Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

the SAC secretary, the joint secretary, council members, Vice-President (Retd) Thray Sithu Dr Sai Mauk Kham and wife, Vice-President (Retd) Thray Sithu U Nyan Tun and wife, families of the heads of state who had served State duties in successive eras, officials, NCA signatory ethnic armed organizations, NCA non-signatory EAOs, ethnic people and guests.

The State flag bearer and parade battalions led by Parade Commander Lt-Gen Aung Aung took positions at the square.

All parade troops saluted the Senior General who arrived at the dais of the square. At the same time, the artillery troop launched the 21-shot gun salute, and 750 white doves were released to mark the 75th Anniversary (Diamond Jubilee) Independence Day 2023.

The Senior General together

with the parade troops and attendees saluted the State flag and then fallen martyrs and comrades.

After taking a two-minute silence, they all recited the oaths of the 75th Anniversary (Diamond Jubilee) Independence Day 2023.

Then, aircraft from the Tatmadaw (Air) in a 75 type formation flew over the square to salute the Senior General.

The State flag bearers, Tatmadaw (Army, Navy and Air)

flag bearers, parade companies from nine battalions representing the Tatmadaw (Army, Navy and Air), military, police and student bands, ministries, Myanmar War Veterans Organization, and the State central military band led by the parade commander saluted the Senior General.

Meanwhile, varieties of military aircraft in different formations saluted the Senior General.

Basic education students from Nay Pyi Taw Council Area demonstrated letters and images on “75th Anniversary of Diamond Jubilee Independence Day” (4.1.2023), Union flag, Unity is strength, eight national races, safeguard Independence, a white dove with an olive branch, Keep Moving Forward to Achieve Our Goal, and let’s meet again.”

A total of 75 female and male parachutes demonstrated free-fall parachuting from 7,500 feet

high, bearing different flags on the ground. The Senior General took the salute of decorated floats, royal families and military troops in the royal regalia ceremonial procession.

Troops from Tatmadaw, SWAT and Myanmar Police Force together with decorated floats of Tatmadaw (Army, Navy and Air) together with BIA company, BDA company, BNA company, PBF company, BA company, Beret company, Gurkha company, 303 company and 52 Sten company, SWAT and security battalion showed off skill demonstration while marching past the Senior General.

Decorated floats and entertainment troupes from relevant regions and states, Nay Pyi Taw Council Area and ministries presented songs, dances, landmarks of regions and states, lifestyle, customs and products as well as

work processes.

The mechanized columns comprising artillery, armoured vehicles, missiles, air defence, military engineering, Tatmadaw (Navy) and Ministry of Home Affairs led by Column Commander Brig-Gen Zaw Min Thein marched past the Senior General.

Meanwhile, the aircraft of Tatmadaw (Air) in different formations saluted the Senior General. Two Su-30 fighters demonstrated High-Performance Manoeuvre, and daytime colour smoke fireworks were launched.

The Senior General and his wife together with guests cordially waved at the decorated floats, skill-demonstrated troupes and dance troupes.

Speech delivered by State Administration Council Chairman Prime Minister Senior General Thadoe Maha Thray Sithu Thadoe Thiri Thudhamma Min Aung Hlaing on Diamond Jubilee Independence Day 2023

Distinguished guests and all esteemed national brethren of the Union,

Today is truly auspicious as we celebrate the momentous occasion of the 75th Anniversary (Diamond Jubilee) of the Independence Day of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar. On this auspicious occasion, I would like to extend my warmest felicitations and greetings as well as best wishes for health, happiness, and prosperity to all the national races residing in the country in harmony and friendship.

Our motherland, Myanmar, has prospered as a dignified nation when we enjoyed solidarity and unity amongst all national races during the reigns of Kings Anawrahta, Bayintnaung, and Alaungphaya. Nonetheless, when unity was weakened, the colonialists waged three aggressive wars against Myanmar. As a result, Myanmar was enslaved, leading to the loss of its own monarchy and sovereignty. The imperialists oppressed and exploited Myanmar in political, economic and social aspects through various means. Colonizers used a divide-and-rule strategy to drive a wedge between national races by dividing hilly regions from the mainland in an effort to prolong their colonialist dominance.

