Disciples conveyed the gold casket for sacred Buddha relics, the gold casket for sacred relics of Arhat, the gold leaves for treatises of Tri Pitakat, gold leaves for Jaya Mangala Gatha and Mingala Mawgun inscription, the gold alms-bowl, stone inscription, gems cornerstones, the gold alms-bowl, the gold cornerstone decorated with pieces of ruby, the gold cornerstone and Mawgun inscription respectively to round the precinct of the Buddha image clockwise and then to the centre of the cornerstone.

Leader well-wisher for the image, the Chairman of the State Administration Council Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services placed the soil from seven sites of Bodh Gaya and from famous pagodas from Myanmar. At the auspicious time, the gem casket, the gold casket for sacred Buddha relics, the gold casket for holy relics of Arhat, the gold leaves for treatises

of Tri Pitakat, gold leaves for Jaya Mangala Gatha and Mingala Mawgun inscriptions, the gold alms-bowl, the gold cornerstone decorated with pieces of ruby and stone inscription of Mawgun at the designated places and sprinkled scented Paritta water on it.

In accord with the traditions mentioned in the treatises, they all took the designated places. “Maravizara Buddha Im-

age” is defined as the Lord Buddha significantly conquering overall disturbances and dangers committed by Marn celestial being. Construction of the Buddha image aims to show the firm flourishing of Theravada Buddhism in Myanmar to the world, to ensure peace and tranquillity in the country, contribute visits of local and foreign travellers to the regional development as well as the develop-

ment of the State. The Buddha image will be carved in line with 32 major characteristics and 80 minor ones of the Lord Buddha in Bhumi Phassa Mudra. The throne will be 18 feet high and the Buddha image, 63 feet high, totalling 81 feet tall. Upon completion, the Maravizara Buddha Image will be the most prominent and highest image made of marble in Myanmar and world-wide. —MNA



Suspects arrested with their firearms

THE security forces arrested Win Min Tun, Naing Lin Htet, Pyae Phyo Maung, Ma Nan Ohnmar Oo, Ma Hnin Hnin Oo and Ma Ei Kham together with their homemade weapons used in riots in Kaung Naung Ward in Muse Township on 24 April.

Moreover, the police detained Wai Yan, Ma Sandi Nyunt Win and Ma Aye Thandar Aung for distributing anti-government papers in Thingangyun township at Myitta Nyunt Ward of Tamway Township, and they found a handmade mine in Ottha Myo Thit of Bago Township and arrested three men near Kanpetlet junction in Mindat Township, 14 men and 2 women including Myint Soe, security of rubber plantation near Yangon-Mandalay expressway road in Hlawga Village of Bago Township together with their weapons used in riots.

The police raided the house of Nay Min Min located in Mayangon Township of Yangon Region and did not find the suspect but the firearms.

Moreover, the police ar-

rested Than Soe from Pathein in Ayeyawady Region and seized the weapons at "Shwe Min Tha Mee" building and "Tun Shwe Yang" teashop

located in Shwepyitha Township.

The security forces detained Daw Thandar Aung from Pyay Township of Bago Region, Kyaw Min Thu from Pinyin Township of Nay Pyi Taw and Kyaw San Oo from Meiktila Township of Mandalay Region together with their firearms used in riots.

On 25 April, the security forces found a handmade mine between Kyi Taung Kan railway station and Phyat Khwal railway station in Tabin Shwe Htee Ward of Pobbathiri Township.

The police confiscated the weapons used in riots in No (14) B.E.P.S compound in North Okkalapa Township of Yangon Region.

The security members also arrested Kyi Htwe from Dawei Township of Taninthayi Region together with the firearms.

Those arrested will face effective legal actions, and investigations are underway to capture the rest of the suspects. — MNA

Shan State emphasizes food sufficiency, enhancement of people's living standard

cent of cooking oil and more than 200 per cent of beans and pulses. As such, Union level officials and local authorities will join hands in undertaking local food sufficiency, change

of growing crops suitable for the region, modern techniques and formation of cooperative societies.

The Union Minister inspected Namkhwi Dam in Hopong Township and Hsegyi Dam in Taunggyi Township.

