Chance to vote in the election every 5 years is an invaluable right of citizens: VP



VICE President U Henry Van Thio met local elders in Thantlang and Haka and inspected the development undertakings. At 8 am yesterday, he met local elders at the Diamond Jubilee Memorial Hall of the Baptist Church in Thantlang.

At the meeting Vice President U Henry Van Thio explained his mission to see with his own eyes the development undertakings jointly conducted by the government and the people within a period of four years and the transport difficulties the locals are facing especially in the rainy season, and to look into their requirements, saying that local people are really enjoying the fruits of national development.

In his brief account of the

developments, the Vice President said Myanmar's export of rice and rice-related goods in 2018 has reached the highest level in a period of 73 years after 1934, and it is the first point. The second point is that the development pace of the country's tourism industry in 2019 has been acknowledged by UNWTO as the fastest of the year, as the industry gained 40.2 per cent increase during the period. In fact, those developments are the results of the concerted efforts of the Union Government, departments and the relevant organizations, with the involvement of the people. Hence, inclusive undertakings in the interest of the country and the people are a must, he said.

The good results of public-government cooperation can be witnessed in the COVID-19 prevention, containment and treatment undertakings, and the world has acknowledged them as exemplary, he noted.

The chance for every citizen who has reached the age of 18 to vote in the election only once in every five years is an invaluable right for him or her, and this rare opportunity is not to be lost. The accuracy of the voter list is important, and the erroneous lists in some places should be corrected through the coordinated involvement of the responsible personnel and local people. The responsible personnel should strictly observe the directives and the election laws, bylaws and rules, the vice president suggested.

The success in elephant foot yam cultivation is a must in abandoning the shifting cultivation, as soil and weather of Chin State are suitable for the crop, he said.

Later, two local elders presented a report on the construction of a retaining wall at the northern sector of a football ground and the repair of the eroded road in Thantlang, the establishment of an elephant foot yam factory, the erection of a cable tower for 12 villages where communication is poor, the grouping of 18 villages into a new village-tract, the linking of the electrified villages, with high school and rural healthcare centre, with the national grid, the construction of Bwaynu river bridge, the construction of a new town hall in Thantlang and town water supply.

Union Minister Dr Myo Thein Gyi, deputy ministers U Tin Myint and U Khin Maung Win, Chin State ministers U Soe Htet and U Shwe Hti Yo and Permanent Secretary U Shwe Lay looked into the requirements.

Vice President U Henry Van Thio provided financial assistance to COVID-19 volunteer teams. Chief Minister of Chin State Salai Lian Luai, Speaker of Chin State Hluttaw U Zo Bawi and Chin State Minister U Phway Ah presented national registration cards to the local people.

At the temporary briefing hall of the university, officials presented a report on the Convocation Hall construction project, progress of work, other development activities, a housing project, and the extension of land for the university.

Under the specific action programme of the COVID-19 economic remedial plan, 200,000 persons with disabilities in the whole country will be provided with K30,000 each. In Chin State 2,691 persons with disabilities have been initially provided with the cash aid. K183.9 million will be provided for the remaining 6,130 at a rate of K30,000 per head. Every expectant mother in the whole country will be provided with K30,000 once during the COVID-19 containment period. Every expectant mother or every under-2 infant in Chin State, Naga region and Rakhine State has been receiving K 15,000 per month since 2017; every expectant mother or every under-2 infant in Kayin and Kayah states, since 2019; every expectant mother or every under-2 infant in Ayeyawady Region and Shan State, since 2020. In 2017-2018, every senior citizen of age 90 and above was provided with a monthly social pension of K 10,000 and in 2018-2019, the eligibility age was lowered to 85. The government is striving for the socio-economic development of every citizen. So the involvement of citizens is required in the programmes in their interest, he said.

Then, the Union minister, the chief minister and officials looked into the requirements presented by the leader of the local elders. The vice president provided cash assistance for the remaining persons with disabilities through the chief minister, and volunteers and government staff for their involvement in the anti-COVID-19 activities. Then the NRCs were presented to 346 local people.

The vice president inspected an unsafe school building hit by the earthquake jolted on 16 April. He then met cabinet members and heads of departmental branches of Chin State at the Pyidaungsu Villa. —MNA ■

Advance voting process for local voters outside their constituencies in 2020 General Election

- Heads of trainings, schools, hospitals and jails are to contact the sub-election commissions to get documents of Form 15
- They must return these documents to sub-commission of respective townships by 26 August 2020 after the documents are filled by the voters.
- Sub-election commission of respective townships must send ballot papers and envelopes for advance voting to the trainings, schools, hospitals and jails by 7 October 2020.
- Advance voting must be organized at trainings, schools, hospitals and jails on their appropriate day from 8 October 2020 to 21 October 2020.
- The envelopes containing ballot papers must be sent back to sub-election commission of respective townships by 4 pm on 8 November 2020.

Section 59 (g) in Hluttaw Election Law

IN accordance with section 59 (g) of the Hluttaw Election Law, no one is allowed to vote more than once in any election for a Hluttaw constituency in which he or she has the right to vote. Anyone who is found guilty of or abetting this act shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding K100,000 (one hundred thousand Kyats), or with both.

Government of Japan provides medical supplies to MoHS

THE Japanese government and its people donated 9.3 million Yen worth of medicines and medical supplies to help Myanmar in the fight against COVID-19, and the plane carrying medical supplies landed at Yangon International Airport yesterday morning.

Japanese Ambassador to Myanmar Mr Maruyama Ichiro handed over the medical equipment to Professor Dr Zaw Than Tun, Director-General of Department of Medical Research and Dr Kyaw Khaing, Deputy Director-General and Head of International Relations Division under the Ministry of Health and Sports.

The Japanese Ambassador said: "The COVID-19 pandemic has been occurring all over the world. We can see Myanmar can control the outbreak well. The Japanese government appreciates the moves of Myanmar. But, there are some confirmed cases in Myanmar, and so we provide

the medical supplies. The medicines that we donated today are produced in Japan, and we will keep providing such medical supplies."

This donation is the first batch out of the 2 billion Yen assistance for medical equipment and facilities to help Myanmar's response to the pandemic as part of the economic and social development programme of Japan in Myanmar.

"They donate medical equipment, including quality beds and suction machines which are used at ICU (Intensive Care Unit). Although our country controls the disease to a certain extent, we need to have such medical supplies to prevent the second wave of COVID-19 by looking at our neighbouring countries. So, we thank the Japanese government and its people for their donations," said Director-General Professor Dr Zaw Than Tun.

The Union Minister and party met the IDPs in IDP camps. The Union Minister said the government had been fulfilling the needs of the civilians apart from the current support for short-term benefits; plans are being made for long-term benefits; the government was focusing on internal peace and National Level Strategy was being implemented to resettle the internally displaced persons and to shut down the IDP camps so that the people could live again independently with safety and dignity; the two IDP camps in Kayin State has been implemented as per the Strategy and Kayin State is also included in the government-led Maternal & Child Cash Transfer (MCCT) Programme.

The Union Minister also said that the government was providing social pensions to the elderly aged 85 and over and implementing the COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan (CERP)

to give people with disability and senior citizens between the ages of 80 and 85, and to support the IDPs to buy food.

The Union Minister said that the cash assistance should be effectively used as those are public funds and the people will benefit the long-term plans on education, healthcare, social and economic sectors.

The Kayin State Chief Minister said the government was not only giving relief assistance but also carrying out the plans for professional works and discussed with the war victims on receiving aid.

