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## Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

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## Five National Objectives of Diamond Jubilee Independence Day

1. To ensure cementing the discipline-flourishing genuine multiparty democratic system and build the Union based on democracy and federalism;
2. To utmost strive for ensuring prosperity of the nation and food sufficiency as national work processes;
3. To build a better State and socioeconomic life in accord with the theme “Keep Moving Forward to Achieve Our Goal” focusing on interests of the State and ethnic national people;
4. To initiate national solidarity and peace of the Union with a firm vow;
5. To successfully hold the free and fair multiparty democratic general elections and emerge an electoral system in which all ethnic nationals would participate proportionately.

## Articulating Myanmar's Position on United Nations Security Council Resolution

It is observed that the United Nations Security Council adopted a resolution on Myanmar through voting at its meeting in New York, United States on 21 December 2022. It is mentioned in the UN Charter that the member states confer the Security Council primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security. The situation in Myanmar is solely internal affairs, which in no way pose any risk to international peace and security. Hence, Myanmar highlights that the adoption is not in line with the Charter of the United Nations.

The Britain-initiated resolution was found to incorporate several intrusive elements on Myanmar's internal affairs that contravene the principles and purposes of the United Nations. Moreover, it is observed that the resolution also constitutes human rights-related matters which have already been discussed repeatedly at the Third Committee of the General Assembly and the United Nation Human Rights Council and which also fall outside the purview of the Security Council's mandate.

It is found that the resolution demands an end to violence. Myanmar's security forces have been performing with utmost restraint in accordance with the existing laws. Only the terrorist acts of unlawful organizations, the so-called NUG and PDFs, necessitate condemnation and prohibition.

Myanmar has to declare the State of Emergency after the massive electoral fraud occurred in the 2020 General Elections and subsequently implement the provisions of the state of emergency. Furthermore, Myanmar has been steadfastly fulfilling the Five-Point Road Map, including the holding of free and fair multiparty democratic elections in line with the 2008 Constitution to hand over State duties to the winning party. Therefore, it is for the international community to support and encourage the Government's endeavours to return to democracy.

In its cooperation with the ASEAN to implement ASEAN five-point consensus, Myanmar upholds principles of non-interference in internal affairs and respecting sovereignty along with the principles of the ASEAN Charter. The said principles will also be fundamental in providing humanitarian assistance under the ASEAN scheme to people in need without any discrimination.

Likewise, the principles of non-interference and respecting sovereignty play a substantial role in Myanmar's engagement with the Special Envoy of the United Nations Secretary-General on Myanmar. Myanmar will continue its cooperation for the repatriation of displaced persons from Bangladesh in accordance with the bilateral arrangements between the two countries.

Myanmar is a multi-ethnic and multi-religious country. It is imperative that the history and national characteristics of the country, and divisions created by the colonial divide-and-rule policy are thoroughly considered when it comes to Myanmar issues. Only Myanmar knows best such delicate and wide-ranging matters and it has the ability to handle them.

It is noted that external interventions by means of interference and putting pressure do not bring any success in many countries, given the different historical backgrounds of the countries. The Government of Myanmar has been endeavouring to ensure the perpetuation of sovereignty and non-disintegration of the Union and national solidarity while prioritizing the interests of the people for peace, stability and development of the country. Exerting pressure to destabilize Myanmar rather than supporting the government's efforts does not help the country and Myanmar will not accept such acts.

It is further noted that the elements contained in the Security Council resolution do not contribute to the peace and stability of Myanmar except for politicization. Myanmar will uphold the 2008 Constitution, existing laws and fundamental principles as the only norms in carrying out state affairs.

## 9 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 23 December, total figure rises to 633,599

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to **633,599** after **nine** new cases were reported on 23 December 2022 according to the Ministry of Health.

The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **608,198** including **eight** new recoveries.

The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,489** on 23 December with no new deaths reported from the pandemic.

According to the research, it is found that people who have been vaccinated do not suffer severely from the disease, need not to be hospitalized and unlikely to die. If they have received booster shot, the death rates can be reduced more.

As such, the people need to follow the new normal way in living with COVID. Hence, all the people above five have to fully receive COVID-19 vaccination inoculated by the Ministry of Health free of charge. Six months after the vaccination, they have to take booster jabs at relevant health centres and ward/village administration offices without fail.

Moreover, they have to wear masks while in closed chambers and public places. They need to often wash hands with soap and water or the hand gel containing alcohol (at least 60 per cent) for 20 seconds.

