## Republic of The Union of Myanmar Union Election Commission Notification 166/2020

14<sup>th</sup> Waxing of Wagaung, 1382 ME  
(1 September 2020)

### Announcement for voters living outside their constituencies to fill and submit Form (3-A) to apply for inclusion of their names in the voters lists of their current constituencies

- In accordance with section 10 of by-laws of the respective parliamentary elections, if those who have been living outside their constituencies for more than 90 days do not want to cast their votes in their original constituencies, they can vote in the constituencies where they are currently living by doing the following:
  - At least 30 days prior to the election date, at the sub-election commissions of the relevant residential quarter/ village-tract, civil servants (with recommendation of their superior officials), workers (with recommendation of their employers or agents of the employers), and non-workers (with self-admission) can fill Form (3-A) to apply for inclusion of their names in the voters lists of the constituencies where they are currently living. In addition to the form, a recommendation of the relevant residential quarter/village-tract administrator must also be submitted. Along with the documents and evidences, the applicants must fill their respective voter number included in the voters lists of their original constituencies.
  - If the applications submitted in accordance with the rules mentioned in section 1 (a) of this notification meet required criteria, the sub-election commission of the relevant residential quarter/village-tract will enroll the names of the voters into the eligible voters lists of the constituencies where they are currently living.
  - After enrolling the names of the applicants to their current constituencies, the sub-election commission of the relevant residential quarters/village-tracts must inform the township sub-election commission in order that the names can be removed from the voters list of the original constituencies. The current township sub-election commission, by using Form (3-B), must also timely inform the sub-election commission of the township where the applicant formerly lived.
- The Union Election Commission will hold the 2020 General Elections on 8 November 2020. So, those who have been living outside their constituencies for more than 90 days can fill and submit Form (3-A) at the sub-election commissions of relevant residential quarters/village-tracts commencing 17-9-2020. The deadline for the application is 10-10-2020.

## 102 Myanmar citizens stranded abroad get home on 1 Sept

THE 20<sup>th</sup> relief flight of Myanmar Airways International (MAI) landed at the Yangon International Airport in the evening of 1 September, bringing back a total of 102 Myanmar citizens who were stranded in foreign countries. Among them, 52 persons were from South Korea, 1 person from Switzerland, 2 from Belgium, 3 from Brazil, 3 from Canada, 3 from France, 3 from Indonesia, 4 from the Great Britain, 4 from Italy, 3 from Norway, 2 from South Africa and 22 from the US.

The Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports and local officials

helped the returnees for health inspections and arranged for 21-day quarantine.

To bring back the Myanmar citizens who are stranded in foreign countries by relief flights and chartered flights in accordance with the instructions from National-Level Central Committee on Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs cooperated with the relevant ministries and Myanmar embassies from respective countries and brought back a total of 13,172 citizens to date.—MNA

## 37 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 1 September, total figure reaches 919


MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases reached 919 after 37 new cases were reported on 1 September according to Ministry of Health and Sports.

Out of the 37 cases, 17 are from Yangon Region, 8 from Mon State, 6 from Bago Region, 4 from Rakhine State, 1 from Magway Region and 1 from Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory. Among these 919 confirmed cases, six died, 357 have recovered, 348 have been discharged from hospitals and 61 were held under investigation.—MNA

## Section 59 (g) in Hluttaw Election Law

IN accordance with section 59 (g) of the Hluttaw Election Law, no one is allowed to vote more than once in any election for a Hluttaw constituency in which he or she has the right to vote. Anyone who is found guilty of or abetting this act shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding K100,000 (one hundred thousand Kyats), or with both.

**V**ICE President U Henry Van Thio presided over the 2nd coordination meeting of steering committee on Hanthawaddy International airport construction project yesterday to discuss the infrastructural works for the project.

The meeting was held at the Ministry of Transport and Communications in Nay Pyi Taw, and attended by committee members and Union ministers U Thaug Tun, Dr Aung Thu, U Thant Sin Maung, U Ohn Win, U Win Khaing and U Han Zaw, Attorney-General of the Union U Tun Tun Oo; chief ministers U Phyo Min Thein and U Win Thein; deputy ministers U Maung Maung Win and U Kyaw Myo; and officials.

U Henry Van Thio, in his capacity as the chairman of steering committee, explained the work of his committee which was reformed by the President's Order 31/2020 on 11 February 2020. The previous committee held a coordination meeting in December 2016 and decided to set up the Hanthawaddy International airport as a national project, to sign contract with HIA Myanmar Co.,Ltd., to do collaboration among relevant ministries in applying for Official Development Assistance Loan and to provide assistance for infrastructure and utilities.

The framework agreement with Yongnam-CAPE-JGC Consortium was expired on 30 Jan-

uary 2018 although the company won tender for construction of Hanthawaddy airport under the Public-Private-Partnership system.

Discussions were made with the JICA and MLIT to implement the airport project with 100 per cent ODA loan. The preparatory committee on implementation of project was formed with the representatives of Myanmar and Japan, and the committee held 11 meetings from February 2018 to July this year.

The agreements were made to construct the phase-1 of facility that can handle 8 million passengers each year, to conduct feasibility study by the JICA, to prepare for the

report on this study with the collaboration of relevant departments and to take part in infrastructural works.

Union Minister U Thant Sin Maung explained the project of Hanthawaddy airport, followed by presentation of the Joint-Secretary of steering committee and the Director-General of Department of Civil Aviation, U Aung Kyaw Tun, about the background history of the project, preparation for feasibility study report, land utilization and compensation for the lands.

Mr Uehara, the Deputy Team Leader of Feasibility Study Team, presented work plans for the study.

