Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

“Bagan and art of lacquerware are coexisting in the Bagan zone. Lacquer (lo-

cally called Yun) is one of Myanmar’s ten best well-known traditional arts and crafts (Ten floral arts) and aesthetic finest art. Lacquerware College is providing the technology of lacquerware arts to maintain

traditional lacquerware from extinction and pass it on to future generations. The college offers a two-year diploma and shares the technology with the locals.

Law Amending the Myanmar Engineering Council Law State Administration Council Law No 40/2022

11th Waning of Tagu 1384 ME
26 April 2022

THE State Administration Council enacted this law under Section 419 of the Constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar.

1. This law shall be called the Law Amending the Myanmar Engineering Council Law.
2. Section 5 of the Myanmar Engineering Law shall be substituted as follows: —
“5. In forming the Myanmar Engineering Council with 60 members, the Panel of Patrons of the Council shall-
 - (a) select to assign duties to 10 each among the eligibly professional engineers as council members in accord with the criteria as follows: -
 - (1) professional engineers from ministries and government organizations related to the engineering arena,
 - (2) professional engineers from government departments, universities, colleges and institutes concerning the engineering and technological academic measures.
 - (b) select to assign duties to eligibly retired professional engineers from ministries, government organizations, engineering and academic technological measures-related government departments, universities, colleges and institutes concerning the engineering arena as council members.
 - (c) select to assign duties to 15 each among the following eligibly professional

engineers as council members—

- (1) professional engineers from non-governmental engineering societies
 - (2) renowned professional engineers
3. Sub-section (f) of Section 8 of the Myanmar Engineering Council shall be substituted as follows: -
“(f) The Panel of Patrons shall legally form the new council under the permission of the responsible ministry within 60 days from the date the existing council term shall be invalid and order to hand over the duties.”
 4. Sub-section (f) of Section 8 of the Myanmar Engineering Council, below Sub-section (g), shall be substituted as follow: -
“(g) The existing council shall serve the duties and functions until the new council has been formed.”

I hereby signed this law under Section 419 of the Constitution.

Myanmar and Thailand discuss drug control cooperation

AT the invitation of Justice Minister of Thailand Mr Somsak Thepsutin, a delegation led by Union Minister for Home Affairs Lt-Gen Soe Htut went to Bangkok on 22 April to promote the Myanmar-Thai drug control cooperation.


At the meeting, the two sides cordially discussed joint drug control issues between the two countries, the success of the anti-drug special operation— Operation 1511/22 and plans for further cooperation. They also observed the Office of the Narcotics Control Board (ONCB)’s management procedures for confiscating drug-related assets, the use of technology in the anti-drug activities, and the auction of seized assets.

Afterwards, the Myanmar delegation led by the Union

minister inspected the security measures, the rule of law and drug control activities at the Royal Thai Police’s Sai Mai Area Police Station and Maritime Police in Bangkok and drug control and observed the living and administrative support of police officers.

A delegation led by Joint Secretary of the Central Committee for Drug Abuse Control and Commander of Anti-Drug Police Force Police Brig-Gen Win Naing, who accompanied the Union Minister during the trip to Thailand, attended the 23rd Myanmar-Thailand Joint Drug Control Meeting on 22 April in Bangkok.

The meeting discussed matters related to the drug situation in the region, control of the illegal entry of chemicals into the Golden Tri-

Bagan Lacquerware College, in cooperation with Asian Lacquer Craft Exchange, is exchanging lacquer arts from Asian countries. There are lacquer craft exchange programmes in Japan, China, the Republic of Korea, Thailand, Cambodia, Viet Nam and Laos. They are temporarily suspended in the COVID pandemic. There were teacher exchange programmes between Myanmar and development partner Japan. Japanese lecturers conducted an intensive course for the locals executing lacquerware for living.

The lacquerware technology college is an institution where the technology of lacquerware is offered to meet international standards, preserve traditional lacquerware, and not lose its grip. Furthermore, tourists can also explore lacquerware at the Lacquerware Museum

the earnings will go to the revenue of the State.

Moreover, over 40 antique lacquer objects have been collected with the State's budget. Also, there are two buildings for the foreigners to explore the arts of lacquerware at the college. Additionally, lacquerware shops also offer items produced with Japanese techniques and traditional ones. The college will be reopened on 12 May 2022, so the tourists are cordially invited," said Daw Nilar Myint, a principal of the college said.

Preserving and protecting the lacquerware arts to date and maintaining temples and pagodas from the Bagan dynasty is a price of the Bagan zone. The locals have been preserving it as vocational education and passing on the future generation is a national responsibility. Lacquerware College (Bagan), operated under the Department of Cooperative and the Depart-

on campus. More than 400 lacquerware, including traditional items maintained from the 12th century AD, is showcased at the museum. The foreigners usually visit there. Also, the lacquerware production hall features production stages from the raw materials (bamboo, timber). The foreigner is charged K2,000 to enter the museum and hall, and

Academic upgrading of the College

Lacquerware College (Bagan) was started as a lacquerware vocation school in 1924 and upgraded to Myanma

Emergence of self-help lacquerware vocational school

The vocation of making lacquerware is also preserving the country's cultural heritage. Retired assistant to Officer of Bagan U Ba Tin in Colonial era, was a person who appreciated traditional arts. He tried to establish a lacquerware vocational school for the sustainable development of lacquer crafts in Bagan city. U Ba Tin met with lacquerware experts and opened a self-help school. In 1924, the state-owned school was opened.

Upgrading to college level

The government changed the course duration of the lacquerware vocation school from three years to one year in March 1960. The school offered a one-year course every year from March 1960 to March 1965. According to a meeting (32/94) of the Union Government of Myanmar on 31 August 1994, the school was upgraded to Myanma Lacquerware Institute. Later, it was turned into Lacquerware College in December 2003.