The Union Minister and party donated K208.14 million for 6,938 disabled people, K28.96 million for 724 households to buy foods and the Department of Social Welfare donated K7.38million for 246 senior citizens in 2 IDP camps, soap bars and lime powder bags to ethnic IDPs.—MNA


170 Myanmar nationals fly back home from Malaysia

A relief flight of Myanmar Airways International (MAD) brought back 170 Myanmar migrant workers who work at garment factories in Penang of Malaysia, and it landed at Yangon International Airport yesterday evening.

The Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports, and local officials helped the returnees for health inspections and arranged for a 21-day quarantine. To bring back the Myanmar citizens who are stranded in foreign countries by relief flights and chartered flights following

the instructions of National-Level Central Committee on Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs cooperated with the relevant ministries and Myanmar embassies from respective countries.

The Myanmar Embassy in Kuala Lumpur cooperates with the relevant organizations of Malaysia per the instructions of Ministry of Foreign Affairs to send back the undocumented Myanmar nationals and those detained at cells, by relief flights.—MNA ■ *(Translated by Khine Thazin Han)*

69,000 fingerlings released into paddy fields in Kyonpyaw

ABOUT 69,000 fingerlings were reportedly released into the paddy fields to reduce the scarcity of the fish resources and ensure sufficiency of the local consumption.

The fingerling releasing ceremony was held in Kyonpyaw township in Pathein District on 14 August. The service was at-

tended by U Aung Soe Moe, the township administrator, the officials and staff from the relevant departments and the officials from social organizations.

At the ceremony, a total of 69,000 fingerlings were released including 19,000 Thai Barbus fingerlings and 50,000 golden fingerlings.

"By releasing the fingerlings, we can produce both paddy and fish at the same time. We are releasing about 69,000 fingerlings into 138 acres of paddy fields. Each acre of paddy field will get 500 fingerlings. It is aimed at ensuring the self-sufficiency of the local people. For sufficiency of fisheries resources, the Fisheries Department is releasing the fingerlings into the ponds (inns) and creeks annually. The department is also taking legal action against illegal fishing to reduce the scarcity of the fish resources," said Daw Khin Myo Naing, Head of Township Fisheries Department.

There are about 30 granted inns in Kyonpyaw township, which earned the country K249 million in this financial year. — Nay Win Myint (Kyonpyaw)

MR to reopen Yangon-Mawlamyine express train service on 22 August

Total border trade using ITCs exceeds K37 bln in 10 months

TOTAL border trade conducted by Individual Trading Cards (ITCs) exceeded K37.84 billion in ten months of the current financial year (FY) of 2019-2020 which started in October, according to the data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

From 1 October to 31 July this FY, the Ministry issued 61 ITCs and export using those cards through border gates

earned the exporters over K2.6 billion while its imports exceeded K35.24 billion.

The Myawady border recorded the highest trade at a value of K24.78 billion in the current FY, according to the Commerce Ministry.

Myanmar mainly exports agricultural products, animal products, marine products, minerals, forest products, manufacturing goods and others to

foreign trade partner countries. In contrast, capital goods, intermediate goods and consumer goods are imported.

The Ministry has issued a total of 1,748 ITCs, registering its trade value of over K192 billion since 2012-2013FY. The Ministry issued 292 ITCs in 2012-2013, 261 in 2013-2014, 315 in 2014-2015, 146 in 2015-2016, 248 in 2016-2017, 168 in 2017-2018, 92 in the mini-budget

period of 2018 (April-September, 2018), and 163 in the 2018-2019FY, according to the Ministry's figures.

The Ministry began issuing of ITCs in 2012. Traders can sell up to K15 million per week using ITCs, which must be extended every year. The Trade Department issues ITCs to boost border trade.—Zwe

A total of 64,683 returnees including 11,680 in May, 25,338

in June and 18,597 in July and 9,068 returnees from 1 to 15 August so far have come back home through this border crossing.

Yesterday's returnees were successfully kept in the respective quarantined centres in line with COVID-19 prevention measures, according to the local officials. —Htein Lin Aung (IPRD) (Translated by Kyaw Zin Lin)

South Korea tightens curbs in capital to control virus surge

SOUTH Korea tightened coronavirus measures on Saturday in Seoul and its surrounding areas as the country reported the highest number of new daily infections in more than five months.

The stricter social distancing guidelines include restrictions on gatherings and activities including professional sports, which will be played behind closed doors in the capital area again.

The move came as South Korea reported 166 new cases on Saturday, the highest daily figure since early March, bringing the country's total infections to 15,039 with 305 deaths.

South Korea stands at a "critical juncture" in the battle to control the coronavirus surge,

Prime Minister Chung Sye-kyun said at a government response meeting.

"Our top priority is to contain the spread of the virus in the greater Seoul area."

A majority of the new cases came from the greater Seoul region -- home to half of the country's 51 million people -- raising fears about a major spike with a three-day weekend starting in South Korea from Saturday.

Despite the outbreak and calls to avoid large gatherings, thousands of right-wing protestors rallied against President Moon Jae-in's centre-left government in the heart of Seoul on Saturday. Around 20,000 participated, according to the Yonhap

news agency.

South Korea endured one of the worst early outbreaks outside mainland China but brought it broadly under control with extensive tracing and testing while never imposing the kind of lockdowns ordered in much of Europe and other parts of the world.

The country has been seen as a model on how to combat the pandemic with the public largely following safety health measures such as face masks.

It even started allowing limited numbers of spectators at sports games in July -- which was reversed for the greater Seoul region on Saturday.

Myanmar needs to sustain this incredible response to the pandemic while lifting strict social distancing systematically.

The number of limited persons for gatherings and activities has been set less than 30, from the previous number of 15. The government is taking steps to resume some events and activities, including football games.

In relaxing strict measures, people need to be cautious about preventive measures against this to avoid another wave of this disease

which is extremely expensive for the country and people.

Some countries have announced they could produce COVID-19 vaccines in the near future. However, WHO takes reasonable steps to verify the accuracy of the information, and the vaccine needs to be affordable and accessible to all in addressing systemic health inequalities.

Myanmar's peak season for travellers is from October to February. If people keep on adhering to the directives and guidelines for containment of this disease, the country could enjoy the upcoming tour season without fear and worry about the pandemic.

THE ONGOING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Solutions, solidarity needed to defeat COVID-19 pandemic

"Our best way forward is to stick with science, solutions and solidarity and together we can overcome this pandemic," World Health Organization (WHO) Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus urged earlier this month.

AS THE COVID-19 pandemic continues to rage across the world, Richard Horton, editor-in-chief of leading medical journal The Lancet, asked a provocative question with his newly-published book titled "The COVID-19 Catastrophe: What's Gone Wrong and How to Stop It Happening Again."

Such a question reverberates around the globe as worldwide COVID-19 infections have crossed the 20-million mark and coronavirus deaths surpassed 750,000.

Amid the catastrophe of the century, the future and destiny of mankind, analysts say, depend on current choices and actions.

COMMON SECURITY

From traditional security threats such as wars and conflicts to non-traditional security threats such as climate change and cyber attacks, humankind's understanding of security has been continuously expanded.

Among them, in the past over 100 years, various infectious diseases, ranging from the Spanish Flu to AIDS, Ebola, SARS and Zika, have repeatedly reminded humans against biosecurity risks.

Nobel laureate and biologist Joshua Lederberg once warned, "the single biggest threat to man's continued dominance on this planet is the virus."

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, which has been severely hitting the world's economic production, social life, international relations and global landscape,

sounded the alarm bell again.

The coronavirus, which knows no borders, races or religions, can serve as a sober reminder that security has become more interconnected and transnational. Considering that facing the pandemic, no one is safe until everyone is safe, China's vision of common security could help provide an answer to defeating the virus.

