Pearl and gems emporium continues seventh day in Nay Pyi Taw

THE seventh day of sales of pearl and gems in Myanmar Kyats continued yesterday morning at Mani Yadanar Jade Hall in Nay Pyi Taw following the COVID-19 health guidelines.

It was announced that of 450 lots of jade from 451 to 900 lots, 407 jade lots were sold for K3,510,199,708 on the sixth day of the emporium.

On the seventh day of the emporium, the gem merchants placed their proposed prices in the tender boxes starting at 8 am after viewing the jade lots displayed in the Jade Hall.

The responsible persons will check the bidding prices for jade lots from number 901 to 1350, and the jade lots that are sold will be announced at 8 am today.

Similarly, the bidding price proposals for jade lots from (1351) to (1800) will be closed at 11 am. Today's sold jade lots will be announced on the morning of 9 April, while the jade lots numbers from (1801) to (2148) sold on 9 April will be announced on the next day. The auction will continue till 10 April.—MNA

ASEAN DGSOM-ATRC leaders' retreat held online

THE first ADGSOM-ATRC Leaders' Retreat (1st ASEAN Digital Senior Officials' Meeting and ASEAN Telecommunications Regulators' Council Leaders' Retreat) was hosted by Thailand via a virtual system yesterday.

Permanent Secretary for Transport and Communications U Soe Thein, Director-General of the Directorate of Communications U Myo Swe and representatives participated in the discussion. Malaysia chaired

the meeting. Senior digital officials, heads of regulators from the ASEAN countries, director of the ASEAN Secretariat, and ASEAN ICT centre attended the meeting.

The meeting focused on ASEAN ICT funding and the preparation of the "Leaders' Statement on Advancing the Digital Transformation of ASEAN" that need to be submitted to the ASEAN Digital Ministers for approval at the 38th ASEAN Summit in Novem-

ber 2021.

The meeting also discussed projects being implemented under the ASEAN ICT Work plan 2021, approval of the member countries' proposed projects for the ASEAN ICT Work Plan 2022 depending on the priority needs and funding situation.

They also discussed projects to be implemented with outside organizations' assistance and other issues related to the telecommunications and the ICT sector. — MNA

File opened against former chief minister of Mon State Dr Aye Zan under Anti-Corruption Law

THE Anti-Corruption Commission formed an investigation team according to the complaint to take action against the former chief minister of Mon State, Dr Aye Zan, under the law for his acts of taking monetary from businesspersons based on his post of chief minister and authority.

Based on inspection findings conducted by the investigation team, former chief minister of Mon State, Dr Aye Zan, accepted more than K569,809,000 from businesspersons who extracted sand from Thanlwin River as of 2018 while serving as chief minister of Mon State.

He allowed those businesspersons to pay a less-

er amount of mineral tax to the State fund. As such, the State fund lost more than K132,357,000 in the 2019-2020 financial year.

He issued K20 million from the Covid-19 fund to another person, but he did not pay back the money. Dr Aye Zan then gave K65 million to the other two persons who did not pay back the money.

As such, the investigation showed financial loss of the State.

The Anti-Corruption Commission stated that a file of the lawsuit against Dr Aye Zan to be taken action under Section 55 of the Anti-Corruption Law was opened at Mawlamyine Myoma police station in Mon State. — MNA

Voting fraud was terrible

IN holding the 2020 election, as it was the time of breaking out of Covid-19, votes were cast under the social distancing. Votes were cast by 71 per cent. Large numbers of difference were found in the inspection of the voting result, and such findings were released. Requests were made for addressing the differences in voting results many times. There were more than 50,000 vote-riggings in Myeik Township and over 30,000 in Kyunsu Township, in addition to more than 10 million across the nation. Voting fraud was terrible. Such an event was similar to the act of illegally sitting the examination to take the highest marks. As attempts were made to form the new government by holding the third Hluttaw in addition to absence of addressing the errors on voting list, the Tatmadaw assumed the State responsibilities in accord with Sections 417 and 418 of the Constitution starting from 1 February 2021 and formed the State Administration Council under Section 419. The council was constituted with military and civilian persons in balance, and civilians were appointed as chairmen of region and state administration councils. In fact, the Tatmadaw is taking responsibilities in a short period to ensure genuine democracy and disciplined and firm democracy.