Completing bachelor degree

Those enthusiastic with graduate (under 35 years) and under-graduate (under 25 years) education can join a two-year diploma course. Those who successfully accomplished the two-year diploma course starting from the 2005 intake are entitled to attend the Co-operative University to learn business science and receive a bachelor's degree.

Cooperation with international institutions


Lacquerware College (Bagan) was made partner with Japan for lacquer craft exchange programmes in 1953. At present, it's working together with the Universities of arts in Japan, China and Thailand to exchange lacquer crafts.

Creating job opportunities for the trainees

The college produced 2,564 trainees between 1924-1925 and 2019-2020 academic years. Of them, 15 can set up their own business, 80 serve as civil staff, and 550 join private firms. Three of them are engaged in the lacquerware industry for a living. The college helped them to hunt for jobs.

new job opportunities, said Union Minister for Commerce Dr Pwint San during the eighth World In-

tellectual Property Day 2022 ceremony held virtually in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday. Moreover, the

transfer of high technology can enhance productivity and create innovations in literature, arts, and industrial sectors by sharing the benefits equally between the creators and consumers and improving living standards. Therefore, intellectual property can support the country's economic development, he said.

According to the theme of this year's World Intellectual Property Day, the Union Minister added that it is necessary to work together to establish a copyright protection system so that today's youth can create innovations that will make the future more beautiful.

World Intellectual Property Day has been held annually by the World Intellectual Property Organization since 2000. The theme of World IP Day 2022 is IP and Youth; Innovating for A

Better Future.

Myanmar became the 176th member country of WIPO in 2001.

The Ministry of Education (previously the Ministry of Science and Technology) and the IP Department under the Research and Innovation Department served as a domain to communicate with the World Intellectual Property Organization to conduct the IP related activities. The IP Department drafted and amended the copyright law, shared knowledge, cooperated with international organizations and carried out the copyright measures.

The 26th of April is designated as "World IP Day" each year in recognition of the "WIPO Convention" established by the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) in 1970. — Htun Htun/GNLM

57th Myanmar Gems Emporium continues its fifth day

THE fifth day of the 57th Myanmar Gems Emporium continued yesterday at Mani Yadana Jade Hall in Nay Pyi Taw.

The local and foreign gem merchants observed the displayed jade and jewel items in the hall and jadestone outside the hall.

After that, the officials opened the bidding for 700 jadestone lots from series 1 to 700 and announced that 523 jadestone lots were sold out.

Moreover, 330 pearl lots from series 1 to 330 were on sale through the open tender system, and 330 pearl lots were sold out, while 54 gemstone lots from series 1 to 120 were sold to local and foreign gem merchants during previous events.

The jade lots from the series 701 to 1400 will be sold on the sixth day of the event, and from 1401 to 2000 on the seventh day.

Union Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental

Conservation U Khin Maung Yi, in his capacity as Myanmar Gems Emporium Central Committee Patron, inspected the jade sales at the event yesterday afternoon.

The Myanmar Gems Emporium has been successfully held since 1964 to earn foreign income and develop the economy for the citizens, reaching its 57th event. The local and foreign gemstone merchants peacefully observed the displayed pearl lots and jade lots during the event. — MNA

Ex-union ministers U Ohn Win, U Win Khine, ex-deputy minister Dr Tun Naing, ex-managing director of No 1 Mining Enterprise U Kyaw San, managing director of Electric Generation Enterprise U Than Naing Oo, company chairman U Chit Khine, managing director U Win Min Khine charged under Anti-Corruption Law

THE Anti-Corruption Commission has set up an inspection team to investigate the bribes in the production and sales of coal which is needed for the Tigyt coal-fired power plant of Electric Power Generation Enterprise of the Ministry of Electricity and Energy.

According to the inspections, No (1) Mining Enterprise and one private company developed an operation on Tigyt coal-fired power plant with 30 per cent of interest to the country and 70 per cent to private. In paying 2 per cent of miner-

al tax to the government, they failed to change the sale of price per ton (K48,100 per tonne in 2018-2019, K56,500 per tonne in 2019-2022). They collected on the sale per tonne of coal at K12,000 according to the ministry's management committee meeting 1/2017 held on 12 January 2017. Therefore, it reduced more than K1,900 million of mine tax for more than 23 tonnes of coal produced from 2018 to 2021 and more than K14,000 million for 30 per cent of production that the government must receive, which caused more than K15,900 mil-

lion losses in the State budget. Therefore, ex-union minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation U Ohn Win was charged under Section 55 of the Anti-Corruption Law, while former managing director U Kyaw San of the No (1) Mining Enterprise and joint-venture company chairman U Chit Khine under Section 55/63 of the Anti-Corruption Law.

The Electric Power Generation Enterprise of the Ministry of Electricity and Energy and the private company failed to follow the President's Office di-

rective 1/2017 in making the coal procurement contract. They did not calculate the price of one tonne based on 2,000 tonnes of normal production per day but on 1,750 tonnes to increase the price for one tonne. It cost more than K5,809.12 per tonne, and the government faced losses of more than K9,400 million, over K8,200 million in purchasing for 1.4 million tonnes by the department between 2019 and 2021 and more than K1,200 million in income tax for calculation of the income tax of per ton that must be paid by the company.

The cases were opened against ex-union minister for Electricity and Energy U Win Khine and ex-deputy minister Dr Tun Naing under Section 55 of the Anti-Corruption Law, ex-managing director of the Electric Power Generation Enterprise U Than Naing Oo and joint-venture company managing director U Win Min Khine under Section 55/63 of the Anti-Corruption Law at Phayagon Myoma police station in Ottarathiri Township of Nay Pyi Taw on 25 April. The ACC conducts further investigations to take action. — MNA

Shwebo Pawsan Farming, Milling and Trading Association (Central) has been raising awareness of GI.

Working agendas and cooperation, the interest of farmers, traders and millers when GI will be earned, the business operating system for quality management drawn up by the association and inviting new members were highlighted at the event.