The Union Ministers, the

Attorney-General of the Union, chief ministers of local government and the deputy ministers discussed the works of their departments.

In his concluding remarks, the Vice President said the advantages of Hanthawaddy airport, including its location, air routes for international flights, the lack of obstruction, sufficient land areas to expand the airport, linking with major cities, highways and railways, access to electricity from Lawpita and Zaungtu hydropower plants, water supply from Za Let Htaw and Ma Zinn reservoirs and a major hub for local and foreign commodity flows.—MNA

## SSB holds meeting on relief measures amid COVID-19 pandemic

OFFICIALS from the Social Security Board (SSB) under the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population yesterday held meeting on relief measures and further processes during the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the meeting, Union Minister U Thein Swe said that the COVID-19 is spreading throughout the world so far and causes burdens for people regarding health issues and economy sectors and so the ministry has set strategic plan to response these negative impacts.

The government provided social security benefits including 40 per cent of social security fees to insured workers from the factories and workshops which are temporarily suspended for the inspections whether they are in line with the rules released by the Ministry of Health and

Sports.

The SSB needs to study the challenges of other international social security boards in analyzing whether the current relief measures are effective.

Director-General of SSB briefed the contribution of K26,576.762 million for social security fees during COVID-19 pandemic, Pilot project with

Wave Money, medical supplies to social security hospitals and clinics, educating programmes via videos, pamphlets, posters and viber stickers, relief measures and further processes under CERP.

The Union Minister added that to implement unemployment benefits system with the helps of ILO, to continue receiv-

ing aids of EU, to expand contributions via Wave Money, to conduct pilot project with CCT Function for e-Contribution of business people in paying fees, to review the remaining workplaces for 40 per cent of social security fees and 60 per cent for pregnant women.

He also met with new 18 assistant doctors and instructed to

carry out the duties in line with the mission and visions of the ministry and civil servant regulations. He said that the health workers of SSB play key role and they need to serve the patients with proper treatment to raise the trust in public hospitals and clinics. —MNA

### Republic of the Union of Myanmar Ministry of Health and Sports Order 100/2020

14<sup>th</sup> Waxing of Wagaung, 1382 ME  
(1 September 2020)

THE Ministry of Health and Sports has issued this order in exercise of the rights contained in Section 21, sub-section (b) of the Prevention and Control of Communicable Diseases Law.

1. As the Ministry of Health and Sports is carrying out preventive measures against (Coronavirus Disease 2019 – COVID-19) in real-time. Due to the increasing number of positive cases and the number of patients who have neither travel history nor close contacts with COVID-19 patients, people residing in some townships are required for “Stay-at-Home” in order to effectively control the spread of the disease.
2. It is hereby announced that people residing in the following townships in Yangon Region are included in the Stay-at-Home programme:
  - (a) Thingangyun
  - (b) Insein
  - (c) North Okkalapa
  - (d) Thakayta
  - (e) Hline
  - (f) Pazundaung
  - (g) Mingaladon
3. People from the above-mentioned SEVEN townships, who are included in the Stay-at-Home programme shall follow the following rules:
  - a. To stay only at their homes (Those who need to perform their duties at government departments, organizations, companies, factories and workshops not included)

- b. Only one person per one household to go out for necessary shopping
  - c. Only two persons per household to go to hospital or clinic if a need arises.
  - d. To wear mask when going outside.
  - e. To allow only authorized vehicles, and ferries providing transportation service to those who are to going to workplaces to perform their duties, to pass through the wards.
  - f. The vehicle is to carry only a driver and a passenger for going shopping in the ward, and only a driver and two persons for going to hospital or clinic.
4. Regarding matters relating to Clauses b, c and f of Paragraph 3, if more persons need to ride on the vehicle or to go for other emergencies, they are to seek approval from the respective Ward Administration Office to go outside, and the responsible persons of the respective Ward Administration Office shall not allow anyone to go out or come in to their wards except those who are going out and coming in to assume their charge of duties.
  5. Action will be taken against those who fail to abide by this order under the existing laws.
  6. This order comes into effect from 8 am 2-9-2020.

## Additional statistical bulletin on drug seizures, acting on information

1. In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.
2. With orders from the Office of the President, the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department relayed information on reports on drug-related offences up to 29 August 2020 to the Ministry of Home Affairs to take action, as displayed below:

3. Out of the information sent to the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department, so far a total of 1,309 cases have been opened files as of 29 August 2020. A total of 2,004 people, including 1,675 men and 329 women had been arrested with 10,092.3194 g of heroin, 1,435.42 g of ICE, 47,187.22886 g of opium, 1,367.96 g of low-quality opium, 53,363.76 g of speciosa powder, 51,097.32 g of speciosa, 2.5 litres of liquid speciosa, 667,215 stimulant tablets, 14,713.48 g of marijuana, 0.1 litres of opium tincture, 630.28 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 60.15 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy powder, 27 firearms, different kinds of 609 cartridges and one grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the department will report on further exposed cases.

# MoHS discusses increasing nationwide control measures against COVID-19

THE Ministry of Health and Sports organized a virtual meeting on speeding up containment measures against COVID-19 yesterday.

Speaking at the meeting, Union Minister Dr Myint Htwe said the ministry was responding to COVID-19 by effectively using resources preparing for the worst situations as the virus was rapidly spreading in short time.

The virus would be under control only if it is responded without hesitation. Abiding by the central committee's instructions, the ministry is implementing COVID-19 containment works by considering social, economic, education and political perspectives, the Union Minister said.

He appreciated the participants in the COVID-19 containment process, and stressed the importance of cooperation from social affairs ministers in regions and states to effectively carry out the virus containment processes on the ground.

Contact tracing is the

most effective and important prevention strategy at present.