People need to follow the social distancing rule and avoid the crowds as much as possible. While not wearing masks, if they cough and sneeze, they need to cover mouth and noses with elbows in line with the personal hygienic ways. ## It is necessary to focus on the improvement of the public economy rather than the economy of a group in order to develop the domestic economy: Senior General

ONLY when the amount of circulating currency is larger will the businesses develop, said Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing at a meeting with officials from associates of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry at the Mingala Hall of UMFCCI in Yangon yesterday morning.

### Discussions on task undertakings and requirements of relevant sectors

First, UMFCCI President U Aye Win reported on the establishment of the federation, formation of the federation, admission of associate organizations under the disciplines, running of the federation, policies and future plans. UMFCCI Vice President and President of Myanmar Rice Federation U Ye Min Aung and officials of associate organizations reported on the formation of organizations, the need for internationally recognized laboratories to increase export volume from respective sectors, the need to apply modern techniques for the development of agriculture sector, needs of assistance for capital, skilled labour and techniques for further development of industries, and arrangements for holding the gems emporiums on sale with foreign currency as well as kyat currency.

### Discussions of Union ministers in relevant sectors

In response to the reports, Union ministers U Win Shein, Dr Kan Zaw, U Hla Moe, Dr Charlie Than and U Aung Nang Oo discussed efforts for the economic development of the State, the State's contributions to capital and requirements for the development of MSME industries, issuance of licences as

quickly as possible, provision of techniques and capitals by relevant ministries for manufacturing sector based on agriculture and livestock sectors, efforts of ministries to develop the electric vehicles for transportation measures, and undertakings for economic development.

### Encouragement to manufacturing measures based on agriculture and livestock sectors

In his speech, the Senior General said that UMFCCI has been founded for more than 100 years, free from any reliance on others. As governments in successive eras have undertaken the development of the nation, the current government is also striving for the improvement of the country. Only when manufacturing measures are active will trade and service come into existence. To be able to do so, the government makes management, encouraging MSME

businesses for manufacturing products. Some 75 per cent of the people are residing in rural areas, primarily engaging in agriculture and livestock farms. Hence, manufacturing and trading based on agriculture and livestock measures can get greater benefits which can help the State economy improve.

MSME industries aim to encourage domestic businesses, substitute imported products and increase the export volume. Priority must be given to manufacturing measures to encourage local businesses. The democratic governments in the first and second terms emphasized the import of goods rather than the manufacturing of the products and faced a trade deficit. Prioritizing domestic production is further benefitting the State. It is necessary to focus on the improvement of the public economy rather than the economy of a group in order to develop the domestic economy. Hence, the government is

enhancing the work process of businesses beneficial for the majority of the people. As operating businesses cannot be free from the control of the government under the disciplines, UMFCCI needs to fully cooperate with the government for the development of the State economy.

The government disburses loans for capital as much as possible. Only when the amount of circulating currency is larger will the businesses develop. So, the government encourages investment measures.

If manufacturing of personal goods and foodstuffs can achieve success with the use of agriculture and livestock products it will meet domestic demand. Exceeded products will be exported to foreign countries.

### Turning out of qualified human resources

Subject-wise training schools are opened to turn out relevant qualified human resources. If

private sectors produce skilled labourers, the government will encourage them. Investment in education is enormous, actually benefiting the State. Hence, training must be given to trainees to have brilliant skills in relevant subjects.

### Encouraging manufacturing by effectively utilizing natural resources

The Senior General highlighted the manufacturing of products with the use of wood, bamboo, rubber, cotton and other raw materials to develop the production of personal goods, various products and medicines for the people. The Senior General also emphasized the operation of banking services, and the tourism sector and urged officials from associate organizations of the UMFCCI towards the development of the State economy free from politics.

## White elephant Rattha Nandaka lives healthy, happy with his mother

A 33-year-old female elephant called Zar Nan Hla kept by the Myanmar Timber Enterprise in Taungup Township of Rakhine State has given birth to one white male elephant at 6:30 am on 23 July 2022. The baby elephant was two feet and five inches in height, three feet and one inch in girth and weighed around 180 pounds at birth.

The title of the baby white elephant is "Rattha Nandaka" and he has pearl-coloured eyes, a plantain branch-shaped back, white hair, a distinctive tail, auspicious plot signs on the skin, reddish-brown or pinkish skin, and five claws on the front

legs, and big ears. Therefore, these features conform with seven out of eight characteristics.