Countries, as China proposed, should pursue common, comprehensive, cooperative and sustainable security, reject a Cold War mentality and confrontation between blocs, and oppose the practices of seeking absolute security of oneself at the expense of others, so as to achieve the security of all.

LIFE FIRST

The public health crisis is also a test of countries' value orientation.

Countries have different histories, cultures and levels of economic and social development. Thus, in the fight against the pandemic, with such different factors, they may adopt different crisis response approaches.

Despite that, as the rights to life and health are fundamental parts of human rights, they should become the primary consideration for countries when facing the challenges posed by the pandemic, and guarding life should be the common value pursued by countries.

Yet, Washington, in the absence of scientific evidence, has

its people even at the cost of a short-term economic downturn and even a temporary shutdown.

Mehmood-ul-Hassan Khan, a Pakistani geopolitical analyst, said that China's response to COVID-19 has been timely, effective, transparent and responsible.

Noting that the Chinese government has always given top priority to the life and health of its people, he added that the international community can learn a lot from China's experience.

SOLIDARITY NEEDED

"Our best way forward is to stick with science, solutions and solidarity and together we can overcome this pandemic," World Health Organization (WHO) Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus urged earlier this month.

Looking back over the past century, from World War II to the 9/11 terrorist attacks and then to the global financial crisis of 2008, mankind has relied on cooperation to tide over these crises. However, since the onset of the pandemic, this cooperation has been lacking and such international organizations as the WHO have repeatedly called for solidarity.

One of the biggest stumbling blocks to international cooperation is Washington's intentional disruption. Though the United States boasts rich scientific and technological resources and advanced medical equipment, the country intercepted shipments

When the novel coronavirus struck, China made every effort to protect the lives and health of

of medical equipment bound for other countries and recklessly stigmatized others to shift the blame.

"The threat of coronavirus should kindle global cooperation, not a new cold war," Horton warned in a Guardian opinion piece this month.

Also, the pandemic has exposed weaknesses in the global systems of detection, monitoring, control and treatment of such infectious diseases.

Thus, as the international community has urged, countries need to defend the global governance system with the United Nations at its core, give full support to the WHO, share experiences in fighting the pandemic, ensure the smooth supply of medical supplies and accelerate the research and development of drugs and vaccines.

The virus's attack on human beings is far from over, and the prospects for pandemic control remain grim. In these drastic times, as UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has said last month, only through international cooperation "will we ease the economic and social consequences of the crisis."

"It is only by strengthening bonds across society that we will recover better and build a healthier, more inclusive, sustainable, resilient and equitable world," he added.

New York museums, galleries to reopen from August 24

NEW YORK's museums, art galleries and other cultural institutions will be allowed to reopen starting August 24, state governor Andrew Cuomo said Friday after a five-month shutdown due to the coronavirus.

However, there will be mandatory face masks, timed ticketing with staggered entry and just 25 per cent occupancy, he tweeted.

The reopening does not include performing arts venues,

which will remain shut until the end of the year.

New York's famed Metropolitan Museum of Art, which normally welcomes seven million visitors a year, said it would reopen on August 29.

"After nearly six months, The Met's reopening will be a historic moment for the Museum and the City," Met president Daniel Weiss said in a statement.

"Throughout the recent months of uncertainty, isolation

and grief, we have longed for the day when we can safely welcome everyone back to The Met, where all can find comfort, inspiration, and a sense of community."

The Whitney Museum of American Art will reopen on September 3 but the Museum of Modern Art has yet to announce its reopening date.

The Metropolitan Opera is scheduled to resume on December 31, while Broadway theatres will remain closed until at least

January.

New York state was initially hard hit by the coronavirus and has recorded 25,232 deaths and 424,167 infections so far, Cuomo said in an update Friday.

He highlighted the state's progress against the pandemic with under one percent of coronavirus tests proving positive over the past seven days.

EU reserves 400 mln doses of potential J&J virus vaccine

THE European Union said Thursday it had reserved up to 400 million doses of a potential new coronavirus vaccine being developed by US giant Johnson & Johnson.

Preliminary talks concluded Friday for a first purchase of 200 million doses followed by an equal number later, a statement said.

"The envisaged contract with Johnson & Johnson would provide for the possibility for all EU Member States to purchase the vaccine, as well as to donate to lower and middle income countries," it said.

The bloc said it was in "intensive discussions" with other manufacturers for potential vaccines.

According to the World Health Organization, nearly 3.7 million cases of Covid-19 have

been recorded in Europe since the start of the pandemic, and 218,383 deaths.

On July 31, the European Commission said it had reserved 300 million doses of another potential vaccine being developed by French firm Sanofi.

"Our citizens' lives and our economy need a safe and effective vaccine against the coronavirus. Today's talks bring us closer to achieving this," European Commission president Ursula von der Leyen said.

The EU is using about 2 billion euros (\$2.4 billion) from an emergency fund to strike advance purchase deals with several vaccine makers in a bid to secure enough shots for its population of 450 million.

COVID-19 vaccine will be free for Americans, say officials

THE US government announced that if proven effective, the US will ensure that it is distributed free to all Americans.

"We are not at all reducing the regulatory rigour with which we will evaluate and hopefully approve vaccines," Paul Mango, a senior health department official, was quoted in an AFP reported as saying.

The US has invested more than \$10 billion in six vaccine projects and signed contracts guaranteeing the delivery of hundreds of millions of doses after they clear clinical trials.

The vaccine doses themselves will be paid for by the government.

Payments for the doctors and clinics that administer these doses will be covered by private and public insurers, officials have said.

"We are on track to deliver hundreds of millions of doses by January 2021," he added.

Critics of President Donald Trump have expressed worries that in order to announce the availability of vaccine before elections on November 3, the administration may bypass safety precautions—Mango

has denied the charge.

This week, Russia approved a vaccine even before it started the last phase of clinical trials. Francis Collins, director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), compared Russia's vaccine, dubbed as "Sputnik V" to a game of "Russian roulette."

"I hope that the Russians have actually definitively proven that the vaccine is safe and effective, but I seriously doubt that they've done that," top US infectious disease expert Anthony Fauci said.

Australian government to cut university fee support for failing students

THE Australian government has announced that it will stop subsidizing university fees for first-year students who fail half their subjects.

Minister for Education Dan Tehan announced the changes on Thursday, saying that they would prevent students from taking on study loads they can't handle.

Under the new measures, students who fail at least half of their first eight subjects in

a degree will lose access to the Higher Education Loan Programme (HELP), through which Australian citizens and other eligible students receive zero-interest loans from the government to pay for their tertiary education.

However, universities will be able to maintain a students' access to the scheme if their performance was affected by exceptional circumstances.

"These measures will en-

sure students not to take on a study load they won't complete," Tehan said.

The government held 66.6 billion Australian dollars (about 47.7 billion U.S. dollars) worth of HELP debt in financial year 2018-19.

According to the Department of Education, one student accrued 663,000 AUD (about 475,961 U.S. dollars) in HELP debt after enrolling in 44 courses at 26 institutions and attain-

ing no qualifications.

"The lack of transparency of a student's enrolment has allowed some non-genuine students to enrol and re-enrol at multiple providers at the same time," Tehan said.

Andrew Norton, a higher education expert from Australian National University (ANU), said that approximately six percent of students fail every subject in their first year at university.

"Many fails are avoidable if disengaged students leave before the HELP census date or the usually later date to withdraw without academic penalty. The government's legislation would put more pressure on universities to check that students are engaged, especially as they move from first to second semester," he told Nine Entertainment newspapers.

