## Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to **613,381** after **11** new cases were reported on 4 June 2022 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, **592,327** have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll stands at **19,434** without more casualties.—MNA

## Arrangements needed to meet electricity needs: Union Minister

THE Ministry of Electric Power and the Ministry of Energy should make arrangements to meet the electricity needs of the people, Union Minister U Thaung Han said. This is the order given to the authorities when he arrived at Paunglaung Hydropower Plant on the morning of 4 June.

Next, the Union minister said that it is necessary to continuously inspect the generators for durability and pay special atten-

tion to the cleanliness and safety of the power plant. The Ministry of Electric Power and the Ministry of Energy should work to meet the growing electricity demand, he said. To be able to produce electricity continuously and with stability throughout the year, efforts are being made to balance generation resources on power generation projects, such as Hydropower plants, Solar power plants, natural gas and thermal



power plants.

Afterwards, the Union minister and party arrived at Paunglaung Dam and urged to systematically manage the water flowing into the dam to generate

electricity to meet the demand for electricity before next summer.

He also inspected the condition of the dam, water inflow of the dam, water storage and the condition of the construction of

the overflow water gate. In Yangon Region, the part-time power supply was tested from 5 pm to 8 am on 25 May, and it is planned to provide a 24-hour power supply from mid-June. — MNA

ment Department in Sittway Township and instructed the necessary things regarding the Rakhine state development programmes.

Then, they went to the Shwekyia weaving operation in Kyamathauk Village in Sittway. They met the owner and viewed round the operation site.

They then inspected the bean cultivation area of U Aung Than Tin who is running with Mya Sein Yang Fund in Kyamathauk Village.

The deputy minister and party also checked the concrete road paving works carried out by villagers in Ywathitkay Village using the Village Development Project fund (VDP) of the Rural Development Department.

They also visited the Minthalay general economic

cooperatives in Sanpya (North) Ward of Sittway Township and held discussions with the officials of the association.

On arrival at the weaving training school of the Small-Scale Industries Department in Sittway Township, the Headmaster, teachers and staff reported on the procedures of the training school to the deputy minister. He then viewed the practical session of trainees and provided cash assistance to them. The deputy minister then went to Rakhine State Cooperative Confederation and instructed the cooperatives to produce and distribute natural fertilizers, find ways to collect the granted loans and provide tractors, agricultural materials and agrochemicals to the association's farmers. —MNA

## COVID-19 vaccine drive continues in various states, regions

DOCTORS and nurses from public hospitals, Tatmadaw medical teams, healthcare workers and volunteers are working hard to give COVID-19 vaccines in different states and regions as the vaccination programme is one of the most important activities in the prevention, control and treatment of COVID-19 disease.

COVID-19 vaccine is administered daily to target groups regardless of race or religion, including Buddhist monks and nuns, local people over the age of 40, students, religious leaders, prisoners, people with disabilities, ethnic armed groups, people with chronic diseases, people in IDP camps and over 12-year-old students, respectively.

On 3 and 4 June, doctors and nurses from public hospitals, medical teams

from the Tatmadaw, relevant healthcare workers in collaboration with volunteers gave COVID-19 vaccines to 2,408 people from 12 townships in Shan State (North), 5,224 people from 26 townships in Ayeyawady Region, 4,325 people from nine townships in Rakhine and Chin states, 3,263 people from seven districts in Mandalay Region and 175 people from Bago and Toungoo townships in Bago Region, respectively.

Similarly, healthcare officials inoculated 1,478 students from seven townships in northern Shan State and 95,413 students from 26 townships in Ayeyawady Region on 3 and 4 June.

It is reported that officials from the respective Military Commands visited the site and coordinated the necessary work. — MNA

Domestic and international flights were reopened to boost tourism and revitalize domestic travel and facilitate the flow of goods abroad during the period

of COVID-19.