The Union Election Commission has inspected the withdrawal/receipt/use/remaining of ballot papers used for Pyithu Hluttaw Election of Seikpyu, Pauk and Taungdwingyi townships of Magway Region together with the respective township election sub-commission, head of police force, Immigration and Population and administrator according to the Hluttaw Election Law Section 53.

4. According to the inspection, a total of 600 polling stations in these three townships took out 519,534 ballots and used 343,406 ballots. It left 166,639 ballots instead of 176,128 ballots. The difference was 11,889 and it found 2,400 extra ballots. The extra/shortage ballots and illegal extra ballots were found at respective poll stations. Findings were as follows:

Try the best to serve the people

STATE service personnel are those discharging duties of the State and the people for their interests. So, they are dubbed as State service personnel as well as public service personnel. They deserve to take pride in their duty in carrying out their respective jobs with goodwill.

Images of noble State service personnel were dirty in political changes in February 2021. While some politicians focusing on destruction acts committed incitements for CDM activity, some personnel were absent at workplaces. Those service personnel joined CDM activity based on emotional feeling, provocation, misunderstanding and coercion.

It is uneasy for being a noble staff. They have been serving their duties with skilful techniques for a long time. The government waited in a patient manner for the personnel to have a proper conscience for the sake of the State and the people.

Service personnel must have diverse attitudes and concepts to conscientiously serve the State and the people with noble spirits in any government eras.

Currently, the government emphasizes the resumption of workplaces and the reopening of people's hospitals and schools.

Regrettably, medical doctors, nurses, health staff and teachers were absent at workplaces.

Reportedly, they were imposed coercion to join CDM and worried about action to be taken when they return to workplaces.

The government informed the staff about filing complaints on coercion and threats and pledged to protect them. Hence, they need to abide by the disciplines of the personnel.

Personnel who did not commit crimes should return to workplaces for serving their duties. Especially, patients are waiting for health staff while students remember teachers.

Some hospitals are closed as medical doctors join CDM activity. Local people seek help from the Tatmadaw for health care services. Tatmadaw government allows the staff wishing to return to workplaces.

Only when they do not continue serving will substitute staff be appointed in vacant posts. That is why personnel are requested to join the workplaces for reopening schools and hospitals for public interests.

Service personnel are urged to resume serving duties for the State and public interests without political colours and wrong attitudes.

Together, towards a fairer and healthier post-COVID-19 world

Why we must seize the moment to advance health equity and achieve universal health coverage

THIS World Health Day, WHO is highlighting the opportunity we have to build a fairer and healthier post-COVID-19 world. For well over a year now, marginalized and disenfranchised communities across the world and in the South-East Asia Region have borne the brunt of the COVID-19 pandemic. In countries rich and poor, socio-economic, political, educational and geographic factors among others have facilitated the spread of the SARS-CoV2 virus, impacting health outcomes and compounding inequalities. In our unequal world, preventable social and economic inequities continue to impede the right of everyone, everywhere, to achieve the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health – an injustice that we must not accept.

COVID-19 is just the latest disease to expose, exploit and exacerbate inequalities that negatively impact health and socio-economic outcomes between and among vulnerable groups. In countries at all levels of income and development, health and

illness follow a social gradient: The lower the socio-economic position, the worse the health and the poorer the access to health services of adequate quality. This is why the burden of communicable diseases in the Region such as TB, hepatitis and HIV is most acute among poor and disadvantaged populations, which has the tragic effect of entrenching these communities' poverty and marginalization. And that is why noncommunicable diseases such as stroke and heart disease can be more commonly found among populations that are exposed to socially determined risk factors such as unplanned urbanization and inadequate housing, which can contribute to household air pollution, food insecurity and malnutrition.

