The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Five-Point Road Map

1. Priority will be given to fully realizing peace, stability and rule of law throughout the Union to safeguard the socioeconomic life of the people.
2. People-centred development work that enhances socioeconomic well-being will be undertaken to ensure the country's prosperity and food security.
3. Processes will further continue to consolidate a genuine, disciplined multiparty democratic system and build a Union based on democracy and federalism.
4. Priority will be accorded to work aligned with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement, in order to achieve enduring peace for the entire nation.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

Kengtung Airport must be improved to admit direct landing and taking off of aircraft which stretches aviation transport to Laos, China and Thailand: Senior General

CHAIRMAN of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing inspected the situation of upgrading Kengtung Airport and construction of Kengtung Saopha Palace Replica in Kengtung of Shan State (East) yesterday afternoon.

At the airport lounge, Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Transport and Communications Admiral Tin Aung San,

Quartermaster-General Lt-Gen Kyaw Swa Lin and Director of Military Engineers Brig-Gen Zaw Naing Oo reported on the brief history of Kengtung Airport, situation to upgrade the runway and the airport and future plans.

After hearing the reports, the Senior General said Kengtung is blessed with a beautiful natural environment in addition to the Buddha Park in Pankwe Village and Loimwe

hill station as well as various tourist destinations. Currently, jets are used in aviation transport to far distant areas of the country. Hence, the Senior General pointed out that airports must be upgraded for heavy aeroplanes. The Senior General stressed that Kengtung Airport must be improved to admit direct landing and taking off of aircraft which stretches aviation transport to Laos, China and Thailand.

The Senior General inspected the upgrading of the runway at Kengtung Airport and gave necessary instructions to officials.

The Senior General inspected the progress in the construction of the Kengtung Saopha Palace Replica in its area near Nawngtung Lake and attended to the needs.

In looking into the maintenance of Nawngtung Lake, the Senior General heard reports on

water supply and drainage of the lake, pumping out of silt without harming the lake, least impact on the environment in the work process, and systematic dredging of silt through the sonic water level meter presented by the Director of Military Engineers and officials.

In response to the reports, the Senior General gave necessary guidance and inspected the work progress along the circular lake lane. —MNA/TTA

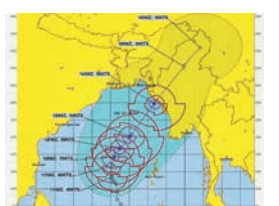

Heads of Service Organizations confirmed and appointed

1. The State Administration Council has confirmed the appointment of U Soe Tun Naing, Director-General of the Department of Rural Road Development under the Ministry of Cooperatives and Rural Development, after the one-year probationary period.
2. The State Administration Council has appointed Dr Yin Myo Thu, Deputy Director-General of the Department of Higher Education under the Ministry of Education, as Rector of Mawlamyine University on probation from the date she assumes charge of her duties.

Public Notice for Elimination of Violence

1. Declaring themselves to be “for the people”, the so-called CRPH, NUG and PDF terrorist groups are lawlessly killing Buddhist monks, civil servants including schoolteachers, and members of the general public, as well as looting and robbing.
2. Not encouraging, supporting, or assisting “CRPH”, “NUG”, and “PDF” terrorists, who are intimidating and killing people and committing destructive activities, is to protect the lives and property of the general public.
3. Giving information secretly to the authorities on terrorists and on the possession and transport of weapons/ammunition is tantamount to protecting the lives and property of innocent people.

Those from organizations with various titles including PDFs in armed struggle line invited to return to legal fold

9 May 2023

1. The State Administration Council is discharging the State responsibilities under the Constitution (2008) of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar while implementing the Five-Point Road Map and 12 Objectives to build a Union based on genuine, disciplined democracy and federalism. Meanwhile, as those wishing to politically indoctrinate the people and make attempts to cause the utter devastation of the State unlawfully formed the Committee Representing Pyidaungsu Hluttaw (CRPH), the National Unity Government (NUG) and their subordinate People's Defence Forces (PDFs) and committed armed terror acts, the government declared them as the terrorist groups under the Counter-Terrorism Law.
2. These terrorist groups persuaded innocent people to join the terror organizations with indoctrination based on frightening, sending them to the areas of ethnic armed organizations for attending the explosives courses and participate in the ethnic armed organizations to commit murders in terrorist acts and attacks. A large number of Buddhist monks, State service personnel and innocent people lost their lives in the terror attacks. These terror acts hindered the development of the nation.
3. As the strength of the nation lies within, the nation will reach its goal in a short time only when the development of the nation and construction of the Union based on genuine, disciplined democracy and federalism can be carried out with concerted efforts of the people through might and main. Hence, now is the time to make cooperative efforts to build the State by struggling free from the indoctrination of those who attempt to cause utter devastation to the country, and those involved in terrorist groups including PDF for various reasons and illegal organizations are invited to return to the legal fold for participation in the nation-building tasks. If those who returned to the legal fold committed crimes such as murder, rape and harming others, they would face trials at the court under the law and the government would ease any restrictions over them depending on their crimes under the law.
4. If they return to the legal fold, necessary assistance will go to them, and cash awards will be given to those who bring arms and ammunition as follows:-
 - (a) K5 million per gun from the rifle types
 - (b) K2 million per gun from pistol types
 - (c) K3 million per shotgun
 - (d) K7.5 million per mortar, launcher, RPG
 - (e) K500,000 per homemade shotgun, homemade mortar, homemade gun
 - (f) K300,000 per homemade mine and grenades
 - (g) K200,000 per other equipment except for arms and munitions, (e.g., walkie-talkie)
 - (h) K5 million per drone which can be used in bombing
5. As such, those wishing to return to the legal fold are invited and urged to contact district and township administration bodies, military camps and police stations.