With the arrival of international airlines, AirAsia (Berhad) Flight No. 505 will fly twice a week, with direct flights to Kuala Lumpur and Yangon on Mondays and Fridays.

Due to the global epidemic, international flights were temporarily suspended at Yangon International Airport in 2020. The flight resumed on 17 April 2022. With 72,540 departures and 20,991 flights operated, YACL expects to increase the number of passengers and flights at Yangon International Airport this year. — Nyein Thu (MNA)

## Daily imports of essential anti-COVID-19 equipment conducted in smooth process

Three companies imported 101,150 PPE suits and one tonne of disposable face masks by five vehicles from 1

to 4 June.

Officials from relevant departments provided necessary facilities in order to beef up the standard operating procedures-SOP for the import process.

## CBM releases statement revealing actions against companies for remaining export earnings

THE Central Bank of Myanmar released a statement that they are investigating to take action on the companies that fail to deposit export earnings on 3 June.

The statement said the 137 companies are facing actions under Section 42-a of the Foreign Exchange Management Law and the boards of directors of these companies have been blacklisted.

Exporters are required to comply with Article 38 (b) of the Foreign Exchange Management Law, to deposit their export earnings in the domestic banks in foreign currency and if they fail to do so, they will have to face imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year or a fine or both punishments must be imposed under Section 42-a of the law, it added.

To receive the full revenue

from exports, the exporters are required to have the export earnings in foreign currency in their bank accounts within six months from the date of shipment (within three months

from 10-11-2021) according to Section 38-b of the Foreign Exchange Management Law and Paragraph 35 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law. Therefore, the Central

Committee on Acceleration of Trade and Goods, the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations, the Ministry of Legal Affairs, the Ministry of Commerce, the

Central Bank of Myanmar, the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI), and the Foreign Exchange Authorized Dealer (AD) Licenced Banks cooperated to ensure the 2009 export earnings of export companies.

In their operations, it included clarification by AD Banks (within two years), clarification by the UMFCCI (60 days), announcing to clarify in the newspapers and the website of the Central Bank of Myanmar (60 days), closing the registration certificate of importers and exporters (PPA) for those who do not clarify (30 days) by the Ministry of Commerce and holding five meetings with exporters led by the Central Committee for Acceleration of Trade and Goods, the statement said.—TWA/GNLM

Processing jaggery at one cottage industry.

DURING the new jaggery season, the price of old jaggery is about K3,000 per viss and the people get more profits than previous years.

“The jaggery is produced thrice a year. In the normal season, the price of jaggery declines in the market. Currently, the price does not fall and it reached nearly K3,000 and so the farmers reap good profits,” said Ko Tun Tun Win, a jaggery dealer in the delta region.

On 2 June 2022, the price of NyaungU Say Khet Aphyu was K2,200 per viss while K2,000 per viss of Taungtha/Mahline (done),

K2,200 per viss of Pakokku jaggery and K2,800 per viss of Yesakyo Wanphyu jaggery.

On 28 January 2022, the price of NyaungU Say Khet Aphyu was K2,850 per viss while K2,800 per viss of Taungtha/Mahline (done), K2,800 per viss of Pakokku jaggery and K3,000 per viss of Yesakyo Wanphyu jaggery, according to data of the Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre.

The price of Yesakyo Wanphyu jaggery rose to K3,300 per viss on 4 April. On the same period of 2 June 2021, the price of NyaungU Say Khet Aphyu was K1,600 per viss while K1,250 per

viss of Taungtha/Mahline (done), K1,350 per viss of Pakokku jaggery and K1,900 per viss of Yesakyo Wanphyu jaggery.

The sugar price drastically declined from the jaggery price in 2020 and the sale of jaggery mixed with sugar was high at K300/400 lower than the real jaggery.