Namkhwi Dam irrigates 1,690 acres of farmlands, and Hsegyi Dam, 3,000 acres of land. There are more than 290,000 acres of irrigated farmlands in Shan State.

preliminary doctoral courses under the restrictions of Covid-19 prevention held at the Ministry of Education, Dr Nyunt Pe instructed officials concerned to systematically send reports on absentees to workplaces on 3 May and urged educational staff to pave the way for new generation students for enhancement of their education quality.

He noted that not losing learning opportunity for students is very important for those students and the State. The Ministry of Education will reopen final

year courses, master's courses (written) and preliminary doctoral courses of universities, degree colleges and colleges in the higher education sector under the Covid-19 prevention restrictions on 5 May with the aim of not delaying learning opportunities of students in the outbreak of Covid-19, enabling the students to finish final year courses of 2019-20 academic year and turning out graduates for workplaces, the Union Minister added.

The deputy minister, the permanent secretary and the director-general of the Higher Education Department reported on the number of the courses to be opened on 5 May and the number of students, facts about the training courses, academic and management matters, arrangements for student hostels, and more plans to open first to third years' courses and distance education courses.

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 142,722 after 10 new cases were reported on 25 April 2021 according to the Ministry of Health and Sports. Among these confirmed cases, 131,932 have been discharged from hospitals.—MNA

Systematically use fertilizer and pesticide in cultivation without chemical residues

AGRICULTURAL inputs, particularly fertilizers and pesticides, are useful for the cultivation of crops, including paddy all over the country.

As 670,000 tonnes of urea fertilizers and 16,000 tonnes of pesticide were imported from October 2020 to April 2021 for domestic use, businesspersons need to distribute such kind of agricultural inputs to farmers at fair prices, without focusing on self-interests only.

State-owned and private-run plants produce fertilizers and pesticides for agricultural purpose. However, they cannot still meet the domestic demand. Hence, businesspersons import such kinds of agricultural inputs to be met the demand.

Emphasizing the use of quality agricultural inputs by farmers at fair prices, only when fair profits can be created for the companies which operate trading of those inputs on a commercial scale can an economic chain be sustained.

Businesspersons are allowed to apply for the import of agricultural inputs through the Myanmar Agricultural Inputs Registration System (MAIRS) online.

As the number of fertilizers and pesticide are of variety, users need to take care of efficient use of them in farmlands. It is because fertilizer and pesticide are generally made of chemical elements.

Being an agro-based country, Myanmar can enjoy fruitful results from the agricultural sector by earning income from trading and exportation of agricultural products. In this regard, these products need to be free from chemical residue.

As such, farmers should especially take care of using fertilizers, pesticides and other chemicals fed to their farmlands with the aim of increasing the per-acre yield of crops.

Chemical residues in crops do not benefit both consumers and producers. Content of chemical residues is like betting between users and consumers. Such betting may ruin businesses of users as well as cause losing lives of consumers.

Such a chemical residue can bring side effects to consumers, causing serious health hazards. On the one hand, no one country accepts the import of agricultural products containing chemical residues. The exporters, therefore, may face unexpected loss in the export of products.

Hence, farmers need to receive laboratory tests over agricultural products before exportation. Simultaneously, people should check packages of crops with the technical assistance of authorized organizations before consumption for staying away from possibly hazardous nutrition.

One billion COVID vaccine doses administered globally

On December 8, 90-year-old British woman Margaret Keenan, resplendent in her Christmas T-shirt, received the Western world's first COVID vaccination - a chink of light at the end of the tunnel for humanity after a devastating pandemic year.

SIX months on, nearly one billion COVID jabs - both first and second shots - have been administered globally, according to AFP's database.

The unprecedented inoculation drive is seen as the world's ticket out of the coronavirus disaster, despite concerns about rare side effects, worries over supply, and a glaring inequality between rich and poor.

With new COVID variants sparking a worrying fresh spike of cases and uncertainty over the vaccines' effectiveness against them, the planet is now racing to inoculate as many people as possible before being overwhelmed by yet another wave of a pandemic that has already killed three million people.

"A year ago I felt myself a young man, now I am an old man," said Laszlo Cservak, a 75-year-old Hungarian, after his first jab near the River Danube.