Notice on licence applications for illegally owned arms and munitions

9 May 2023

1. It is learnt that people illegally carry arms and munitions for their concerns about personal security due to the lethal attacks of terrorists on innocent people today. Although the original intention is for personal security, one's mind can change at any time when in possession of arms and munitions. Moreover, it can cause firearm misuse for possessing illegally and it is not in conformity with the law. Therefore, the State Administration Council will manage to grant licences systematically as per the policy of carrying arms and munitions.
2. In applying for the licence to carry arms and munitions, applicants will not be asked how they get the gun, but they must apply for it together with the arms that they want to carry. Upon the applications, it will review as per the policy of carrying arms and munitions and licences will be granted to those who meet the specific requirements. Action will be taken against those who do not apply for licences together with arms and munitions during the fixed period.

168 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 11 May, total figure registers 636,810

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to **636,810** after **168** new cases were reported on 11 May 2023 according to the Ministry of Health.

Therefore, a total of **10,483,406** laboratory samples were examined and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached **636,810**. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **615,630** including **116** new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,493** on 11-5-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic.— GNLMM

DMC holds meeting on clarification of its work operation



The meeting of the Disaster Management Centre (DMC) in progress yesterday, chaired by SAC Member Deputy Prime Minister MoHA Union Minister Lt-Gen Soe Htut.

THE meeting on the clarification of the work operation by the Disaster Management Centre (DMC) was held at the centre

yesterday.

First, National Disaster Management Committee (NDMC) Vice-Chair 1 State Ad-

ministration Council Member Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Home Affairs Lt-Gen Soe Htut said that, accord-

ing to the weather forecast of Cyclone Mocha, it has already known about the regions where the storm is likely to hit closely and so it is in a certain situation to jointly conduct the measures for the period of emergency. The DMC should compile the data regarding the preparations in the townships of Rakhine and Chin states and complete evacuation processes and make the rehabilitation operations as quickly as possible with the minimum of losses.

Then, NDMC Vice-Chair 2 Union Minister Dr Thet Thet Khine reported on emergency response, distribution of 10,000 tonnes of reserve rice and cooperation work with region/state governments.

The officials of the working committee also discussed the current situation of Cyclone Mocha, its path, strength, se-

curity measures in townships of Rakhine and Chin states that the storm is likely to hit, emergency communication systems, manpower, vehicles and machines for emergency recuse work, Cyclone Shelter and evacuation of people and materials, installation of satellite phones, international cooperation, mobile water treatment transportation to Rakhine State, Rapid Response Team (RRT) for emergency healthcare services, distribution of medicines, water purification tablets, bailey bridge, relief items, shelters and other matters.

Then, the representative of the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Navy), a member of DMC, explained the situation after high tide.

Finally, NDMC Vice-Chair 1 and Vice-Chair 2 made proper instructions. — MNA/KTZH

MYANMAR sports contingent which participated in the XXXII Southeast Asian Games which is being held from 5 to 17 May returned to Yangon via chartered aircraft at 5:30 pm yesterday.

The sports team were welcomed back by Yangon Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein, Yangon Region ministers, officials from the Ministry of Sports and

Youth Affairs, presidents from the Myanmar sports federations, and the public at Yangon International Airport.

The Myanmar sports team was led by Chairman of the Myanmar Olympic Committee U Min Thein Zan, Union Minister for Sports and Youth Affairs, team leader and Director-General U Tun Myint Oo of the Sports

and Physical Education Department and 16 sports administration members.

The sports contingent includes 158 athletes and coaching staff from Vovinam Team which has won four gold, three silver, and 17 bronze medals, Chinlone Team which has secured one gold, two silver, and six bronze medals, Vovinam (Kun Bokator)

Team which has earned one gold, Petanque Team which has won one gold medals, Lethwei Team which has collected one silver, and one bronze medals, Chess Team which has picked two bronze medals, and Track and Field Team, Volleyball Men's Team, Badminton Team, Sepak Takraw Team, and Boxing Team.

THE low-pressure area over the southeastern Bay of Bengal and adjoining the south Andaman Sea persists. It is likely to intensify into a cyclonic storm and is likely to move towards

Myanmar. Therefore, the rehearsal exercises for emergency management, response, rescue, cooperation, readiness and rehabilitation processes are being conducted in respective regions and states.

The chief ministers of regions and states and commanders of respective commands inspected them and provided relief items and materials.

Moreover, officials make preparations like rescue teams prepared in advance, storing the relief items and materials, cyclone shelter construction and storage of five types of rations and drinking water.

Next, the Rakhine State chief minister visited the Sittway University and inspected the arrangements being made for the relocation of the people who live in the Thechaung IDP camp. In the evening, he met the local people vendors near Yanpyay Manpyay Pagoda in Sittway and advised them to move to a safe place.