To remedy these and other health inequities, and to create a fairer and healthier post-pandemic world, WHO is calling on leaders in the health sector and beyond to make concerted efforts throughout the COVID-19 response and recovery to ensure that all people have living and working conditions that are

conducive to lifelong health and well-being. Clean water and air, income and social protection, and food security among other environmental and public policy goods are vital to achieving this goal, and can best be secured through a "health-in-all-policies" approach that is gender-responsive and human rights-focused, and which advances the core principle of the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda: Leave no one behind.

Health systems themselves have a critical role to play. Since 2014 the Region has pursued universal health coverage (UHC) as a Flagship Priority, with the aim of ensuring all people have access to the health services they need, when and where they need them, without financial hardship. And we have made real progress. Trend data from the Region's 2020 monitoring report show that health service coverage is now, on average, above 63%, as compared with 49% a decade ago. The density of health workers – around 70% of whom are women – continues to increase, with nine countries now above the

first WHO threshold, compared with six in 2014.

But the fiscal constraints imposed by the pandemic threaten to stall or even reverse progress unless budgets are actively reprioritized and health is apportioned additional resources. New sources of revenue should be explored, for example increases in taxation on unhealthy products such as tobacco, alcohol and sugar-sweetened beverages. Value for money must continue to be improved, including through investments in primary health care and pro-poor initiatives that help mitigate the social determinants of health.

Crucially, communities must continue to be engaged and listened to – precisely as they have been throughout the COVID-19 response. Community outreach and empowerment, including through women-led organizations, can help identify the root causes of inequities and find localized solutions, and also enhance coordination between health and social services and target communities. The whole-of-government,

whole-of-society approaches that countries have mobilized to respond to the pandemic provide a compelling model by which they can accelerate progress towards UHC, and with it, Sustainable Development Goal 3 and the wider Sustainable Development Agenda.

On the Region's onward journey, countries must continue to prioritize the collection of high-quality, timely and reliable health data. To adequately uncover inequities and enable policies that tackle them, health data should be collected on a disaggregated basis and analysed by key stratifiers for inequities, such as by sex, geography, income, education, or other pertinent metrics. The findings should then be fed into health policy-making and implementation. The Region's WHO-supported Health Information Platform, which provides an integrated database of country progress across a range of indicators, must continue to be leveraged to close gaps and eliminate disparities.

We can – and must – prevail. The emergence and spread

of COVID-19 has laid bare the inequities that influence health outcomes between and among groups in the Region and across the world, and which make us all more health-insecure. We must reduce and ultimately end those inequities and accelerate towards UHC. All people have the right to achieve the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health. A fairer and healthier Region and world is possible. We must dare to be bold and achieve our vision.

COVID-19: AstraZeneca vaccine benefits still 'largely positive'

THE benefits of the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine are still "largely positive" and outweigh risk of rare but serious blood clots, according to

an official with the World Health Organization (WHO), speaking on Tuesday during the agency's regular press briefing from Geneva. Dr Rogério Pinto de Sá

Gaspar, Director for Regulation and Prequalification, was responding to a journalist's question regarding links between the vaccine and cerebral venous

sinus thrombosis, a rare blood clotting syndrome.

The European Medicines Agency (EMA) on Tuesday denied that it had established any link, following reports that one of its experts stated there was a connection.

Expert meetings underway

Meanwhile, an EMA committee that monitors the safety of medicines has been meeting to assess the data, which is also being reviewed by a regulatory body in the United Kingdom. WHO is following both proceedings.

"What we can say is that the appraisal that we have for the moment, and this is under consideration by the experts, is that the benefit risk assessment for the vaccine is still largely positive", said Dr Pinto de Sá Gaspar.

He reported that "thrombotic events" are rare, and are now being categorized in terms of their distribution within the population.

"For the time being, there is no evidence that the benefit risk assessment for the vaccine needs to be changed", he added. "And we know from the data coming from countries like the UK and others, that the benefits are really important in terms of reduction of the mortality of populations that are being vaccinated."

WHO's Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety is due to meet on Wednesday, which also will look at the data, with a conclusion expected later in the week.

Stigma and virus variants WHO continues to work with a group of scientists worldwide to

develop nomenclature for variants of the new coronavirus that causes COVID-19.

Many people, including health experts, have been referring to the variants by the countries in which they were first detected, something the UN agency wants to change.