Additionally, matters concerning SATAKE Seed Centre operated by the association were

Pedigree seed access plays a pivotal role in seeking GI. The association is also running a



Seed Centre developed under the JICA's project to produce pedigree and quality seeds of Pawsan variety in Wetlet Town-

ship, Shwebo district.

Shwebo Pawsan rice seed production (2020-2021) has been carried out on trial run from 22

December 2021.

In order to acquire copyright for Shwebo Pawsan, relevant organizations and farmers are cordially invited to work together in producing pedigree seeds and meeting GI criteria.

Pawsan rice crop was previously grown in Ayeyawady delta regions. Now, it is cultivated across the country. There are about 1.3 million acres of Pawsan rice crop every year.

Pawsan varieties vary in different regions and a harvest season. A GI is a specific intellectual property right that designates a product from one particular region and whose characteristics result in both the natural conditions of its origin and the expertise of local producers. — Lu Lay/GNLM

Gold transactions still cannot be fixed on the CBM reference exchange rate: YGEA

GOLD transactions still cannot be fixed on the Central Bank of Myanmar's reference exchange rate amid the financial difficulty, said U Myo Myint, the Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA) chair.

According to the provisions stipulated in Sections 11, 12 and 13 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law, the foreign exchange earned by locals in Myanmar must be deposited in accounts at the authorized dealers and exchanged for the local currency at the Central Bank of Myanmar's reference rate of K1,850 per US dollar within one working day, according to the

notification released on 3 April.

That is why the YGEA called for an urgent meeting on 8 April. The meeting determined to carry out gold transactions depending on the CBM's reference exchange rate. However, it has not come into effect yet.

"We have difficulty fixing the gold price on the CBM's reference rate. The border market does not accept the set rate of K1,850. Nonetheless, the transaction is done with the exchange rate margin," U Myo Myint was quoted as saying.

On 23 April, officials from the department concerned, the

YGEA and Mandalay Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association discussed gold price stability at the meeting. Gold transaction on the CBM's reference rate, immediate payments, and avoiding price manipulation was discussed, he said.

Current market condition impedes transaction on the basis of the reference rate. Yet, it will be implemented later, he continued.

The US dollar stands at K2,000 in the unofficial black market, while the CBM reference rate is K1,850. The gold price stands at US\$1,903 per ounce in the global market. Meanwhile, 24-carat gold is worth K2,045,000 per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme).

The domestic gold price is highly correlated with the global gold price, YGEA stated. During the end of September 2021, a dollar value hit an all-time high of over K3,000 in the gold exchanges and consequently, the pure gold reached a record high of K2.22 million per tical in history. — NN/GNLM

Perennial gum sterculia cultivation expands in NyaungU District

THE number of acreages for perennial gum sterculia that produces tragacanth Gum aka Sterculia gum or Karaya gum, has increased in NyaungU District, Mandalay Region, according to U Aung San, a gum sterculia farm owner in Ngathayauk town.

The distance of gum sterculia is 10 feet in each row of cultivation. The growers in Kyaukpadaung Township, NyaungU Township, Ngathayauk town and Bagan city are expanding acreage of gum sterculia as they

rely on rainwater for agriculture. The growing season starts in the monsoon. It's resistant to climate change. Skilled tappers harvest the gum. Some growers turned to perennial gum sterculia as low rainfall affected crop yield, U Tin Htun Aung, a three-acre farm owner from Legwa village, said.

Myanmar Tragacanth Gum is generally exported to China. Additionally, Japan has shown interest in it, but it wants only organic farmed gum. —Ko Htein KPD, KK/GNLM

UK Covid patient was positive for record 505 days: researchers

The previous record for persistent infection — rather than repeated bouts of Covid — is thought to be 335 days, the team from King's College London and Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust said.

BRITISH researchers believe they have documented the longest-known Covid-19 infection, in a patient who tested positive for a total of 505 days before their death.

The previous record for persistent infection — rather than repeated bouts of Covid — is thought to be 335 days, the team from King's College London and Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust said.

One of the study's co-authors, consultant virologist Gaia Nebbia, said the unnamed individual was diagnosed in mid-2020 with respiratory symptoms that later improved.

Tested positive about 45 times

But they then tested positive about 45 times before attending hospital up to their death.

Nebbia said persistent infection with SARS-CoV-2 — the virus which causes Covid-19 — has been described in patients with weakened immune systems.

She and her team studied how the virus from nine Covid patients in London changed over time, concluding that new variants may occur in immunocompromised patients.

"This is one of the hypotheses for the emergence of variants," Nebbia told AFP.

"Regular sampling and genetic analysis of the virus showed that five of the nine patients developed at least one mutation seen in variants of concern.

"Some individuals developed multiple mutations associated with variants of concern, such as the Alpha, Delta and Omicron variants.

"However, none of the individuals in our work developed new variants that became widespread variants of concern."

Of the nine immunocompromised patients who tested positive for at least eight weeks, infections persisted on average for 73 days.

But two patients had persistent infections for more than a year.

Weakened immune systems

All the patients had weakened immune systems due to organ transplantation, HIV, cancer or other medical therapies. They were studied between March 2020 and December last year.

Of the nine, five survived. Two of the five recovered without treatment and two others recovered after antibody and antiviral therapy.

The fifth individual was still infected at their last follow-up examination in early 2022, even after treatment, and had Covid for 412 days.

Should they test positive at their next appointment, they will exceed the 505-day record, the researchers said.

Nebbia said the situation demonstrated the urgent need for new treatments to help immunocompromised patients recover.

The findings will be presented at the European Congress of Clinical Microbiology and Infectious Diseases in Lisbon, which begins on Saturday.

MY GRANDPA passed away in his early 50s. It was during the state of lawlessness due to the civil war. He was a wealthy man from a village which was not more than four miles away from a town. He owned over a hundred acres of paddy fields and a lot of cattle. In his village, there was no security, especially at night. He often heard the news that his house would be robbed one day. At last, he had to move to the town for the safety of the lives of the family members, leaving his properties in the village. After some time, his house and his barn, which was full of paddy, were burnt down by the robbers. The news weighed him down, and he was laid in bed.