In addition, the Rakhine State chief minister viewed the passenger vessels, trawlers and ferries as taking shelter at the risk of storms in the Myole Creek and the Satyoekya Creek. — Tin Tun (IPRD)/MKKS

Precautionary measures underway in villages of Gwa Township

UNDER the supervision of the Chairman of the Gwa Township National Disaster Management Committee, pre-evacuation activities and relief and rescue operations for villages that may be affected by storms are being carried out in a timely manner in Gwa Township, Rakhine State. Residents in Kywaychai village moved to the Dhamma

Datkhina monastery for shelter yesterday afternoon.

Village administrators and social organizations in the village helped relocate 20 households and 30 residents from the Kywaychai village in the Kywaychai village-tract to the monastery, and the Rakhine State Government has stockpiled 500 rice bags, 1,500

visses of edible oil, 500 visses of salt, and 50 visses of fish paste for the displaced people to consume. The Township National Disaster Management Committee already stored 16 items for 18,117 households, and the township social associations are also working to provide support. — Shwe Yee Win Kyaw/CT

Boiling The Water Systematically and Tasting Its Benefits

ALMOST all of us have known that “Unless the teacher shows, the work is not methodical.” Many people might think boiling the water is just a trifle. However, in practical work, a guide or a teacher is quite essential. Once, one of my intimate friends who is a senior engineer told me that he often said to his workers to do the work as he instructed because they could only be able to do the work but they did not know the theory. He had been a student at an engineering institute and so he had studied a lot of theories of engineering subjects. After he went back to his house, I thought his words were perfectly right, and in every work, a good guide or a good teacher is essential.

There are as many ideas about how to best boil water as there are about how to cure hiccups. Some people say you must use cold water, explaining that hot water sits in the pipes, daring bacteria to inoculate it; others say to use hot, arguing that only a fool wouldn't get a head start. Debates rage as to whether olive oil added to water serves any purpose (it only does if you are planning to serve the water as soup, which you may, but it makes sense to wait to add the oil until you decide).

Potatoes should be started in cold water, as should eggs. But sometimes I find myself distractedly adding them to water that's already boiling, and both turn out fine. Green and leafy vegetables should be dropped into a bubble as big as your fist at the last second. Pasta, similarly, should only be added when a pot is rollicking and stirred once or twice. Ecclesiastical writers on the subject point out that in the beginning there was water, all life proceeded from water; there was water in Eden, water when we fell, then the slate got cleaned with it. Water breaks, and out we come.

As far as I can tell, the point is that water has been at

it, oblivious to our observations, for longer than we know. I recommend heating a great deal of it, covered if you're in a rush because it will boil faster that way, or uncovered if you need time to figure out what you want to boil. As long as it's a big pot and the water in it gets hot, whichever technique you choose and however you time your addition of ingredients, the world — which began with some assessments with a lot of water at a rolling boil — will not come to an end.

Julia Child, an American cooking teacher, author, and television personality, instructs tasting water periodically as it climbs toward 212 degrees to get used to its temperature at each stage. Her advice might be overzealous, but it teaches an invaluable lesson, not about boiling, but about learning to cook: if there is anything that you can learn from what is happening, learn it. You don't need to know how the properties of water differ at 100 degrees and at 180, but by tasting it at those temperatures you may learn something about your pot, your stove, or the spoon you like best for tasting.

Once your water reaches a boil, salt it well. The best comparison I can make is too pleasant seawater. The water needs to be this salty whether it's going to have pasta cooked in it or the most tender spring peas. It must be salted until it tastes good because what you're doing isn't just boiling an ingredient but cooking one thing that tastes good in another, which requires that they both taste like something. All ingredients need salt. The noodle or tender spring pea would be narcissistic to imagine it already contained within its cell walls all the perfection it would ever need. We too seem to fear that we are failures at being tender and springy if we need to be seasoned. It's not so; it doesn't reflect badly on the pea or person that either needs help to be most itself.

When you find yourself tasting your water, you are doing the most important thing you ever can as a cook: the only way to make anything you're cooking good along the way. There are moments in cooking when common sense dictates not to taste — biting into a dirty beet or raw potato — but do taste anything else from a few minutes after you start cooking it until it's done.

Add salt by hand so that you start to get a feel for how much savouring takes, and as you do, taste the water repeatedly. This may at first feel ridiculous, and then it will start to seem so useful you'll stand by the pot feeling quite ingenious. Even though the water is boiling, you can test it with your finger. If it's well seasoned, just tapping the surface will leave enough on your skin for you to taste.

When you find yourself tasting your water, you are doing the most important thing you ever can as a cook: the only way to make anything you're cooking good along the way. There are moments in cooking when common sense dictates not to taste — biting into a dirty beet or raw potato — but do taste anything else from a few minutes after you start cooking it until it's done.

You don't need to know what it's supposed to taste like; what anything is supposed to taste like, at any point in its cooking, is good. This is as true for water as for other ingredients.