Officials are telephoning those who recently visited Rakhine State, and cooperation from the public is needed, he added.

The ministry is also undertaking prevention and monitoring works at transit centres, reception camps and IDP camps in Rakhine State to prevent from the spread of coronavirus.

The Central Epidemiology Unit is analyzing the rapid spread of the virus in the country by making daily discussions with relevant officials from regions and states and is reporting the findings and requirements to relevant department heads at a punctual manner.

The ministry will immediately carry out the works that can be done by the ministry alone, and the tasks that the ministry can't implement will be reported to the central committee in time. Special flights are transporting medical professionals

and medical supplies to Rakhine State, and the ministry is increasing its testing capacity to detect more infected persons with no symptoms.

After updating current guidelines and rules and regulations on coronavirus in accordance with additional findings, types of infections and changing symptoms, they will be distributed to regions and states, he added.

Head of Rakhine State

Public Health and Medical Services Department Dr Sai Win Zaw Hlaing and central survey team leader Director Dr Nyan Win Myint discussed the matters relating to random testing with rapid test kits, additional testing with PCR machine to those who tested positive and COVID-19 control processes in Rakhine State.

Sittway General Hospital Medical Superintendent Dr Zaw Lwin reported

on the situations of medical treatments, patients, intensive care units, and ventilators at the hospital, and heads of the departments from other regions and states detailed about the conditions of patients, treatments and quarantining at the relevant hospitals. Rector of University of Medicine 1 Prof. Dr Zaw Wai Soe reported on this morning's discussions with clinical professors, and other matters includ-

ing security, internet connection and foods.

The attendees discussed increasing of testing with PCR machines and GeneXpert machines, and Director-General of Medical Research Department prof. Dr Zaw Than Tun and Deputy Director-General (Disease Control) Dr Thanda Lwin detailed about telephoning those who travelled to/from Rakhine State.

Central Epidemiology Unit Director Dr Toe Thiri Aung reviewed the situation of COVID-19 outbreak in Myanmar; and medical superintendents of Thandwe People's Hospital and Kyaukpyu People's Hospital reported on the conditions of patients and medical treatments at the hospital. In the afternoon, officials discussed updates of current COVID-19 guidelines and rules and regulations based on the additional findings, types of infections and changing disease symptoms. —MNA (Translated by Kyaw Zin Tun)

# COVID-19: Our country at the crossroads

# Wagaung, the month of casting lots festival

Wagaung (August) is the 5<sup>th</sup> month of Myanmar lunar calendar. Myanmar is a tropical country with three seasons namely hot season (gein hman) rainy season (wathan) and cold season (hei man). Wagaung falls in the rainy season. The word 'Wagaung' is a combination of two words 'Wa' and 'Khaung'. Wa means Buddhist lent and Khaung means middle or peak. So, Wagaung implies the middle or the peak of the Buddhist lent which covers three months of rainy season namely Waso (July), Wagaung (August) and Tawthalin (September). In the stone inscriptions of the Bagan Period another word for Wagaung was used. It was "Nan Kala" (နာကလ) which means the time for ploughing, or the planting season, or the month for agricultural activities. There is a Myanmar folk rhyme which aptly describes this season "ဝါဆို၊ ဝါခေါင်၊ ရေခဲတင်မတင်" (In Waso and Wagaung there are billows of rain water). As these two months are the peak of rainy season the countryside is inundated with rain water. Astrological name of Wagaung is Simha (ဒိဟိ) (Leo) and its zodiacal sign is lion. In this month in daytime the Sun and the Hpou Sha stars and at night the Moon and Tharawun stars rival in their radiance. Although all lilies and most trees and plants burst forth into bloom, khat-tar or land lily (Crinum amoenum) is traditionally marked as the flower of Wagaung.

Sayey Tan Pwe which may best be rendered into English as "Casting lots Festival" was the traditional festival held in Wagaung in days of yore. Sayey Tans are lots to decide to choose recipient of food or gift or alms in a religious offering. The custom of casting lots in religious charity originated in the lifetime of the Lord Buddha. While the lord Buddha was residing in the Weiluwn Vihara at the Capital of Yazagyoe, famine hit the city and there was scarcity of food. Buddhist devotees could no longer provide 'hswan' (food) for all monks of the Vihara. Some wanted to select ten or twenty monks to offer food. Some preferred to cast lots so as to decide the recipient monks. Some thought of

offering food to the monks only on the Sabbath days when they came to the Vihara for fasting and observing moral precepts. Others chose the day after the Sabbath day for offering food because they thought that was the day the monks were in real need of food. Being unable to reach a consensus of opinion the devotees referred the matter to the Lord Buddha.

Where upon the Lord Buddha expounded seven different modes of offering food to the monks. They are as follows:

- (a) Sangha-bhat which is the food offered to all monks
- (b) Uddesa-bhat which is the food offered particularly to one or two monks.
- (c) Nimantana-bhat which is the food offered to the invited monks.
- (d) Salaka-bhat which is the food offered to the monks chosen by casting lots.
- (e) Pakkhika-bhat which is the food offered to the monks on the waxing and waning moon days.
- (f) Uposathika-bhat which is the food offered to the monks on the Sabbath day.
- (g) Patipadika-bhat which is the food offered to the monks on the day after the Sabbath day.

The Lord Buddha then said that he approved all of them. Since that time offering of food to the monks by casting lots became a common practice

among the Buddhist devotees. With the permission and at the direction of the Lord Buddha, the monks chose one monk from among themselves and appointed him "Bhattuddesaka" i.e. the monk who was in charge of allotting food offered by the devotees. The monk thus chosen and appointed must have special qualifications such as good health, activeness, managerial skill, freedom from bias and prejudice, and being able to keep the correct list of allotted and unallotted monks. The first monk appointed in that charge during the lifetime of the Lord Buddha was Maha Thera Ash-in Datba, the son of the Malla king. He discharged the duty of allotting Uddesa-bhat, Nimantana-bhat and Salaka-bhat, with fairness and correctness.