"I horribly miss not going to the pool or gym, and travelling, so I came here to get liberated and my old life back," added Cservak, reflecting the COVID weariness felt by billions worldwide.

In the darkest days of the pandemic, the idea of rapidly creating, manufacturing and authorizing even one effective vaccine against COVID looked far off.

But the world's scientists, aided by billions in public fund-

ing, worked around the clock to develop several viable vaccines - the first ones using cutting-edge mRNA technology that hacks into human cells and effectively turns them into vaccine-making factories.

"Normally, it takes five to 10 years to produce a new vaccine," European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen told the European Parliament in February.

"We did it in 10 months. This is a huge scientific success."

'Jabs army' With clinical trials showing efficacy of up to 95 per cent, attention turned to the logistical

nightmare of producing, storing, delivering and administering the vaccine - in theory to everyone on Earth who wanted it.

Rollout was sluggish in many countries, but faced with a life-or-death race against time, some deployed creative logistical solutions, turning cathedrals, iconic sports stadiums, and theme parks into emergency vaccination centres.

France turned a velodrome into a vaccino-drome. Venice created the vaccination vaporetto. Hard-hit Britain deployed tens of thousands of vaccine volunteers, dubbed the "jabs army".

World leaders from US President Joe Biden, Britain's Queen Elizabeth and Pope Francis rolled up their sleeves to take the shot - although not always in front of the cameras - in a bid to counter public scepticism.

Biden told the world "there's nothing to worry about" as he received his shot live on TV.

The few countries that rolled out a vaccine quickly have seen cases and deaths fall, with a return to something of a normal life.

In Israel, where more than half of the population is fully vaccinated, cases dropped to around 13 per 100,000 people compared to

around 650 in January. Deaths fell by a factor of 10.

British pubs have reopened their beer gardens, Israel dropped mask wearing outdoors, and theme parks and theatres have restarted in the United States.

Nekia Griffin, a 46-year-old medical administrator and Harry Potter fan, told AFP her trip to Universal Studios in California was her "first real outing" since last spring.

"To get a piece of that magic is just, it's indescribable. It's just so wonderful to be back."

'Shocking' disparity

But it has been far from plain sailing. The scramble for vaccines has seen ugly political spats, with China and Russia accused of "vaccine diplomacy" by offering homemade jabs to strategic allies.

Britain and the EU became embroiled in an unseemly post-Brexit row over access to vaccines and the bloc came under fire for a shambolic start to the vaccine rollout.

"Getting these vaccines into the arms of billions of people is now the most pressing challenge for the international community. This is, in a manner of speaking, the 'new arms race'," according to The Soufan Centre, a research body.

And with World Health Organization officials stressing that "no one is safe until everyone is safe",

there has been outrage over the gap between the rich world and poorer countries - a "shocking and expanding disparity," according to WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus.

Around half of the doses administered so far have been in high-income countries accounting for 16 per cent of the population. The 29 lowest-income nations have received 0.1 per cent, according to an AFP count.

Recently, very rare but occasionally fatal side effects including blood clots have hit the headlines, afflicting particularly the vaccine produced by AstraZeneca.

Despite authorities stressing the benefits far outweigh the risks, the negative press threatens to weigh on vaccine take-up, with a flood of misinformation on social media fuelling the anti-vax drive.

Some have resorted to bribing the reluctant: California-based firm Bolthouse Farms gave workers \$500 to get the job. One Beijing district handed out boxes of eggs and free trips to popular tourist attractions as an incentive.

What does the future hold? Already stirring controversy are 'vaccine passports', likely to be required in some form for international travel and entrance to public events, despite campaigners crying foul over data protection.

3rd COVID-19 emergency launched in Tokyo, Osaka area amid virus surge

Tougher measures against the novel coronavirus were introduced in Tokyo and the western Japan prefectures of Osaka, Kyoto and Hyogo on Sunday under a third state of emergency amid a surge in coronavirus cases across the country.

UNDER the new restrictions, operators of restaurants serving alcohol and movie theatres are required to close temporarily and sports events will be held without spectators. The emergency declaration will be effective for 17 days through May 11 in a bid to curb infections during the upcoming Golden Week holidays from late April to early May.

While the state of emergency does not entail a hard lockdown of the kind some other

countries have imposed and largely relies on the cooperation of the public and businesses, the measures have more teeth than the previous declaration in January.