Almost all people get used to drinking normal (cold) water. Some people who own refrigerators can have colder water. Those people do not like the taste of normal water as the tastes of the two kinds of water; one is normal and the other is refrigerated; are rather different. We have to admit and accept that the taste of refrigerated water makes one good. In almost urban houses, people can afford to buy a refrigerator and put water and other foodstuffs in it. Therefore, those people have never heard that drinking hot water offers uncountable benefits to human beings. As for me, I was amazed when I first knew about it. However, when one of my friends who always drink hot

water told me about his health status after practising the habit of drinking hot water for three months, I gradually realized it. The followings are the benefits that my friend has explained to me recently.

- o Having Better Digestion
- o Relieving Achalasia
- o Breathing Better
- o Making One Calm
- o Reducing Pain
- o Hydrating
- o Helping In Losing Weight
- o Preventing Premature Ageing by Elimination of Toxins
- o Decreasing Stress Levels

Be careful of one thing! He recommends you start drinking a cup of hot water every morning in the beginning, when you start to get used to doing it and start also drinking one at night. If you don't like the taste of water, you can also drink it with tea and get all the benefits of polyphenols or coffee.

It is true that drinking hot water has benefits for your health, but you must be careful when drinking it. If the water is too hot it can lead to severe damage to the oesophagus and taste buds and scald the tongue. It is important to check the temperature before drinking.

Besides, if you live in a hot country or are going to exercise or go through intense physical effort you should not drink hot water since it makes you less thirsty although you need more water, leading to a bigger risk of dehydration.

If you are having any frequent medication talk to your doctor to be sure that drinking hot water will not interfere with the medication effects. May everyone grasp the health benefits as their own.

Severe Cyclonic Storm Condition

According to the observations at (20:30) hrs MST today, the Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” over Southeast Bay of Bengal has moved Northwards and intensified into a Severe Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA”. It is centered at about (335) Nautical miles West-Southwest of CoCo Island, (435) Nautical miles West-Southwest of Hainggyigyun, (550) Nautical miles South-Southwest of Sittwe, (465) Nautical miles West-Northwest of Nicobar Islands (India), (285) Nautical miles West of Port Blair (India) and (590) Nautical miles South-Southwest of Cox's Bazar (Bangladesh).

It is moving towards Bangladesh-Myanmar Coasts, the present stage of the Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” is coded orange stage.

Position of Severe Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA”, center pressure and wind

Severe Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” is located at Latitude (12.3) degree North and Longitude (87.9) degree East, centre pressure of Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” is (992) hPa and maximum wind speed near the center is (60-70) miles per hour at (20:30) hrs MST today.

Severe Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” is likely to move nearly Northerly during next (12) hours and intensify into a Very Severe Cyclonic Storm “MOCHA” over Central Bay of Bengal around (12.5.2023). Illegal industrial materials, consumer goods, foodstuffs, auto parts and vehicles seized

ON 9 May, an on-duty combined team conducted inspections at the Kawkareik (Tadakyoe) combined checkpoint and confiscated 50 rolls of PVC flooring sheet worth K2.25 million from a vehicle heading to Yangon from Myawady and 76 Sailun tyres worth K12,141,988 from a Nissan diesel (approximately K30 million) near No 2 Highway Junction on Myawady-Hpa-an-Yangon Road. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

In addition, an on-duty team captured 7,390 pieces of window automotive glass worth K215 million that exceeded the 61 days of Valid for Prior Arrival-VPA from a container at the Hteedan con-

tainer checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Similarly, a combined team led by officials from the Office of the Commander of the Dawei District Police Force captured 230 cartons of Thai-made palm oil worth 6.2 million without official documents from a Dyna truck (approximately K25 million) near Bogyoke Street in Dawei township. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Therefore, six arrests (estimated value of K290,591,988) were made on 9 May, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Plans underway to prevent saltwater flows, drinking water shortage in Yangon Region



THE Irrigation and Water Utilization Management Department of Yangon Region is working together with Yangon Region Development Committee to supply irrigation water, conduct flood preventive measures and distribute drinking water to Yangon. It also arranges to ensure drinking water stocks in urban cities and curb salt water flows into fields and wards in lower parts of the Yangon Region.

“Our department makes arrangements not to occur flows of seawater and drinking water shortage if the natural disaster occurs. The patrol units and essential materials

are ready at the dams and dikes to stop the salt water. The heavy machines are also getting ready to preserve the dams due to the disasters. All the dams and dikes are in good condition,” said Assistant Director U Nyan Soe of the

regional department.

The region has nine dams, 49 flood prevention and saltwater prevention dikes, 160 sluice gates, and 22 river water pumping stations developed by the government and is benefitting 1,014,776 acres of farmlands of the region. The 27 saltwater prevention dikes – 292 miles in total in Thanlyin, Kyauktan, Thongwa, Kayan, Kungyangon, Kawhmu, Twantay and Dala prevent the inflow of seawater. The department makes proper plans to ensure drinking water stocks for Yangonites and prevent the entry of saltwater into the fields and wards. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

Delay in China Customs clearance affects quality of mango

THE delay resulting from changes in China's Customs clearance system deteriorates the fruit quality and the price plummets, fruit traders engaged in the Muse trade zone stressed.

At present, China has commenced customs duty payment with a 2.0 system for fruit imports via normal trade, causing delays. Therefore, we need to closely observe whether it brings a negative influence on the quality of perishable fruits or not, Sai Khin Maung from the Khwanyo fruit Depot said.