At that moment, the powerful and effective medicine could not be bought easily. He was taken care of by his family with random indigenous medicine. The condition of his health got worse and worse day after day. At last, he left his beloved family and went to his new existence. This incident was 67 years ago. If my grandpa had met a doctor and got some treatments with powerful and effective medicine, he could not have encountered such a situation like that.

A few days ago, I made a phone call to a person who was very intimate, like my younger brother, whose age was about 55 and who lived in Hlegu and asked him about his health. He

answered my call, explaining how he made his medical check in a renowned private hospital with modern apparatus and machines. He continued how the physician gave him important instructions and some effective medicine. I remembered my grandpa at once. The person I talked to on the phone was not as wealthy as my grandpa. However, my grandpa was unlucky. The instability of the State made my grandpa and my friend greatly different.

After our conversation, I happened to think about people. Most people, including me, want to live long.

It is not a fault! It is natural. Therefore, they try to lengthen their lifespan with various kinds

of medicine whenever they become ill. The chronic or acute illness needs to be cured with food or medicine which is instructed by a skilful doctor or physician. These days, there are many doctors, physicians, private clinics, high standard hospitals and very precise laboratories here. As the stability of the State is also confirmed, people can have excellent treatments at any time.

In 2003, I was not well and went to a doctor from a clinic in my town. He made a necessary examination on me and let me know that I had high blood pressure. He also gave me some instructions in which I would have to take regular doses of pills with

out fail to keep my normal blood pressure. Since then, I have been taking those pills for ages. Otherwise, I would have died of high blood pressure in ten years. My grandpa did not get that chance as the unstable situation of the State at that moment, although he had enough cash to cure his illness. I think he also had a strong desire to recover from his illness and live long happily in the world with his family.

What was more, I had another illness after 2003 and consulted the clinic's doctor that I often went to. He gave me some instructions and suitable medicine as before. Therefore, I had to take more pills for them. At present, I am taking four different

pills after breakfast daily. This is also lengthening my lifespan. Later, I sometimes think about why I am doing this to lengthen my lifespan. **Am I attached to my current life? Is lengthening lifespan good? What am I going to do in the remaining period of my life?**

A lengthening lifespan is called longevity, and it was stated on Wikipedia as follows.

As living conditions improve and the science of medicine advances, the longevity of the average American has increased greatly, from about 45 years in 1900 to over 75 years today. But the most impressive human longevity is nothing compared to the 400-year lifespan of an ocean clam

found near Iceland, or the 5,000-year lifespan of the bristlecone pine, a tree found in the western US. We may use *longevity* to talk not only about actual lives but also of the useful "life" of things: the life of your car's tires or the shingles on your roof, for example.

From the above passage, I happened to take notice of the phrase "the useful life". One's life is long, but if he could not do anything for society and depends on all his measures upon the others, is his life meaningful? All his measures such as having a meal, changing clothes, taking a bath, urination, excretions, making the bed, walking hither and thither in the house, bringing medicines to


take them, etc., will be the duties of the others, and it will be a burden for them. If so, his longevity will not be beneficial to society.

In addition, on 26 April, 5.4902 tonnes of illegal timbers (estimated value of K1,098,040) were seized under the Forest Law in Bago District and Toungoo District yesterday during an inspection conducted by the inspection team led by the Forest Department under the supervision of the Bago Region

Anti-Illegal Trade Special Task Force. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

Similarly, an unregistered Honda Fit GE6 vehicle (estimated value of K1,500,000) in the Sagaing Region during an inspection conducted by the inspection team led by the Police Force under the supervision of the Sagaing Region Anti-Illegal Trade Special Task Force. The action was taken under the Export and Import Law.

Therefore, the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee stated that ten arrests (estimated at K189,548,122) were made on 23, 25 and 26 April. — MNA

Chinese Taipei logs single-day high of 6,339 new COVID-19 cases

Chinese Taipei on Tuesday reported a single-day high of 6,339 new COVID-19 cases, comprising 6,295 locally transmitted cases and 44 imported infections, said the Central Epidemic Command Centre (CECC). Of the local cases, New Taipei city reported the highest number of infections at 2,076, followed by Taipei city with 1,302, Taoyuan city with 1,159, Keelung city with 409, Taichung city with 263, Hualien county with 212, Kaohsiung city with 182 and Yilan county with 126 cases.

With the addition of new cases, the total number of COVID-19 cases in Chinese Taipei reported, so far mounted to 68,022 including 10,521 imported cases and 57,447 local cases.

With no fresh death reported in the past 24 hours, the death toll remained unchanged at 856 including 842 fatalities from local cases and the other 14 from imported cases. — ANI

Multinational pharmaceutical company keen to expand cooperation with China

ASTRAZENECA, a multinational biopharmaceutical company, is keen to cooperate with China on a wide range of topics, including global anti-epidemic cooperation and promoting healthcare innovations, said the head of the company at the Boao Forum for Asia Annual Conference 2022.

“In order to reinforce the achievements in the global fight against COVID-19 and share the health and wellbeing, addressing timely and equitable access to vaccines

and vaccination is urgent for the world,” Leif Johansson, chairman of AstraZeneca, said in his speech via video link at the Boao forum.

As of the first quarter of 2022, AstraZeneca has delivered more than 2.8 billion doses of COVID-19 vaccine to more than 180 countries worldwide, about two-thirds of which were exported to go to low-income countries and regions.

He said that AstraZeneca is committed to working with all parties to bridge the vaccine

gap and strengthen exchanges on anti-pandemic experience through digital means.

Johansson pointed out that China has scored world-renowned achievements in developing the digital economy, and the application of digital technologies such as 5G, big data, and artificial intelligence has significantly improved the quality of medical services and accessibility of treatment for patients in China.