Authorities are also asking the operators of karaoke establishments as well as tourism spots such as Tokyo Sky Tree and Universal Studios Japan in Osaka to close.

Department stores in the designated areas are only selling food and other daily essentials.

Public transport operators such as train and bus companies have been asked to end operations earlier on weeknights, with reduced services on weekends and holidays.

While a quasi-state of emergency was designated in the major cities of Tokyo, Osaka and Kyoto as well as in Hyogo and six other prefectures earlier this month, the measures have been unsuccessful in bringing down coronavirus cases.

MoSWRR provides social pension to elderly, cash assistance to storm victims, disabled, Parahita, CSOs in Magway Region

THE ceremony to provide social pension, and cash assistance to storm victims, the people with disabilities, Parahita and social welfare teams was held in Pwintbyu Township of Mandalay Region on 24 April.

In the event, Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr Thet Thet Khine said the State Administration Council reached its third month for serving the State duties in line with the 2008 Constitution. As the for-

mer UEC failed to resolve the voting frauds, the SAC serves as interim government according to the provisions of the state of emergency.

The SAC Chairman also instructed all to resume the suspended businesses.

She also talked about the storm that occurred in Sagaing, Taninthayi, Bago and Magway regions. Of these regions, the storm seriously hit Pwintbyu township of Magway Region. She then briefed her visit to

Pwintbyu township to assist the storm victims.

The ministry will provide more than K30.1million for 2,072 victims in Pwintbyu Township. The officials keep making efforts to conduct social awareness campaign and responses to natural disasters by cooperating with the public and civil society organizations.

The ministry also provides K107,040,000 for 19 homes/Yeiktha in Magway Region in 2020-2021FY. The ministry also pro-

vides K10,000 per senior citizen for about 250,000 older adults once every three month across the nation as per the National Social Protection Strategy stipulated in 2015. Therefore, it will provide for 25,375 older people above 85 years old during this ceremony.

She then highlighted equal human rights, rehabilitation and development programmes for the disabled and elderly.

She also added that the ministry provided K30,000 each to 200,000 persons with disabilities during the COVID-19 outbreak, and arrangements are also being made to provide further cash assistance to those who do not receive any aid.

There were 8,918 persons with disabilities who did not receive cash assistance in Magway Region. Therefore, a total of K14,100,000 will be provided to 470 persons with disabilities out of 8,918 disabled.

Taw, Yangon, Mandalay and other regions and states are reopened as usual.



The markets are alive with the vendors and sellers. Si-

Among them, Dr Kyin Kyin (Assistant Surgeon) and Dr Soe Than Htaik (Assistant Surgeon) of Tangyan Township People's Hospital, Dr Thant Zaw (Specialist) of Yangon Eastern District General Hospital, Dr Ko Ko Naing (Assistant Surgeon) of Hpa-an People's Hospital and Dr Kyaw Lin (Specialist) of Yangon Children's Hospital participated in CDM activities without performing medical treatments at assigned hospitals but gave medical treatments at private hospitals/clinics according to the documentary photos.

As tasks are being carried out to arrest those medical doctors charged, action will be taken against the persons under the law for admitting those medical doctors, and work licences of the private hospitals/clinics which allowed them to give medical treatments will be closed. Deterrent action will be taken against owners of these hospitals/clinics under the law. Action will be taken against any health staff under the law for taking charges of providing healthcare services to the people and giving assistance to private hospitals/clinics with participation in CDM activities without discharging assigned duty. Severe action will be taken against owners of private hospitals/clinics which admit those medical doctors and health staff for supporting the CDM participants.—MNA

Fuel oil price up by 55 per cent in three months

THE domestic fuel oil price has now risen above 50 per cent per litre in three months, as the heightened coronavirus restriction and possible lockdown in Asia sparked oil demand concerns, coupled with a strong dollar exchange rate.

The fuel oil was pegged at around K590 per litre for Octane 92, K610 for Octane 95, K590 for diesel and K605 for premium diesel in early February 2021 in the domestic retail market. Then, it remarkably rose to K920 for Octane 92, K1,005 for Octane 95, K920 for diesel and K930 for premium diesel on 25 April 2021, according to the local fuel oil market.