On 9 October 2020, the sugar was priced at K920 per viss, K1,800 per viss of NyaungU Say Khet, K1,750 per viss of Mahline jaggery, K1800 per viss of Pakokku jaggery, K2,100 per viss of Yesakyo jaggery while the price of NyaungU jaggery mixed with sugar was K1,400 per viss and K1,250-1,300 per viss of Mahline jaggery mixed with sugar, according to jaggery wholesale centres.

In the 2010s, the real jaggery was priced at K1,000 per viss.

During the early period of this year, the price of jaggery became high and there was no jaggery sitting in the warehouse, jaggery purchaser Ko Thein Zan said. In 2022, the sugar price is different from the normal price of jaggery and the jaggery mixed with sugar becomes less in the market, according to the jaggery wholesale centre. — TWA/GNLM

## YESC to provide 24/7 electricity in Yangon starting mid-June

THE arrangements are being carried out to distribute electricity in full in some townships of the Yangon Region, according to YESC.

Currently, the townships receive power from 5 pm to 8 am and the industrial zones have power between 9 am and 5 pm.

The rotation system from 5 pm to 8 am was started on 25 May and the power will be supplied for 24 hours starting mid-June.

“We are so happy that we will receive electricity as usual. We cannot do anything if there is a power outage. It is not okay to run

generators as the fuel price is high. We have to shorten the working hours if there is a power outage. We have losses just in one week or one month,” said Ma Myat Noe who runs a small-scale garment industry.

According to the data from the Ministry of Electric Power, the country produces electricity between 2,661 mW and 2,742 mW per day, while the demand is more than 3,800 mV. It now produces an additional 200 mV per day for high rainfalls and so the power supply system is changed. — TWA/GNLM

### Sustainable Living in harmony with nature

- Conserving the environment
- Efforts to increase human resource development
- And maintenance of public property.

These factors demonstrate the highest commitment of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar to environmental management. Part of Myanmar's reform process includes amending and approving environmental policies and laws. The Government of Myanmar has declared a path to sustainable, socially and environmentally sustainable development for its citizens.

### Investors are also joining forces.

Myanmar released the environmental quality standards, environmental impact assessment and the social impact assessment in

2016. In order to comply with Myanmar's changing environmental regulations, the Environmental Conservation Department (ECD) and the Ministry of Environmental Conservation and Forestry (MOECAF) provided additional information to investors who are unsure of specific environmental requirements.

The Environmental Conservation Department (ECD) is working with other ministries to test a new environmental impact assessment system. In the end of 2014, the Environmental Conservation Department (ECD) had provided guidance and review to more than 123 investment projects for environmental assessment. Forty of these projects were energy, infrastructure and production projects, which have already completed environmental impact assessments.

As industrial parks grow, so

does environmental protection. Investors also need to become familiar with Myanmar's environmental law. Investors will be able to support Myanmar's responsible investment promotion process by adhering to the country's environmental regulations. Only then will foreign investors be able to take consider the environmental standards used in their operations in other countries in setting standards for environmental protection in Myanmar.




life to the venomous catfish species. Ye Marn cannot console his soul and he followed a path to avenge that fish.

### Illegal timbers and consumer goods seized

## China, Papua New Guinea discuss free-trade deal

CHINA and Papua New Guinea held talks on a free-trade deal Friday, as Beijing's foreign minister wrapped up a landmark tour of the Pacific Islands with a stop in the resource-rich nation.

Papua New Guinea's Prime Minister James Marape said discussions in the capital Port Moresby had focused on economic cooperation and a long-mooted trade agreement.

China is already a major investor in Papua New Guinea and buys much of the country's gas, minerals, timber and other resources.

Beijing is vying with Australia to be Papua New Guinea's leading trading partner.

Marape, who has vowed to make his country the world's richest black Christian nation, said he wants to shift the economy away from primary materials to more lucrative finished products. He has invited more Chinese investment and said work was ongoing on a trade deal.

"China and Papua New Guinea officials are going through tidying Chinese-PNG free-trade arrangements," Marape told journalists.

