of the first month of the Chinese lunar calendar. It falls on 1 February this year. Regarded as the most important holiday for Chinese people, it is all about family reunions and relaxation.

This year's Spring Festival was celebrated as sporadic COVID-19 cases have been occurring in multiple places across China.

To clear the way back home for hundreds of millions of holiday travellers, China's National Health Commission (NHC)

has urged targeted COVID-19 response measures for people travelling home ahead of the holiday.

Local authorities should not take a simplistic approach to COVID-19 containment by applying a one-size-fits-all policy, nor should they add excessive restrictions, according to the NHC. This year's Spring Festival travel rush began on 17 January and will last until 25 February. To avoid the spread of COVID-19, free testing locations have been set up in hospitals and railway stations across the country to facilitate nucleic acid testing for travellers. The Third Hospital of Changsha in central China's Hunan Province began providing a 24-hour nucleic acid testing service on 19 January.—Xinhua ■

underreporting of cases across the country.

The daily update from the

country's federal health ministry showed the number of fatalities reaching 500,055, up 1,072 in the previous 24 hours.

Total infections stood at 41.9 million, according to the statistics, second only to the United States.

Case numbers have jumped in recent weeks due to the highly infectious Omicron strain but rates have slowed in recent days and the health ministry last week said there were indications of a plateau in virus cases in several parts of the country.

Experts said the Omicron wave would not cause many deaths or hospitalizations, but several states imposed restrictions on movement and have only now started easing them.—AFP ■

Putin says Russia plans no lockdown in Omicron wave

President Vladimir Putin said Thursday there will be "no lockdown" in Russia to curb the spread of Covid, despite the country facing a steep surge in infections driven by the highly contagious Omicron variant.

"No lockdown is planned," Putin said at a meeting with Russian businessmen aired on state television, adding that Russia will even ease some restrictions. "In the near future, restrictions on contact persons can be lifted, so that people can work peacefully," Putin said.—AFP ■

New Zealand to start easing tough Covid border controls

NEW ZEALAND will start easing some of the world's toughest pandemic border restrictions this month but will not fully reopen until October, Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said Thursday.

Ardern announced a five-step plan to reconnect New Zealand to the rest of the world, beginning with waiving hotel quarantine requirements for its nationals stranded overseas by the pandemic.

"It's time to move again," said Ardern, who has been under pressure recently to relax border policies that have been largely unchanged since the beginning of the Covid-19 crisis almost two years ago.—AFP ■

WHO sees "ceasefire" opportunity in fighting COVID-19 in Europe

THE European region is approaching "a plausible endgame" in its fight against the COVID-19 pandemic while the cases were still surging, a senior official of the World Health Organization (WHO) said Thursday.

"For now, the number of deaths across the Region is starting to plateau," said Hans

Kluge, WHO's European Regional Director, at a press conference. The region has seen 12 million new cases of COVID-19 in the last week, the highest weekly total since the pandemic began.

The success of current protection measures is evident despite a rise in hospitalizations, according to Kluge, who noted

that it has not been "as rapid as the case incidence rate, and overall, admissions to intensive care have not increased significantly." "It is possible to respond to new variants that will inevitably emerge — without re-installing the kind of disruptive measures we needed before," said the WHO official.—AFP ■

Japan mulls sending natural gas to Europe in contingency over Ukraine

JAPAN is weighing an option to divert part of its natural gas reserves to Europe in case Russia restricts gas supplies to the region in response to projected sanctions following a Russian invasion of Ukraine, government sources said Thursday.

Japan is likely to seek coordination with other countries in supporting Europe, which heavily relies on natural gas supplies from Russia through pipelines.

The United States has warned Moscow of sanctions if Russian forces invade the neighbouring Ukraine as Russian troops have been positioned near the border.

Some US media have reported that the administration of President Joe Biden has spoken with officials of major natural

gas importers in Asia including Japan and South Korea about diverting gas supplies to Europe.

“We would like to think how we can contribute to the international community,” Japan’s Economy, Trade and Industry Minister Koichi Hagiuda told reporters.