"We need to make sure that any of the names that are used do not further stigmatize a person, or a last name, or a location, inadvertently", said Dr Maria Van Kerhove, WHO technical lead on COVID-19, responding to a question from a South African journalist.

"There should be no stigma associated with these viruses being detected, and unfortunately we still see that happening."

increasing pre-primary attendance rates requires coordination, joint efforts and cooperation between policymakers and implementers. Before the children go to the Basic Education schools of the Ministry of Education, the Social Welfare Department have to carry out training for them. He urged to focus the discussion on improving the quality of pre-schools, increasing pre-school attendance coverage, and strengthening interconnection between government organizations and local/foreign non-governmental organizations and private sector.

The attendees discussed the development of pre-primary education to increase pre-primary school attendance and the budget of ECCD, and collaboration and inclusive ECCD. — MNA



Mat weaving business earns extra family income in Tada-U

THINPHYU mat weaving business is earning extra family income in Tada-U township, according to the mat weavers from Tada-U.

Most of the Myanmar people are using Thinphyu mat as their home furniture. Most Myanmar houses have at least one Thinphyu mat, whether it is old or new. Also, these mats are made of split cane and are suitable for Myanmar warm weather.

The main raw material to weave the Thinphyu mat is ordered from Pantanaw town. The raw canes are initially put into the water to weave the Thinphyu mat. Before putting them, they need to keep under the sun.

"The Thinphyu mat is woven with the cane strips. The 100

cane trees can weave two Thinphyu rugs. We have to split the

cane. Then, we have to weave the mat before the canes are dried.

The weavers earn K 2,500 for a piece of Thinphyu mat.

Although it is fewer wages, the girls are earning extra income as it is a traditional business.

After the harvest season, the girls in Tada-U townships are weaving the Thinphyu mat from April to September. Then, they are selling them back for K15,000 per mat, said a mat weaver from Ngar Yar Pyar village, Tada-U township.

There are many sizes of Thinphyu mat. But the seven feet is the biggest one for the Thinphyu mat. Also, the mat used for meditation is sold for K3,000. Therefore, the girls in Tada-U township earn extra family income by weaving for Thinphyu mat, said Ma Naing Naing Maw, a Thinphyu mat weaver.—Ye Tint (Tada-U-IPRD)/GNLM

US dollar gains up to K1,500 in April first week

ACCORDING to the Central Bank of Myanmar's data, the US dollar value against Kyat appreciates in the domestic forex market, reaching up to K1,500.

The dollar exchange rate stood at K1,469 on 31 March and strengthened to K1,495 on 6 April. The exchange rate rose by K20 in a week. Nevertheless, the local forex market rate is K70 higher than the rate set by the CBM. The CBM set a dollar exchange rate at K1,495 on 6 April. In contrast, it stood at K1,570 in the local forex market, a money changer reported.

A dollar was valued at only

K1,330 in January-end. The dollar exchange rate jumped to K1,441 in February, with an increase of K100 against January's rate. The local forex market's data showed that the dollar exchange rate touched the maximum of K1,345 and the minimum of K1,327 in January 2021. The rate moved in the range of K1,335-1,465 in February. It reached the lowest of K1,420 and the highest of K1,550 in March.

In 2020, the exchange rate moved in the range of K1,465-1,493 in January, K1,436-1,465 in February, K1,320-1,445 in March, K1,395-1,440 in April,

K1,406-1,426 in May, K1,385-1,412 in June, K1,367-1,410 in July, K1,335-1,390 in August, K1,310-1,355 in September, K1,282-1,315 in October, K1,303-1,330 in November and K1,324-1,403 in December.

In 2019, the rates are pegged at K1,508-1,517 in July, K1,510-1,526 in August, K1,527-1,565 in September, K1,528-1,537 in October, K1,510-1,524 in November and K1,485-1,513 in December.

On 20 September 2018, the dollar exchange rate hit an all-time high of K1,650 in the local currency market.—NN/GNLM

Farmers from Mongyang happy with golden pumpkin yield, prices this year

THE golden pumpkin has brought smiles to the farmers' faces in the Mongyang region, Shan State (East) as they are getting fair prices of their products in the local markets, with yielded abundantly this year, according to the pumpkin growers.