"The specifics of the free-trade arrangement are being finalized as we go through, so that Papua New Guinea interests are not suppressed or harmed, but maintained and in fact augmented," he said. His comments come as China, Australia and other Western allies race for influence across the Pacific Islands.

The vast but sparsely populated region is home to vital shipping channels and – because of its location near areas where the Chinese and US militaries operate – seen as strategically important.—AFP

## Sri Lanka seeks UN help on food shortages

CASH-STRAPPED Sri Lanka is seeking urgent United Nations help to build a stockpile of essential foods, the prime minister's office said Friday, after authorities warned of looming starvation.

Acute shortages of food, fuel and other essential goods, along with record inflation and rolling blackouts, have inflicted widespread misery in the island nation's unprecedented economic crisis.

Scarce supplies of petrol, diesel and fertilizer have made it difficult for farmers to grow crops, while the agricultural sector is still reeling from a disastrous organic policy that kneecapped yields last year. The UN Food and Agriculture Organization is now planning a "food crisis response plan" to shore up reserves and will also offer more funds for urban agriculture, Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe's office said in a statement.

Parliamentary speaker Mahinda Yapa Abeywardana warned

in April that Sri Lanka was facing "very acute food shortages and starvation".

Around half of Sri Lanka's rice production was lost last year, and the latest cultivation season which started last month has been disrupted because of fertilizer shortages.

Sri Lanka's painful economic crunch was sparked by a shortage of foreign currency, leaving traders unable to pay for critical imports, including fertilizer. The government has since defaulted on its \$51 billion foreign debt and is seeking an International Monetary Fund bailout. —AFP

## China to further shore up industrial economy

CHINA'S Ministry of Industry and Information Technology on Thursday pledged to strengthen support for the industrial economy despite mounting downward pressure, as part of efforts to stabilize the country's economic fundamentals. The implemen-

tation of the country's package of measures, such as tax and fee cuts, should be accelerated to help enterprises tide over their difficulties as early as possible, said Tao Qing, a ministry official. No effort will be spared to ensure unimpeded industrial chains, she

said, adding that measures will be taken to strengthen the upstream and downstream matchmaking services of key industries, such as the automobile and integrated circuit industries, and to remove bottlenecks in key regions. —Xinhua

#### Pro-Russian officials seek to 'nationalize' state property in Ukraine

Pro-Moscow officials in Ukraine said on Thursday (2 June) a decree had been issued to "nationalise" state property in the southeastern region of Zaporizhzhia.

The decree has been signed by officials installed by Moscow in the area which is partially controlled by Moscow.

"The liberated region of Zaporizhzhia will nationalize the state property of Ukraine," said Vladimir Rogov, a member of the region's pro-Moscow military-civilian administration.

"The corresponding decree was signed by the head of the military-civilian administration of the region," he said on messaging app Telegram.

Zaporizhzhia's nuclear plant is the largest in Europe. —AFP

#### Ukraine central bank raises key interest rate to 25% in war on inflation

UKRAINE'S central bank on Thursday more than doubled its key interest rate in an unprecedented intervention aimed at propping up the country's economy, which has been clobbered by the Russian invasion.

The National Bank of Ukraine (NBU) raised the rate from 10 to 25 per cent per annum – the highest since 2015. It sought to "restrain inflation processes during the war", the board of the National Bank of Ukraine said in a statement.—AFP

# Japan drugmaker tests medicine vending machine in train station

A Japanese pharmaceutical company has started a trial sale of cold medicine, painkillers and other drugs via a vending machine it installed at JR Shinjuku Station in Tokyo, a project that would better serve commuters who suddenly come down with illness.

The vending machine by Taisho Pharmaceutical Co. at one of the busiest train stations in Japan

became operable Tuesday and will be available to use until 31 August.

The pharmaceutical company said it will analyze the issues that come up during the trial run in the hope of installing them in the future in regions that do not have many drugstores.