The lots are either wooden sticks or bamboo slats or bamboo strips or palm leaves or pei leaves on which names and addresses of the donors of food are written. The lots are then put into the basket and the basket is shaken upside down many times so that the lots are thoroughly shuffled up. The monks queue up either according to their serial number or according to the seniority of their vasa (ordained age) to draw the lot. Then they go to the house as directed by their lots to partake of the food of-

fered there. During the lifetime of the Lord Buddha offering of food to the monks by casting lots could be made at any place, on any date and in any month. There was no rule fixing its place, date and month. But Myanmar kings chose Wagaung as the month for performing this religious function because the monks observing lent vows and residing together in the same monastery might have difficulty in getting sufficient food in Wagaung. Originally casting lots was to provide food to the monks. But later, eight priestly utensils namely three pieces of yellow robe, the girdle, the alms bowl, the adze, the water dipper, and the needle and other offertories are also donated by casting lots. Such articles are hung on a tree-shaped stand which is called Padei-thabin meaning the tree of plenty and variety, comparable to the mythical cornucopia.

In Myanmar the earliest evidence of offering of food to the monks by casting lots was found in the stone inscriptions of ancient Bagan. In lines 22 and 23 of Saw Hla Wun pagoda inscriptions of A.D. 1268, 1290 and 1291, there was mention of Sayey Tan (casting lots) There is one oral history which tells how offering food by casting lots originated in Myanmar. During the reign of King Thihathu (A.D. 1298-1312) of the

Pinya dynasty (A.D. 1298-1364) a big wooden monastery was built by the royal order, and the king decreed that 'he who hath the courage let him take possession of it' At that time there was one head monk named Soo Twin Pyit Sayadaw who was famous for his learning and knowledge. Hearing the royal decree the monk took residence of the monastery. Later the monk advised the king that the best way to find the deserving occupant for the monastery was by casting lots. From that time began the casting lots festival. Later, in the reign of King Thailun (A.D.1629-48) of the Nyaung Yan dynasty (A.D. 1599-1752) there appeared two religious translations namely Culavapali nisaya and Culava-pali Athakatha nisaya by the most venerable monk Shwe Umin Sayadaw of Pakhan Gyi town. In them he translated into Myanmar the two Pali words "Salaka" and 'hatta' as 'Sayey Tan' and 'Hswan'. Salaka means wooden or bamboo sticks on which letters were written and hatta means food (hswan). Letters written on the sticks mention names and addresses of the donors of food.

Myanmar literature of later historic periods contained references to the casting lots festival. Different forms of poem such as loota, lay cho, eh-chin, tay htat, tha hpyan etc.

on twelve seasons composed by eminent bards like U Yar, Lu U Min, Hpo Thu Daw U Min, Mei Khwe, U Hpye, U Ponnya have mention of casting lots festival in Wagaung. On page 229 of one Myanmar Chronicle named Konbaung Set Maha Yazawun Tawgyi Volume 11, the holding of the casting lots festival at the palace of King Bagyidaw (A.D. 1819-37) was recorded as follows:

"On the 8<sup>th</sup> waning day of the month of Wagaung, village monks (Ga ma wa thi) and forest monks (Arin nja wa thi) were invited to the palace. Eight priestly utensils and other offertories were hung on the two hundred and sixty Padeithabins. His Majesty the King and the Chief Queen donated them to the monks and poured the libation water. Their Majesties then offered Salakabhat Sayey Tan hswan (food offered by casting lots) to the monks."

It is to be noted that unlike the Sayey Tan Pwe of the Lord Buddha's time, Myanmar Sayey Tan Pwe has the names of the recipient monks written on the lots, instead of the donors' names and addresses and it is the donors who draw the lots, not the monks. List of names and addresses of the monks residing in the locality is made and these are written on the lots which are placed in the bamboo container called 'wa kyit-tauk'. At the assembly of the Buddhist devotees, names of the donors of food are called out according to their serial number to draw the lots. The following morning the donors either invite the monks of their lots to their houses to offer food or put food in the large bowl with stand and cover (usually of lacquer) called 'hswan ok' and send it to the monks.

Just like on other Myanmar religious functions. A festival atmosphere is created by the gathering of lay devotees dressed in their finery, and dainty damsels carrying offertories on their heads, followed by groups of merry-making youths who joyously dance, sing and play folk music of 'do-bat', 'ozi', and 'byaw' which befit the occasion.

## Yangon govt to take legal actions against illegal operation of vehicles

YANGON Region government will take legal actions against illegal operation of the vehicles on YBS routes with more effective laws, according to the region's Minister for Electricity, Industry, Transport and Communication Daw Nilar Kyaw.

MP U Aung Phone Kyaw San Oo of Htantabin Township Constituency 1 asked if Yangon regional government has a plan to take legal action against the

outside illegal vehicles operating in Yangon YBS bus routes day and night. He argued how the Yangon local government would take action against those vehicles.

He raised this question during the fourth-day session of the Second Yangon Regional Hluttaw's 12th regular meeting held on 31 August.

Minister Daw Nilar Kyaw responded to the question saying that YBS system is being operated under Yangon region

public transport sector to be able to establish a better public transport system. YBS buses have also been added to meet the needs of the public. At present, some 102 bus lines including shuttle bus lines are being operated in Yangon region. However, the action is being taken against those vehicles, which are illegally operating along YBS bus routes in some townships.