"This year, the golden pumpkins are yielded plentifully. The pumpkins are demanded highly by the traders and earning good price. Nearly every day, we picked up the golden pumpkin and sold them back.

After 120 days, the golden pumpkin can be started to pick up. One acre of golden pumpkin can produce around 2,000 pumpkins, said a local farmer.

The daily-wages labour is also earning K10,000 per day. Therefore, the daily wages labours are also happy with their income, said another pumpkin grower.

The Mongyang region is engaging with the agriculture business. The local farmers are growing onion, chilli, potato, tomato, eggplant and beans.

The farmers are growing them, especially in the monsoon season from May to June.

Then, they are constantly cultivating winter crops golden pumpkin from October to November. This year, the golden pumpkin are yielded richly and making reasonable profits.—Arr Char/GNLM

Butter bean prices slip on weak demand

WHEN the butter bean is flooding the market, the prices slid owing to weak demand. The butter bean prices moved in the range of K47,000-63,000 per bag depending on the size in the Mandalay market, with a slight decrease of K1,000-2,000 per bag.

About 40,000 bags of butter bean from Yesagyo Township is daily flowing into Pakokku market, said U Bo Gyi Naing, owner of Nilar depot in Pakokku Township. The villagers along Ayeyawady and Chindwin rivers in Yesagyo Township cultivate the butter beans on alluvium soils during low water level of the Ayeyawady River. The beans are highly yielded, U Phoe Kyaw, a grower from Yesagyo Township, elaborated.

A basket of butter bean is worth K14,000 this year, indicating K1,000 lower than last year's

rate, the growers said.

Additionally, the butter bean prices decline in the domestic market on the back of falling demand from the foreign markets, according to the Mandalay pulses and beans market.

In 2019, the beans touched a high of K37,000 per basket. In April 2020, butter bean fetched about K17,000 per basket. This year, it plunged to K14,000 per basket. The price is possible to extend the drop as the foreign demand is feeble amid the COVID-19 pandemic and the political changes, the traders said.

Butter bean export to China, Japan and European markets has been falling. Now, it is relying only on the domestic market, said a trader from the Mandalay market. Typically, Myanmar exports about 75 per cent of butter bean production

to foreign markets -- Japan, China, Denmark, Singapore, the Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Taiwan (China Taipei) and Viet Nam, with an export volume of 15,000-30,000 tonnes per year.

There are over 160,000 acres of butter bean plantation both in winter and monsoon crop seasons. The butter beans are grown in June and July for the monsoon growing season and harvested in October and November. The winter season is in October/November, and harvest time from January to March. The butter beans are primarily cultivated in Sagaing, Bago, Magway, Mandalay and Ayeyawady regions and Mon and northern Shan states. Magway Region produces good-quality butter beans, and Japanese buyers prefer them.—KH/GNLM

OFFICIALS inspected seven bullets hit on the glass of the entrance security booth of US Centre on Inya Road in Kamayut Township of Yangon Region. The centre was fired seven shots at 7 am on 27 March.

Thanks to the efforts of officials, Aye Thaw Kaung, son of U Tint Lwin, 34, holding citizenship scrutiny card No 12/Ka-Ma-Ra (C) 054565, who fired the US Centre by gun, was arrested at the residence of 74-D, Thanlwin Road, Bahan Township together with Mercedes YGN/3P-5569 at about 9 am on 30 March.

According to his confession, he bought a black pistol that can be fired with a gas cylinder and 150 lead balls worth

K190,000 on 25 February online. He also purchased a fake number plate YGN/5P-7463 worth K40,000 from the shop selling phoney number plates on West Shwegondine Road the same day. On 26 March, he changed the number plate YGN/3P-5569 of his father's Mercedes with a fake one. He drove the car three-four times on Inya Road near the US Centre to monitor the environs. On 27 March, he left the house and opened fire at the US Centre with a gas gun seven times.