However, under the able leadership of ethnic leaders, the entire national races of the Union sacrificed their life and blood for the great cause of regaining our independence. Consequently, Myanmar regained its independence and sovereignty on 4 January 1948. The cost of achieving Independence through

sacrifices of the lives, blood and sweat of the ethnic nationals was indeed high. Even after we regained our independence, the negative impacts of the divide-and-rule system lingered, sparking the emergence of numerous internal armed organizations within the nation. On the bright side, the struggle for independence has fostered a strong sense of patriotism, nationalism and unity amongst all our national races. The history of the struggle for independence has proven that we are crowned with victory when all our national races were unified.

Since our country was ruled by colonialists for almost a century, there were hardships in the history of our independence struggle. Many sacrificed everything in their quest for independence, including their lives and limbs. They are, in fact, the architects of our independence who contributed towards the perpetuation of our independence. **We observed a two-minute moment of silence to pay tribute to them on this special day.**

Independence can be lost in a flick of a moment, but it takes years to regain. Therefore, I would like to earnestly urge the entire national race to join hands in safeguarding and perpetuating sovereignty and independence.

Our country has existed as a Union since the days of the ancient monarchs. Our country has been under different political systems since independence,

Regardless of differences, it is crucial to choose a system that best suits our country. Just as democracy calls for fulfilling the wishes of the majority, it also required to heed the aspirations of the minority. People with diverse perspectives and goals could not be viewed as an adversary; they should also not be subjected to prejudice or exclusion because such beliefs are incompatible with democratic ideals. A cult of personality is opposed to democracy which not only causes a detrimental impact on union cohesion but also social division.

We need to approach this with “a global perspective”. Food, shelter, and clothing are the three fundamental requirements of all human beings. The global population was approximately 6.1 billion in 2000, 7.8 billion in 2020, and approximately eight billion in 2022 and the population is increasing annually. There will be a proportionately larger need for food, clothing, shelter and housing as the population grows. Food demand, in particular, will be extremely high. Agriculture and livestock-breeding supply the majority of the demand for these basic needs of food, clothing, and shelter. Our country is sandwiched between two of the world’s most populous nations. Myanmar, blessed with favourable weather conditions and a strategic geographical location, is a country that thrives in crop cultivation, fruit cultivation, and livestock breeding. It is critical to seize these opportunities and utilize them effectively. Food security will become increasingly important in the world where demand for these basic human needs rises.

Ours is a country with significant potential to contribute to global food security. Indeed, our country could become the **agricultural powerhouse** that we once imagined.

Rather than increasing the sown acreage of main crops, plans were underway to increase crop cultivation as mixed cropping and double cropping. If per-acre yield increases, we can expect better development for the country. Similarly, livestock farms must be planned in order to expand livestock manufacturing. If this occurs, the country will have sufficient poultry, meat and fish, as well as serve as import substitution and as primary export commodities. **Every nation and individual strives to advance their socioeconomic status. Our collective efforts are necessary to achieve this overarching goal. “Dedicated work and determination enable us to achieve any goal we set.”**

In order to build a modern, developed nation, our administration has taken pragmatic steps in the best interests of the entire people. Additionally, for the sake of the nation, I would like to urge all national races to work side-by-side in respective sectors with a view to promoting the prosperity and development of the nation.

government emphasizes the education sector to increase the percentage of school children and literacy rate across the country. The government has set a national goal for all school-aged children to have the chance to learn and finish KG+9 education. Only when they finish KG+9 education at a minimum, will they have a solid foundation for vocational education, and so, they can pursue their studies at vocational training schools.

School education as well as knowledge of life beyond schools are widely encouraged in pursuing education. It is necessary to create opportunities for all citizens to learn vocational education in their respective sectors. Hence, the government has made arrangements to create chances for all citizens to accumulate knowledge through reading as it is the simplest and cheapest way of learning. **Moreover, efforts are being made to launch literacy campaigns with the goal to reach reading campaigns. Investment plans in the education sector will be the groundwork for a future democratic nation.**

It is necessary to encourage people to enthusiastically participate in sports activities as part of a nationwide movement for ensuring the health and fitness of entire people. Plans have been laid out with implementation to turn out a new generation of youths who have talents in sports, to be able to represent from regional/national level to international level, with a view to uplifting the prestige of the State and nationals. The government has also set a goal to implement affordable healthcare services in order to meet

the healthcare standard and increase the life expectancy of the entire people. With effective measures of prevention, control and treatment of Covid-19, the outbreak of disease and death toll have been reduced and brought under control at present.