The machine, which stocks around 30 different products including eye

drops and digestive medicine, will be available to use between 10 am and 6 pm as to allow pharmacists at a drugstore within Shinjuku Station to assist customers. Taisho Pharmaceutical said it will consider extending the machine's operational hours following the trial run.

Pharmacists that are stationed inside the drugstore nearby are notified

through a device when a customer has selected nonprescription medicine via the vending machine.

The user is then able to acquire the item after staff approval. Purchases are limited to prepaid transportation cards, while the machine has an integrated facial recognition system in order to prevent users from bulk buying medicine.— Kyodo

# Bosphorus sea trade unaffected by Ukraine war, sanctions

AT the gates of the Black Sea, trade is in full swing as freighters and oil tankers sail from the heart of Istanbul to Russian and Ukrainian ports.

Just after the Russian offensive in Ukraine on February 24 and the first Western sanctions, the largest vessels of international companies plying on these waters were replaced by smaller ships.

The total number of ships on the route remains around the pre-war level of 40,000, according to experts.

"Russia shamelessly steals Ukrainian grain and sends it overseas from Crimea, including to Turkey," said Vasyl Bodnar,

"In May alone, we counted at least 10 passages including two round trips from three vessels flying the Russian flag...

ship movements on this key waterway between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean for a decade now.

While swiftly condemning the Russian offensive in Ukraine, Turkey positioned itself as a neutral mediator and refused to join Western sanctions against Moscow.

Although Ankara has banned the passage of military vessels through its straits of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus since late February under the Montreux Treaty of 1936, it is not legally entitled to intercept commercial ships or to search them, a diplomatic source said in Ankara.— AFP

# US-Venezuela business picking up despite punishing sanctions

VENEZUELA'S imports of US food and farming products are on the rise, with the private sector driving increased business between the two former partners despite punishing sanctions imposed on Caracas by Washington.

"Venezuela was disappearing from the world of imports and exports for a while, but it's coming back," Luis Vicente Garcia, general manager at the Venezuelan-American Chamber of Commerce (VENANCHAM), told AFP.

"We're at a turning point," Garcia said. Total imports of food

and farming supplies in Venezuela were \$2.4 billion in 2021, a 31.2 percent increase over 2020.

The oil-rich but cash-strapped South American country is now experiencing timid growth after a years-long recession in which its gross domestic product shrunk by 80 per cent.

Purchases from the United States reached \$634 million in 2021, second only to the \$934 million spent in Brazil, according to a report by the US Department of Agriculture, which said that opportunities in Venezuela are improving.—AFP

### Kremlin says 'certain results achieved' by day 100 in Ukraine

THE Kremlin said Friday that Russia had achieved some results from its military campaign in Ukraine, 100 days after Moscow sent troops into its pro-Western neighbour.

"Certain results have been

achieved," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters when asked about the first 100 days of what Russia calls its "special military operation" in Ukraine.

Russia says it sent its forces

into Ukraine to defend residents of two breakaway pro-Moscow regions, the Donetsk and Lugansk People's Republics, from Kyiv's military.

"In terms of ensuring their protection, measures are being taken and certain results have been achieved," Peskov said.

"Many settlements have been liberated from the pro-Nazi armed forces of Ukraine and directly from nationalist elements," he said. Russia has repeatedly described authorities in Ukraine as neo-Nazis and nationalists — labels that Kyiv says are being used as propaganda to justify the conflict.

"The opportunity has been provided for people to start establishing a peaceful life," Peskov said. "This work will continue until the time when all of the goals of the military operation are achieved."

### 'Many settlements liberated': Kremlin

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov says "many settlements have been liberated from the pro-Nazi armed forces of Ukraine and directly from nationalist elements" over the past 100 days.

"The opportunity has been provided for people to start establishing a peaceful life," Peskov tells reporters.

Russia claims it sent its forces into Ukraine to defend residents of two self-proclaimed Russian-backed statelets in the eastern Donbas region, the Donetsk and Lugansk People's Republics.