He dropped a large office bag comprising the gas gun, a box of 100 lead balls, two CO2 gas cylinders and a fake car number plate packed by a blue polyeth-

Chile president enacts election postponement

CHILE'S President Sebastian Pinera enacted a law Tuesday to postpone by five weeks an election to choose a commission to rewrite the country's dictatorship-era constitution, amid a surge in coronavirus infections.

The vote was to have taken place on Sunday, but Pinera proposed that it be delayed, and received the backing of

parliament.

"We did not think it prudent or convenient to hold elections this coming weekend," Pinera said as he signed the bill in Santiago.

The election to decide the members of a Constituent Assembly who will rewrite the constitution -- which has been in effect since the Augusto Pinochet dictatorship (1973-

90) -- will now take place on May 15 or 16.

Campaigning would be suspended until April 28.

Pinera said the reasons for the postponement were "taking care of the health of our compatriots and secondly, taking care of the health of our democracy".

Chile has notched record new daily infec-

tions recently, regularly topping 8,000 -- a much higher number than during the first wave of the pandemic and despite a fast advancing vaccination campaign.

Chile's intensive care units are running at 95 per cent occupancy.

Last October, Chileans voted overwhelmingly in favour of rewriting the constitution. —AFP ■

New Zealand boosts space technology cooperation with Germany

NEW Zealand's aerospace industry is getting a boost through cooperation with the German Aerospace Centre (DLR), which is expected to improve its capability and potentially lead to joint space missions, New Zealand's Minister of Research, Science and Innovation Megan Woods said Wednesday.

According to her, 12 New Zealand organizations have been chosen to work with world-leading experts at DLR to complete feasibility studies for cooperation on propulsion, space communications and remote sensing technologies.

DLR is Germany's national research centre that conducts research and development activities in the fields of aeronautics, space, energy, transport, security and digitalization. Woods said the feasibility

studies will lead to larger scale collaborations, potentially including joint New Zealand-Germany space missions.

"Our Government has helped accelerate growth including through an enabling regulatory regime for space, the Airspace Integration Trials Programme and investing in the MethaneSAT climate change space mission," the min-

ister said.

Approximately 900,000 New Zealand dollars in funding has been allocated to the 12 space technology projects from the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment's 28 million New Zealand dollars in Catalyst Fund, which is aimed at growing partnerships with international research organizations. —Xinhua ■

Ukraine urges NATO to speed up membership in 'signal' to Moscow

UKRAINIAN President Volodymyr Zelensky on Tuesday urged NATO to speed up his country's membership into the alliance, saying it was the only way to end fighting with pro-Russian separatists.

Zelensky spoke with NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg after an increase in clashes and Russian military movements on the border raised fears of an escalation of the separatist conflict in eastern Ukraine. In a tweet after the call, Zelensky said it was time for NATO to move forward with Ukraine's longstanding desire for membership. He said Kiev was committed to defence reforms requested by the alliance in exchange for membership. "But reforms alone will not stop Russia," said Zelensky, whose government has said it hopes to be invited this year to

join a NATO Membership Action Plan (MAP).

"NATO is the only way to end the war in Donbas. Ukraine's MAP will be a real signal for Russia." Fears have been mounting of a major escalation of the conflict in eastern Ukraine, where government forces have battled separatists in the mainly Russian-speaking Donbas region since 2014.

Ukraine last week accused Russia of massing thousands of military personnel on its northern and eastern borders as well as on the Crimean peninsula annexed by Moscow.

The United States, the central power in NATO, stopped short of saying that Ukraine's membership had become more urgent and said Kiev must first complete reforms. —AFP ■

Talks to save Iran nuclear deal get off to good start

IRAN, Russia and the United States reacted positively Tuesday to the opening exchanges in a first day of talks in Vienna aimed at rescuing an international agreement on Tehran's nuclear programme.

US President Joe Biden has said he is ready to reverse the decision of his predecessor Donald Trump to withdraw from the landmark 2015 agreement, negotiated to ensure that Iran never developed a military nuclear programme.

And after Moscow gave a positive assessment of the opening of the talks earlier Tuesday Washington's reaction a little later was also upbeat. Iran too, described the opening talks as constructive.

"I can say that overall, the meeting was constructive," the head of the Iranian delegation, Abbas Araghchi, said in a video on Iranian broadcaster Irinn.