In order to develop the state economy and domestic manufacturing capacity, efforts are being made to develop

micro, small and medium-scale enterprises (MSMEs). With these measures, the production of finished goods using raw materials from domestic agriculture and livestock farms and natural resources which are major driving forces for domestic manufacturing will improve significantly as well.

While striving for development, natural resources must be utilized in a prudent and sensible manner giving due consideration to the future of the State and the next generations. As such, it is necessary to conduct environmental conservation and rehabilitation measures for past environmental degradation. In extracting natural resources, sales of manufacturing finished goods rather than selling in raw form can earn more income, create job opportunities for local people and develop technology and human resources at home.

Moreover, the best ways and means are being sought for generating electricity at full capacity and for having a sufficiency of electricity for both household and manufacturing purposes. Renewable energies such as solar power and hydropower could be conducted and atomic energy in addition to potential wind energy and hydropower will be peacefully used to implement projects in the electric power sector and others.

Strenuous efforts are also being made for the development of the nation in all aspects and undertakings of non-disintegration of the Union and improvement of culture and social sectors. In implementing a social object for deepening the Union Spirit **“to respect and promote the customs and traditions**

of all National peoples and preserve and safeguard their cultural heritage and national characteristics”, the Myanmar Traditional Cultural Performing Arts Competition at the national level was successfully organized on a grand scale. Members of the State Administration Council (SAC) organized celebrations to mark relevant State Days on a grand scale. The government has pledged to march towards a modern and developed nation. So, I would like to urge all our national races to cooperate with the government in our march towards the goal in respective sectors.

COVID-19 vaccines prior to infection reduce transmission of Omicron: Research

RECENT vaccination and boosters reduce infectiousness, but the risk of infection is still high, according to a study conducted in California prisons.

An examination by researchers at UC San Francisco that looked at transmission between people living in the same cell found that vaccination and boosting, especially when recent, helped to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in California prisons during the first Omicron wave.

Advantages of vaccination

The study indicates the advantages of vaccination and boosting in lowering the transmission, even in environments where many people are still becoming sick. Additionally, it demonstrates the cumulative effects of boosting and the additional protection that immunization offers patients who have already contracted the disease. With each extra dose, the chance of transmission decreased by 11 per cent.

"A lot of the benefits of vaccines to reduce infectiousness were from people who had re-

ceived boosters and people who had been recently vaccinated," said Nathan Lo, MD, PhD, a faculty research fellow in the Division of HIV, Infectious Diseases and Global Medicine at UCSF and the senior author of the study in Nature Medicine. "Our findings are particularly relevant to improving health for the incarcerated population." The researchers analyzed deidentified data collected by the Califor-

nia Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR). This included COVID-19 test results, vaccine status and housing locations for 1,11,687 residents, 97 per cent of whom were male, between 15 December, 2021, and 20 May, 2022.

Breakthrough infections

Breakthrough infections were common, despite the residents' relatively high vaccina-

tion rate of 81 per cent with the primary vaccine series. But the rate of serious illness was low. In just over five months, there were 22,334 confirmed SARS-CoV-2 Omicron infections, 31 hospitalizations and no COVID-19 deaths. Vaccinated residents with breakthrough infections were significantly less likely to transmit them: 28 per cent versus 36 per cent for those who were unvaccinated. But the like-

lihood of transmission grew by 6 per cent for every five weeks that passed since someone's last vaccine shot. Natural immunity from a prior infection also had a protective effect, and the risk of transmitting the virus was 23 per cent for someone with reinfection compared to 33 per cent for someone who had never been infected.

Those with hybrid immunity, from both infection and vaccination, were 40 per cent less likely to transmit the virus. Half of that protection came from the immunity that one acquires from fighting infection and the other half came from being vaccinated.