In terms of China-Europe cooperation, Leon Wang, executive vice-president and international and China president of AstraZeneca, spoke highly of the significant role that Chinese companies played in promoting close economic and trade exchanges between the two sides.

Faced with multiple challenges posed by the pandemic, he suggested all parties should seek common ground while reserving differences so as to explore more potential for the global economic recovery and achieve a win-win outcome. —Xinhua

Serum Institute of India, world's largest vaccine maker, halts production of Covishield

SERUM Institute of India has halted production of Covishield, the locally made version of the AstraZeneca Covid-19 vaccine, due to falling demand, said chief executive of the world's largest vaccine maker on Friday.

The Serum institute has produced more than one billion doses of Covishield — its version of the AstraZeneca jab — and is a major supplier to the Covax global inoculation programme for poorer countries. There is now a global glut of coronavirus vaccines.

It is a remarkable contrast to a year ago, when India, known as the “pharmacy of the world”, restricted exports to combat a terrifying rise in infections that pushed the healthcare system to breaking point. Vaccine exports resumed in November.

“We’ve got 200 million doses of stock,” said Serum chief Adar

Poonawalla. “We shut down production in December. I’ve even offered to give free donations to whoever wants to take it,” he told an economic forum organized by Times Network media group.

“I didn’t know what to do with the product. So I had to tell them, shut down the production. Otherwise, it’ll all expire,” he

added. Drugs Controller General of India allows Covishield to be used for up to nine months after its manufacturing date. The production halt applies only to Covishield, a Serum spokesperson confirmed to AFP. The company also produces Covovax under licence from US pharma giant Novavax. — AFP

Small businesses struggling in New Zealand, uncertainty looms over COVID-19

SONNY Sun who owns a small retail shop located in the central business district (CBD) in New Zealand's largest city Auckland, is not sure of the business outlook.

Small businesses have suffered a lot amid COVID-19 in New Zealand, and they are still struggling as New Zealand has loosened COVID-19 restrictions nationwide.

Sun's business used to be brisk before the pandemic when white-collar workers, tourists and international students were swarming across the busy commercial area.

“Business was very good in 2017 and 2018. I used to have four employees working for me,” Sun said.

To avoid being infected amid COVID-19, many people in New Zealand have worked at home to reduce social activities. Now walking down the once busy Queen Street in Auckland CBD, it is not uncommon to find homeless people and rough sleepers sheltering themselves in front of many of the empty shops. News of crime was heard now and then.

“I have to shorten the business hour of my shop. It is very unsafe at night time here. I can't risk my employees' or my safety for just several dollars of income,” said Sun, adding that his shop was robbed several times in the past year.

Sun has already lost most of his customers, some employees and revenue amid the pandemic. “My deficit reached 70,000 New Zealand dollars in 2020,” said Sun. —Xinhua

Japan unveils 6.2 tril. yen package to soften impact of Ukraine war

JAPAN on Tuesday compiled a 6.2 trillion yen (\$48 billion) emergency economic package to mitigate the impact on households and smaller firms of rising prices, partly blamed on Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

The key features of the package include cash handouts of 50,000 yen per child for low-income households, more subsidies for oil wholesalers to bring down retail gasoline prices and support for struggling small and medium-sized companies as well as livestock farmers.

The relief measures, compiled before a House of Councillors election in July, come as rising fuel costs and food prices are threatening to hurt consumer sentiment, with the economy yet

to fully recover from the COVID-19 pandemic fallout.

To finance the new spending, the government will tap 1.5 trillion yen from reserve funds allocated for emergency spending in the

current business year that began in April, around 2 trillion yen secured in the fiscal 2022 budget and other sources as well as 2.7 trillion yen from an extra budget to be compiled later.—Kyodo

Asia facing 'stagflationary outlook' amid Ukraine war: IMF

ASIAN nations, like the rest of the world, are being battered by countervailing forces such as the war in Ukraine that are raising prices while holding back growth, the IMF said Monday.

"The region faces a stagflationary outlook, with growth being lower than previously expected,

and inflation being higher," said Anne-Marie Gulde-Wolf, acting director of the IMF's Asia and Pacific Department. The regional outlook, which follows the World Economic Outlook released last week, shows the growth forecast for Asia was cut to 4.9 per cent, impacted by the slowdown in China,

which is having ripple effects on other closely-linked economies.

Inflation is now expected to rise 3.2 per cent this year, a full point higher than expected in January, she said. "Despite the downgrade, Asia remains the world's most dynamic region, and an important source of global growth," Gulde-Wolf said in remarks prepared for delivery to a press briefing. But the Russian invasion of Ukraine and Western sanctions on Moscow have driven up food and fuel prices worldwide, while major central banks are raising interest rates to combat inflation, which will pressure countries with high debt loads.

A larger-than-expected slowdown in China due to prolonged or more widespread Covid-19 lockdowns or a longer-than-expected slump in the property market presents "a significant risk for the region."—AFP

World's top 500 companies gradually resume production in Shanghai

DESPITE the impact of the COVID-19 resurgence in Shanghai, more than 4,000 workers at a factory of SAIC Motor, a Chinese automaker have resumed work while being shielded from the virus.

Starting on 18 April the complete vehicle and parts manufacturers and logistics branches of the world's top 500 company started the pressure test for work and production resumption, focusing on the support of personnel, supply chain, production management as well as epidemic prevention measures, said Huang Jianying, Party chief of a passenger vehicle branch of SAIC Motor.

More than 700 complete vehicles have come off the production line at the branch's factory located in China (Shanghai) Pilot Free Trade Zone since the first one came off on 19 April.

The factory's production will gradually climb if the supply chain remains stable, according to Ji Qiwei, deputy general manager of the branch.

"We attach sufficient importance to both production and epidemic prevention," said Huang.

The factory not only formulated a series of plans on epidemic prevention, health screening and emergency before the pressure test but also set up eight professional teams of security, logistics and emergency response. The teams take charge of implementing the prevention measures and disinfecting the production, material and living areas.