### UN sees 'no winner'

The UN says there is "no winner" in the worst conflict in Europe in decades.

Nearly 14 million Ukrainians have been forced to flee their homes since the Russian invasion on 24 February, the majority women and children, according to UN estimates.

"This war has and will have no winner. Rather, we have witnessed for 100 days what is lost: lives, homes, jobs and prospects," UN Assistant Secretary-General Amin Awad says in a statement.

### Russian lobbyists barred from EU parliament

The European Parliament bans Russian lobbyists from its premises to prevent them spreading what it calls "propaganda" about Russia's war in Ukraine.

"Effective immediately, Russian company representatives are no longer allowed to enter European Parliament premises," parliament speaker Roberta Metsola says on Twitter.

### Civilians urged to evacuate Sloviansk as Russia bombing intensifies

THE bombing in eastern Ukraine is becoming more intense and, with no water or electricity, 100 people or so heeded the mayor's call on Thursday to evacuate the city of Sloviansk which sits in Russia's crosshairs.

"The situation is getting worse, the explosions are stronger and stronger and the bombs are falling more often," 18-year-old student Goulnara Evgaripova told AFP.

Outside an administrative office, she boarded one of five minibuses earmarked to take people out of the city in the Donetsk region that Moscow wants to control.

One Russian strike killed three people, wounded six and left a trail of damage on Tuesday in Sloviansk, witnesses told AFP.

Mayor Vadim Liakh, spoke of a fresh bombardment on Thursday that damaged electricity lines on the edge of the city which boasted a population of 100,000 before the late February invasion.

"There is no electricity, the water supply is down," Liakh

posted on the Telgram messenger service.

"The best solution in this situation, is to evacuate.

"Take care of yourselves. Pack your bags," he urged.

Dmytro, a 35-year-old labourer, admitted he was ready to leave with this family.

"There's no water, my grandmother is handicapped and it's hard for my mother to wash her.

"If we had running water, we would stay longer."

Unlike many others Dmytro has somewhere safe to go.

But all he wants is for the war to be over. "It's always better to be at home," he explained.

Many analysts predict the war will go on for months more with fighting continuing in the Donbas where the Russians have made headway in recent weeks and now control most of the strategic city of Severodonetsk, 80 kilometres (50 miles) east of Sloviansk.—AFP

### EU drops Russian patriarch from sanctions to seal new deal

EU ambassadors on Thursday dropped the leader of Russia's Orthodox church from a proposed blacklist, allowing them to agree a new round of sanctions after opposition from Hungary, diplomats said.

"Another strong package of sanctions was agreed today against Putin and the Kremlin," tweeted EU chief Ursula von der Leyen. "This will reduce Russia's capacity to finance its war." Budapest had stalled final approval of the fresh wave of sanctions over the war in Ukraine, including a ban on most Russian oil imports, by demanding that Patriarch Kirill be taken off the list. EU leaders on Monday thought they had clinched agreement on the new measures after giving in to Hungarian premier Viktor Orban's demand to exempt Russian oil arriving via pipeline. But the other 26 nations had to buckle again to wrap up the package in the face of Orban's obstinacy after he insisted the Russian church leader's name also be removed.—AFP

### Interpol warns of flood of illicit arms after Ukraine war

Many of the weapons being sent to Ukraine will eventually wind up in criminal hands in Europe and beyond, Interpol's chief warned on Wednesday (1 June), urging countries to start scrutinizing arms-tracking databases.

"The high availability of weapons during the current conflict will result in the proliferation in illicit arms in the post-conflict phase," Interpol secretary-general Juergen Stock said.

That will only empower organized crime groups that have become increasingly global operations, capable of exploiting the chaos created from Russia's bombardments over the past three months.—AFP

## Israeli PM meets IAEA chief over Iran's nuke activities

ISRAELI Prime Minister Naftali Bennett met with visiting Director-General of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) Rafael Grossi on Friday, urging the international community to prevent Iran from achieving nuclear weapons.