The top government spokesman, Chief Cabinet Secretary Hirokazu Matsuno, said at a press conference that Japan has been closely communicating with the United States and European countries, indicating coordinated efforts would proceed smoothly.

At the same time, there are concerns in the government that natural gas reserves in Japan are not in great abundance either.—Kyodo ■

Over 7 million visited Dubai in 2021 tourism turnaround

MORE than seven million foreign tourists visited Dubai last year, marking a “remarkable turnaround”, the government of the Gulf city state hosting the Expo world fair announced Thursday.

The figure was up 32 per cent on 2020, the first full year of the coronavirus pandemic, Dubai’s economy and tourism department said in a statement.

It hailed the recovery as “a remarkable turnaround amid continuing global challenges”.

This year, however, missile attacks since last month by Yemeni rebels on the United Arab Emirates of which Dubai is a member have prompted US and UK travel warnings.

Missile and drone attacks by Huthi rebels in Yemen, in whose war the UAE is a military supporter of the government, have rattled the Gulf state’s image as a haven of stability in the turbulent Middle East.

Dubai, home of the world’s tallest tower, super-luxury hotels and swanky nightclubs, has since 1 October hosted Expo 2020 which runs until 31 March.

The glitzy emirate, a trading and leisure hub for which tourism is a pillar of the economy, attracted a massive 16.7 million tourists from the East and West in 2019, before Covid-19 restrictions.—AFP ■

UK to support consumers as energy price cap rises 54%

THE UK government on Thursday stepped in to help the hardest-hit households struggling with the rising cost of living, announcing a £9 billion package to offset soaring energy bills.

It followed an announcement by that energy regulator that the price cap on how much suppliers can charge consumers will jump by 54 per cent due to soaring wholesale gas prices.

The annual price cap for consumers not on a fixed deal with their supplier will rise by £693 to £1,971 in England, Wales and Scotland from April, Ofgem said. Northern Ireland has a separate regulator and has also announced sharp hikes in average household gas bills.

UK inflation rose to a near

30-year high in December and more costly household bills are further stoking fears about a cost-of-living squeeze, with government tax rises looming.

The government, under pressure due to lockdown-breaching parties but also struggling to claw back eye-watering pandemic

spending, is being urged to get tackle the issue. Finance minister Rishi Sunak said electricity customers will get a £200 discount on their bill in October, to be repaid over five years, while lower and middle-income households will see a £150 rebate on local taxes in April.—AFP ■

Brazil hikes key interest rate to double digits

BRAZIL’S central bank hiked its benchmark interest rate by 1.5 points Wednesday to 10.75 per cent, bringing it into double digits for the first time in nearly five years to fight rampant inflation.

The eighth straight increase to the Selic rate, which was in line with forecasts, comes as Latin America’s biggest economy struggles through a recession and stubbornly high inflation

that the bank’s monetary policy committee said “continued to be a negative surprise”. The nine-member committee, which made the decision unanimously, hinted it would soon slow the tightening cycle, saying it “currently foresees a slowdown in the pace (of rate cuts) as the most adequate policy”. Brazil has responded to pandemic-driven inflation with one of the most

aggressive tightening cycles in the world, rapidly raising the key interest rate from an all-time low of two per cent in March 2021.

The last time the Selic rate was in the double digits was in May 2017. Brazil’s inflation rate came in at 10.06 per cent for 2021, crashing through policymakers’ target range — currently 3.5 per cent, plus or minus 1.5 percentage points.—AFP ■

Singapore's retail sales grow 6.7 pct on year in December 2021

THE Department of Statistics (DOS) of Singapore announced on Friday that Singapore's retail sales grew by 6.7 per cent year on year in December 2021, compared to the 2.2 per cent year-on-year increase recorded in the previous month.