The United States was not present at those discussions because Iran has refused to meet the US delegation so long as its sanctions against Tehran remain in place.

The European Union is acting as an intermediary. Mikhail Ulyanov, Russia's Vienna-based envoy to international organizations, said Tuesday's meeting between those parties still in the deal — Iran, China, Britain, France, Germany and Russia — had been "successful". It would take time to restore the agreement, he said.

"The most important thing after today's meeting of the Joint Commission is that practical work towards achieving this goal has started," he tweeted.

"We do see this as a constructive and certainly welcome step," US State Department spokesman Ned Price said of the talks a little later. —AFP ■

Mexican election candidate launches campaign from coffin

A Mexican congressional candidate launched his election campaign in a coffin Tuesday to highlight the country's many thousands of deaths from the coronavirus pandemic and cartel-related violence.

Carlos Mayorga, a lower house candidate for the Encuentro Solidario party in the northern state of Chihuahua, said he was sending a message to politicians that people were dying "because of their indifference."

Mayorga arrived inside a gold-colored casket at a campaign rally on a bridge between the Mexican border city of Ciudad Juarez and El Paso, Texas.

He was accompanied by aides dressed in personal protective equipment and carrying bouquets of flowers to draw attention to Mexico's Covid-19 death toll of more than 200,000

-- one of the world's highest.

Politicians "have remained silent about the high levels of organized crime. They have re-

mained silent about the chaotic Covid situation," Mayorga said.

More than 300,000 people have been murdered in Mexico

since the government deployed the military in the war on drugs in 2006, according to official figures. —AFP ■

'Suddenly we heard people scream: Flood!' - Horror in Indonesia

HOMELESS, injured, and with his daughter dead, Sugeng

stares blankly as he comes to grips with the devastation left

by floods and landslides on Indonesia's Adonara island.

The 60-year-old was asleep with his family on Sunday night as torrential rain battered the community at the eastern end of the vast archipelago nation.

In seconds, their lives changed forever.

"Suddenly we heard people scream 'flood!'" said Sugeng, who like many Indonesians goes by one name.

He and his wife fled their home, but their 20-year-old daughter Indri did not make it out alive and her body was later found on a beach.

"She was trying to hold on

to a cupboard but the current was so strong that she lost her grip," Sugeng said.

"We buried my daughter yesterday... I'm devastated."

Adonara island, home to about 125,000 people, was among the areas hardest hit by the floods and landslides that killed more than 150 in Indonesia and neighbouring East Timor. The disaster was triggered by heavy rain and wind from one of the region's most destructive cyclones in years, which ripped across a cluster of islands in the neighbouring Southeast Asian nations.—AFP ■

Brazil prostitutes strike for first-line Covid shots

PROSTITUTES in the city of Belo Horizonte in southeast Brazil have gone on strike for a week, demanding to be included in the group of front-line workers receiving priority coronavirus vaccines. Thousands of sex workers in the city have been forced by pandemic-related closure of hotels -- where they rented rooms to sell their services -- to solicit for clients on the street, they say.

"We are in the front line, moving the economy and we are at risk," Cida Vieira, president of

the Association of Prostitutes of Minas Gerais state, told AFP. "We need to get vaccinated."

Vieira and other women held a protest Monday in a street lined with shuttered hotels where they used to ply their trade, waving placards declaring: "Sex workers are professionals" and "Sex work and health." "We are part of the priority group because we deal with various types of people and our lives are at risk," said Lucimara Costa, one of the protesting prostitutes.—AFP ■

Descendants of Sudan Jews hope to connect with Israel

IN a corner of a shabby central Khartoum neighbourhood, Hebrew-lettered gravestones jut up from a rubble-strewn plot, remnants of the small but vibrant Jewish community that once lived in Sudan.

The cemetery stood for years as a reminder of an oft-overlooked chapter in Sudan's history, but for decades it has been neglected, abandoned among cracked streets littered with trash and lined by tyre shops.

"All we have from Sudan's Jewish community is this run-down cemetery, some old photos and memories," pharmacist Mansour Israil told AFP.