Now, the Rattha Nandaka white elephant is five months old, three feet and one inch in height, four feet and seven inches in girth, and weighs 330 pounds. He stays healthy and happy with his mother elephant at the Yadana white elephant hall of Yadana White Elephant Shed in Nay Pyi Taw. He is the one who has been tame by people since he was young and is being trained with the "Peace Human and Elephant Interaction Training" system to become a tamer. — MNA/CT

## Myanmar's manufacturing sector attracts more than \$187 million in past eight months

A total of 41 foreign enterprises pumped US\$187.426 million into Myanmar's manufacturing sector in the past eight months (April-November) of the current financial year 2022-2023, including capital expansion by the existing enterprises, as per the statistics released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

Myanmar attracted foreign direct investments of \$1.459 billion from 58 enterprises during the April-November period. The majority of the investments were brought into the manufacturing sector. The agriculture sector drew \$3.5 million from two projects. The power sector received \$817 million from 10 projects, while one enterprise put \$29 million in the real estate sector and two other foreign enterprises made an investment of \$413.068 million in the service sector respectively. The hotels and tourism sector attracted less than 1 million. The mining sector received \$7 million from one project, while one enterprise also put investments of less than a million into the hotels and tourism sector and some capital expansion

of the existing businesses is also seen. Additionally, the livestock and fisheries sector saw a capital expansion of \$1.545 million.

The manufacturing enterprises and businesses that need a large labour force are prioritized to create job opportunities for the local community, according to Myanmar Investment Commission.

Although some labour-intensive enterprises faced financial hardship amid the COVID-19 negative impacts and the political changes, the industry is now returning to normal after the COVID-19 vaccination programme for the workers, as per the HIS Markit's September report.

In a bid to boost factory productivity with a healthy workforce in the garment industry, Mobile Medical Check to garment workers took place in Yangon and Nay Pyi Taw, supported by UNICEF Myanmar.

Moreover, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association has organized Labour Law Awareness and WCC Training since July 2022, with the support of UNICEF Myanmar. It aims to provide the soft skills needed

for industrial development and create a better workplace for garment workers.

Additionally, the association launched a voluntary labour compliance assessment-VLCA Online System on 10 November 2022.

Myanmar's manufacturing sector is largely concentrated in

garment and textiles produced on the Cutting, Making, and Packaging basis, and it contributes to the country's GDP to a certain extent.

There are active 541 factories operated under MGMA. The majority of them are from China, followed by Myanmar and the Republic of Korea.

Myanmar has drawn foreign direct investment of more than \$647.127 million from 49 enterprises in the past mini-budget period (October 2021-March 2022). Of them, 40 foreign enterprises put investments in the manufacturing sector, pumping an estimated capital of \$202.667 million. — KK

## Lower stocks push up chickpea price

THE price of chickpeas went up as the stocks in the domestic market dropped.

The prices moved in the range between K1,818,000 and K2,010,000 per tonne on 1 December and escalated to K1,850,000 and K2,085,000 per tonne depending on varieties.

The figures showed a tremendous rise of K30,000-75,000 per tonne within three weeks.

The lower stocks and strong demand hiked up the price at the end of the chickpea season.

Newly harvested chickpeas will abundantly enter the market in end-January 2022, Myanmar Pulses, Beans and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association.

The country primarily cultivates paddy, corn, cotton, sugarcane, various pulses and beans. Its second-largest production is pulses and beans, accounting for

33 per cent of agri-products and covering 20 per cent of growing acres. Among them, black beans, pigeon peas and green grams constitute 72 per cent of bean acreage. Other beans including peanuts, chickpeas, soybeans, black-eyed beans, butter beans and rice beans are also grown in the country.

Myanmar's agriculture sector is the backbone of the

country's economy and it contributes to the Gross Domestic Product greatly.

# Scientists discover primary cause of smell loss in long Covid-19

While focusing on the loss smell, the finding also sheds light on the possible underlying causes of other long Covid-19 symptoms -- including generalized fatigue, shortness of breath, and brain fog - that might be triggered by similar biological mechanisms.

**A**CCORDING to a team of scientists led by Duke Health report, the reason some people do not recover their sense of smell after Covid-19 is due to an ongoing immune assault on olfactory nerve cells and an associated decrease in the number of those cells.

The finding, publishing online 21 December in the journal Science Translational Medicine, provides an important insight into a vexing problem that has plagued millions who have not fully recovered their sense of smell after Covid-19.

### Long Covid-19 symptoms

While focusing on the loss smell, the finding also sheds light on the possible

underlying causes of other long Covid-19 symptoms -- including generalized fatigue, shortness of breath, and brain fog - that might be triggered by similar biological mechanisms.