As for the challenges in the supply chain and logistics, Huang said SAIC Motor has conducted a comprehensive survey of suppliers' production capacity, inventory and raw materials while helping them advance the epidemic prevention and production resumption.—Xinhua

Boao Forum builds up high expectations for revival of world economy, says Turkish scholar

THE Boao Forum for Asia (BFA) Annual Conference 2022 creates high expectations for contributing to the revival of the world economy and multilateral trade mechanism, especially in the post-COVID-19 pandemic era, a Turkish scholar has said.

Founded in 2001, the BFA is a non-governmental and non-profit international organization committed to promoting regional economic integration and bringing Asian countries closer to their development goals.

Held annually in Boao, a coastal town in China's southernmost province of Hainan, the forum brings together world leaders, business leaders, scholars and think tanks representatives.

This year's event opened on Wednesday and lasted three days.

Selcuk Colakoglu, director of the Ankara-based Turkish Center for Asia-Pacific Studies, said there were "vibrant discussions" at the forum on integration and globalization in Asia and other parts of the world, which have been impacted by the pandemic.—Xinhua

German business mood up slightly despite Ukraine war

THE business climate in Germany improved slightly in April as Europe's largest economy absorbed the initial shock of the war in Ukraine, an economic think-tank said on Monday.

"The German economy has

shown its resilience," Ifo president Clemens Fuest said after the closely watched index rose to 91.8 points from 90.8 points in March.

Companies were less pessimistic about the outlook for

the economy, after the mood plunged in March following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, Ifo said.

The overall indicator lost almost eight points in March, while forecasts took a bigger knock

than at the start of the coronavirus pandemic two years ago.

The assessment of current conditions was "minimally better", Fuest said, adding that sentiment among businesses had "stabilized at a low level".

"The initial shock of the war seems to have abated somewhat, but given the multitude of risks, it is too early to start talking about a turning point," said Elmar Voelker, an analyst at LBBW bank.—AFP

Nissan ending production of Datsun brand vehicles

JAPANESE automaker Nissan is ending production of Datsun brand vehicles, less than a decade after reviving the famed budget car to woo cost-conscious customers in emerging markets, the company said on Monday.

“Nissan is focusing on core models and segments that bring the most benefit to customers, dealer partners and the business,” it said in a statement.

“Production of Datsun redi-GO will cease at the Chennai Plant,” it said, adding that sales of already built models

would continue.

The facility in India was the last one operating for the brand, after production ended in Indonesia and Russia.

The company said aftersales service and parts would remain available.

Nissan first killed off the Datsun brand in 1981, but it was revived in 2013 by then-CEO Carlos Ghosn.

Ghosn would go on to be arrested in Japan on allegations of financial misconduct, before jumping bail and fleeing to Lebanon where he remains an international fugitive.—AFP

ECB calls for global regulation of cryptocurrencies

A senior European Central Bank official called Monday for global regulation of cryptocurrencies as the virtual assets are now bigger than the risky mortgage loans behind the 2007 global financial crisis and show signs of being a bubble.

Cryptocurrencies like bitcoin have so far largely escaped regulation, but authorities in numerous countries are taking a closer look given the threat they could pose to financial systems given their volatility and the increasing size of the market.

“We need to make coordinated efforts at the global level to bring cryp-



to-assets into the regulatory purview,” said Fabio Panetta, a member of the ECB’s executive board, in a speech in New York. “And we need to en-

sure that they are subject to standards in line with those applied to the financial system.” His call echoes that of the Bank of England, which

last month increased oversight to prevent cryptocurrencies from becoming a risk to financial stability.

Panetta said the crypto market is now larger than the \$1.3 trillion (1.21 trillion euros) sub-prime mortgage market was when it melted down and triggered the global financial crisis in 2007.

Moreover, “it shows strikingly similar dynamics”, he warned.

“Crypto evangelists promise heaven on earth, using an illusory narrative of ever-rising crypto-asset prices to maintain inflows and thus the momentum fuelling the crypto bubble,” said Panetta.—AFP

China’s cross-border e-commerce registers growth despite pandemic

AT a cross-border e-commerce industrial park in Hefei, capital of east China’s Anhui Province, workers from Shangyan Trading Company are busy loading clothes into trucks after quality inspection.

The goods will be

transported thousands of miles away to overseas warehouses and will be shipped to North America for sale.

“Despite the pandemic headwinds, our cross-border e-commerce sales have continued to grow in recent years,”

said Jiang Yebing, general manager of Shangyan, adding that the company’s sales volume rose by 60 per cent year on year in the first quarter of 2022 and goods were delivered each day.

Driven by factors including smoother logistics

channels and more convenient customs clearance policies, cross-border e-commerce in landlocked Anhui has gained momentum. This impetus offers a glimpse into China’s rapid growth in this field against the backdrop of the pandemic.—Xinhua

UBS profits rise on investment banking rebound

SWISS banking giant UBS reported Tuesday better-than-expected net profit for the first quarter, which rose by 17 per cent to \$2.1 billion (1.9 billion euros), buoyed by an upturn in its investment banking division.

The bank’s operating income — the equivalent of revenue — jumped eight percent compared to the same period a year earlier, to more than \$9.3 billion, Switzerland’s biggest bank said in a statement.

Both figures beat expectations of analysts surveyed by Swiss agency AWP, which had pencilled in an average of \$1.6 billion in net profit, on operating income of \$8.8 billion. UBS chief executive Ralph Hamers said that the first three months of the year had been “dominated by extraordinary geopolitical and macro events”.

But he added in the statement that the bank had “remained focused on executing our strategy, providing stability for our clients and managing risk”.—AFP

Pope asks Sri Lanka to reveal Easter bombers over conspiracy murmurs

POPE Francis urged Sri Lankan authorities on Monday to reveal who was behind the country's 2019 Easter bombings in an attack the island's Catholics suspect was a plot to propel President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to power.