The researchers said they were gratified to see that vaccination confers additional protection even for those who had already been infected, but they were surprised by how much the infection continued to spread, despite the residents' relatively high vaccination rates.

A high amount of transmission

"Regardless of the benefits you see in vaccination and prior infection, there is still a high amount of transmission in

this study," said Sophia Tan, a researcher in Lo's lab and the study's first author. "We hope these findings can support ongoing efforts to protect this vulnerable population."

This includes making efforts to keep residents current with boosters and increasing the vaccination rate of the prison staff, only 73 per cent of whom had received the primary series at the time of the study. The general rate of boosting could also be improved significantly. At the time of the study, just 59 per cent of residents and 41 per cent of staff had received all the doses recommended by the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), based on their age and health status.

"Within the two months following vaccination, people are the least infectious, which indicates that boosters and large timed vaccination campaigns may have a role to reduce transmission in surges," Lo said. "New ideas are needed since the risk of infection in this vulnerable population remains so great."

Climate data can help model spread of Covid-19: Research

ACCORDING to a new study by a group of researchers from the Qatar Environment & Energy Research Institute (QEERI), at Hamad Bin Khalifa University, and Transvalor S.A., France, Covid-19 transmission can be more precisely modelled by including meteorological factors, with ultraviolet (UV) radiation as the main driver.

A rising number of studies indicate that the climate may have an effect on how Covid-19 spreads, however, it is unclear how much it alters risk and transmission. Studies on the effects of climate change have been patchy or poorly controlled; they have only looked at a small number of

climatic factors or have ignored socioeconomic factors, for example.

Data on reported Covid-19 cases

In the new paper, the researchers studied data on reported Covid-19 cases in 196 countries over a 14-month period, using socioeconomic, environmental, and global health factors as control variables. They developed three different analytic approaches -- statistical, machine learning and econometric -- which modelled the potential contributions of climate to confirmed case numbers. The results suggest that while disease susceptibility, lock-

down compliance, and increased testing are the most effective strategies for preventing the spread of Covid-19, UV radiation is the climate factor most strongly correlated with the spread of Covid-19, with greater UV radiation associated with reduced transmission. For other meteorological and air quality factors, including temperature, absolute humidity and solar radiation, discrepancies between results in the three analysis methods emphasized the difficulty in understanding the correlations.

For instance, the humidity was positively correlated with Covid-19 spread in the machine learning analysis and negative-

ly correlated in the econometric analysis.

The statistical analysis

The temperature was moderately negatively associated with Covid-19 in the statistical analysis but positively correlated with Covid-19 transmission in both the machine learning and econometric analyses.

The authors conclude that UV radiation emerges as the most impactful meteorological factor in Covid-19 transmission across all methods.

This could help refine transmission predictions based on seasonality or weather forecasts, and help inform future pandem-

ic response measures that limit the economic impact of complete lockdowns. They point out that this is supported by overwhelming evidence that UV light can effectively kill SARS-CoV-2 and other coronaviruses.

The authors add: "The impact of climate on Covid-19 transmission rates has been the subject of many studies, but it is still poorly understood.

In our study, we demonstrated that meteorological factors play a key role in statistical, machine learning and econometric analyses of Covid-19 risk, with ultraviolet radiation (UV) as the main driver."

CURRENT AFFAIRS

Weekly market update of dry groceries

Onion

The Bayintnaung Wholesale Market saw the entry of 150,000 visses of new onions on 3 January 2023. The prices moved in the range of K1,600 and K2,600 per viss depending on the quality, size and producing areas (Myingyan and Myittha).

The price of onions from the Myittha area hit the highest at K2,350 per viss in the Mandalay market, while those from the Pakokku area were also priced the highest at K1,950 per viss.

Garlic

The wholesale price of the Kyukok garlic variety was approximately K3,400 per viss on 3 January 2023, while the local garlic from Shan State (Aungban) fetched K3,900-5,100 per viss.

Potato

The prices of potatoes stood at K2,300 per viss of old Chinese potatoes and K1,900 per viss of new Chinese potatoes, while the prices of Shan potatoes moved in the range between K1,700 and 2,200 per viss.