"China's authorities are planning to go with the system exercised in border trade after they ran a system used for sea trade," Sai Khin Maung elaborated.

On 7 May, mango trucks were stuck at the checkpoint on China's side for two days, according to the Khwanyo Depot.

On 9 May, the trade channel was eased. However, it affects

mango quality as they have been loaded on the trucks for five days. Consequently, poor quality brings down the prices. The ripe Seintalone mango was priced at 60-100 yuan per 16-kilogramme

basket, while fresh ones fetched 100-130 yuan per basket.

Last early April, Seintalone touched the highest price of 120-180 yuan per basket.

The transportation and cus-

toms procedures play a pivotal role in mango exports to China, Sai Khin Maung continued.

The growers are battered by the high cost of cultivation input, harming the market repu-

tation every year. Last year, low use of cultivation input brought down quality, causing postharvest diseases such as stem end rot and black spot in fruit.

Some traders did not even cover the cultivation cost due to the inferior quality of Seintalone mango.

Of about 200 mango varieties that originated in Myanmar, Seintalone, Shwehintha, Padamyar Ngamauk, Yinkwe, and Machitsu varieties are primarily grown. The foreign market prefers Seintalone varieties.

Ayeyawady Region possesses the largest mango plantation acres, having about 46,000 acres. Bago Region is the second-largest producer with 43,000 acres and Mandalay has 29,000 acres of mango. There are over 24,000 acres in Kayin State, over 20,400 acres in Shan State and over 20,000 acres in Sagaing Region, according to the association.— NN/EM

200 companies fail to submit AR in April

A total of 200 companies failed to submit annual returns (AR) on the online registration system (MyCO) in April 2023, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

The DICA has notified any registered company which fails to file its AR on MyCO is to be struck off the register from the date of the directive, under Section 430 (F) of the Myanmar Companies Law, according to the DICA's notification.

Five hundred companies in January and 400 each in February and March did not file the AR on the MyCO. Additionally, 5,000 companies failed to submit AR in

2022, the DICA stated.

The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018 under the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

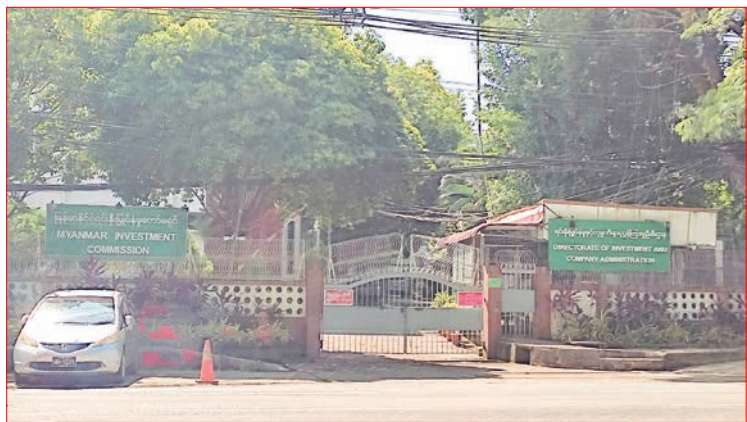
All registered companies need to submit AR on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation, and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the incorporation) under Section 97 of the law.

Under Section 266 (A) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017, public companies must submit annual returns and financial statements (G-5) simultaneously. All overseas corporations must

submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending, under Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

As per DICA's report, thousands of companies were suspended for failing to submit AR forms before the due date. Newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

The DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for the AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000. If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the register, according to the DICA notice.—NN/EM

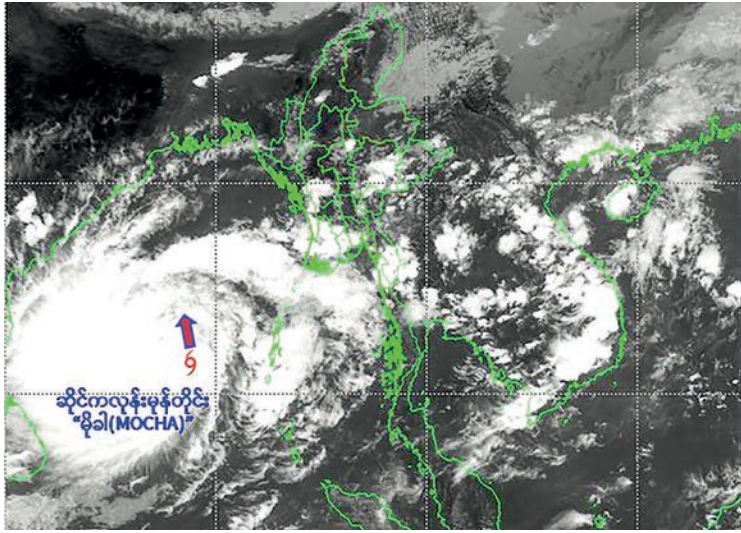

south-southwest of Sittway, 445 nautical miles west-northwest of Nicobar Islands (India), 285 nautical miles west of Port Blair (India) and 630 nautical miles south-southwest of Cox's Bazar (Bangladesh).