Excluding motor vehicles, retail sales rose 8.6 per cent last December, compared to the 4.5 per cent growth last November. The estimated total value of retail sales last December was about 4.4

billion Singapore dollars (about 3.28 billion US dollars). Of these, online retail sales made up an estimated 14.6 per cent, lower than the revised 17.1 per cent recorded in November 2021 when there were major online shopping events. The DOS also reported that the sales of food and beverage services increased by 7.4 per cent year on year in December 2021, compared to the one per cent increase in the previous month. —Xinhua ■

NW China province sees new energy development boom

NORTHWEST China's Gansu Province is seeing a new energy development boom as the country seeks to reduce carbon emissions and improve the energy mix.

By 2021, the installed power generation capacity of new energy projects in Gansu had reached 27.63 GW, accounting for 48 per cent of the total installed power generation capacity in the province, according to the State Grid Gansu Electric Power Company.

Last year, the electricity generated by new energy

projects exceeded the 40 billion kWh mark for the first time to reach 44.6 billion kWh, the company said.

By 2021, the utilization rate of new energy power generating capacity in Gansu had reached a record

high of 96.83 per cent after local authorities further encouraged local consumption and transmitted more energy to the country's eastern and central regions. The province, rich in wind and solar energy, will step up new energy development in the coming years. The installed power generation capacity of new energy projects in the province is expected to exceed 80 GW in 2025, with non-fossil energy accounting for nearly 30 per cent of primary energy consumption, the company said.—Xinhua ■

Ten children rescued in Panama sex trafficking operation

PANAMANIAN authorities announced Thursday that as part of an operation to disrupt a sex trafficking ring, 10 children were rescued and three people in Panama and Costa Rica were arrested.

"The victims in this case range between the ages of four and 16 and the people involved are close relatives" of the minors, said Emeldo Marquez, a senior Panamanian prosecutor.

He explained that the relatives "facilitated" the shipment of the children from the town of Baru, 525 kilometres (326 miles) southwest of Panama City, to the Costa Rican border, to be sexually exploited.

In a statement, the Panamanian prosecutor's office confirmed that the number of children rescued was ten.

Panamanian police in Baru as well as Costa Rican authorities in the border towns of Barrio San Jorge and Laurel worked together to dismantle the sex trafficking ring and make the arrests.—AFP ■

20 dead in Argentina after taking toxic-laced cocaine

AT least 20 people died and 74 more were hospitalized in a Buenos Aires suburb after consuming cocaine cut with a toxic substance, possibly opioids, Argentine authorities said Wednesday.

Officials said they were working quickly to determine what the cocaine was mixed with, but warned those who bought the drug over the last 24 hours to dispose of it.

Sergio Berni, the security chief for Buenos Aires province, told the television channel Telefe that authorities were trying to locate the toxic substance "to remove it from circulation." "There is a key ingredient that is attacking the central nervous system," Berni said.—AFP ■

13 killed in rare raid on jihadists by US special forces

US special forces hunted down high-ranking jihadists in a rare airborne raid in northwestern Syria on Thursday, killing 13 people in an operation the Pentagon described as "successful".

The operation was thought to be the biggest of its kind by US forces in the jihadist-controlled Idlib region since the 2019 raid that killed Islamic State group leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi.

The targets of the latest operation around the town of Atme, which residents and other sources said lasted around two hours, were not immediately

clear. Names circulating on social media and among local residents suggested the US raid was not aimed at IS operatives but at members of rival jihadist group Al-Qaeda.

The Pentagon stopped short of revealing its target in the nighttime raid but said more information would be provided later. "US Special Operations forces under the control of US Central Command conducted a counterterrorism mission this evening in northwest Syria," spokesman John Kirby said in a statement.—AFP ■

'Where is Scholz?': Germany's new chancellor under fire

TWO months into the job, the honeymoon is already over for German Chancellor Olaf Scholz, with critics accusing him of being "invisible" on the Ukraine crisis and the coronavirus pandemic.

The hashtag #woistscholz ("Where is Scholz?") is doing the rounds on Twitter, and some say the famously taciturn politician needs to start speaking up.