Chilli pepper

The wholesale prices of chilli peppers were K12,500 per viss of Shan long chilli pepper and K12,000 for the Moehtaung variety. The prices of bell peppers were moved in the range between K11,500 and 14,200 per viss depending on the producing areas (Thazi, Sinbyukyun, Chinese varieties and Salin).

Rice

The prices of sticky rice were K75,000-K80,000 per bag on 3 January in the Yangon market.

Meanwhile, the prices of high-grade old Pawsan stood at K98,000 per bag from the Shwebo area, K70,000 from Pathein/Myaungmya area and K68,000 from the Pyapon area, while the new Pawsan varieties were K61,000-72,000 per bag depending on the production regions. The prices of other varieties were K52,000 for short mature rice (90 days), K47,000 for rice grown under the intercropping system, K42,000 for new low-grade rice and K40,500-41,000 for export broken rice (B1-2).

Palm oil

The wholesale reference price of palm oil in the Yangon Region this week was up by 110 per viss compared to the last week's price. The reference price for a week from 2 to 8 January 2023 was set at K4,470 per viss.

Consequently, the wholesale prices of palm oil increased to K5,250 per viss on 3 January 2023.

Pulses

The prices of various pulses stood at over K1,690,000 per tonne of black gram (Fair Average Quality/RC), K1,890,000 per tonne of black gram (Special Quality/RC), K1,755,000 per tonne of pigeon pea (red gram) RC, K4,225-4,350 per viss of chickpea and K2,800-2,920 per viss of green gram (Kayan Shwe Wah variety) in Yangon markets. —TWA/EMM

Six solar-powered aerators to be used to prevent water pollution in re-discharge of wastewater

ACCORDING to the Urban Environmental Conservation and Sanitation Department under the Yangon City Development Committee, arrangements are being made to prevent water pollution in disposing of wastewater by using six aerators driven by solar-powered two HP motors.

Leachate wastewater released from the landfills and the Hteinbin final disposal site in Hlinethaya (West) Township is collected in the surface aerator tank and then aerated. Aeration is the process by which air is circulated through, mixed with or dissolved in a liquid or substance.

By the aeration process, bacteria and micro-organisms in the leachate can be reduced and water pollution can be prevented

during re-discharge.

In addition, the aeration process is also being used at the Kandawgyi Lake to reduce the bacteria and micro-organisms in the lake water and algae with the solar-powered three-blade

motor equipped with a 1.1 kW DC motor. It is known that the process is being used by the Urban Environmental Conservation and Sanitation Department, Yangon City Development Committee. — TWA/CT

New Mingala Market to be completed in April 2023

THE construction of the new Mingala Market is scheduled to complete at the end of April 2023 and some completed shops are to be sold at the beginning of this year, according to the Department of Markets under the Yangon City Development Committee.

Joint contractors of the new Mingala Market are Sun Myat Tun Construction Company Co Ltd and Jasmine Palace Construction. The construction of the project started in 2019,

and the first part — up to the fifth floor — was completed in October 2022 and the second part — the rest floors — will be completed at the end of April 2023.

The new market is going to be a 17-storey building with over 5,000 shops, 21 lifts, and parking lots that can accommodate more than 700 vehicles, cinemas, restaurants, banks and supermarkets.

After the completion, owners of shops who had run the

business in the old market will be relocated to the new market.

Detailed inquiries can be made by those who are willing to purchase vacant shops, at the Department of Markets under YCDC in Yangon City Hall.

The new Mingala Market in Mingala Taungnyunt Township was formerly a high-end market that used to sell wholesale and retail consumer goods. It encountered two fire outbreaks, in May 2010 and in January 2016. — TWA/CT

CBM revokes forex licence of Mandalay Capital Company Ltd

MANDALAY Capital Company Limited got its money changer licence revoked, as per the Central Bank of Myanmar's statement released on 3 January.


Non-bank financial insti-

tutions (NBFI) have to seek a forex licence under a separate company or parent company and they are not entitled to be engaged in money changer business under the NBFIs.