"One of the first symptoms that has typically been associated with Covid-19 infection is loss of smell," said senior author Bradley Goldstein, MD, PhD, associate professor in Duke's Department of Head and Neck Surgery and Communication Sciences and the Department of Neurobiology.

"Fortunately, many people who have an altered sense of smell during the acute phase of viral infection will recover smell within the next one to two weeks, but some do not," Goldstein said. "We need to better under-

stand why this subset of people will go on to have persistent smell loss for months to years after being infected with SARS-CoV2."

### Olfactory epithelial samples

In the study, Goldstein and colleagues at Duke, Harvard and the University of California-San Diego analyzed olfactory epithelial samples collected from 24 biopsies, including nine patients suffering from long-term smell loss following Covid-19.

This biopsy-based approach — using sophisticated single-cell analyses in collaboration with Sandeep Datta, MD, PhD, at Harvard University — revealed widespread infiltration of T-cells engaged in an inflammatory

response in the olfactory epithelium, the tissue in the nose where smell nerve cells are located. This unique inflammation process persisted despite the absence of detectable SARS-CoV-2 levels.

### Delicate tissue

Additionally, the number of olfactory sensory neurons were diminished, possibly due to damage of the delicate tissue from the ongoing inflammation.

"The findings are striking," Goldstein said. "It's almost resembling a sort of autoimmune-like process in the nose."

Goldstein said learning what sites are damaged and what cell types are

involved is a key step toward beginning to design treatments. He said the researchers were encouraged that neurons appeared to maintain some ability to repair even after the long-term immune onslaught.

"We are hopeful that modulating the abnormal immune response or repair processes within the nose of these patients could help to at least partially restore a sense of smell," Goldstein said, noting this work is currently underway in his lab.

He said the findings from this study could also inform additional research into other long Covid-19 symptoms that might be undergoing similar inflammatory processes.

### Myanmar imports over 29,000 tonnes of fertilizer worth \$57.279 mln in Nov

MYANMAR brought in over 29,000 tonnes of fertilizer worth US\$57.279 million from foreign countries by sea and border channels in November, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The country imported over 17,000 tonnes by the sea with an estimated value of \$52.588 million, with 45,000 tonnes from China, about 2,000 from Malaysia, over 10,000 from Saudi Arabia, 9,000 from Japan, over 3,500 from Thailand, 2,600 from the Republic of Korea, over 1,000 from Oman, over 1,000 from Chinese Taipei, 850 from Germany, 550 from Indonesia, over 500 from Israel, 150 from Finland, over 80 from Viet Nam and over five from India. The majority of the seaborne fertilizer import is from China. The import volume of fertilizer was

up by 15,000 tonnes compared to that of October.

Meanwhile, the country imported over 12,000 tonnes of fertilizer worth \$4.691 million from the neighbouring countries in November, including

over 6,000 from China, over 5,000 from Thailand and about 600 from India. The border posts saw a decrease of 200 tonnes compared to that in November. —TWA/EMM

### Myanmar imports approximately 5,000 tonnes of pharmaceuticals worth over US\$53.7 mln in Nov

APPROXIMATELY 5,000 tonnes of pharmaceuticals, with an estimated value of over US\$53.711 million, were imported from foreign countries in November, according to the statistics released by the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar brought in medicines worth \$48.007 million by sea from Argentina, Australia, Bangladesh, Belgium, Brazil, China, Cyprus, Denmark, Ecuador, France, Germany, India and 32 other countries.

Between 1 and 30 November, Myanmar imported 2,000 tonnes of medicine worth \$5.704 million from China (1,200 tonnes) and Thailand (800 tonnes) through the border posts. —TWA/KK

### Trade valued at US\$166.741 mln on Myawady border in Nov



ACCORDING to the statistics of the Ministry of Commerce, the value of trade volume from the Myawady Border Trade Zone was US\$166.741 million in November of the 2022-2023 Financial Year.

Out of the total trade volume, the Myawady Border Trade Zone has earned \$40.352 million from exports and \$126.389 million from imports, indicating that 79.24

per cent of the trade target was achieved.

Compared to the same period of the previous financial year, the export value decreased by \$35.441 million and the import value by \$3.558 million. Therefore, the total trade value dropped by 38.999 million US dollars.

The downturn in exports compared to the same period is due to the decrease in exports of agricultural products, mining products, animal products, fishery products, industrial finished

goods and others.