Regarding taking of an action, the traffic police seized

about 154 vehicles in 2018 and took legal action against 148 cars in 2019.

Those undisciplined, unregistered, illegal vehicles have legal action taken under Section 65 of the 2015 Motor Vehicle Law, under which a fine of less than K30,000 is imposed. Now, the government has planned to take action against those disobedient vehicles under the respective law, she noted.

## Fishing industry faces difficulty as its season starts

ALTHOUGH the onshore and offshore fishing boats have resumed business at the start of the fishing season, some of the boats have not raised their anchors due to worries about the declining market of this industry.

"We export all the fish to Ranong. We heard that Ranong could not ship the fish bought last year to other countries because of suspended transport. Only 30 per cent of fishing boats have started their operation. Some fishing boats' owners do not dare to leave for fishing. But they need to go their fishing boats because they need to look after their fishermen. The fishermen are facing difficulty for their livelihood after three months of suspension of work. This problem can be solved only by the fishing boats going out to sea, said U Thet Soe, the secretary of Myanmar Fisheries Federation (MFF) in Taninthayi region.

We will know that there is difficulty in the sale of the fish

after one or two weeks. We will not exactly see the demand of the Ranong market as well. To be able to penetrate other markets, we need to have the fish cold storage and bridges in Myeik. Only when we have such facilities, we can export the fish to other countries by keeping the caught fish in the cold storage and bridges, according to MFF.

"The caught fish are sold in Ranong by FOB. We heard that Ranong had not sold their fish yet and aquatic products bought last year because of COVID-19. So, the boat owners who have ten fishing boats are running only five boats," said U Tun Naung Oo, the head of Fisheries Department in Myeik District.

Taninthayi coast is located

in the southern part of the country. It is the longest one among three other shores, and it is 1200 km long. Over 250,000 fishermen from 1,250 onshore and offshore fishing boats are reliant upon the Taninthayi coast, according to the Fisheries Department in Myeik District. —Khine Htoo

THE Disaster Management Department has provided over K3,037 million to the disaster affected areas in Sagaing Region in four and a half years, said the head of Sagaing Region Disaster Management Department.

"The department has provided over K156 million for 13,263 households in 24 townships, hit by the strong wind, over K7 million for households in five flooded townships and over K28 million for 73 victims who were killed by thunder and in motor vessel capsized. Additionally, the department has also provided over K35 million for digging of the tube wells in 15 villages in Sagaing region and distributed the instant noodle in Naga Self-Administered Zone," he added.

The National Disaster Management Committee has provided K650 million worth rescue equipment such as vehicles, motorcycles, speed boats, fibre boats, lifejackets, motor vessels and wheel loaders for Sagaing region in cooperation with the Disaster Management Department. "We have also spent over K1,686 million for construction of one cyclone shelter facility to accommodate about 600 people in Kalay township and nine school shelters to accommodate about 500 people in Kalay, Mawlaik, Paungbyin, Homalin and Kani townships for the safety of the natural disaster-affected people. Moreover, the department has provided 4,000 raincoats, umbrellas and rain boots for the children

## Over 32,000 reserved rice bags sold at much fairer price over 1 month

OUT of 500,000 bags (108 pounds per bag) from reserved rice, over 32,000 have been sold between 10 July and 31 August, according to Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

Of 32,000 bags that have been sold, Yangon traders purchase the most with 21,790 bags, followed by Nay Pyi Taw with 3,300 bags.

Additionally, 2,200 bags are sold in Mon State, while 2,000 in Chin State, 1,756 in Mandalay Region, 920 in Taninthayi Region, 200 in Bago Region and 100 in Sagaing Region.

Regarding the rice purchase at a much fairer price, those in-

terested retailers and factories can contact through mobile numbers – 09-694386994/5 of MRF and 09-694386996 of Myanmar Rice and Paddy Traders Association.

At present, MRF purchased the rice bags at K22,400 per bag from the Consumer Affairs Department and distribute them at K22,800 per 108-pound bag to the registered retail shops, in order to pay storage charges.

It is the government's move to sell the rice at K1,000 per pyi (2.13 kg) which is much fairer price than the prevailing market price. MRF is supporting the government's plan with non-profit, the federation reported.

The Ministry of Commerce, Myanmar Inspection and Test-

ing Service (MITS), the authorized organization of the State and MRF implemented rice reserve scheme on 30 April.

The state's emergency rice reserve is to ensure food security, keep the price stable in the domestic market, continue to

## 56 factories completely shut down in 7 months amid COVID-19 crisis

A total of 173 factories were hit hard by the coronavirus impacts in the past seven months (1 January and 31 July), including the closure of 56 factories and workplaces, temporary closure and layoffs, said Daw Moe Moe Su Kyi, Regional Minister for Immigration and Human Resources.

She responded to the queries raised by Daw Aye Aye Mar of Lanmadaw constituency, at the twelfth regular session of the Second Yangon Region Hluttaw held on 31 August. Daw Aye Aye Mar asked whether the factories that were closed during the pandemic are in line with past commitments during its establishment. She also questioned the number of factories shut down, the reason for the closure and further plans.

Those 173 factories have over 42,000 workers, and some of them are applying for new jobs posted by the Department of Labour, she continued.

According to section 8 (1) of Factories Act 1951, the employer must report to the Factory and General Labour Laws Inspection Department at least 15 days before the starting operation. The existing law of the Department of Labour does not embody the commitments regarding the starting operations.

However, during the start-up of factories and employment, the employers and workers must sign employment contract outlining 21 facts issued by the Department of Labour and have to send the EC (employment contract between employer and employee) with commitments to the relevant township offices. Workplace Coordinating Committee (WCC) that includes balanced ratios between the workers and employer representatives are also to be formed. Besides 21 facts, mutual agreements between the employers and workers are also to be committed under the EC.