Domestic oil price is positively related to the global market. Oil price inched higher in the global market at US\$62.14 per barrel for WTI crude and \$66.11 for Brent crude on 24 April.

Additionally, the foreign exchange rate also affects the pe-

roleum price. The US dollar is gaining against Kyat in the local forex market in April, rising above K1,600 per dollar. In mid-February, a dollar was worth K1,430.

Usually, Myanmar imports fuel oil primarily from Singapore,

with monthly volumes touching 200,000 tonnes for gasoline and 400,000 tonnes for diesel. There are about 2,000 fuel stations and over 50 oil importer companies in Myanmar, Myanmar Petroleum Trade Association stated.

A monthly oil import is estimated at \$400 million, yet the oil importers face banking restrictions for maritime trade. Oil importers via land border can use informal payment Hundi system instead, said an importer.

The domestic oil prices have declined from 10 January 2020 owing to a fall in global oil prices. On 8 January 2020, oil prices were pegged at around K905 per litre for Octane 92, K995 for Octane 95, and K985 for diesel and premium diesel. Following the global market crashing, the domestic oil price plunged to more than 50 per cent in April against January's prices. In late April 2020, the oil prices touched a low of K290-330 per litre for Octane 92, K430-455 for Octane 95, K435-465 for diesel, and K445-475 for premium diesel, according to the domestic oil market. Ninety per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. In the Q1 of the current financial year 2020-2021, about \$600 million worth of petroleum products were imported. The figure plunged by half compared to a year-ago period, the Ministry of Commerce stated. — KH/GNLM

Pigeon pea price in bull market



Myanmar's pigeon peas are primarily shipped to India and exported to Singapore, the US, Canada, Pakistan, the UK, and Malaysia.

THE pigeon pea (red gram) price continues rising from early April, and it surged to above K94,5000 per metric tonne in the fourth week of April.

The pigeon pea price was on the rise in March-end 2021 amid the low yield and the dollar gain. The pigeon peas market saw a slight upward trend in price along with the appreciation of US dollar against Kyat, according to the domestic market.

The gram fetched up only K837,500 per tonne in early February. The price in April-end showed a remarkable increase of K100,000 per tonne as against February's rate.

The traders set the selling price at K88,000-90,000 per three-basket bag in the Manda-

lay market. The majority of them accept only immediate cash payment. The pigeon pea market remains bullish even after the Thingyan holidays (13-19 April), a trader from the Mandalay market shared his opinion.

Myanmar's pigeon peas are primarily shipped to India and exported to Singapore, the US, Canada, Pakistan, the UK, and Malaysia. But, the export volume to other countries rather than to India is extremely small.

More than 249,245 tonnes of various pulses and beans were exported to foreign markets between 1 October and 4 December of the current financial year 2020-2021, with an estimated value of US\$217 million. Of them, the pigeon pea export account-

ed for 83,758 tonnes, generating an income of \$57.94 million, the Commerce Ministry's data indicated.

The domestic bean market is positively related to the law of supply and demand, said an official of Myanmar Pulses, Beans and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association.

Since 2017, India has been setting import quota on beans, including black grams and pigeon peas. Therefore, the growers face difficulties to export their beans to the Indian market.

India's move to restrict importation of pulses in August 2017 severely affected growers in Myanmar. The price of pulses also drastically plummeted.

In the 2017-2018 FY, over a million tons of black grams, pigeon peas, and green grams were shipped to foreign countries. Nevertheless, the earnings have registered at just \$713 million owing to the price drop.

Myanmar shipped over 1.6 million tonnes of different varieties of pulses, especially black grams, with an estimated worth of US\$1 billion, to other countries in the FY2018-2019. During last FY2019-2020 ended 30 September, the country delivered 1.6 million tonnes to the external market, generating an export value of \$1.195 billion. — MM/GNLM

China tightens border security amid coronavirus resurgence

"CHINA has stepped up food safety measures on imported goods following the coronavirus resurgence in the border," U Min Thein, the vice-chair of Muse Rice Wholesale Centre, said.

Starting from 20 April, 30 samples from imported goods and packaging per truck have to be tested for the COVID-19. The test costs 60 Yuan per sample, totalling 1,800 Yuan per truck, the COVID-19 prevention and containment commission of Yunnan province released the notification on 19 April.