The Global Disaster Alert and Coordination System has issued a red alert level warning that two million people will be affected by a cyclone with a maximum wind speed of 167 kilometres (103.7 miles per hour) in Myanmar. — TWA/CT

DMH urges domestic flights, vessels along Myanmar coasts to prepare, watch weather forecast

THE Department of Meteorology and Hydrology urged domestic flights, trawlers and ships off and along Myanmar coasts to make the necessary preparations by watching the weather forecast of the department during the period of Cyclone Mocha.

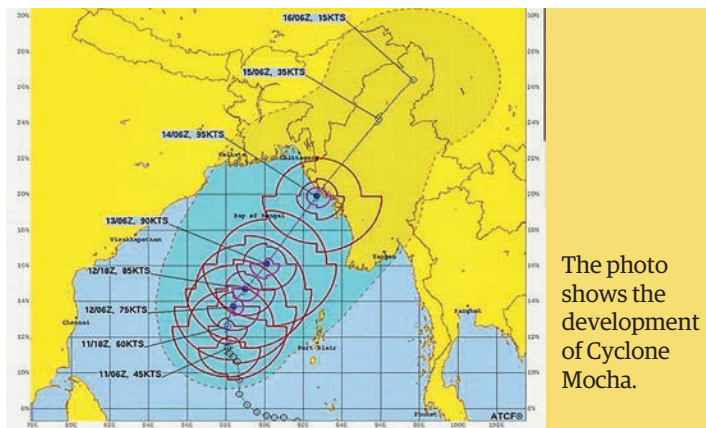
According to the observations at 6:30 am on 11 May, the deep depression over the southeast Bay of Bengal has moved north-northwestwards and intensified into Cyclone Mocha. It is likely to intensify into a very severe cyclonic storm (Cyclone Mocha) over the central Bay of Bengal around 12 May. Cyclone Mocha is forecast to cross southeast Bangladesh and the northern Rakhine coast between Cox's Bazar (Bangladesh) and Kyaukphyu (Myanmar) around 14 May, according to the department.

Weather watcher Su Su

San also posted on her Facebook page that the storm can move into Sittway of Rakhine State at 12:30 pm on 14 May and the wind speed in squall may reach 109 miles per hour (95 knots) and 132 miles per hour (115 knots) and the wave height may reach 23 feet with the reference of JTWC Cyclone Mocha at 14:42 on 2 May.

Delta region ferry operations to be temporarily suspended from 12 May

ACCORDING to the Cyclone Mocha warning issued by the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology on 11 May, services of ferries that run between Yangon and the delta region will be temporarily suspended on 11 May in the region and on 12 May in Yangon, the traders stated.

The Patheinthu ferry will make its last run from Yangon to Mawgyun on 11 May. Thus, people who wanted to deliver goods from Yangon to Mawgyun, including from the Nyaungpinlay market in Lanmadaw, were seen rushing to load their goods, a trader told the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

Dealers in the Nyaungpinlay market and Thanzay market said that there will be almost no transactions due to

the decrease in the number of purchases from shops in Yangon and the temporary suspension of shipments to the delta region until 14 May because there are no ferry services on 12 and 13 May.

Despite the temporary suspension of ferry services to the delta region, goods can still be exported by truck these days. However, the orders are decreasing due to fewer purchases and transactions from the delta region, according to some depots in the Bayintnaung market.

The neighbouring townships, including Mawgyun, Laputta, and Bogale townships, suffered the most casualties and damage to their residents as a result of the powerful Cyclone Nargis that hit on the night of 2 May 2008. — TWA/CT

2023-2024 academic year info issued for all academic staff during enrolment

THE Ministry of Education announced on 10 May that all the teaching staff avoid collecting any fees or charges during enrolment for the 2023-2024 academic year.

It is mentioned in the statement that any fees or charges are not to be collected, any money or gifts are not to be accepted, and the class badge, the school badge, or any other things are not to be sold. More-

over, teachers are to collaborate with parents for students' cooperation skills, regular attendance and daily homework. Teachers are to evaluate according to the instructions and work in cooperation with parents to ensure that there are no school dropouts and students can continue studying up to the middle school and high school levels

In addition, parents and

teachers have to work together to prevent the use of drugs, alcohol, beer, cigarettes and teach students how to live healthily and make sure that they are not addicted to playing games.

Finally, teachers are to cooperate with the relevant Public Health Department so that students who have passed the age of 12 can complete 100 per cent vaccination against the COVID-19 virus. — TWA/CT

Google to show off AI and Pixel gadget innovations

GOOGLE is expected to enrich its popular online services with more artificial intelligence on Wednesday as it scrambles to catch up with rival Microsoft despite fears that AI poses a threat to society.

Leaks ahead of the internet titan's annual developers conference have revealed that Google will also show off new

gadgets, including a foldable smartphone, and reveal additions to its Pixel line of devices.

Most attention will focus on Google's expected release of a more muscular version of its Bard generative AI being put to work across the platform.

Microsoft upped the pressure last week by expanding public access to its generative AI pro-

grammes — including the Bing chatbot — that have put the company founded by Bill Gates back on the map as a big tech disruptor.

The services have been enhanced with the ability to work with images as well as text, and Microsoft intends to add video to the mix, according to executives.