Additionally, the Department has dealt with the labour rights of those workers affected by 173 factories. Regarding payment for business shutdown allowances, if the workers file complaints to the relevant township Department of Labour Relations in Yangon Region, the related township department officials will inspect and resolute the disputes under the Settlement of Labour Dispute Law and Rules (2012)

The employment termination and redundancy pay are settled as per the Notification No. (84/2015) released on 3 July 2015, under the Employment and Skill Development Law. The employment termination

must be notified of the workers of one month in advance. If the employers failed to give one-month notice, one-month salary is added to the payment, she said.

When the workers want employment status rather than compensation for the closure of factories and called for more beyond the Notification No (84/2015), those files are sent to Yangon Region Arbitration Tribunal, and they are settled in accord with the existing law.

If the workers or employers are not satisfied with the arbitration, they can send further complaints to the Arbitration Council within seven days of arbitration. The disputes are inspected and settled again. The Department of Labour Relations of Yangon Region tackled with payment in line with the Notification as mentioned above. Yangon Region Investment Committee also issues notifications regarding job opportunities of domestic and foreign enterprises through notice boards and MRTV, after the committee holds bi-monthly meeting related to the endorsement of the investment proposals. Additionally, labour registration cards can be processed within one day for the citizens, Yangon regional minister added.

## Myanmar aims for \$16 bln worth exports, \$18 bln imports for 2020-2021FY

UNDER the National Planning Law for 2020-2021 Financial Year, Myanmar intends to reach the export target at US\$16 billion and import at \$18 billion.

Myanmar's GDP growth forecast for FY2020-2021 is estimated at 6 per cent. The country's export sector relies more on the agricultural, manufacturing and other service sectors. Export earnings from CMP (cutting, making, and packing) garment businesses are rising, while reliance on natural resources is lessening.

The forestry is expected to drop by 11 per cent. In comparison, Myanmar intends to grow by 2.2 per cent for the agricultural sector, 3.4 per cent for livestock and fisheries, 0.3 per cent in the power sector, 2.1 per cent for minerals, 7.1 per cent in the manufacturing industry, 12.7 per cent in electricity, 6.8 per cent in the construction sector, 7.9 per cent in transportation, 9.1 per cent in communication, 8.6 per cent in finance, 3.8 per cent in social and management, 9.3 per cent in other service and 7.1 per cent in trade sector respectively.

The government expects the private sector contributes to 72.73

per cent of investments.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, and finished industrial goods, while it imports capital goods, raw industrial materials, and consumer goods.

In the current 2019-2020FY, the country shipped in and out goods valued \$33 billion in nearly 11 months, an increase of \$1.8 billion compared with the corresponding period of the 2018-2019FY, according to the Ministry of Commerce. During the same period in the previous FY, trade stood at \$31.2 billion, according to data released by the ministry.

This year, both maritime and border trade recorded an increase compared with the year-ago period, with exports estimated at over \$15.7 billion and imports valued at \$17.27 billion.

Myanmar's foreign trade has shown a 10-per-cent increase, year over year, under the incumbent government. The Ministry of Commerce is endeavouring to boost export, enhance value-added production, reduce export barriers and provide trade financing services. — Htet Myat

## Iran nuclear deal parties meet amid US pressure

VIENNA—The signatories to the faltering Iran nuclear deal kicked off a meeting in Vienna on Tuesday as the United States is bidding to restore international sanctions on the Islamic republic and extend an arms embargo.

Britain, France, Germany, China and Russia are struggling to save the landmark 2015 accord with Iran, which has been progressively stepping up its nuclear activities since last year.

Tehran insists it is entitled to do so under the deal – which swapped sanctions relief for Iran's agreement to scale back its nuclear programme – following the US withdrawal from the accord in 2018 and the reimposition of sanctions. In a boost to Tuesday's talks, the Iranian atomic energy last week agreed to allow inspectors of the UN nuclear watchdog to visit two sites suspected of having hosted

undeclared activity in the early 2000s. International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) head Rafael Grossi had travelled to Iran on his first trip since taking up the top post last year and after months of calling for access.

Results from any site visits are, however, expected to take three months, according to a diplomat familiar with the matter,

so “it risks being a problem then with the Iranians” if anything undeclared and nuclear-related is found.

### US ‘isolated’

Mikhail Ulyanov, Russia's Ambassador to International Organizations in Vienna, noted Monday on Twitter that “nuclear deal participants have a lot of

topics to discuss”.

The meeting is chaired by EU senior official Helga Schmid with representatives from Britain, China, France, Germany, Iran and Russia attending.

Mark Fitzpatrick, an associate fellow of the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS), said last week's agreement on access kept “Iran generally in line with the rest of the world, against an isolated United States”.

The United Nations last week blocked the US bid to reimpose international sanctions on Iran, while Washington also failed to rally enough support to extend an arms embargo set to start to lapse from October.

But Fitzpatrick pointed out that “Iran's nuclear activities remain of deep concern to those states that are dedicated to non-proliferation”.—AFP ■

## Psychologist-backed documentary labels Trump ‘malignant narcissist’

WASHINGTON—As battle lines are drawn ahead of Donald Trump's bid for re-election, a new documentary based on the testimony of mental health professionals has labeled the US president a “malignant narcissist”.

“Unfit: The Psychology of Donald Trump” – released on streaming platforms Tuesday – claims not to be politically motivated.

The film interviews several psychologists who argue they have a medical duty to warn the US public about Trump's alleged mental state.

According to psychologist John Gartner, Trump clearly exhibits four key symptoms of malignant narcissism – the “most destructive” personality type – including paranoia, narcissism, antisocial personality disorder and sadism.