Traders must bear the cost. Only those traders and packaging tested negative will be allowed for cross-border trade.

The COVID-19 test is mandatory for all those truck drivers, brokers and workers who are executing the cross-border trade between Myanmar and China every day. The test is estimated at 60 Yuan for a person.

"The traders, goods and

packaging are to be daily tested for the COVID-19. Consequently, the traders are facing an extra burden of expense (K400,000-500,000) per truck for now. They have to wait for another day for the test result, causing a delay in trading and discomfort for the drivers. The extra expense significantly hurts the trading to a large extent", said U Min Thein.

Additionally, the workers must strictly abide by the coronavirus containment measures to return to work.

The fever test, wearing masks and gloves, and test results are essential.

The staff and workers in the border point must stay at the designated place between 9 pm and 8 am. If they are found to violate the rules, they will be sent to their hometown.

Following the coronavirus resurgences, Myanmar's Muse border trade has come to the verge of a standstill. — NN/GNLM

Fed set to hold the line as US economy recovers

THE Federal Reserve finally has what it wants and predicted: signs of a US economic recovery that could undo some of the damage done by the Covid-19 pandemic.

But when the central bank's policy-setting Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) opens its two-day meeting on Tuesday, analysts do not expect officials to raise rates or otherwise signal any backing away from the easy money policies rolled out to aid the US bounceback, despite some fears of rising inflation. "No one is expecting any major policy changes in terms of rates or the Fed's asset purchases," Andrew Hunter, senior US economist at Capital Economics, told AFP.

In fact, Fed officials have clearly stated that they will not be spooked by temporary price increases into reacting too quickly and pumping the brakes on stimulus measures. The government in

recent weeks has reported the first signs that Covid-19 vaccines are bringing laid-off workers back to work and ending the suffering of businesses hard-hit by closures meant to stop the contagion. Labor De-

partment data showed unemployment claims hit the lowest point since the pandemic began, while the economy regained 916,000 jobs in March, pushing the unemployment rate down slightly.

Retail sales surged in March to a level 27.7 per cent higher than the pre-pandemic rate a year earlier, while the Institute for Supply Management's services index hit an all-time high last month and new home sales hit a 15-year high. Yet even with signs hiring has picked up, more than 17 million people remain out of work and Fed Chair Jerome Powell has warned the economy will not achieve "maximum employment" this year. — AFP ■

New bloodletting hits Spanish banking sector

IN Spain where bank tellers were once legion, the sector is again reeling from thousands more job cuts as a 10-year trend gathers pace due to the ongoing pandemic.

Two more big banks announced thousands of layoffs last week with 8,300 jobs to be axed at CaixaBank, or one in five of its staff, and 3,800 at its smaller rival BBVA, accounting for 16 per cent of the workforce.

The announcements drew an angry response from Spain's big unions, the UGT and the Workers' Union (CCOO), who denounced the cuts as "brutal" and "scandalous".

Late last year, Banco Santander, Spain's largest bank, said it would cut 3,500 jobs while Banco Sabadell moved to lay off 1,800 staff.

All of them have made the same argument: that in a context of low interest rates which is expected to continue, they have to cut costs by reducing the number of branches rendered unnecessary by the growth of online banking.

Online transactions at BBVA have grown by 87 percent over the past two years, while branch-based operations have fallen by 48 percent, the bank said on Thursday. —AFP ■

Shanghai looks to attract foreign investment in 'new cities'

SHANGHAI government is working to attract foreign investment for the five "new cities" in the city's suburbs — Songjiang, Jiading, Fengxian, Qingpu and Nanhui — by holding a series of diverse investment promotional events. The first event took place on Thursday in Sheshan, a beautiful scenic spot in Songjiang New City. Located in the city's southwest, Songjiang initiated the G60 Science and Technology Innovation Valley, an alliance of nine major cities in the Yangtze River Delta region which also includes Jiaxing, Hangzhou, Jinhua, Suzhou, Huzhou, Xuancheng, Wuhu and Hefei.