Compared to the recent period, the export value decreased by US\$ 0.349 million and the import value exceeded US\$4.819 million.

It is reported that most of the exported items this month are various kinds of nuts, and imported items are machines and equipment, building materials, petroleum products, chemical products, fertilizers, plastic raw materials, cotton fabrics, pharmaceutical products and other materials. — TWA/CT

CHAIRMAN of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing said the Mawlamyine airport would be moved to a new location during his inspection tour of Mawlamyine airport after the opening ceremony of a new building for the Mon State High Court on 20 December.

a new place in order to extend the flights and to expand the runway since the current location is close to downtown and university areas, it is learnt.

The new location is projected to be a standard airport to handle landings for all types of flights from domestic airlines to enhance the development of Mon State and Kayin State. —TWA/MKKS

## WHO chief says many reasons for hope in 2023

ALTHOUGH 2022 has been a highly challenging year for global health, there are still many rea-

sons for hope as the new year approaches, the head of the World Health Organization (WHO) said

on Wednesday. During 2022, the third year of the COVID-19 pandemic, there

were also global outbreaks of mpox, cholera outbreaks in many countries, and an Ebola outbreak in Uganda. Drought and flooding hit the greater Horn of Africa and the Sahel, and there was flooding in Pakistan. However, WHO Director-General, Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said at a press briefing on Wednesday that the COVID-19 pandemic is waning, as is the global mpox outbreak, and there have been no new cases of Ebola in Uganda for more than three weeks.

"We are hopeful that each of these emergencies will be declared over at different points next year," he said.

The number of weekly reported COVID-19 deaths worldwide has dropped by almost 90 per cent since the peak at the end of January, he added, when the

Omicron wave was in full swing.

However, he also warned that the pandemic is not over. Gaps in surveillance, testing and sequencing still make it difficult to understand exactly how the virus is changing; and gaps in vaccination have left millions of people, especially health workers and the elderly, at high risk of severe disease and death.

The WHO chief identified five priorities for the world health authority in 2023: focusing on health promotion and disease prevention by shifting from sick care to healthcare; promoting universal health coverage, particularly primary healthcare; strengthening emergency preparedness and response; pushing forward research, science and technology; and continuing to reform the WHO.—Xinhua

## Chinese scientists develop new method to preserve female fertility

A group of Chinese scientists has developed a new method to preserve mouse follicles at a very low temperature, increasing their viability by more than 30 per cent after recovering, compared with conventional methods.

The results shed light on a promising approach for fertility preservation in women, according to the study published in the journal Nature Communications.

For prepubescent girls and women in urgent need of cancer treatment, follicle cryopreservation is almost the sole option to preserve their fertility. However, the protective agents used in the current method of follicle cryopreservation often lead to a poor effect due to their high concentration and high toxicity, said the paper.

Researchers from the University of Science and Technology

of China (USTC), in collaboration with counterparts from the First Affiliated Hospital of Anhui Medical University, developed a method of vitrification cryopreservation of mouse follicles encapsulated in hydrogel by "nanowarming", a novel cryopreservation technology.

The researchers reduced the demand for the highly toxic protective agents through the method and lowered its concentration to a quarter of the conventional way, said the paper, revealing that the viability of mouse follicles was increased by more than 30 per cent.—Xinhua

## Japan reports 206,943 new COVID-19 cases amid 8<sup>th</sup> wave of infections

JAPAN'S health ministry and local governments said that 206,943 people had been newly infected with the COVID-19 virus nationwide, according to the latest figures released Wednesday, as the country grapples with an eighth wave of infections.

This is an increase of 16,100 new cases from the same day a week earlier and marks the first time the national tally has topped the 200,000-mark since 25 Aug the

data showed. Of the total infections, Tokyo confirmed 21,186 new cases, with the figure for the capital rising week-on-week for a 16th straight day, and up by 2,374 cases the same time a week ago, the ministry said.

The figure also exceeded 20,000 new infections in Tokyo for a second consecutive day, according to the data, with the capital on Wednesday also reporting 20 COVID-19 related deaths.—Xinhua

### US ban on 'Made in Hong Kong' label breaches trade rules: WTO

THE United States is flouting international trade rules by labelling imports from Hong Kong as those from China, the World Trade Organization ruled Wednesday, an outcome that Washington rejects.

The WTO ruling addressed a decision under

former president Donald Trump's administration after Beijing imposed a sweeping security law on the financial hub in 2020 to stamp out dissent.