“This type of leader pops up all throughout history, and they're always extraordinarily disruptive,” Gartner told AFP, noting that the same label has been applied to Hitler, Stalin and Mussolini.

“What is so strange is that we're not used to seeing this type of leader in America.”

But the film's central premise of professionally diagnosing a public figure from afar is contentious.—AFP ■

## US on brink as vigilantes, guns and hate stoke fears ahead of election

WASHINGTON—Shootings that left three dead at protests against police brutality have stoked fears of rising violence as a deeply divided US heads into elections amid economic collapse, a deadly pandemic and the worst social upheaval since the 1960s.

President Donald Trump, hoping to secure a second term in November despite the crisis, heads Tuesday to Kenosha, the Wisconsin town which descended into violence last week after police shot a young black father seven times in the back.

The governor of the state, Democrat Tony Evers, called on Trump in vain to reconsider

his visit, warning it would “hinder our healing” and arguing that the citizens of the town are already traumatized. One of them, Gregory Bennett, said he no longer feels safe in the town where last Tuesday night, a 17-year-old who had joined a far-right militia protecting private property shot dead two protesters.

Local white people “are in fear, they look for a reason to defend themselves and we have people over here [the militias] looking for a reason to attack,” said Bennett, a social worker and former member of the military who said he no longer leaves his house without a bulletproof jack-

et and a pistol in his belt. In the United States, where the right to defend oneself is part of the na-

tional identity, some 30 percent of the adult population owns at least one firearm.—AFP ■

## Turkey extends Mediterranean gas exploration mission

ANKARA — President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Tuesday played up Turkey's military might after extending a Mediterranean gas exploration mission that has pitted it against Greece and the rest of the EU.

Turkey's push into disputed waters has raised the stakes in the energy-rich but volatile region, reviving long-standing hostilities between the two neighbours.

Greece accuses Turkey of violating its sovereignty, while Ankara says its NATO ally is pursuing a “maximalist” approach that offers no room for talks.


The European Union is watching the conflict with growing concern, with Germany spearheading efforts to get the sides to temper the rhetoric and settle their differences through talks.

Turkey deployed the Oruc Reis research vessel and warships to the disputed waters on August 10 and prolonged the mission twice. Greece responded by staging naval exercises with several EU allies and the United Arab Emirates not far from smaller ones Turkey conducted between Cyprus and Crete last week.

Turkey's most recent extension of the mission was until Tuesday, raising the possibility of a respite in a fast-escalating conflict that includes deals the two countries struck with war-torn Libya and Egypt.

But in a message on NAVTEX, the international maritime navigational telex system, Turkey said late Monday the seismic vessel's stay in the eastern Mediterranean would be extended until September 12.—AFP ■

## Facebook threatens to ban news publication on Australian platforms

SYDNEY—Social media giant Facebook Inc. on Tuesday threatened to stop Australian media outlets and individuals from sharing news stories on its platforms in response to a proposed law that would require it to compensate news companies for their stories.

In July, the Australian government announced a draft of the News Media Bargaining Code, which was designed to “level the playing field” for Australian media outlets by making companies like Facebook and Google LLC pay for news content. Facebook Australia and New Zealand Managing Director Will Easton said in a statement if the proposed code were to become law, Facebook would be forced to pay for information that makes up a fraction of its service, and which news publishers voluntarily share on the platform.

“Assuming this draft code becomes law, we will reluctantly stop allowing publishers and people in Australia from

sharing local and international news on Facebook and Instagram,” Easton said in a written statement. “This is not our first choice -- it is our last.”

Easton said the company is in favor of the Australia government’s goal to support struggling news organizations, but argued that news publishers – not Facebook – benefit most from news stories being shared on social media.

“News represents a fraction of what people see in their News Feed and is not a significant source of revenue for us,” he said. “News organizations in Australia and elsewhere choose to post news on Facebook...and they encourage readers to share news across social platforms to increase readership of their stories.” Facebook’s statement comes two weeks after Google made a similar rebuke of the proposed law, suggesting end users of the search engine may be forced to pay for the service.—Kyodo ■

## Japan, Australia, India to jointly enhance pandemic-hit supply chains

TOKYO—Japan, Australia and India agreed Tuesday to cooperate in enhancing regional supply chains as the coronavirus pandemic continues to disrupt trade and manufacturing activity, hitting economic growth. The countries aim to draw up measures by the end of the year and are also planning to call for the participation of the members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations. Economy ministers from the three nations “underscored the necessity and potential to enhance the resiliency of supply chains in the Indo-Pacific region”, they said in a joint statement released after their videoconference.—AFP ■

# Myanmar exports agricultural products worth US\$ 3.3 billion in current FY

**T**HE agricultural sector is the lifeblood of Myanmar and is the first prioritized business of the country. Agriculture is the backbone of Myanmar's economy and rice,

pulses and beans are the country's leading agricultural products. In Myanmar, agricultural sector accounts for over 37 per cent of the country's GDP and employs about 70 per cent of

the labour force. The agricultural sector plays an important role in reducing poverty rate in Myanmar.

Myanmar's exported agricultural products worth US\$

3.3 billion to foreign countries between 1 October last year and 31 July in the current financial year, an increase of US\$500 million against a year-ago period, according to the

figures released by the Ministry of Commerce. Myanmar earned US\$2.8 billion from agricultural products export in the first ten months of the financial year 2018-2019. In the country's export sector, the agriculture industry accounted for almost 22 per cent of overall exports. The main items of export in the agricultural sector are rice and broken rice, beans and pulses and maize. Fruits and vegetables, sesame, dried tea leaves, sugar, and other agricultural products are also transported to other countries around the world. About 60 different types of crops are grown across the country.