The grandson of an Iraqi Jew who settled in Sudan, Israil, whose family later converted to Islam, still lives in a neighbourhood once known as "the Jewish quarter" in Omdurman, the capital's twin city across the Nile river. —AFP ■

Ex-prostitute, 'Jesus' actor line up for Peru Congress race

EX-PROSTITUTE Angela Villon is one of several unconventional candidates vying for a seat in Peru's national congress in elections Sunday -- a reflection of the country's growing diversity.

These atypical candidates include a Jesus actor, a cosplaying anime fan, and a leftist politician hoping to become Peru's first transgender congresswoman.

They are among 2,572 candidates running for a seat in Peru's 130-seat unicameral legislature, and their chosen issues vary radically.

Prostitute-turned politician

"We whores also vote, and we decided to stop being used," said Villon, 56, who is taking a stand for oft-exploited and outcast sex workers.

If elected, she says she would push for prostitution to be legalized and for its practitioners to be afforded dignity.—AFP ■

THE Italian government has given the green light for fans to attend Euro 2020 matches scheduled for Rome's Stadio Olimpico, including the tournament's curtain raiser, the country's football federation said on Tuesday.

Rome is set to host the opening fixture for the delayed multi-host nation Euro, between Turkey and Italy in Group A on Friday June 11. The Italian capital was also picked to host Italy's other group matches against

Switzerland and Wales, as well as a quarter-final.

"The willingness of the Italian government is excellent news that is good for the whole country, not just for football," president of the federation (FIGC) Gabriele Gravina said in a statement.

Gravina added that Italian health minister Roberto Speranza had asked the technical and scientific committee which advises the government "to find the best way to enable the presence of fans" for the matches.

The European Championship will run until July 11 and is currently programmed to feature matches played in 11 other cities — London, Munich, Baku, Saint Petersburg, Budapest, Bucharest, Amsterdam, Bilbao, Glasgow, Dublin and Copenhagen. —AFP ■

Premier League set to be halted as ban on organised sport still in place

THE 2020-21 football season is facing the prospect of being halted for a second successive season as the government and the health authorities failed to lift the ban on organized sport.

All organized sport was halted by the authorities last month until at least April 11 following a surge in COVID-19 cases.

However, with the number of positive cases reducing considerably in the last few weeks, there was hope that athletes who practise sport at elite level in Malta will be given the green light to resume their preparations ahead of gradual return of competitions.

However, speaking during a press conference in Castille, Prime Minister said that for the time being restrictions on organized sport remained in

place and may be will be lifted after April 26 should the situation continues to improve.

"It's important that everyone remain responsible and do not break the current restrictions so that on April 26 we can look forward to reopen the restaurants, bars and the return of organised sport as well as other activities," Dr Abela said.

"Everything will depend on how as a country we manage the lifting of restrictions."

The decision is particularly a huge blow for the Malta Football Association who is facing the prospect of ending the Premier League earlier than expected for a second successive season.

It is to be noted that Malta is the only country that has elite sport halted due to COVID-19. —AFP ■

Kevin De Bruyne signs contract extension at Man. City

KEVIN De Bruyne has signed a two-year contract extension that will keep him at Manchester City until 2025, the Premier League club announced on Wednesday.

The Belgium international, whose existing deal was due to expire in 2023, is 30 in June and now looks set to see out most of the remainder of his career at the Etihad Stadium.

De Bruyne has had a glittering spell since joining the club from Wolfsburg in 2015, winning seven major trophies, which could rise to 11 by the end of the season if City are successful in their hunt for the quadruple.

"I could not be happier," said De Bruyne. "Since joining City in 2015, I have felt at home. I love the fans, my family are settled here in

Manchester and my own game has developed really well.

"This football club is geared for success. It offers me everything I need to maximize my performance, so signing this contract was a straightforward decision.

"I am playing the best football of my career and I honestly feel there is more to come."

He said he and manager Pep Guardiola had the same football philosophy.

"Having that relationship with a manager is so important to me because our objectives are totally aligned, and we want the same things," he said.

City director of football Txiki Begiristain hailed De Bruyne as one of the best players in world football. —AFP ■