Putin calls for emergency Iran summit to decrease tensions

MOSCOW — President Vladimir Putin on Friday called on the permanent members of the UN Security Council and Germany to convene an emergency Iran summit to avoid an escalation of tensions in the Gulf.

China, France, Russia, Britain, the United States, Germany and Iran should take part in the video summit, the Kremlin chief said. "It's an urgent issue," Putin said in a statement released by the Kremlin.

"Discussions at the UN Security Council over the Iranian issue are becoming increasingly tense," Putin said, adding that Moscow's ally Iran was a target of "groundless accusations".

"The goal is to put together a blueprint that would allow to avoid confrontation, an escalation in tensions at the UN Security Council." He added that the leaders should also agree on ways to ensure security and trust in the Gulf region.

Tensions over Iran have escalated since 2018 when President Donald Trump withdrew the United States from a multinational accord that froze Iran's nuclear programme and reimposed crippling sanctions on its economy.

Last week US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Washington would submit a UN Security Council resolution to extend an arms embargo on Iran despite opposition from Russia and China.—AFP ■

Belarus leader reaches out to Russia as pressure grows

MINSK — The opposition in Belarus kept up the pressure on President Alexander Lukashenko with a fresh demonstration in Minsk on Saturday, as the strongman reached out to Russia in an apparent plea for help.

Some 5,000 opposition supporters gathered near a metro station in the capital where a demonstrator died during this week's police crackdown on protests against Lukashenko's claim to have won re-election last Sunday.

With the opposition gain-

ing momentum after days of demonstrations, Lukashenko's main election challenger Svetlana Tikhonovskaya had called on supporters to rally again over the weekend.

Demonstrators laid flowers at the site where Alexander Taraikovsky, 34, died on Monday, with many chanting "Leave!" and some holding up pictures of protesters with severe bruises, after accounts emerged of detained demonstrators being beaten and tortured.—AFP ■

UN to ramp up food aid in DR Congo to reach 9 million people

UNITED NATIONS — The World Food Programme said Friday it was rapidly scaling up operations in DR Congo with millions facing "the world's second biggest hunger emergency." The United Nations agency said it needed \$172 million (145 million euros) to prevent millions from plunging deeper into hunger over the next six months.

"WFP is ramping up operations in the Democratic Republic of Congo to meet increasing

needs — a consequence of escalating conflict and displacement, disease, extreme poverty, poor harvests and COVID-19," spokeswoman Elisabeth Byrs told reporters. "DRC is the world's second biggest hunger emergency after Yemen." The WFP said that 15.6 million people in DRC were considered acutely food insecure, with a further 27.4 million deemed at high risk of facing a rapid deterioration in food security.—AFP ■

Israel-UAE deal a Trump coup, but his sights are set on Iran

WASHINGTON — The Israel-UAE agreement gives the United States a rare diplomatic success in the Middle East -- but it is Iran which President Donald Trump has in his sights, with a strategy that has already hit roadblocks at the United Nations.

The White House has lavished praise on a foreign policy coup which was sorely needed by a president seeking re-election in November who has little to show on the diplomatic front.

"This is a dramatic breakthrough that will make the Middle East safer," chief US negotiator Jared Kushner told CBS. "It means less American troops will have to be over there."

Under the US-brokered agreement, the United Arab Emirates and Israel agreed on Thursday to establish full diplomatic ties, making the monarchy just the third Arab country to recognize the Jewish state, following Egypt in 1979 and Jordan in 1994.

"Assuming the deal works, it's the first time Israel has established normalized relations with

any Gulf nation and for that reason it's significant," said Aaron David Miller, a former diplomat who served as Israeli-Palestinian peace negotiator in Democratic and Republican administrations.

But, Miller cautioned, "don't blow this out of proportion.

"I don't buy that it's on the same level of magnitude or accomplishment as Egypt or Jordan," said Miller, now a senior fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

"This is the UAE we're talking about. This is not the Arab world's most powerful nation like Egypt. This isn't even a country that has a contiguous border with Israel."

Barbara Slavin of the Atlantic Council, another Washington think-tank, described the agreement as a "good move" but "not earthshaking in view of the covert ties the two countries have had for a very long time."

'Vision for Peace'

Since taking office, Trump has pledged to apply his self-pro-

claimed deal-making skills to resolving the intractable Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

He charged Kushner, his son-in-law, with the daunting task of hammering out Middle East peace.

But the Palestinians have refused to play along with an administration seen as staunchly pro-Israel, and rejected the US president's "Vision for Peace" unveiled in January.

Miller said the Israel-UAE

normalization agreement does little to advance Trump's "vision" of overall Middle East peace.

What's more, he added, "the administration's motivation has nothing to do with Israeli-Palestinian peace."—AFP ■

Indonesia to close doors to foreign tourists until vaccine found

JAKARTA — Indonesia will continue not to open its doors to foreign tourists until a new coronavirus vaccine is found and immunity can be provided, a gov-

ernment official said Saturday, as the hard-hit country is conducting clinical testing for a vaccine.

“The reopening of tourist destinations to foreign tourists

is something positive, but we need to do it at the right time,” Erick Thohir, chief of Indonesia's national economic and COVID-19 recovery team, told a virtual pub-

lic discussion. Since Tuesday, Indonesia has been conducting the final, phase 3 clinical testing for a COVID-19 vaccine candidate in the West Java provincial capital of Bandung.

The clinical trial is taking place with the cooperation of Chinese-based drug maker Sinovac Biotech Ltd. and a team of Indonesian scientists and researchers, as well as Indonesian state-owned drug maker PT Bio Farma which have developed the vaccine candidate. Once clinical testing for about six and a half months is completed, vaccine production will immediately start and pave the way to offering immunity to the general public.

According to Thohir, who is also state-owned enterprises minister, the government did not want its efforts to mitigate the novel coronavirus pandemic undermined by the reopening of its borders to tourists to avoid creating new clusters.

Acknowledging that immunity may only start next year,

Thohir said reopening the country's borders to foreign travelers must go hand in hand with producing immunity so as not to start again from scratch.

“Therefore, for the time being, we are still reviewing the plan to reopen (Indonesia) for foreign tourists,” he said.

As of Friday noon, Indonesia reported 2,307 new confirmed cases of the coronavirus, bringing the total number of cases to 135,123 with 6,021 fatalities.

The government has slowly reopened some tourist destinations for domestic tourists despite the continued high risk of the new coronavirus spreading.

Recovery of domestic tourism has been the first target before the country reopens to tourists from abroad.

Indonesia is also in negotiations with some countries to set up travel corridors for business travelers. Indonesia has reached agreements with South Korea and the United Arab Emirates for such travel bubbles.—Kyodo ■

Vietnam's southern bourse up slightly amid hopes on COVID-19 vaccines

HO CHI MINH CITY — VN-Index, the benchmark index of the Ho Chi Minh City Stock Exchange, inched up from last week's closure of 841.46 points to close at 850.74 points on Friday.

The index posted three ups and two downs this week. It started Monday on a positive note, cutting early gains of gaining 1.74 points, or 0.21 per cent, as profit taking pressure increased strongly when VN-Index was approaching 850 points.

Shares failed to maintain their rally on Tuesday with the market experiencing strong volatility with big variation in large-caps' prices.

Vietnamese shares advanced on Wednesday as increasing oil prices helped boost petroleum stocks, and extended gains on Thursday on upbeat global market sentiment amid hopes of a potential coronavirus vaccine supply deal.

An average of over 278.3 million shares were traded per day on the southern bourse, down 0.5 per cent against last week. Trading value totaled 23.2

trillion Vietnamese dong (over 1 billion U.S. dollars), up 22.6 per cent.