Google is expected to follow suit in AI announcements at its annual "I/O" software developers conference held a short walk from its headquarters in the Silicon Valley city of Mountain View.

A more powerful large language model built into the heart of Bard will likely be unveiled, along with expanded use of the AI powers in Gmail, work software, search and more, according to media reports.—AFP

China's NEV sales surge 85.6% in April

RETAIL sales of new energy vehicles (NEVs) in China jumped 85.6 per cent year on year in April, data from the China Passenger Car Association (CPCA) showed Tuesday.

A total of 527,000 NEVs were sold in China last month, down 3.6 per cent from March, according to the CPCA.

NEV sales of major domestic brands accounted for 70.5 per cent of the total NEV sales in the country, the data revealed.

China exported 91,000 new energy passenger vehicles last month, jump-

ing 1,028.5 per cent year on year and up 29.4 per cent from March. In the first four months of the year, retail sales of NEVs in China rose 36 per cent year on year to top 1.84 million units, the CPCA said.—Xinhua

Japan okays GPS tracking for bail after Ghosn case

JAPAN on Wednesday enacted a law authorizing courts to use GPS for tracking defendants on bail, a measure pushed

for after the dramatic 2019 escape of former Nissan boss Carlos Ghosn.

The revised criminal proceedings law approved

Wednesday will enable courts to order the placement of GPS devices on defendants to prevent them from fleeing Japan.—AFP

Greenpeace sues Italian energy giant ENI

GREENPEACE Italy is suing Italian energy giant ENI for its contribution to global warming, it said Tuesday, in the latest in a raft of climate lawsuits around the world.

The environmental organization and fellow green campaigner ReCommon filed the suit along with 12 citizens from

areas of Italy severely affected by extreme weather events, Greenpeace said in a statement.

The suit was "for past and potential future damages resulting from its contribution to climate change, of which ENI was well aware but chose to ignore for decades", it said.—AFP

Russia lifts visa regime, flight ban with Georgia

PRESIDENT Vladimir Putin has lifted a flight ban and visa regime with Georgia, against which Russia fought a brief war in 2008, the Kremlin said on Wednesday.

According to a decree released on Wednesday, Putin has introduced a 90-day visa-free regime for Georgian citizens from 15 May.

Another decree resumed air travel between Russia and Georgia. In response to anti-Moscow rallies in Georgia, Russia had in 2019 banned air

travel with Georgia.

The two nations share a complicated history, and Mikheil Saakashvili, Georgia's former president who is now in jail, is seen as one of Moscow's top enemies.

In 2008, after years of tensions over Saakashvili's efforts to forge closer ties with the West, Moscow fought a brief but bloody war with Georgia.

However, the current Georgian authorities have, in recent years, been accused by the opposition of forming close

ties with the Kremlin.

Georgia's ruling party insists it is committed to Georgia's EU and NATO membership bid, enshrined in the constitution and supported — according to opinion polls — by 80 per cent of the population.

Georgia's pro-EU president immediately slammed Moscow's decision.

"Another Russian provocation!" the country's figurehead president, Salome Zourabichvili, said on Twitter. — AFP

Pakistan calls out army to quell riots over ex-PM Khan's arrest

PAKISTAN'S political turmoil intensified late Wednesday with violent nationwide protests swelling and the government deploying the military as former prime minister Imran Khan was remanded in custody for eight days on fresh corruption charges following his dramatic detention.

Khan was arrested Tues-

day during a routine hearing in the capital Islamabad and whisked away to an unknown location overnight before appearing behind closed doors in a specially convened anti-graft court at police headquarters.

The upheaval, including mass arrests of protesters, follows months of political crisis during which Khan, who

was ousted in April last year, has waged an unprecedented campaign against the country's powerful military.

"If they think that the arrest of Imran Khan will demoralize us, then they are hugely mistaken," said supporter Niaz Ali in Peshawar, where several monuments and government buildings have been torched.

"We stand with Imran Khan and will support him till death."

The cabinet Wednesday approved deployment of the army in two provinces and the capital to restore peace, a statement from Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's office said.

In Pakistan's largest city Karachi, security forces fired tear gas to disperse supporters of Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, while PTI backers clashed violently with police in Islamabad and other cities. — AFP

G7 finance ministers discuss crises from Ukraine to banking

SUPPORT for war-torn Ukraine will top the agenda as G7 finance talks start Thursday, but ministers and central bankers will also weigh concerns ranging from banking uncertainty to US debt default fears.

The three-day meeting of the Group of Seven developed nations comes with the global economy still unsteady after years of pandemic woes compounded by Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

So the talks in the coastal city of Niigata in central Japan are a chance to set out a vision for financial stability before G7 leaders get together next weekend in Hiroshima. — AFP

Mauritanians vote in key test ahead of presidential contest

VOTERS in the conservative West African state of Mauritania head to the polls on Saturday for legislative and local elections that will serve as a key test ahead of presidential elections next year.

Twenty-five parties are vying for the backing of some 1.8 million voters in the first election since President Mohamed Ould Ghazouani in 2019 took over the vast, arid West African country, known as one of the few poles of stability in the troubled Sahel.

Mauritanians are due to elect 176 members of parliament, as well as 15 regional councils and 238 municipal councils.