When the CBM conduct-

ed an onsite inspection, the money changer business was found running under the name of Mandalay Capital Co Ltd, which is a registered NBFI.

According to the policy laid down by the CBM, Mandalay Capital Co Ltd got its licence revoked (MD-537/2022) on 3 January 2023, as per the CBM's statement. — TWA/EMM

China's Ant Group gets green light for \$1.5 bln fundraising plan

CHINESE authorities have given approval to Jack Ma's Ant Group to raise 10.5 billion yuan (\$1.5 billion) for its consumer finance arm, in a sign that Beijing may be loosening its grip on the fintech giant.

An office of the China Banking and Insurance Regulatory Commission in the southwestern city of Chongqing will let the firm raise its registered capital from eight billion yuan to 18.5 billion yuan, according to a notice issued on 30 December.

After the deal goes through, Ant — in which ecommerce titan Alibaba has a stake — will have contributed a total of 9.25 billion yuan and control half of its shares.

A unit owned by the eastern city of Hangzhou will become the sec-

ond-largest shareholder with a 10 per cent stake, the notice said.

It added that Ant is required to "complete the relevant statutory proceedings" within six months of receiving the

authorization.

Chinese authorities have cracked down on major technology firms in recent years, and in 2020 pulled Ant's planned initial public offering in Hong Kong at the last minute.

The listing would have been a world record at the time. Beijing also hit Alibaba, which Ma co-founded and formerly headed, with a record \$2.75 billion fine for alleged unfair practices.—AFP

GERMAN discount supermarket chain Aldi enjoyed record UK sales during the Christmas trading period, it announced Tuesday, as the country struggles with soaring prices.

Sales during December topped £1.4 billion (\$1.7 billion), up more than 26 per cent from a year earlier, with the company profiting also from food and

drink purchases during the football World Cup, according to a statement.

"Aldi reported its best Christmas ever... despite the rising cost of living," the group said. UK annual inflation stands at around 11 per cent, the highest level in decades, largely owing to a surge in global food and energy prices last year.—AFP

Shares in troubled Kenya Airways suspended for another year

TRADING in Kenya Airways shares has been suspended for another year, the local stock exchange said Wednesday, as the troubled national carrier battles to return to profitability.

Last month, Kenyan President William Ruto said the government was ready to sell its entire stake in the airline, which has been languishing deep in the red for

years.

Kenya Airways shares have been suspended since July 2020, in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic that devastated global air travel.

"The extension of suspension seeks to enable the company (to) complete its operational and corporate restructuring process," the Nairobi Securities Exchange said in a statement.—AFP

Stock markets rally on New Year boost but US equities falter

GLOBAL stocks mostly rallied Tuesday thanks to a New Year boost, clouded however by rising interest rates, recession worries and Russia's war on Ukraine.

While 2022 was painful for investors, there is a fear that this year could be worse, with International Monetary Fund chief Kristalina Georgieva warning a third of the global economy could slip into recession.

Yet London closed 1.4 per cent higher, as traders returned from a holiday weekend to play catch-up with Frankfurt and Paris, which logged gains on both Monday and Tuesday.

German inflation eased in December for a second straight month, preliminary data showed, as government interventions helped to bring down energy prices.

But Wall Street stocks failed to hold on to gains, closing lower. "Restrictive policy and recession fears remained front and center for investors," said Edward Moya of the OANDA trading platform.—AFP

Ex-crypto boss Bankman-Fried pleads not guilty to fraud

FTX co-founder Sam Bankman-Fried pleaded not guilty Tuesday to US criminal fraud charges over the spectacular collapse of his crypto exchange.

The 30-year-old former digital currency billionaire, who is out on bail, entered the plea in federal court in Manhattan before New York judge Lewis Kaplan.

FTX and its sister trading house Alameda Research went bankrupt in November, dissolving a virtual trading business that at one point had been valued by the market at \$32 billion.

The United States has charged Bankman-Fried with conspiracy, wire fraud, money laundering and election finance violations.