Foreign investors remained net sellers of 743 billion Vietnamese dong (32.3 million U.S. dollars), compared to a net selling of 152 billion Vietnamese dong (6.6 million U.S. dollars) last week.

The market is forecast to extend the current uptrend and head toward resistance 876-883 points in the short term with wide divergence among stocks, according to local securities experts.

Besides, information related to the production of vaccines against the COVID-19 pandemic is expected to support the market in the short term.

Stock exposure should be maintained at 50-65 per cent of the portfolio, said the experts, noting that investors may consider selling part of the short-term positions at the aforementioned resistances and consider opening short buying positions and covering previously sold positions at market corrections in several sessions. —Xinhua ■

Central Japan residents to seek injunction to stop maglev train work

SHIZUOKA, Japan — A group of residents in the central Japan prefecture of Shizuoka are preparing to seek a court injunction to stop the construction of a high-speed maglev train line, officials of a local civic group said Saturday.

Central Japan Railway Co. is already facing opposition from the local government over the construction work and gave up on its original plan to open the new line between Tokyo and Nagoya in 2027.

The residents are concerned that tunnel work by the operator in a mountainous area could cut off groundwater flow and lower the water level of the Oi River, which passes through the central part of the prefecture known for

its tea and oranges, the officials said.

Shizuoka Gov. Heita Kawakatsu has refused to give approval for the maglev train work in the prefecture, citing potential environmental damage.

The maglev trains, with a top speed of 500 kilometres per hour, would connect the two major cities located 286 kilometres apart in 40 minutes, less than half the travel time for existing shinkansen train services.—Kyodo ■

Netherlands economy sees unprecedented drop due to coronavirus

AMSTERDAM — The Dutch economy took its biggest-ever hit from the global coronavirus pandemic as lockdowns brought activity in the country to a standstill, data showed on Friday.

The EU's fifth-biggest econ-

omy shrank by 8.5 per cent in the period from April to June compared with the preceding three months, the central statistics office CBS said. “Never before has such a shrinkage been measured,” CBS said in a statement.

More than half of the contraction was due to a sharp fall in household consumption, the statisticians explained. But falling investment and a sharp decline in the trade balance also played a role.—AFP ■

Frankfurt mayor invites TikTok to set up headquarters: German media

FRANKFURT — The mayor of Frankfurt Peter Feldmann has recently invited popular Chinese video-sharing app TikTok to set up its new global headquarters in the German metropolis, several German media outlets reported.

Feldmann's letter of invitation to ByteDance, a Chinese tech firm and owner of TikTok, was first reported by Journal Frankfurt on Wednesday, and later also by Frankfurt Allgemeine Zeitung and Der Spiegel.

Frankfurt boasts one of the world's busiest internet hubs and a large number of data centres, as well as many well-trained professionals in the region, Feldmann was quoted as saying in the letter, who also noted

Venice anti-cruise activists cheer as port workers protest

VENICE — A Venice citizen's group is cheering a temporary victory as cruise lines pull out of the lagoon city this year due to coronavirus logistical challenges, even as pressure rises from furloughed port workers.

MSC Cruises and Costa Cruises announced this week that their first Mediterranean cruises after a months-long hiatus due

to the pandemic would depart from Genoa and Trieste, larger ports that make new coronavirus-related regulations, such as social distancing, easier to ensure.

On Friday, the group No Grandi Navi (No Big Ships) plans an evening gathering to celebrate what organizers called a small step forward in an eight-year battle to ban the

massive ships from Venice's environmentally fragile waters. No departures from the UNESCO-listed city are planned for the rest of the year, as the two companies trim back their schedules and itineraries. Many big cruise ships will also be skipping Venice as a port of call.

"This isn't the final victory. But it's an important step and we believe

it opens a new phase of negotiations in which the game has changed," No Grandi Navi committee member Marta Sottoriva told AFP.

The port of Venice is a major economic driver for the city, bringing in hordes of day-trippers who swell the number of annual visits to the city to over 30 million, according to some estimates. —AFP ■

Trump orders Chinese firm to divest from TikTok's U.S. operations

WASHINGTON — U.S. President Donald Trump on Friday ordered Chinese company ByteDance Ltd. to divest its interest in the U.S. operations of its popular video-sharing app TikTok within 90 days.

In the executive order issued the same day, Trump said there is "credible evidence" that leads him to believe that ByteDance "might take action that threatens to impair the national security of the United States."

Amid a widening U.S.-China rivalry, the Trump administration has stepped up pressure on TikTok and Chinese messaging app WeChat due to concern the platforms are both a privacy risk and susceptible to Beijing's censorship activities.—Kyodo ■

China's ride-hailing giant pledges 200 mln yuan in creating jobs

BEIJING — Chinese ride-hailing giant Didi Chuxing (DiDi) has announced that it will invest 200 million yuan (about 28.8 million U.S. dollars) to promote employment for those affected by the COVID-19 epidemic, unemployed and poor family members based on its platform.

The company plans to give subsidies of car rentals, income and insurance purchases for beginners who join DiDi's ride-hailing fleets. Drivers in poor areas can enjoy special poverty-relief funds, and freelancers can participate in skill training courses for free.

DiDi has also been creating jobs for poverty-stricken counties and donated shared bikes to poor areas, with the operation revenue used to set up public welfare posts for locals.—Xinhua ■

Japan braces for further damage by crop-hungry fall armyworm

TOKYO — Japan is sounding the alarm against the inexorable march of the fall armyworm, as reports of damage by the pest in Asia following its spread in Africa are increasing, threatening Japan with infestation.

The Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries has warned of significant damage to farm products unless authorities and farmers take appropriate measures to remove the insect in a timely fashion. First detected in Kagoshima Prefecture, southwestern Japan, in July last year, the fall armyworm has caused damage in about 30 of the nation's 47 prefectures.—Kyodo ■

Yangon govt set to protect nearly 40,000 acres of mangroves

A coordination meeting at the Yangon Region Chief Minister's office on 5 August agreed to convert 39,977.52 acres in Thongwa, Kyauktan and Kungyangon townships into protected mangroves.

Director U Thein Toe of the Yangon Region Forest Department said their department would need to work

together with the farmland management department, statistical department, fisheries department, general administration department and affiliated organizations to implement the mangrove process.

U Thein Toe said some of the area is already converted into mangroves while the rest are either untouched or illegally exploited. He said they

will have to apply to reclaim some of the land from the Central Committee for Vacant, Fallow, and Virgin Land Management. He said some of the land had been issued for other uses but he fears this may destroy the land. He said mangroves will benefit the people and can protect the area from natural disasters.

The director of Forest Department also said since

the region is close to the sea, there are many areas that the central committee has granted that have remain untouched. He said they will reclaim those areas and return lands that have regrown forests to a collective ownership. He said the local residents are hoping for this as well. He said they will discuss with all relevant villages to divide the forests and are aiming to complete this within

the current government administration. He said local residents are pleased with this news.

While destruction to mangroves are minimal in Yangon Region the forest department said most land is destroyed due to misuse for other purposes.

“About four to five thousand local residents have signed for the mangrove project,” said Ko Zaw Min Thu, head of the southern Yangon District branch of US-based Landesa Rural Development Institute. He said local residents have been waiting for an answer for 3 years as there are prawn breeding farms in the mangrove area. He said the Union Government will issue the area as a collective mangrove forest ownership once demarcation is complete and will divide rights to work in the area like the mangroves in Let Khoke Kone, Mandalay.