Trump retaliated by removing special trading privileges for the city and US customs authorities later said goods produced there could no longer be stamped "Made in Hong Kong", sparking the complaint.

Hong Kong argued that such a move ignored its status as a separate

member of the WTO, violating trade rules.

On Wednesday, a panel

set up by the WTO's dispute settlement body said that the origin marking

requirement was "not justified" under global trade rules. It added that the US "has not demonstrated that the situation at issue constitutes an emergency in international relations".

The US's labeling requirement also gives Hong Kong products "less favourable" treatment than others, the panel said, adding that goods of other countries bear their own name rather than that of another WTO member.

The outcome drew a sharp rebuke from Wash-

ington Wednesday, with US Trade Representative spokesperson Adam Hodge saying the country "strongly rejects the flawed interpretation and conclusions" of the panel report.

The US was responding to China's "highly concerning actions", threatening US national security interests, Hodge said.

He added that the US does not plan to remove the marking requirement as a result of the latest report.—AFP

### EU hails WTO 'win' in chip spat with Bogota

THE European Union welcomed a World Trade Organization (WTO) ruling Wednesday against Colombia's imposition of duties on frozen fries from three EU countries.

"This is a major win for European exporters of fries, who were frozen out of the Colombian market," the EU's trade commissioner Valdis Dombrovskis said.

The WTO had agreed for a group of experts to mediate in the dispute, which concerned anti-dumping customs fees imposed against fries from Belgium, Germany and the Netherlands.

Anti-dumping measures are permitted by the Geneva-based WTO, but only under certain conditions and are often subject to challenges.—AFP

## Facebook agrees to pay US\$725 million to settle privacy suit

FACEBOOK parent Meta has agreed to pay \$725 million to settle a long-running lawsuit that accused the social

network of allowing third parties, including Cambridge Analytica, to access users' private data. The amount was dis-

closed in a court filing late on Thursday. "The proposed settlement of \$725,000,000 is the largest recovery ever

achieved in a data privacy class action and the most Facebook has ever paid to resolve a private class action," lawyers for

the plaintiffs said in the filing. Facebook has not admitted any wrongdoing as part of the settlement,

which must still be approved by a judge in the San Francisco division in the US District Court.—AFP

## Japan Nov consumer prices rise 3.7%, highest since 1981

CORE consumer prices in Japan climbed 3.7 per cent in November, a nearly 41-year high, as increased import prices for food and energy, exacerbated by a weaker yen, maintained inflationary pressure, the government said Friday.

The nationwide core consumer price index, excluding volatile fresh food items, rose for the 15th straight month. The gain of 3.7 per cent was the largest since December 1981. Core CPI remained above the Bank of Japan's two per cent target for the eighth straight month,

data by the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications showed, having been pushed up by higher import costs and a weaker yen. The BOJ main-

tains that such cost-push inflation will not last long so its two per cent target has not been attained in a stable and sustainable manner.—Kyodo

## Shanghai's trade with Italy hits US\$14 bln

IMPORTS and exports between Shanghai and Italy saw a 3.2 per cent year-on-year increase to reach 99.31 billion yuan (about 14.25 billion US dollars) in the first 11 months this year, data from Shanghai customs showed.

This makes Italy surpass France and become

Shanghai's second-largest trading partner in the European Union (EU).

At present, Germany continues to be Shanghai's largest trading partner among other EU countries. From January to November, the foreign trade volume between Shanghai and Germany

exceeded 232 billion yuan, accounting for about one-third of the city's total imports and exports to the EU, said Shanghai customs. During the same period, Shanghai's foreign trade value with France reached 90.15 billion yuan, down 8.3 per cent year on year.—Xinhua

## Scotland passes law easing gender change rules

LAWMAKERS in Scotland passed a contentious law Thursday making it easier and faster for people to change their gender, despite a rare rebellion within the ruling Scottish National Party (SNP) and “concerns” from the UK government.

The legislation, which garnered 86 votes in favour but 39

against in Scotland’s devolved parliament in Edinburgh, drops the requirement for a gender dysphoria medical diagnosis in order for someone to alter their gender.

“The motion is therefore agreed and the Gender Recognition Reform Scotland Bill is passed,” presiding officer Alison

Johnstone said to loud applause from the public gallery.

People aged 16 and 17 will also now be allowed to change their gender, despite efforts by some Scottish lawmakers to keep the age at 18. The law reduces from two years to three months — or six months for 16-17 year-olds — the time needed for an applicant to live in their new gender before it is officially recognised.