Prosecutors allege he cheated investors and misused funds that belonged to FTX and Alameda Research customers.—AFP

Putin orders screening of Ukraine assault documentaries

PRESIDENT Vladimir Putin ordered his government on Tuesday to ensure by February the screening in cinemas of documentary films dedicated to his assault on Ukraine and the fight against “neo-Nazi” ideology.

The Kremlin said in a statement that the culture ministry had until 1 February to implement the order.

Putin shocked the world by sending troops to Ukraine on 24 February last year, saying the pro-Western country needed to be “demilitarized” and “de-Nazified”.

Putin ordered the defence ministry to render assistance to Russian filmmakers who will produce documentaries dedicat-

ed to “the heroism of the participants of the special military

operation”, the Kremlin said, using the official term for the offensive.

Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu has been ordered to report to the president on those efforts by 1 March.

Since the start of Moscow’s military campaign, state television channels have ramped up propaganda lauding Russian troops fighting in Ukraine as heroes. Independent media outlets have been suspended or shut down in Russia, with many journalists leaving the country.

Criticism of the offensive in Ukraine is now punishable with jail time, while words such as “war” and “invasion” are banned.—AFP

85% Ukrainians oppose territorial concessions to Russia, poll reveals

EIGHTY-five per cent of Ukrainians oppose any territorial concessions to Russia according to a poll released by the latest poll results released by a Kyiv-based pollster, reported NHK World.

The poll was conducted by the Kyiv International Institute of Sociology conducted from 4-27 December and involving 2,005 residents in all regions of Ukraine except for areas occupied by Russia.

Respondents reiterated that Ukraine should not give up any of its territories to Russia, even if it causes the war to last longer.—ANI

Tanzanian president lifts ban on opposition political rallies

TANZANIA’S president on Tuesday lifted a ban on opposition rallies imposed in 2016 by her strongman predecessor, in an overture to political rivals seeking the restoration of democratic traditions.

“I am here to declare that

the ban on political rallies is now lifted,” President Samia Suluhu Hassan, who took power after the death of John Magufuli in 2021, told a gathering of political leaders at State House in Dar es Salaam.

“The government will be re-

sponsible for ensuring security during rallies, but I urge all politicians to also practise civilized politics,” she added.

Hassan has been under pressure to break with some of the more hardline policies of Magufuli, who came to power in 2015 as a no-nonsense man of the people but became accused of crushing dissent.

Nicknamed “the Bulldozer” for his uncompromising style, Magufuli banned political rallies early in his first term, but critics said the ruling was applied only to opposition groups.

Free speech and the press were also curbed and opposition leaders detained in a sweeping crackdown on dissent under his leadership in a country once seen as a democratic beacon in East Africa.—AFP

French prosecutors seek fraud trial for former spy chief

PROSECUTORS have urged a trial for the ex-head of France’s domestic intelligence agency in a sprawling probe into murky ties between the security services and private firms including luxury giant LVMH, a source close to the case said Tuesday.

Bernard Squarcini, until 2012 head of the DSGI spy agency, and 10 others are targeted on charges including influence peddling, fraud and complicity in breaches of professional and judicial secrecy.

The investigation into the so-called “Squarcini affair” has

been going on for over a decade, and prosecutors asked judges in December to order the trial for the suspects, who include a former appeals court judge.

Conspicuous by its absence from the list is the LVMH luxury conglomerate, the parent company of brands including fashion house Louis Vuitton and champagne producer Moët.

In late 2021, the company paid a fine of 10 million euros (\$10.5 million at current exchange rates) fine to settle claims it hired Squarcini to spy on private citizens.—AFP

US resumes full immigrant visa service in Havana

FIVE years after it was closed due to mysterious “sonic attacks” on diplomatic staff, the US consulate in Havana resumes full immigrant visa services for Cubans on Wednesday.

The reopening comes amid

a record exodus from the communist island to the United States, mainly by undocumented migrants, as Cuba suffers its worst economic crisis in 30 years. “The United States is working to ensure safe, legal,

and orderly migration of Cubans by expanding consular operations in Havana and restarting the Cuban Family Reunification Parole Program (CFRP),” the embassy said in a statement last week.—AFP

New chapter for Pope Francis after death of Benedict XVI

WITH the death of Benedict XVI, Pope Francis enters a new phase of his papacy free from the constraints of co-existing with a predecessor, but conservative criticism of his reforms may not end.