Scholz was sworn in as chancellor on 8 December after leading his Social Democrats (SPD) to a sensational election win, ending 16 years in power for Angela Merkel's conservatives.

But a Forsa survey this week showed the SPD behind Merkel's CDU-CSU in the polls for the first time since the election — on 23 per cent compared with 27 per cent for the conservative bloc, which is now the main opposition party.

Scholz himself, feted for winning the September 26 election with a campaign that played on his calm demeanour and meticulous approach, is also seeing his popularity wane.

In a recent survey by public broadcaster ZDF on Germany's most popular politicians, Scholz found himself lagging behind Merkel — who has retired from politics — and Health Minister Karl Lauterbach.

Scholz, who will fly to Washington to meet US President Joe Biden on Monday, has long been known for his understated style.

He was once dubbed "Scholzomat" for his dry, robotic speeches.

Merkel was hardly known for her media presence or rousing speeches, but Scholz "seems to want to surpass her in the art of disappearance", according to Der Spiegel weekly, which accused him of being "almost invisible, inaudible".

"The way the chancellor speaks and communicates seems inappropriate," political scientist Ursula Muench told AFP.— AFP ■

Rotterdam says no decision on dismantling bridge for Bezos superyacht

THE Dutch port city of Rotterdam has not received a request for a permit to temporarily dismantle an historic bridge to allow a superyacht built for Amazon founder Jeff Bezos to pass, local media reported Thursday.

The city's mayor denied any decision had been made, a day after a municipality spokeswoman told AFP that officials had green-lighted the shipbuilder's request to remove the central section of the iconic Koningshaven Bridge, sparking widespread

criticism on social media.

Bezos's gigantic, 430-million-euro (\$485 million) three-masted yacht — built in Alblasserdam near Rotterdam — is too big to pass under the bridge, which dates from 1878 and was rebuilt after being bombed by the Nazis in 1940 during World War II.

"I find the turmoil quite peculiar. No decision has yet been taken, not even an application for a permit," Dutch newspaper Algemeen Dagblad quoted May-

or Ahmed Aboutaleb saying on Thursday.

The municipality will make its decision after a permit application is filed and the impact has been assessed, including if it can be done without damaging the bridge and whether Bezos will foot the bill, the mayor said.

"It's about the facts. I want to know them first," he told the daily.

His remarks in Colombia, where he is on a visit, were confirmed by his spokesperson to Dutch news agency ANP.—AFP ■

Xi to meet Putin as tensions rise with West

CHINA'S President Xi Jinping is poised for his first face-to-face meeting with a world leader in nearly two years on Friday when he hosts Russia's Vladimir Putin, with the pair drawing closer as tensions grow with the West.

Xi has not left China since January 2020, when the country was grappling with its initial Covid-19 outbreak and locked down the central city of Wuhan where the virus was first detected.

He is now readying to meet more than 20 leaders as Beijing kicks off a Winter Olympics it hopes will be a soft-power triumph and shift focus away from a build-up blighted by a diplomatic boycott and Covid fears.

Xi and Putin will meet in the Chinese capital before their nations release a joint statement

reflecting their "common views" on security and other issues, a top Kremlin adviser said at a Wednesday press briefing.

The two strongmen will then attend the Olympic opening ceremony on Friday evening.

Spiralling tensions with

the West have bolstered ties between the world's largest nation and its most populous, and Putin was the first foreign leader to confirm his presence at Friday's opening ceremony.

He hailed Russia's "model" relations with Beijing in a

December phone call with Xi, calling his Chinese counterpart a "dear friend".

For its part, China has called on the United States to respect Russia's "reasonable security concerns" over Ukraine.

Moscow is looking for support after its deployment of 100,000 troops near its border with Ukraine prompted Western nations to warn of an invasion and threaten "severe consequences" in response to any Russian attack.

China enjoyed plentiful support from the Soviet Union — the precursor to the modern Russian state — after the establishment of Communist rule in 1949, but the two socialist powers later fell out over ideological differences.— AFP ■

North Korean Olympics message may signal halt to missile tests: analysts

NORTH Korea sent "warm congratulations" Friday to ally Chi-

na ahead of the opening of the Beijing Winter Olympics, a mes-

sage analysts said likely signals it will stop test-firing missiles during the event.