Bennett expressed Israel's deep concern regarding Iran's continued progress towards achieving nuclear weapons while "deceiving the international community by using false information and lies".

He emphasized the urgent need in mobilizing the inter-

national community to "take action against Iran, using all means, in order to prevent Iran from achieving nuclear weapons".

Stressing his country's support for the IAEA carrying out its mandate in a professional and independent way, the Israeli prime minister noted the importance of the IAEA Board of Governors "delivering a clear and unequivocal message to Iran in its upcoming decision".

While Israel prefers diplomacy to deny Iran the possibility of developing nuclear

weapons, it reserves the right to self-defense and to act against Iran in order to block its nuclear programme should the international community not succeed in the relevant time frame, Bennett said.

Grossi's visit came amid Israel's mounting concern over Iran's nuclear activities and any potential return to the 2015 nuclear agreement with world powers. He arrived in Israel Thursday night before heading to the Austrian capital of Vienna for an IAEA Board of Governors meeting on Monday. —Xinhua

## Estonian government in crisis as coalition crumbles

ESTONIAN Prime Minister Kaja Kallas on Friday called for talks on a new government after her ruling coalition fell apart, urging unity because of security concerns over neighbouring Russia.

Kallas spoke to reporters

after President Alar Karis accepted her request for ministers from the Centre party, including Foreign Minister Eva-Maria Liimets, to be removed from the government.

The dismissal of the Centre

party follows weeks of political deadlock, including a vote on an education bill in which the coalition partner voted against the government and with the far-right EKRE opposition instead.

"It's honest to say that this agreement is over and we're going to form a new coalition," Kallas said.

Kallas's Reform party has proposed to begin coalition talks with the right-wing Isamaa conservatives and the Social Democrats.

The Centre and Reform parties have alternated in government over the nearly three decades since Estonia broke free from the crumbling Soviet Union. Russia's invasion of Ukraine has spooked the three Baltic states of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, which are all EU and NATO members. —AFP

## Kishida eyes attending NATO summit in late June, 1<sup>st</sup> time for Japan

PRIME Minister Fumio Kishida is planning to attend a summit of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization slated for late June in Spain, a move that would make him the first Japanese leader to take part in a gathering of the Western alliance, a government source said Saturday.

Kishida's attendance at the 29-30 June event in Madrid

is dependent on the domestic political situation leading up to a House of Councillors election likely to be held 10 July, the source said.

Government officials hope Kishida's participation in the NATO summit would strengthen coordination with the United States and European countries in responding to Russia's war in Ukraine and possible contin-

gencies over the Taiwan Strait.

Kishida plans to travel to the Spanish capital after attending a three-day summit of the Group of Seven industrialized nations from 26 June in Germany, according to the source.

Australia, New Zealand and South Korea have also been invited to attend the NATO summit as partner countries in the Asia-Pacific region. —Kyodo

#### Japan's Horie, 83, becomes oldest to sail nonstop solo across Pacific

JAPANESE ocean adventurer Kenichi Horie on Saturday became the world's oldest person to make a solo, nonstop 8,500-kilometre voyage across the Pacific on a yacht. Horie, 83, reached the Kii Channel, which separates Wakayama and Tokushima prefectures in western Japan, on the Suntory Mermaid III, his 6-metre-long, one-tonne boat, at 2:39 a.m., after setting sail from San Francisco, California, on 27 March.

"I'm very happy that I was able to return home without major problems," he said by phone. "I'm grateful for the support I received from you all."