Myanmar agricultural products are primarily transported to Thailand, China, India, Bangladesh, Japan, Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines, Indonesia, and Sri Lanka. However, the export market for the country's agricultural products remains uncertain due to quality and unstable global demand. The country requires specific export plans for each agro product, as they are currently exported to exter-

nal markets based upon supply and demand. Contract farming systems, the involvement of regional and state agriculture departments, exporters, traders, and some grower groups, are required to meet production targets. The ministry is trying utmost to help farmers deal with challenges such as high input costs, procurement of quality seeds, high cultivation costs, and erratic weather conditions.

Myanmar shipped over 1.15 million tons of beans and pulses to foreign markets from 1 October 2019 to early July in the current financial year 2019-2020, fetching US\$730 million, according to the figure released by the ministry. The Southeast Asian country earns about US\$800 million from exports of beans and pulses every

year. Myanmar exported over 2.31 million tonnes of rice and broken rice as of July 31 this financial year 2019-2020. Myanmar freighted over 1.456 million tonnes of rice and 860,592 tonnes of broken rice, earning nearly US\$700 million. Being an agricultural country, Myanmar exports a wide variety of agricultural products, ranging from rice, beans and pulses, sesame, sugarcane, onion, garlic, ginger and other kitchen crops to watermelons, bananas, mangoes, avocados, cucumbers, chili, and other profitable fruits and vegetables, and rubber.

The government launched the Agriculture Development Strategy and Investment Plan 2018-2023 in June 2018, which encourages good management, productivity and competitiveness in the sector. The

plan aims to promote private sector interest and encourage farmers to improve the market access and information. To boost agricultural production, the country is tackling the challenges of erratic weather, capacity and technical know-how to produce value-added products and dependence on foreign market demand. The issue of high transportation costs, which cause problems in the supply chain, is also being addressed so as to keep up with the countries in the region. With rice, pulses, corn and rubber representing its major agricultural products, Myanmar is rich in land and water resources and has a fa-

vorable climate for agriculture and livestock production.

Myanmar received over US\$2.93 billion from agricultural products export in the financial year 2016-17, up by US\$315 million year-on-year, the ministry's data showed. The Southeast Asian country exported agricultural products worth US\$2.8 billion in the financial year 2017-2018. Myanmar's income from export of agricultural goods in the financial year 2018-2019 were valued at US\$2.45 billion, an increase of US\$260 million compared with the same period of last financial year.

NEW YORK—Serena Williams continues her protracted pursuit of a record-equalling 24th singles Grand Slam title on day two of the US Open at Flushing Meadows on Tuesday.

It has been more than three

years since Williams won her 23rd Grand Slam title at the 2017 Australian Open -- when she was already pregnant with daughter Olympia.

The 38-year-old has come close since, reaching four major

finals only to come away empty handed. She needs one more to equal Margaret Court’s record and starts her latest bid against the 96th-ranked Kristie Ahn at Arthur Ashe Stadium on Tuesday afternoon.—AFP ■

## Arsenal midfielder Mesut Ozil linked with move to Saudi Arabia side Al Nassr

ANKARA—Arsenal playmaker Mesut Ozil is said to have attracted interest from Saudi Arabia side Al Nassr.

Reports in Turkey claimed on Monday that the Riyadh club are preparing an offer of around \$20 million (Dh73.5m) per year in wages for Ozil, although the German midfielder recently said he would remain at the north London club. Ozil is believed to have interest also from Qatar.

The former Real Madrid star, 31, is understood to still be Arsenal’s highest-paid player, with his weekly wages reported to be £350,000 (Dh1.7m). Despite that, he did not feature for manager Mikel Arteta following the 2019/20 Premier League’s restart in June. His contract with Arsenal runs until next year. Ozil attracted heavy criticism this year by refusing to follow his teammates in taking a pay-cut during lockdown, but told The Athletic afterwards that his current deal “should be respected by everyone”, implying he would stay.

Arteta, meanwhile, has hinted that Ozil would be given a clean slate heading into the new Premier League campaign, which begins on September 12. On Saturday, his side defeated champions Liverpool on penalties to win the Community Shield.

Nine-time domestic champions, Nassr are looking to strengthen their squad having this week relinquished the Saudi Pro League title to Al Hilal. The capital club sit six points behind their city rivals with two rounds to go, but lost the crown given their inferior head-to-head record.—AFP ■

## Tottenham to go to Bulgaria, AC Milan face Shamrock Rovers, in Europa League

PARIS—Tottenham Hotspur will face a trip to Bulgaria in the Europa League second qualifying round in September after being paired with Lokomotiv Plovdiv in Monday’s (Aug 31) draw.

The tie will be played on Thursday, Sept 17, five days after Jose Mourinho’s side kick off their Premier League campaign at home to Everton. They are due to play away at Southampton on Sunday, Sept 20.

Lokomotiv qualified for the Europa League by winning the Bulgarian Cup for the second year running. Spurs qualified by coming sixth in the Premier League.


Meanwhile, League of Ireland side Shamrock Rovers have been handed a glamour tie at home to seven-time former European champions

AC Milan in Dublin.

Steven Gerrard’s Rangers have been drawn away at Lincoln Red Imps of Gibraltar, the minnows who beat Celtic 1-0 at home in a Champions League qualifier in 2016 before losing the return in Glasgow.

After being knocked out of this season’s Champions League at home by Ferencvaros in the second qualifying round last week, Celtic will enter the Europa League in the third qualifying round, the draw for which takes place on Tuesday.

Complications caused by the coronavirus pandemic mean that all qualifying ties are being played as one-off matches at the home of the first team drawn from the hat, rather than over two legs.—AFP ■