Pyongyang conducted an unprecedented seven weapons tests in January, including launching its most powerful missile since 2017 as it hinted it could restart long-range and nuclear testing.

The sabre-rattling raised tensions on the Korean peninsula and forced Beijing — Pyongyang's main diplomatic ally and economic benefactor — to block a US push for new UN sanctions over the barrage.

North Korea is barred from competing at the Beijing Games, which have been clouded by hu-

man rights and coronavirus concerns and subject to a diplomatic boycott by Washington and its allies.

On Friday, state media in North Korea reported leader Kim Jong Un "warmly congratulated" China's President Xi Jinping on successfully opening the Beijing Winter Olympics "despite the worldwide health crisis and unprecedented severe circumstances".

"The Olympic torch flaring up in Beijing clearly proves that no difficulty and challenge can ever prevent the Chinese people from vigorously advancing," Kim's message said, according to state-run KCNA.—AFP ■

Costa Rica: Central America's green pin-up

COSTA Rica, which elects a new president Sunday, is a small country thriving on ecotourism. Its neutrality, strong democracy and political stability have earned it the nickname of Central America's Switzerland. Here are four facts about the country of more than five million people:

Beacon of peace

Independent since 1821, Costa Rica is considered a model of democracy in Central America. A short civil war in 1948 led to the abolition of the army and helped

put in place the country's political stability. In the 1980s, when several other Central American countries were mired in civil wars, neutral Costa Rica acted as peace broker, earning then-president Oscar Arias Sanchez the Nobel Peace Prize in 1987.

It saw a political shift in 2014, when the two rightwing parties that had shared power since the 1960s — the PLN and PUSC — suffered an historic defeat as centrist Luis Guillermo Solis was elected president.—AFP ■

Four top aides desert UK's embattled Johnson

BRITISH Prime Minister Boris Johnson suffered four staff defections on Thursday as pressure intensified on the embattled leader over lockdown parties and his loose-lipped style of politics.

One of the departures was linked to an inflammatory remark made by Johnson, attacking opposition Labour leader Keir Starmer over a notorious paedophile.

"Being honest, I wouldn't have said it and I'm glad the prime minister clarified it," finance minister Rishi Sunak said in an extraordinary rebuke of his boss during a televised news conference.

Sunak is tipped as a leading contender to replace Johnson, if a brewing Conservative revolt against the prime minister develops further.

Downing Street confirmed that chief of staff Dan Rosenfield was leaving, just over a year after he took on the role with a brief to professionalize Johnson's chaotic operation.—AFP ■

Cargo ships waiting off Southern California pushed farther due to US Navy exercises: report

CARGO ships waiting to unload in ports of Southern California had been pushed farther away from the shore as the US Navy launched training exercises along the coast, the Washington Examiner reported Thursday.

Kipling Louttit, Executive Director of the Marine Exchange of Southern California, which coordinates shipping traffic and piloting vessels into the ports, was quoted as saying that only cargo ships cleared to dock within 72 hours were permitted within 50 miles since "the military is shooting missiles and guns six days a week".

"We needed to spread the ships out, so we had to skip over the area. We now have them 150 miles offshore of Southern California. They are waiting along the Mexican coast and as far away as the Panama Canal," Louttit said.—Xinhua ■

Olympic athletes from Russia were ranked second with 26 points, with reigning pairs world champions Anastasia Mishina/Aleksandr Galliamov and ice dancers Victoria Sinitsina/Nikita Katsalopov both on the second and Mark Kondratyuk third in the men's singles. Thanks to medal hopeful Sui Wenjing/Han Cong's top-class performance, China edged onto the third place with 21 points, beating Japan into fourth by one point, though Olympic silver medalist Shoma Uno landed a nearly perfect short programme to finish second.—Xinhua ■