A second round is scheduled for 27 May for half of the 176 seats in the National Assembly. — AFP

Russia seizes tugboats from Danish shipper Maersk unit

RUSSIA has seized four tugboats belonging to a subsidiary of Danish shipping giant Maersk in Russia's far east, according to the group, which ceased operations in the country after Moscow's invasion of Ukraine.

"On 25 April we were informed a local court has or-

dered the tugboats cannot leave Russia and also transferred custody of the tugboats to a third party," Maersk said in a statement on Wednesday.

The four vessels, owned by Maersk unit Svitzer, were operating on a long-term contract for the Sakhalin-2 oil and gas project in Russia's far east.

Maersk tried unsuccessfully to divest the operation for a year before abandoning its efforts in mid-April and suspending its services.

But port authorities ordered the local crews and tugboats to continue to operate, before seizing the vessels, Maersk said. — AFP

UK scraps deadline to ditch EU laws

THE UK government on Wednesday scrapped an end-of-year deadline to ditch remaining European Union-era laws from the statute book — angering Brexiteer Conservatives.

London had promised a post-Brexit “bonfire” of Brussels legislation when it left the bloc, after a 2016 referendum on whether to remain a member.

“Take back control” of British sovereignty was a campaigning slogan for Brexiteers, and right-wing Conservatives viewed the U-turn with dismay.

“Regrettably the prime minister (Rishi Sunak) has shredded his own promise rather than EU laws,” tweeted senior Tory MP Jacob Rees-Mogg, a leading ally of Sunak’s predecessor Boris Johnson.

Business Secretary Kemi Badenoch said the government had already “revoked or reformed” more than 1,000 EU laws since the UK’s EU departure took full effect in 2020.

But she said in a written statement to parliament that government departments had

identified a “growing volume” of retained EU law still in force.

Rather than meeting its pledge to scrap 4,000 items of EU legislation, the government will only revoke around 600 laws, Badenoch said, insisting the plan is “about more than a race to a deadline”.

There are “risks of legal uncertainty” by proceeding with wholesale change so soon, she said, after UK business groups had expressed alarm at more Brexit-related upheaval. —AFP

Australian minister heads to China seeking ‘unimpeded’ trade

AUSTRALIA’S trade minister flew to Beijing on Thursday on a mission to demolish Chinese import barriers after years of

punishing sanctions and unofficial bans.

Trade Minister Don Farrell said he aimed to secure unre-

stricted commerce with China, Australia’s largest trade partner with a healthy appetite for iron ore and coal resources.

“During my visit, I will be advocating strongly for the full resumption of unimpeded Australian exports to China — for all sectors,” he said in a statement on the eve of Friday’s meeting.

Farrell, who is to meet with China’s commerce minister, Wang Wentao, said fully reopening trade would benefit both countries.

The meeting represents a “significant breakthrough” in rebuilding the relationship, said Australia China Business Council president David Olsson, who is with the delegation. —AFP

Chile’s far right re-emerges after presidential defeat

CHILE’S far right may have received a bloody nose in a deeply divisive presidential race in 2021, but elections Sunday for a body that will rewrite the country’s dictatorship-era constitution have shown it to be an enduring force.

Led by conservative lawyer Jose Antonio Kast, an apologist for deceased military dictator Augusto Pinochet, Chile’s Republican Party took 23 of 51 seats on the council that will design a new framework for the country’s future.

The outcome of Sunday’s vote does not alter the balance of power in the Chilean parliament, where the far right is a minority.

But it does give the Re-

publican Party Kast founded in 2019 overwhelming sway in drafting the document that will shape Chile’s new identity.

“The most likely is that something very similar to the 1980 (constitution) will come” from the drafting process, said Claudia Heiss of the University of Chile.

This would, in effect, maintain the status quo in the South American country which had appeared to be on a leftward trajectory ever since anti-government protests broke out in 2019 against deep social inequality. The protests led to a referendum in 2020 in which 80 per cent voted for replacing the Pinochet-era constitution. —AFP

Viet Nam to demand social media users verify identities

VIET NAM plans to ask all social media users on platforms such as Facebook, YouTube and TikTok to verify their identities, citing the need to combat online scams.

The Southeast Asian nation has one of the highest online fraud rates in Asia, with financial, identity and romantic scams particularly common, according to the Global Anti Scam Alliance.

“Unidentified social network accounts will be dealt with,” said Nguyen Thanh Lam, deputy minister of information and communications, without elaborating.

A new government decree on online information scheduled to be issued later this year will make the measure mandatory, Lam said, according to a report published Monday on the ministry’s website.

Lam added that there were times authorities could not track down social media users who violated the law because they used cross-border platforms. —AFP



The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Twelve Objectives

3. Social affairs

- (a) To ensure a strong and dynamic Union spirit, the genuine spirit of patriotism.
- (b) To respect and promote the customs and traditions of all National people and preserve and safeguard their faiths, beliefs, culture, and characteristics of patriotic nationalism.
- (c) To strengthen basic health care in order to achieve the emergence of a health system that enhances the longevity and health of the entire nation.
- (d) To comprehensively promote the education sector to make it capable of producing the human resources necessary for building a modern, developed, and progressive democratic nation.