Ko Zaw Min Thu said the locals will conserve the mangroves as it helps multiply fish and prawns and boosts ecotourism. He said they have given awareness training to all concerned villages and have formed supervising groups as well. He said all the local residents have signed and petitioned for this project and only hope it will take action before the changeover to the next government administration.

The forest department said they will keep the existing and petitioned prawn breeding farms untouched but take legal action towards trespassers.



Bayern thrashing end of an era for Barca, no easy cure at Camp Nou

MADRID—Very rarely does one single result bring the curtain down on an era, but that is what FC Barcelona's 8-2 thrashing in the quarter-final of the Champions League did on Friday night.

Barca's worst ever European defeat was a "historically ridiculous" according to the pro-Barca 'El Mundo Deportivo' newspaper and had veteran defender Gerard Pique tell TV cameras directly after the final whistle that it was "embarrass-

ing."

"We have touched bottom and it's unacceptable," added Pique after Barca had been outplayed, outrun and outfought in every area of the park by a Bayern side that looked, fitter, faster and hungrier than the Catalans.

The immediate consequence of the defeat will be to bring the curtain down on the brief spell at the Camp Nou of coach Quique Setien, who was

brought in to replace Ernesto Valverde with Barca top of the league in January, only to see his side finish five points behind Real Madrid and now to crash disastrously out of Europe.

"We are going to take decisions," said Barca president, Josep Maria Bartomeu shortly after the final whistle, probably aware that his own future is now up in the air as well with elections for the presidency on the horizon. —Xinhua ■

Liverpool great Fowler hits out at 'gangster' Brisbane Roar

LONDON—Former England and Liverpool striker Robbie Fowler claimed Saturday he was wrongfully dismissed by Brisbane Roar, saying the Australian club "turned gangster" on him and assistant Tony Grant.

Fowler was appointed coach last year and overhauled the squad, lifting them to fourth in the A-League before the season was suspended in March due to the coronavirus pandemic.

He and ex-Everton midfielder Grant returned to England and the club announced in late June they had parted ways, citing "the current and ongoing coronavirus situation", while noting that "family comes first".

It led to Irish striker Roy O'Donovan, who played under Fowler at Brisbane, branding him "selfish".

But the Liverpool legend told the Sydney Morning Herald his contract was abruptly terminated over comments made in a television interview, where he said he felt his return was "not a priority" for the club. The 45-year-old insisted he wanted to see out his two-year contract and did not walk away. "They just suddenly turned gangster on us," he told the newspaper. "Lots of people have opinions about me but one thing I'm not is selfish. I had a job to do and I wanted to finish that job.—AFP ■

Horschel, Kim among leaders at log-jammed Wyndham Championship

GREENSBORO—Billy Horschel fired a six-under par 64 on Friday to join a four-way tie atop a jammed leaderboard at the US PGA Tour's Wyndham Championship. Horschel, chasing a sixth tour title and his first since the 2018 Zurich Classic of New Orleans, hit 13 of 14 fairways and 16 of 18 greens in regulation to finish 36 holes on 10-under par 130 -- tied with former Wyndham champion Kim Si-woo of South Korea and Americans Tom Hoge and Talor Gooch. Kim, who notched the first of his two tour titles at the 2016 Wyndham,

had six birdies in his five-under 65. Gooch also posted a 65 while Hoge followed up a first-round 62 with a 68. Harold Varner, who shared the overnight lead with Hoge and Canadian Roger Sloan, carded a 69 to join a group on 131 that also included Ireland's Shane Lowry (63), Harris English (67), Andrew Landry (65) and Doc Redman (64). Sloan was among another seven players a further stroke back on 132 -- with a total of 25 players within three strokes of the lead at Sedgefield Country Club in Greensboro, North Carolina.—AFP ■

Homeschooling and its effects

HOMESCHOOLING is when children's education is based at home with their parents' guidance rather than through enrollment in a public school or private school. The term has caught the attention of parents and educators, especially during Covid-19 crisis. It is an alternative way of educating children by the parents or other households with the responsibilities as teachers and administrators, having complete control over the direction of what their children learn, how they learn it and when. It carries its own pros and cons just as public and private schools do.

One major advantage of homeschooling is flexibility. In homeschooling, there are no fixed curriculum and learning materials assigned for each grade like in public schools. Parents can manage the teaching and learning materials according to their children's interests and needs. Moreover, children obtain chances of learning at their own pace. This means that unlike public

schools, where in a room of 20 or 30 students, the fast learners, who are eager to take more challenging tasks, however, have to wait for the slower ones and on the other hand, the slower ones have to keep up with the faster ones, leading to stressful learning situation. Homeschooling solves this problem by giving children individual attention. Furthermore, homeschooling avoids the potential risk of peer pressure and bullying. This does not mean that homeschoolers do not have access to their peers. In fact, homeschooled children

often have more lessons outside of the home and participate more in their community. In addition, homeschooling creates strong bonds between parents and their children. Parents, performing both roles as teachers and administrators, devote more time to their children, resulting in stronger relationships than as usual.

On the other hand, homeschooling possesses some drawbacks. One defect is that financial costs may arise as a problem as parents and the households have to take care of everything for their children's

learning such as textbooks, books, papers, computers, smartphones and many other teaching and learning aids. This does not seem quite apparent in the short term but in the long term, the issue can put a threat on the family's income. Additionally, homeschooling causes parents under pressure and stress by having to find out the suitable teaching methods and materials and spend time reviewing numerous curriculum programs up to their standards and best suiting their children's learning needs. What is more, homeschoolers can

become restless and tiresome unless appropriate management plan of parents is implemented. This means that some parents expect too much of their children and motivate too often than required, leading children to become bored and frustrated.

To conclude, homeschooling is of assistance to parents and educators and some forms of homeschooling are done with a blend of parents and tutors. For children to obtain successful outcomes, parents' management skills, their intelligence, patience and careful budgeting become vital. Therefore, being aware of the positive and negative attributes of homeschooling, it should be carried out in a sensible way so that effective learning of children will take place.

Teaching is not Selling Something

HERE, I would like to express my feelings and experiences concerned with teaching, which I am choosing as my career. After I had passed the matriculation exam, I started teaching Grade-10 students. Thus, I am now a 5-year experienced teacher and teach all subjects but Biology in one-to-one tuitions, which mean home schooling. During these 5 years, I met many kinds of students and their parents. In accordance with my bitter-sweet experiences, I want to share some thoughts with you.

As I teach for one-to-one tuition, I always first discuss the situations of the students with their parents before accepting their request for teaching. Although they are different in background situation, that is, some are rich and some are not, they have the same mind to support the needs of their children in education. Sometimes their supporting wrongly turns out to be a kind of insult to the teacher. The thing that always annoys me is that some rich parents do not understand about the nature of

one-to-one teaching. I would like to mention some of its natures. It is a part-time job. Based on the subjects they offered, I usually request honorarium from them. The job of teaching in one-to-one tuitions is not like other jobs such as private company, civil servants, selling something and so on. The money earned from these jobs is normally called 'fee', 'salary' or something like that. But, it is called 'honorarium' in teaching society because people consider that it is the job of wisdom and they value it.