An additional three-month reflection period is also required, during which time those who have initiated or are considering altering their gender can change their mind. Opponents of the law fear it could be a danger to women and girls, particularly around the provision of single-sex spaces. But the Scottish government insists the legislation will not impact the Equality Act, which allows for trans people to be excluded from single-sex spaces such as changing rooms and shelters.—AFP

## Philippine giant lantern festival resumes with historical ties to Japan

A century-old giant lantern festival in the Philippines has resumed after a three-year hiatus from in-person celebrations due to COVID-19 restrictions, with spectators enjoying the festivity that has historical links with Japan.

People have been flocking to San Fernando City in Pampanga, a province north of Manila also regarded as the country’s “Christmas capital”, to view the lanterns on display from 17 December to 1 January.

An in-person giant festival was last held in 2019. The resumption is a cause for celebration for many Filipinos, well known for observing one the longest Christmas seasons in the world.

The lanterns, each made to represent a village in San Fernando, measure 20 feet in diameter and contain over 8,000 light bulbs that flicker in sync with Christmas songs and pop music played in the background.—AFP

## Russia focused on ‘liberation’ of Ukraine’s Donetsk: army chief

RUSSIA’S army chief said Thursday his troops in Ukraine were “focused on completing the liberation” of Donetsk, an eastern Ukrainian region Moscow claims to have annexed.

“The situation on the front-line has stabilised and the main efforts of our troops are now focused on completing the liberation of the territory of the Donetsk People’s Republic,” Chief of General Staff Valery Gerasimov said in a briefing.

Gerasimov added that the line of combat stretches over 815 kilometres (506 miles).

Russian armed forces have “hit more than 1,300 critical targets... significantly reducing the combat potential of the Ukrainian armed forces,” Gerasimov said.

He noted that “hypersonic missiles were used for the first time in combat condition,” in-

cluding Kinzhal missiles.

“Damage continues to be inflicted on critical transport and energy infrastructure deep inside Ukrainian territory,” Gerasimov added.

After successful Ukraini-

an counter-offensives pushed Russian troops back in the northern Kharkiv and the southern Kherson regions, the epicentre of the combat has moved towards the east in Bakhmut. —AFP

## Russia jails man for three years over Ukraine remarks

A Russian court on Thursday jailed a man for three years over spreading “false information” about Russia’s offensive in Ukraine on a pirate radio station, as Moscow steps up its crackdown on critics.

The court found Vladimir Rumyantsev, a 61-year-old worker in Vologda city in northwest Russia, guilty of broadcasting “false information” that was “full of hatred” against the Russian army, the regional court said on Telegram.

New legislation came into force after the start of Moscow’s military campaign in Ukraine to penalize what the authorities deem to be damaging or false information about the Russian military.

“Between 7 and 13 April,

the defendant broadcast from his apartment in Vologda, via a specific radio frequency, false information about negative actions by members of the armed forces”, the court said.

It added that the “false” accusations included “violent robberies”, “destruction of local areas” or “rape of young women” in Ukraine.

The court said Rumyantsev also shared on Russia’s largest social network VKontakte “six videos with false information saying members of the armed forces robbed, killed and committed violence against civilians”.

Rumyantsev denied the claims and had been in pre-trial detention since July. The prosecutor had sought a jail term of six years. —AFP

## Thai PM declares candidacy in next year's general election

THAI Prime Minister Prayut Chan-O-Cha is to seek another term in a general election due to be held in the kingdom before May next year, he told local media on Friday.

Prayut came to power as army chief in a 2014 coup before cementing his position in a controversial 2019 election, but his popularity has been in the doldrums.

The newly-created United Thai Nation Party "has offered to support me in becoming the next PM candidate in the next election," he told reporters outside Government House in Bangkok.

"I will make it clear today... that I have decided that I will join the role." Prayut had been widely expected to leave his Palang Pracharath Party (PPRP), which leads the ruling coalition.

PPRP has announced its leader and acting deputy PM Prawit Wongsuwan will be the party's candidate in the election. Prayut and Prawit both served in Thailand's military and their political fortunes have been intertwined for decades. Prayut said that the ties between the two remain strong despite the separation of their political paths.—AFP

#### France, Germany to hold delayed cabinet meeting in January

THE French and German governments have rescheduled a joint cabinet meeting for next month, the French presidency announced Thursday, as the two neighbours look to put recent tensions behind them.