The sailboat, which passed by Hawaii in April, utilized solar panels for electricity needs on board, and Horie used a satellite phone to speak with his staff and others on the ground. The voyage traced a similar route to the one he made 60 years ago when he became the first yachtsman to cross the Pacific alone with no port calls, but in reverse. Then 23 years old, Horie sailed to the West Coast city from Nishinomiya, Hyogo Prefecture, in around 90 days, carrying no passport. —Kyodo

#### Train crash kills at least four near German resort

A train derailed near a Bavarian Alpine resort in southern Germany on Friday, killing at least four people and injuring dozens in a region gearing up to host the G7 summit in late June. Several carriages of the red-coloured local train were lying on their sides on a grassy area next to a highway. Rescuers stood on the top-facing side of the carriages, using ladders to climb into the waggons to reach trapped passengers. "In the serious train accident, as of 3:32 pm (1532 GMT), four people were fatally injured," said police in a statement.

"Around 30 passengers were injured, 15 of them so seriously that they have had to be admitted to nearby hospitals," they said, adding that a huge rescue operation was underway. —AFP

## Hosts for next three SEA Games tournaments confirmed

THE host countries for 2025, 2027 and 2029 SEA Games have been confirmed, according to the SEA Games organizing committee.

The 31<sup>st</sup> SEA Games, hosted by Viet Nam, ended on 23 May, and the 32<sup>nd</sup> SEA Games will be hosted by Cambodia in 2023.

The organizers of the SEA

Games have already confirmed the host countries for the upcoming Games. The 33<sup>rd</sup> SEA Games will be held in Thailand while 34<sup>th</sup> SEA Games will be hosted by Malaysia in 2027. Singapore will host the 35<sup>th</sup> SEA Games in 2029. Brunei had previously planned to host the 2025 SEA Games, but withdrew and

was replaced by Thailand.

This is the seventh time Thailand has hosted the event, the last being in 2007.

Malaysia last hosted in 2017 and will host the seventh in 2027.

Singapore will host the tournament 14 years later in 2015, for the fifth time in its history. —Ko Nyi Lay/GNLM

## Harigae, Lee share halfway lead in US Women's Open

WORLD number four Minjee Lee fired a five-under-par 66 on Friday to grab a share of the 36-hole lead alongside Mina Harigae at the 77<sup>th</sup> US Women's Open in North Carolina.

Australia's Lee, chasing a second major title after her triumph at the Evian Championship last year, had four of her six birdies on the front nine and rebounded from her only bogey at 14 with birdies at 15 and 16 to join Harigae on nine-under-par 133 at Pine Needles in Southern Pines.

America's Harigae, whose first-round 64 was one off the US Women's Open record, followed up with a two-under-par 69 that featured five birdies and a pair of bogeys.

The duo were two strokes in front of Sweden's Anna Nordqvist and South Korean Choi Hye-jin. Nordqvist had four birdies in her three-under-par 68 while Choi raced up the leaderboard with an impressive seven-under-par 64 that featured nine birdies.—AFP

## Denmark recover from Benzema strike to beat France in Nations League

SUBSTITUTE Andreas Cornelius scored twice as Denmark recovered from conceding to a brilliant Karim Benzema goal to beat France 2-1 on Friday in the UEFA Nations League at the Stade de France, the first match at the venue since the chaos that marred last week-

end's Champions League final.

Benzema's stunning strike put World Cup holders France in front six minutes after half-time, only for Trabzonspor striker Cornelius to turn in Denmark's equalizer midway through the second half and then smash in an 88th-minute

winner.

That meant it was a disappointing night for France who also saw both Kylian Mbappe and Raphael Varane come off with knocks.

There was a near-full house of 75,833 inside the Stade de France, including 1,400 Danish supporters, but the atmosphere outside the ground ahead of kick-off was calm.

That was in stark contrast to the scenes six days earlier, when serious organizational problems led to fans being unable to get into the stadium while many peaceful supporters were tear-gassed ahead of Real Madrid's 1-0 win over Liverpool in the Champions League final.

European football's governing body UEFA on Friday issued an apology to those spectators for what it admitted was a "frightening and distressing" experience for those involved.—AFP