The Shanghai Commission of Commerce and Invest Shanghai co-organized the event, which attracted more than 100 people from the government, the consulates general in Shanghai of the United States,

Canada, Japan, Singapore and South Korea, as well as key foreign-invested enterprises and professional service institutions.

"The commission will focus on further promoting the investment environment in the 'new cities' through diverse activities that make them more familiar to foreign enterprises," said Li Hong, deputy director-general of the Shanghai Commission of Commerce.

In 2020, Songjiang's industrial output reached 447.7 billion yuan (US\$68.81 billion), the total value of imports and exports stood at 305.57 billion yuan and fixed-asset investment was 60.5 billion yuan, behind only the Pudong New Area in the three main economic indicators, according to Chen Rong, director of the Songjiang Commission of Commerce. — Xinhua ■

A journey to cluster of Tahkong Mwetaw pagoda

MYANMAR is the land of stupas and temples. Every stupa and temple is based on historical events, some of which are very interesting. Moreover, there are plentiful of ancient pagodas accessible to travel tours for taking a relaxation across the nation. Among them, clusters of Tahkong Mwetaw pagodas in Nyaungshwe Township of Shan State are attractive to travellers.

Tahkong Mwetaw is about 37 nautical miles sail of motor schooner from Inlay Lake of Nyaungshwe Township in Shan State. Motor schooners can take about three hours to drive a journey from Inlay Lake to cluster of Tahkong Mwetaw pagodas located on the western bank of Bilu Creek.

A route of waterway, and natural beauties from environs of Inlay Lake are attractive to travellers.

Travellers can enjoy significant views along both sides of Bilu Creek leading to Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas and crop plantations of the local farmers with Shan mountain ranges in the background. Misty Shan mountain ranges give a taste of chill to souls of travellers. Environs of the pagodas are peaceful and tranquil except driving sound of motor schooners.

Every traveller can see ancient Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas on the western bank of Bilu Creek. Some of pagodas are damaged and some are in good conditions. The history of these pagodas mentioned King Alaungsithu on his tour

built the said pagodas.

There are 76 large pagodas and 54 small ones in the cluster of Tahkong Mwetaw pagodas, in addition to 106 damaged pagodas, according to its history. These pagodas are in small and long forms and lacquered umbrellas atop the pagodas are of tip. Circular decorative bands of the pagodas are small.

Oldie Tahkong Mwetaw pagodas were affected by natural disasters as well as some of pagodas was burgled to take out the enshrined objects. Designs and forms of Tahkong Mwetaw pagodas are similar to that of Intein and Kakku. Similar pagodas can be seen in some areas of Shan State and environs of Inlay Lake.

Although the maintenance and renovation are being undertaken at Tahkong Mwetaw





Pagodas damaged by impacts of natural disasters, historical value and images of archaeology has already lost there. These losses might be dissatisfactory for international travellers who wish to emphasize valuable observation for ancient historical events.

Some bells take positions in the venue of Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas. Historians and researchers estimated these bells might be some 200 years old. Reclining Buddha images, statues of kings of celestial beings and Galon (mythical king of birds) can be seen in the precinct of pagodas. It is interesting that works of these statues and choice of locations were wonderful.

Historians and researchers analyzed that the location of Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas built on both banks of Bilu Creek which originates at Inlay Lake might be based on farsightedness of King Alaungsithu on his waterway trip considering environments and locations as well as travelling.

Actually, it was an area of ancient Sankar City often flooded in the monsoon. As the area of Sankar City was inundated in monsoon as a large lake, it was called Sankar Lake. Some people said that such lake is four miles long from the east to the west and some seven miles from the south to the north with about 15 to 20 feet deep

of water.

As such, some pagodas of the cluster are still facing flooding in monsoon. Even though, such situation of the pagoda can be attractive to the foreign tourists who wish to pay visits to these pagodas in any seasons. Natural beauties of that area being changed in seasons would win the hearts of local and foreign travellers.

Inlay Lake in southern Shan State is an eminent destination for local and foreign tourists but number of travellers bound for Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas via Inlay Lake is still lesser. It is because tour operators didn't arrange a tour package heading to Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas.

Architectural works of Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas are similar to that of Intein and Kakku. However, travellers leading to these pagodas will have the chances to observe knowledgeable natural scenes, significant views of areas, lifestyle of local people and different forms of agricultural tasks.