The meeting was meant to take place in October but was cancelled due to differences between the EU's biggest partners on energy and defence. The two governments will sit down together in Paris on 22 January, a symbolic date that will be the 60th anniversary of the Elysee Treaty which was a key part of post-war reconciliation between the neighbours.—AFP

#### Two dead, 400 homes damaged in Chilean seaside resort town fire

AT least two people died and some 400 homes have been damaged or destroyed in a fire that broke out Thursday in the Chilean seaside resort of Vina del Mar, prompting the government to declare a state of emergency.

The flames, fanned by strong gusts of wind, spread from the upper areas of town down ravines and hills in the span of just a few hours to the lowest and most inhabited sections of the city, located some 120 kilometres (75 miles) from Santiago.—AFP

## Japan protests S Korean military drills near disputed isles

JAPAN said Friday it had lodged a protest with South Korea over military drills conducted in waters near a pair of islets in the Sea of Japan, claimed by both countries. Takehiro Funakoshi, director-general of the Japanese Foreign Ministry's Asian and Oceanian Affairs Bureau, told Kim Yong Gil, a minister at the South Korean Embassy in Tokyo, that the drills, reportedly held on Thursday, were "totally unacceptable" and "extremely regrettable", according to the Japanese ministry.

The ministry quoted Funakoshi as saying the islets are an integral part of Japanese territory in light of historical facts and based on international law.

Citing an informed source, Yonhap News Agency reported earlier Friday that South Korea had conducted "regular military

## Spain Senate passes controversial criminal code reform

SPAIN'S Senate on Thursday gave final approval to a controversial criminal code reform that downgrades two charges used against Catalan separatist leaders over their involvement in the failed 2017 independence bid.

The text, which was passed with the support of 140 of the 261 senators present, abolishes the offence of sedition and replaces it with a charge carrying softer penalties, and it also reduces the penalty for misuse of public funds.

Sedition was the charge used to convict and jail nine Catalan separatists over their failed se-

cession bid, with several of them also convicted of misuse of public funds. They were handed jail terms of between nine and 13 years, but later pardoned.

Analysts have said the move is aimed at courting Catalan separatist support ahead of next year's general election.

Since taking over in June 2018, Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez has adopted a strategy of "defusing" the Catalonia conflict which threw Spain into its worst political crisis in decades, maintaining dialogue with the moderate separatists and

pardoning those involved in the independence bid.

The reform could also soften any future sentence for former Catalan leader Carles Puigdemont and several others who fled abroad during the crisis to escape prosecution.

The reforms have been fiercely criticized by the right-wing opposition Popular Party (PP), which denounced the move as "tailor-made for convicts", as well as some of Sanchez's own Socialists who have denounced him for giving into separatist demands.—AFP

## Argentine goalie Martinez gets a hero's welcome in his home town

ARGENTINA'S World Cup-winning goalkeeper Emiliano Martinez was greeted by a crowd estimated at 100,000 in his home town, Mar de Plata.

It was Argentina's third title but Martinez is the first World Cup winner from the re-

sort town south of Buenos Aires, where tennis player Guillermo Vilas was previously the most famous sports personality.

Martinez showed the crowd in front of the beach on Thursday his trophy as goalkeeper of the tournament and told them it was "not only for me but for all the kids, the little goalkeepers, who dream of going for the fourth star".

"This is a beautiful thing, that a goalkeeper gets this recognition, because this is almost always given to strikers," said Martinez, who left Argentina at 17 to join Arsenal in England and now plays for Aston Villa in the Premier League.

He has developed a reputation as a penalty shootout specialist after his success in the 2021 Copa America final against Brazil and then against France in Doha.—AFP

## France planning AI-assisted crowd control for Paris Olympics

FRENCH authorities plan to use an AI-assisted crowd control system to monitor people during the 2024 Paris Olympics, according to a draft law seen by AFP on Thursday. The system is intended to allow the security services to detect disturbances and potential problems more easily, but will not use facial

recognition technology, the bill says.

The technology could be particularly useful during the highly ambitious open-air opening ceremony with Olympians sailing down the river Seine in front of a crowd of 600,000 people.

French police and sports

authorities faced severe criticism in May after shambolic scenes during the Champions League final in Paris when football fans were caught in a crowd crush and teargassed.

The draft law, which was presented to the cabinet on Thursday, proposes other security measures including the use of full-body scanners and increases the sentences for hooliganism.

Organizers and Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin have both argued in favour of using so-called "intelligent" security camera software that scans images for suspect or dangerous behaviour. The use of such a system during the Olympics is an "experimentation", the draft law says, but could be applied for future public events which face terrorism-related or crowd control risks.—AFP