Last week, I had a little bit confusing case. The student who I taught English was sent to the boarding school by his parents. His father came to tell me about that case while I was teaching him. No sooner did his father explain why he sent his son to the boarding school than I understood that he had no time to study with me and I was sure to stop teaching his son. What he wanted to tell me was: "You do not need to come

any more", but he did not say like that and he used the indirect ways of speaking. I frankly replied to his father like that "I have no problem even though if you move your son to other places. You can think nothing of my schedule for your son and do as you are okay." Two days later, his father phoned me, "Hello, sorry Saya, my son starts attending the boarding school today. I just inform you to know it." And then, I replied, "It is okay and it is my pleasure." On the following day, while I was teaching other students in the evening, he made a call me again. When I saw his phone call, I was a little bit angry because it seemed like annoying me. "Saya, frankly speaking, can you give me money back?" My temper rose after hearing his words. I have now the reason why I was angry with him. In my article, what I do want to emphasize is the ethical standards of one-to-one teaching. The date that he phoned was July 13. It was nearly the middle of the month. We, private teachers, have a rule. For instance, the students must pay hono-

rum to us in the beginning of the month when they invite to start teaching at their home. Some parents think that paying money in the beginning of the month is just pre-giving. Actually, it was wrong. If we miss our responsibility from our side due to some cases, we have to pay back the money to them even though they do not request for it. We must not pay it back if the students stop learning in the middle of the month. Finally, he apologized to me for his wrong words.

Based on that event, I want you all to think about teaching. Some business-minded people think that teaching is like selling something. They only look at their side, thinking: The less they pay, the better. Frankly speaking, as far I have observed, it is only some rich people who usually adopt such a mean, money-minded attitude. We are not sellers and teaching is not selling something as they might suppose. I wish they had a good attitude and view towards our noble profession.



THE Republic of the Union of Myanmar, formerly known as the Union of Myanmar, is composed with seven states and seven regions (divisions). Kayah State (formerly known as Karenni) is one of the States of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar. The British government recognized its independence in a treaty with Myanmar King Mindon Min on 21st of June, 1875.

The Kayah ethnic people living in this state was called Karenni (ကရင်နီ). It was renamed Kayah State in 1951 after the whole of Myanmar regaining the independence from the British in 1948. There are 135 (one hundred and thirty five) national races in the Republic of the Union of Myanmar. They have been living together since the time immemorial.

In connection with the myths of the dancing couple and the seven "Dway-Meh-Naw" in the Seven Steps Lake (ကန်ခန့်ဆင့်), Kayah state is metaphorically called Kanyar-Maw-Kay (ကညာမော်ကျေ) in Kayah term and Dway-Meh-Naw (ဒွေးမယ်နေပြည်) or Ngwe-Taung-Pyi (ငွေတောင်ပြည်) in Myanmar terms. Kayah state is known as Kandar-yawaddy (ကန္တာရဝတီ) as well.

Kayah state is rich in natural resources and mineral resources particularly marble (N.B. its quality is as fine as the famous Italian marble), water resources, teak, flora and fauna. Significantly, the Law-Pe-Ta-hydro-power station (လောပီတ) produces electricity and supplies to the other states and regions in Myanmar.

Kayah people have their own indigenous dialect, language, traditions, customs, costumes and culture. They depend on agro-based farming livelihood. Animal husbandry is their customary livelihood. Their way of life and livelihood are so simple and conservative.

They are traditional believers in animism, but most of them are Christians. Nevertheless, they preserve their cultural values and traditions so their festivals are associated with culture, traditions and their beliefs as well. The identity of kayah is cherished by all national brethren indeed.

The native ethnic groups living in Kayah state (Formerly known as Kayenni) ကယား (ယခင်ကရင်နီ) are Kayah ကယား, Kayaw (ကယော), Gaebar (ဂေဘာ), Yin Tele (ယင်းတလဲ), Kaw-yaw (ကော်ရော) known as (Manu-ma-naw) (မနုမနော) and Kayan (Padaung) ကယန်း (ပဒေါင်း). Actually, the term Kayan (Padaung) ကယန်း (ပဒေါင်း) tribe is collectively called for the inclusiveness of the small tribes Lah-thar (လတ်ထာ), Kare-doth (ကရေဒေါ့),

Kagaung (ကခေါင်း), and Ka-ngan (Yinbaw) ကဂန် (ယင်းဘော်).

Other ethnic groups residing in Kayah State are Bamar (ဗမာ), Intha (အင်းဘူး), Pa-oh (ပခွိုင်) and Shan (ရှမ်း). The tribal people of Kayah State wear distinct and beautiful traditional dresses.

The estimated population in Kayah state is more than two hundred fifty thousand (250000). Kayah state is a combination of three "Sawphy" (Chieftain) districts namely Kye-Phoe-Gyi district (ကြယ်ဖိုးကြီးနယ်), Kandarawaddy district (ကန္တာရဝတီနယ်) and Bawlakhe district (ဘောလခဲနယ်).

When you travel in Kayah state, you will see the scenes of the traditional totem poles which are in close proximity to the Kayah villages. These poles are depicting vividly as the major feature of the Kayah state. Kae-Htoe-Boe festival (ကယားတံခွန်တိုင်ပွဲတော်) is, among the most distinctive festivals in Kayah state, The Kae-Htoe-Boe (ကေထိုးဘိုး) festival or Kayah-takhundine-Pwe-daw (ကယားတံခွန်တိုင်ပွဲတော်) in Myanmar term, is held in April every year. Kae-Htoe-Boe festival (ကယားတံခွန်တိုင်ပွဲတော်) is also called Trar-Ei-Lo (တြာအီလော့). Yin Baw (ယင်းဘော်) calls the festival Gan-Khumt (ဂန်ခွမ်). Though the terms are different, all the Kayah people celebrate the Kae-Htoe-Boe festival in the same way together.

How Kae-Htoe-Boe festival is celebrated (တံခွန်တိုင်ပွဲတော်ကျင်းပပုံ)

The kayah living in the villages have to find the tall and straight tree (traditionally teak or eugenia or Dipterocarpus tuberculatus) in the forest. Before choosing the tree, villagers have to examine or check the tree whether it is straight and free from

any flaws. Besides, it cannot be infested by birds or bugs. The tree must not have vines or nests of birds such as vultures or eagles at the top either.

They believe that the tree is un-clean if the birds' nests are found in it as they are the carnivorous. Since the tree to be used for sacred totem pole, it must be totally clean and free from dirty things. On the very day they fell the tree, they abstain from eating fermented soya beans, snakehead fish and forest animals like sambar deer meat. However, they can eat the chicken or pork or fish that is in their neighborhood.

When they find the suitable tree, they fell it and bring it to the designated grounds for transforming into the Kay Htoe Boe or totem pole. Then they offer lighted candles, lighted incense sticks,

a bunch of bananas and a bunch of sugarcane to the spirits in line with their traditional belief in animism.

Next, they prepare and decorate the log. Finally, they erect it on the designated ground at the venue. The fields or grounds

for erecting totem pole must be chosen in the eastern part of the certain village. As the Sun rises in the east and they regard the rising Sun as the good sign so they usually chose the site in the east in order to erect the traditional totem

pole. In fact, they consider the eastern part of the certain village an auspicious site for celebrating Kay Htoe Boe festival or sacred totem pole festival.

Kay Htoe Boe (ကေထိုးဘိုး) is a Kayah term. The word 'kay' means a state, 'htoe' means flourishing and accomplished, and 'boe' means sacred pole. The festival is celebrated with ethnic dance competition, a costume contest, and other entertainment programs. When the Kay Htoe Boe pole is erected, participants dance around the pole. This festival is celebrated by all Kayah people of Christianity, Buddhism and Animism.

The festival is held by all tribes in Kayah state together showing that they all maintain and preserve the traditional festival and solidarity of the entire Kayah ethnic tribes. In other words, Kay Htoe Boe (ကေထိုးဘိုး) festival portrays the traditional beliefs, unity, culture, identity and ethnicity. The essence or purpose of celebrating or holding this festival is to obtain blessings from the spirits that they traditionally believe.