While meeting with a delegation of over 60 victims of the Easter Sunday attacks on three churches and three hotels that killed 279 people, Francis asked Rajapaksa's administration to reveal the truth.

"Please, out of love for justice, out of love for your people, let it be made clear once and for all who were responsible for these events," the pope said in an appeal to Colombo.

"This will bring peace to your conscience and to your country."

Addressing some 3,500 Sri

Lankans in Italy, including some of the victims, the pope also said he prayed that Sri Lanka will also be able to ride out the worst economic crisis in its history.

The island is gripped by severe shortages of food, fuel and medicines with its 22 million residents grappling with daily

electricity blackouts and galloping inflation.

The head of Sri Lanka's Catholic Church, Malcolm Ranjith, who conducted mass at St. Peter's basilica just before meeting with the pope on Monday, called for "justice and change" in his country.—AFP

Branson urges Singapore not to execute disabled man

BRITISH tycoon Richard Branson on Tuesday urged Singapore to spare the life of a mentally

disabled Malaysian facing execution, telling AFP the death penalty was a "horrible blotch"

on the city-state's reputation.

Nagaenthran K. Dharmalingam, convicted of trafficking a small amount of heroin into Singapore, is due to be hanged on Wednesday after more than a decade on death row.

The planned execution has sparked an international outcry, with the United Nations and European Union among those condemning a punishment they say is cruel and ineffective as a deterrent.

In an interview with AFP, Branson, a long-time campaigner against the death penalty, urged Singaporean President Halimah Yacob to grant Nagaenthran clemency.—AFP

Japan PM to visit Southeast Asia, Europe amid Ukraine crisis

JAPANESE Prime Minister Fumio Kishida plans to tour Southeast Asia and Europe over a holiday week starting Friday, Deputy Chief Cabinet Secretary Seiji Kihara said Tuesday.

The premier will visit Indonesia, Vietnam, Thailand, Italy

and Britain over the eight-day period through 6 May for talks with their leaders, Kihara told a parliamentary meeting.

Kishida is expected to exchange views with the leaders regarding Russia's war in Ukraine.

The war, which started when Russia launched an invasion on 24 February, has created a humanitarian crisis. Ukraine has been asking for global support, including more armaments to help repel Russian forces.—Kyodo

Court blocks Biden lifting US border expulsion policy

A US federal judge on Monday temporarily blocked President Joe Biden from ending a policy allowing the government to quickly expel migrants at the southern border during the pandemic.

The Biden administration had been on track to lift the measure, known as Title 42, on 23 May — a decision that sparked uproar among Republicans and many Democrats, as well as advocates for tougher border controls.

The US District Court in Louisiana said after a videoconference with lawyers it had "announced its intent to grant the motion" originally filed by Missouri, Louisiana and Arizona to stay the termination.

"The parties will confer regarding the specific terms to be contained in the Temporary Restraining Order and attempt to reach agreement," it said in the ruling.

The order prevents the administration from taking any action before a hearing on May 13 to determine whether Title 42 can be lifted.

The three Republican states that brought the lawsuit — later joined by 18 others — celebrated a major win they hoped would avert the unprecedented influx of migrants predicted by Homeland Security officials.—AFP

Russia blocks chess website over Ukraine

THE popular website Chess.com has been blocked in Russia after publishing two critical articles on the situation in Ukraine branded "false information" by the authorities.

The site, which boasts 50 million members worldwide, is now on a list of blocked sources drawn up by Russia's telecom watchdog Roskomnadzor.

The general prosecutor's office requested that access to just two pages of the Chess.com critical of Russia's "special operation" in Ukraine be restricted, domestic agencies and media reported.

But because Chess.com uses the HTTPS protocol, the whole site has become unavailable, the media said.

Chess.com could not be opened in Russia on Sunday afternoon.

The articles allegedly condemned the offensive Russia unleashed in Ukraine on 24 February according to Russian media reports.

Chess.com has already banned Russian grandmaster Sergey Karjakin, who has publicly supported the offensive, from playing games on the site. Karjakin, who played Norway's Magnus Carlsen in 2016 for the world title, has also been suspended for six months by world chess governing body FIDE.—AFP

Iran hails latest talks with Saudi Arabia as 'positive'

IRAN said Monday that the latest round of talks with its regional rival Saudi Arabia was "positive and serious" and voiced hope for further progress soon.

Tehran and Riyadh, which severed diplomatic ties in 2016, held four rounds of talks in Iraq between April and September last year, with a fifth meeting last Thursday.

"The fifth round of negotiations between Iran and Saudi Arabia in Baghdad ... was positive and serious and saw progress," foreign ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh told reporters.

Shiite Muslim-majority Iran and the Sunni kingdom of Saudi Arabia support rival sides in several conflicts, including in Yemen, where Tehran backs the Huthi rebels and Riyadh leads a military coalition supporting the government.

In 2016, Iranian protesters attacked Saudi diplomatic missions in the Islamic republic after the kingdom executed revered Shiite cleric Nimr al-Nimr. Riyadh responded by cutting ties with Tehran.

Iran's Nour news agency reported the latest talks were attended by "senior officials from the secretariat of Iran's Supreme National Security Council and the head of the Saudi intelligence service".—AFP

N. Korea's Kim vows to boost nuclear capabilities at military parade

NORTH Korean leader Kim Jong Un has pledged to bolster his country's nuclear capabilities at the "maximum speed" in a speech given at a military parade to mark the 90th anniversary of the founding of the nation's army, state-run media reported Tuesday.

At the first military parade in Pyongyang's Kim Il Sung Square since January 2021, held Monday night, ballistic missiles including a new type of intercontinental ballistic missile Hwasong-17 were displayed, the Korean Central News Agency

said.

The Hwasong-17 is believed to be capable of delivering a nuclear warhead to anywhere in the continental United States.

The country's main Rodong Sinmun newspaper released photos of the parade showing many other weapons, including what appear to be hypersonic and submarine-launched ballistic missiles.