For the first time since his 2013 election, the Argentine pontiff is squarely at the helm of the Catholic Church and its 1.3 billion faithful without another man in white — former pope Benedict XVI — also at the Vatican.

From Benedict's surprise resignation a decade ago until his death Saturday at the age of 95, the German theologian's lingering presence at the Vatican had caused confusion within the Church, fuelling a "two popes" dynamic sometimes exploited by Francis's critics.

Benedict's death "ends a misunderstanding, a situation of ambiguity, in which (Joseph) Ratzinger could be used as a standard by Francis's opponents", Vatican expert Marco

Politi told AFP, using the former pope's birth name.

Although promising to carry out a post-papacy life of quiet contemplation and study following his resignation, Benedict XVI later weighed in on the explosive issues of clerical sex abuse and the possibility of married priests.

His contribution to a book in January 2020 on celibacy was viewed as a bid to boost the cause of the Church's ultra-conservative wing.—AFP

US House adjourns after failing to elect speaker in historic political stalemate

THE US House of Representatives adjourned on Tuesday evening after its members failed to elect a speaker for the lower chamber. US Congressman Kevin McCarthy, a Republican from California, failed to secure enough votes in three ballots earlier in the day after a group

of House Republicans voted against him.

There will be at least a fourth vote as House members agreed to adjourn until Wednesday noon. McCarthy is reportedly negotiating with fellow Republicans on Tuesday night.

The political drama came

nearly two months after the 2022 midterm elections, in which Republicans flipped the House and Democrats held onto their majority in the Senate.

HISTORICALLY DIVIDED CONGRESS

This was the first time in a century that the US House speaker was not elected on the first ballot.

The House will have to vote on and on until a speaker is elected with a majority of votes. A candidate needs 218 votes to become speaker if no lawmaker skips the vote or votes "present."

All House Democrats voted for Congressman Hakeem Jeffries from New York to lead the Democratic minority in the three rounds of voting on the speakership. It also followed the convening of the new and divided Congress on Tuesday noon.—Xinhua

Brazil's Lula puts US, China among his first official visits

BRAZIL'S President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva will make his first official trip to Argentina at the end of January, before visiting the United States, Portugal and China, an official said Tuesday.

Lula, as the 77-year-old leader is commonly known, will participate in the summit of the Community of Latin American and Caribbean States (Celac), which takes place on 23 and 24 January in Buenos Aires.

The leftist leader, who was sworn in as president of the South American giant for the third time on Sunday, will meet with US counterpart Joe Biden in Washington, on a still "undated" trip, according to a source in the president's office.—AFP

Germany rejects Polish demands for WWII compensation

GERMANY has formally rejected a World War II reparations claim estimated to be 1.3 trillion euros (\$1.4 trillion), the Polish foreign ministry said on Tuesday.

Since coming to power in 2015, Poland's governing Law and Justice (PiS) party has championed the issue and evoked Germany's "moral duty".

Poland in September estimated the financial cost of World War II losses to be 1.3 trillion euros and sent a formal diplomatic note to Berlin demanding compensation.—AFP

Illegal migration to Spain drops in 2022

THE number of migrants arriving illegally in Spain dropped by more than a quarter in 2022 over the previous year, mainly due to a fall in sea crossings, the interior ministry said Tuesday.

A total of 31,219 people entered Spain without permission last year, down from 41,945 in 2021 — a drop of 25.6 per cent and a second straight yearly decline, the ministry said in its annual

migration report.

The interior ministry credited "cooperation with countries of origin and transit" of migrants, and the reinforcement of the fight "against mafias that traffic people" for the fall.

Migrant arrivals by sea decreased across the country but the most significant fall occurred in Spain's Canary Islands in the Atlantic off northwest Africa.

The number of migrants who arrived by sea in the archipelago fell to 15,682 in 2022 from 22,316 in the previous year, about 30 per cent less.

The Atlantic route from West Africa to the Canary Islands had been increasingly used by migrant smugglers since the end of 2019 after safer routes to Europe in the Mediterranean were closed.—AFP