At a time when tourism service will resume operations in the post-Covid-19 period, it is expected that larger number of local and foreign travellers will lead to Tahkong Mwetaw Pagodas in southern Shan State. It is sure that the tour of these pagodas would be interesting for travellers to observe historical documents.

Klopp admits Liverpool don't 'deserve' Champions League next season

JURGEN KLOPP admitted Liverpool are not playing like a side who "deserve" Champions League football next season after blowing the chance to move into the Premier League's top four with a 1-1 draw against Newcastle on Saturday. Mohamed Salah had opened the scoring after just three minutes, but Liverpool wasted a host of chances to extend their lead and paid in stoppage time.

The Reds even had a reprieve when Callum Wilson's equaliser was ruled out after a VAR review for handball, but still could not hold on as Willock's deflected strike secured a vital point in the Magpies' bid for top flight survival. Liverpool move up to sixth but are a point behind fourth-placed Chelsea and West Ham, who face off later on Saturday at the London Stadium.

Two more dropped points is a blow to Liverpool's chances of a place in next season's Champions League after their owners' plans for ensuring they have top level European football every season without having to earn it

on the field collapsed this week. Liverpool were one of 12 clubs to initially sign up to proposals for a European Super League (ESL) last weekend, only to withdraw within 48 hours after a backlash from their own players and fans. "If you deserve it, you deserve it," said Klopp, echoing the critics of the ESL as a closed shop for Europe's big clubs. "I didn't see us today playing like we deserve Champions League next year. We

have another five games and we will see. We learn or we don't play Champions League, that's it."

A protest outside Anfield on Saturday was more muted than the ones seen ahead of Chelsea and Arsenal's home matches in recent days, but a number of flags and banners were attached to the gates around the ground calling out the "greed" of the club's American owners Fenway Sports Group (FSG). —AFP ■

Djokovic upset by Karatsev in Belgrade semi-finals

WORLD number one Novak Djokovic suffered a second surprise loss in as many weeks Saturday as he was knocked out by Russia's Aslan Karatsev in the Belgrade semi-finals.

The 28th-ranked Karatsev saved 23 of 28 break points to advance to his second final of the year following a 7-5, 4-6, 6-4 victory, gaining a measure of revenge for his defeat by Djokovic in the last four of the Australian Open.

Djokovic was also beaten in the last 16 of the Monte Carlo Masters last week by Britain's Dan Evans.

Djokovic, the 2009 and 2011 champion at the event which is played at a venue which carries his name, surrendered a 3-0 advantage in the opening set as he dropped serve three times.

The Serb then fell 4-2 behind in the second but summoned his well-documented powers of recovery to win four straight games and send the match to a deciding set.

Dubai champion Karatsev fended off eight break points in the third set before winning Djokovic's service game to move 4-3 ahead and leave the top seed on the brink. —AFP ■

Henderson surges to victory in LPGA Los Angeles Open

BROOKE Henderson fired a four-under par 67 to win the LPGA Los Angeles Open on Saturday, erasing a four-stroke deficit to edge Jessica Korda by one shot.

Canada's Henderson, 23 and ranked sixth in the world, finished with a 16-under par total of 268 to claim her 10th LPGA title and her first since the 2019 Meijer LPGA Classic in Michigan.

"I felt like I was playing really great golf," Henderson said. "It just wasn't my time. It's nice to get the win and get some confidence back."

Six birdies, including a chip-in at the par-three 12th propelled her past overnight leader Korda and world number one Ko Jin-young, who played alongside Henderson in the final group at Wilshire Country Club.

Two-under through the first nine holes, Hen-

derson took the solo lead with a short birdie putt at the 11th, then pushed her advantage to two with her chip-in at 12.

"I was definitely disappointed that I missed the green there," she said. "But fortunately I had a lot of green to work with. To catch the hole there and make birdie was a huge momentum change – that's probably what won it for me today."

She added another birdie at 14 and was three-up with two to play.

Former major winner Henderson bogeyed 17, and Korda kept the pressure on hitting it close on the way to a birdie at the par-three 18th – where Henderson's tee shot rolled off the green into a swale.

Henderson, of Smiths Falls, Ontario, chipped up to three feet and made the putt to seal the win. —AFP ■