Kim said the country's nuclear force is a "symbol of national power" and it should be further strengthened, according to KCNA, underscoring it has

no intention to abandon its nuclear capabilities. He added he will use nuclear "deterrence" anytime if necessary.

Bilateral negotiations between North Korea and the United States over denuclearization and sanctions relief have been at a standstill for more than two years.

In recent years, North Korea has held military parades, aimed at enhancing national pride, at night to liven up the festive mood through colourful lights, foreign affairs experts said.—Kyodo

UN chief, Turkish president promise to work for peace in Ukraine

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres and Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Monday reaffirmed their commitment to ending the conflict in Ukraine and to creating conditions to end the suffering of civilians, said a UN spokesman.

Guterres met Erdogan in the Turkish capital Ankara on Monday. The UN chief expressed his support for Turkey's ongoing diplomatic efforts in relation to the conflict in Ukraine, Farhan Haq, Guterres' deputy spokesman, told reporters in New York.

"He and President Erdogan reaffirmed that their common objective is to end the war as soon as possible and to create conditions to end the suffering of civilians. They stressed the urgent need for effective access through humanitarian corridors to evacuate civilians and deliver much-needed assistance to impacted communities," said Haq.

They agreed to stay in contact to follow up on ongoing initiatives, he added. Guterres and Erdogan also discussed the impact of the Ukraine conflict on regional and global issues, including energy, food and finance, said Haq.

Guterres was in Ankara on Monday before travelling to Moscow and Kyiv. Turkey, a major mediator, has also indicated its willingness to become a security guarantor of Ukraine.—Xinhua

Russia's Lavrov warns of 'real' danger of World War III

RUSSIAN Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said Monday that peace talks with Ukraine would continue, while warning there was a "real" danger of a World War III. Speaking to Russian news agencies, he criticized Kyiv's approach to the talks, adding: "Good will has its limits. But if it isn't reciprocal, that doesn't help

the negotiation process.

"But we are continuing to engage in negotiations with the team delegated by [Ukrainian President Volodymyr] Zelensky, and these contacts will go on."

But Lavrov accused former actor Zelensky of "pretending" to negotiate. "He's a good actor," he said.

But he added: "If you watch attentively and read attentively what he says, you'll find a thousand contradictions."

Given the current tensions, Lavrov said the danger of a World War III was "real." "The danger is serious, it is real, you can't underestimate it," Lavrov told the Interfax news agency.—AFP

BLINKEN confirms that US diplomats, withdrawn at the start of Russia's invasion, will gradually return to Kyiv.

US President Joe Biden nominates career foreign service officer Bridget Brink to be the next US ambassador.

Several European countries have also reopened their embassies in Kyiv since Russia withdrew its forces from the region.

No deal on Mariupol

RUSSIA'S army says Kyiv prevented civilian evacuations from Mariupol's Azovstal steel plant, where Ukrainian forces have been holding out in the besieged port city, despite announcing a unilateral ceasefire.

Ukraine disputes the claims, saying Moscow did not agree to its request for the evacuation of wounded soldiers and civilians.

Putin congratulates Macron

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin congratulates French President Emmanuel Macron on his re-election following a run-off with far-right candidate Marine Le Pen, seen as closer to Moscow.

Russia strikes on rail infrastructure kill 5, wound 18

AT least five people were killed and another 18 injured on Monday in Russian strikes on railway infrastructure in the central Ukraine region of Vinnytsia, Kyiv said.

"Preliminary information shows that five people died and 18 were injured. Rescue operations are under way, investigators, prosecutors and other services are working at the scene," the Ukrainian prosecutor general's office said in a statement on social media.

'Anfield is hell' says Villarreal's Capoue

"I said 'Where is Villarreal?'" explains Etienne Capoue, who describes it like he was scanning a map of the world and pointing his finger down.

"I was told it was in the sun, just there, next to Valencia. So I said 'alright, let's go'."

Capoue's last two games for Watford were in England's second tier against Norwich and Huddersfield.

He left in January 2021 and his last two games of that sea-

son for Villarreal came against Real Madrid and Manchester United. Villarreal beat United on penalties to win the Europa League final and Capoue was named man of the match.

On Wednesday, Villarreal, the club Capoue knew nothing about, face Liverpool in the first leg of the Champions League semi-finals. A small, sleepy town on Spain's east coast now has an outside shot at being crowned kings of Europe.

"Winning the Champions League? We never had the audacity to say we could win the Champions League," Capoue tells AFP laughing.

"We're the smallest club in the semi-finals, we were the smallest club in the quarter-finals. We're just making our merry way. And we have nothing to lose."

Villarreal knocked out Juventus in the last 16 and Bayern Munich in the quarters, two clubs that together own twice as many European Cups - eight - as Villarreal have wins in the knock-out stage.

When Bayern were winning a third consecutive European Cup in 1976, Villarreal were being relegated to the Spanish fourth tier.

For some at Villarreal, the talk of fairytales and giant-killings might be wearing thin.

Villarreal is a tiny town but a big club, the Europa League champions, a team owned by a supermarket tycoon, who have finished only one of the last eight seasons outside La Liga's top seven. — AFP

Raducanu set for fourth coach in a year after cutting Beltz loose

US Open champion Emma Raducanu is set to appoint her fourth coach in a year after ending her association with Torben Beltz after just five months, she said on Tuesday.

The 19-year-old is due to play in the Madrid Open this week as she builds up to the French Open but said she felt

she required a "new training model".

The Lawn Tennis Association's (LTA) head of women's coaching, Iain Bates, will work with Raducanu this week.

She will bid to build on her run to the Stuttgart quarter-finals last week where she lost to world number one and eventual champion Iga Swiatek.

"I want to thank Torben for his coaching, professionalism and dedication over the last half a year," said Raducanu, who on Monday rose to her highest world ranking of 11.

"He has a huge heart and I have enjoyed our strong chemistry during the time together.

"I feel the best direction for my development is to transition to a new training model with the LTA supporting in the interim." — AFP