They ask blessings for their well-being, wealth, peace and prosperity in life. Kay-Htoe-Boe, the sacred pole indicates the five precepts: (1) To be born innocent (2) To behave righteously (3) To work honestly (4) To eat justly (5) To live peacefully in harmony with all living beings.

This festival is held to venerate the eternal god and creator messengers, to give thanks for blessings during the year, to appeal for forgiveness, and pray for good harvest, good rain, plentiful crops, health of mind and body, prosperity and protection of natural disasters and pandemic or epidemic.

In addition, Kay Htoe Boe festival commemorates the belief that the creator god gave form and life to the world by planting a small post in the ground.

Kayah ethnic people read the chicken thigh bones for prediction before holding any traditional ceremonies or festivals

Kae-Htoe-Boe (ကေထိုးဘိုး) festival is also accompanied by a reading of the chicken bones to predict the year ahead. This fowl bone reading is done before holding any traditional ceremony or festivals in Kayah community.

The Kayah people use to predict their life, augury, weather condition, all the needs and wants by reading at the holes of the chicken thigh bones. They use male chicken for this reading. They take out the thigh bones of the male chicken and look at the holes in the thigh bones. The male chicken has two or three holes. Every chicken has holes in thigh bones.

According to their traditional belief, if the holes in the right thigh bone are found to be higher than the ones on the left, it is considered good for the coming year of the village and villagers' health, harvest, weather conditions. In other words, it is a good omen.

If the holes in the right thigh bone are found to be lower than the ones on the left, it is considered bad for the coming year of the village and villagers' health, harvest, weather conditions. In other words, it is a bad omen. It is learnt that this reading at the holes of the chicken thigh bones is done just before holding the any occasions in Kayah community.


Now, the readers have learnt that whenever they hold their traditional ceremonies or festivals, the kayah people make use of prediction for the good or bad results with the reference of reading chicken thigh bones. The description of the Kae-Htoe-Boe (ကေထိုးဘိုး) festival or sacred totem pole festival accompanied by reading of the chicken thigh bones for prediction makes the readers interested.





The Universities' Dhammayon

THE Universities' Dhammayon (တက္ကသိုလ်များဓမ္မာရုံ) stands majestically in a wide compound sheltered by big, shady perennial trees at the corner of Pyi Road and University Avenue. It is adjoined by the Diamond Jubilee Hall on the south and the Yangon University Post-office on the east. The word 'Dhammayon' is the corruption of the Pali word 'Dhammaramana' meaning 'The support of the Dhamma'. But, in the context of the universities' Dhammayon, it is a spacious hall surmounted by a multi-tiered roof where religious affairs of the universities within the limits of Yangon city are undertaken. This year, the universities' Dhammayon has entered its 83rd anniversary. So it should be hailed as an important land-mark in the campus of the Yangon University on the occasion of its centenary.

The Universities'Dhammayon was the outcome of the endeavours made by the Rangoon University Buddhist Association (RUBA) founded in 1929. It is said that it sprouted up from the Rangoon College Buddhist Association (RCBA) established in 1906. In the 1918-19 academic year, Chairman of the RCBA was Minister of

Home Affairs U May Aung. He was succeeded by a line of prominent personalities such as Municipal Commissioner U Set, Excise Commissioner U Shwe Zan Aung, Barrister U Thein Maung, Judicial Minister Sir U Mya Bu, Chief of Justice U Chan Tun, etc in the subsequent years. In the 1931-32 academic year, Sayagyi U Ba, a lecture from the Chemistry Department and warden of the Bago Hostel, was elected Chairman of the RUBA. He suggested to his executive members to endeavor for the emergence of a university Dhammayon on the estate of Yangon University.

To realize the idea of Sayagyi U Ba, the members of the RUBA introduced a fund-rising programme that year. Accordingly, the students who returned home during Thadingyat holidays collected money from their parents and relatives. When the university was re-opened for the second semester, the money collected totaled about 5,000 kyats. Moreover, some students raised funds by staging theatrical shows at the Jubilee Hall on 19 and 20 December, 1931. They got more 3,000 kyats from these shows. The funds raised amounted to 40,000 kyats in total. But as the total construction cost for the Dham-

mayon would incur 57,250 kyats, the Wealthy Man U Nyo contributed to the RUBA 1,123 kyats left over after his donation to the construction of the Student's Union Building.

It is said that, among the theatrical shows staged at the Jubilee Hall, the one named "Kutha Jataka" performed by Maung Toe Aung drew the attention of a large number of spectators. So, after the show, he was branded as Kutha by the students. He, under the pen-name of Kutha, wrote many articles, short stories, poems, etc. both in Myanmar and in English. He was among the pionerring writers of Khit-san-sar-pay (Age-testing literature). (Later, he became a teacher at the

Myanmar-sar Department and retired as Principal of Mawlamyine College.)

The plan of construction of the Dhammayon took shape in the 1933-34 academic year. That year, Chairman of the RUBA was U Ba Sein, Vice-Chairmen Sayagyi U Pwar and Aggamahapandita Sayagyi U Lin, executive members Maung Thant Tin and Maung Wun (Min Thuwun), treasurers U Bo Thone and Daw Mya Than and Patrons U Set, Sir U Thwin, U Maung Gyi, U Thein Maung and Sayagyi U Ba respectively. By the courtesy of U Set and U Thein Maung, permission to build the Dhammayon in the current site was granted by the government. Thus, the foun-

dition brick-laying ceremony for the Dhammayon was held on Sunday, 25 February, 1934. It was graced by the presence of a chapter of nine monks headed by Aletawya Sayadaw Aggamahapandita Kosalabhidhaja. At the ceremony, Sayagyi U Pwar first gave a welcoming speech to the audience present. Then, Aggamahapandita Sayagyi U Lin reported on the details of the construction programme of the Dhammayon. After that, Sayadaw Kosalabhidhaja preached the Dhamma on the elation over the donation and nine monks recited the Parittas Sutta to ward off the forth-coming dangers. The engineer who supervised the construction of the

Dhammayon was U Tin and the contractors U Ba Tin and U Thet Tin. Two months before the opening ceremony, the first Dhamma-preaching ceremony took place at the Dhammayon. At the ceremony, Aggamahapandita Sayagyi U Lin delivered the discourse on the Paticcasamuppada (The Law of Dependent Origination). The opening ceremony of the Dhammayon was celebrated with pomp and ceremony on 13 November 1937.

When it came to 1941, preparations were made again to stage theatrical shows at the Jubilee Hall to get money for the renovation of the Dhammayon. But, as Yangon University had to be closed down without limitation that year due to the Second World War, the fund-raising plan had to be abolished. Therefore, the treasurer of the RUBA U Toe Aung kept the funds of the association amounting to over 2,000 kyats at the Imperial Bank on Sule Pagoda Road in the 1941-42 academic year.

In the course of its existence right from its inception, the Universities' Dhammayon has been serving its duties to its fullest capacities. It hosted many religious and some other activities of the universities within the confines of Yangon city such as Dhamma-preaching ceremonies, basic Abhidhamma courses, ceremonies of paying respects to teachers, prize-giving ceremonies, reunions of old students, etc. One note-worthy point is that SayadawU Setthila, a world-famous missionary monk, was lodged at the universities' Dhammayon, while he was serving as a lecturer of the Department of Philosophy between 1952 and 1960.

In conclusion, this year, Yangon University has turned a hundred years. So, commemorative occasions and ceremonies are being celebrated tumultuously time and again on the sprawling premises of the university. The whole campus is being charged with festive mood all the year round. The author, therefore, suggest here that a commemorative ceremony should also be held in the precincts of the Universities'Dhammayon so that its importance to the universities will come to the notice of the new-generation students.
