## The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Five-Point Road Map

1. Priority will be given to fully realizing peace, stability and rule of law throughout the Union to safeguard the socioeconomic life of the people.
2. People-centred development work that enhances socioeconomic well-being will be undertaken to ensure the country's prosperity and food security.
3. Processes will further continue to consolidate a genuine, disciplined multiparty democratic system and build a Union based on democracy and federalism.
4. Priority will be accorded to work aligned with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement, in order to achieve enduring peace for the entire nation.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

the Senior General said that multiple education enhances personal skills, critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity, evaluation, analytical skills, collaboration, adaptability, social skills, emotional intelligence, justice, ethical behaviour and leadership for all.

## Duty assignment for rehabilitation processes

primary school. The number of students from 12 years old starts to decline and the remarkable decline in student numbers could be seen at the end of middle school education.

Most of the students who dropped out of the learning showed their reasons based on poverty. Hence, the education conference should seek the best solution for increasing the number of students and the high rate of passing the school examination.

Political stability, maturity and economic development are directly proportionated to the number of educated persons. Hence, it is necessary to focus on increasing the number of educated persons for the development of the nation.

From the 2023-24 academic year, 50 districts will launch 51 technical, agriculture and livestock high schools where the students who have passed the KG+9 education can attend. It needs to open 75 similar schools in further districts in the 2024-25 academic year. Upon completion of opening these schools, each school will have 18,500 students at the basic education school level per year.

These schools have to teach vocational courses to the students for fulfilling the requirements of the State and private businesspersons. Hence, the government and private sector are to cooperate with each other through public-private partnership in teaching students to have training for practical work.

On the other hand, universities have to revise current subjects and extend new subjects based on market demands so as to modernize the curricula in conformity with the requirements of the State economy.

The government allotted K3,146.149 billion for the ministries related to the education sector including the Ministry of Education in the 2023-24 financial year. The budget for education is equal to 9.48 per cent of the Union budget and 2.18 per cent of GDP.

In order to improve teaching and learning measures with an equal ratio of teachers to students, the Ministry of Education appointed 13,903 teachers at different levels in basic education and 5,899 tutors and demonstrator at universities and 333 at ed-

ucation degree colleges.

As the government increases the education budget year by year in order to enhance the education sector, education staff are to strive for serving the assigned duty with utmost effort. Moreover, the BEd (correspondence)

course is conducted at 25 education degree colleges in two batches a year.

Schools, quality of curricula, qualification of teachers in relevant subjects, academic skills and attitudes of teachers on their professions are important for shaping the future of new generations.

Union Minister for Education Dr Nyunt Pe presented a commemorative gift to the Senior General.

After the ceremony, the Senior General, the Vice-Senior General and guests had documentary photos taken together with attendees and visited the booths of 11 ministries related to the education sector.

The Senior General and party attended the dinner to mark the opening ceremony of the conference. The Myanmar National Education Conference 2023 jointly organized by all ministries will last from 18 to 20 May. — MNA/TTA

# Cyclone shelters must be built in towns and villages along the beach and both banks of rivers in Rakhine State: Vice-Senior General

VICE-CHAIRMAN of the State Administration Council Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win who is also in the capacity of Chairman of the National Disaster Management Committee, accompanied by his wife Daw Than Than Nwe and officials, yesterday afternoon arrived at Sittway Airport.

The Vice-Senior General inspected reconstruction and rehabilitation tasks in cyclone-hit Sittway by car.

At the office of the Rakhine State government, the Vice-Senior General gave instructions at the meeting on relief and rehabilitation for losses and damage caused by cyclonic storm Mocha in Rakhine State.

The Vice-Senior General recounted that the Prime Minister has given guidance that if international organizations offer to provide assistance, local authorities can take CI sheets and nails for buildings, medicines and cyclone shelters. All need to cooperate in the soonest supply of electricity and clearing of debris in towns.

Data and accounts must be compiled soonest for systematically conducting the rehabilitation. In conclusion, the Vice-Senior General stressed the need for supplies of basic foodstuffs to each family, supplies of clean drinking water, proper communication measures and construction of more cyclone shelters in necessary regions. Cyclone shelters must be built in towns and villages along the beach and both banks of rivers in Rakhine State. The Vice-Senior General spoke of the need to carry out rehabilitation in the aftermath of the storm to have a better process and people were urged to participate in the rehabilitation of their towns and villages together with service personnel. — MNA/TTA

Rakhine State Chief Minister U Htein Lin reported on stockpiling of relief supplies, efforts for communications in the aftermath of the storm, management for reconstruction and rehabilitation, arrivals of relief items and medicines by water and air, distribution of relief supplies, reconstruction of the storm hit houses, installation of power cable and formation of special health task forces.

Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Transport and Communications Admiral Tin Aung San explained progress in relief, reconstruction and rehabilitation in Rakhine State in accord with the guidance of the Prime Minister, priority for the opening of schools and universities, repairing of damaged parts at hospitals, arrivals of relief supplies by naval ships, distribution of rice, oil, rations and medicines to storm-affected areas, repairing of towers for reconnection of communication stations, and supply of drinking water.

Union Ministers Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung and U Ko Ko Hlaing reported on efforts for shaping the towns to normalcy, offers of neighbouring countries and the international community to provide relief aid and medicines to the storm victims, foreign companies in Rakhine State to provide technical assistance and repatriation and resettlement in the aftermath of the storm.

Union ministers U Thaug Han, Daw Thet Thet Khaing, U Myo Thant and Dr Thet Khaing Win presented the supply of electricity as quickly as possible, distribution of reserve rice and construction materials to necessary areas, repairs for roads, bridges and buildings

in Rakhine State, priority for repairing hospitals, schools and religious buildings, regular healthcare services at the general hospitals, sending emergency health special task forces to necessary areas, and offers of neighbouring countries and international organizations to donate medicines.

In his speech, the Vice-Senior General stressed the need to prioritize repairing high schools and universities to be opened on 1 June. Data on the loss and death of animals must be sent to the National Disaster Management

Committee via the state management committee.

The Vice-Senior General recounted that the Prime Minister has given guidance that if international organizations offer to provide assistance, local authorities can take CI sheets and nails for buildings, medicines and cyclone shelters. All need to cooperate in the soonest supply of electricity and clearing of debris in towns.

# DPM MoTC Union Minister inspects transport of relief supplies to respective areas at Sittway Port

STATE Administration Council Member Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Transport and Communications Admiral Tin Aung San inspected the navy ship Mottama to transport relief supplies to the respective regions as quickly as at Sittway Port yesterday.

The Mottama vessel carried 930 tonnes of supplies including rice, palm oil, foodstuffs, drinking water, family kits, telecom towers, two 500 kVA generators, two water purification trucks, tarpaulin, CI sheets, construction materials, 20 chainsaws, two mobile communication vehicles and fuel oil and it will deliver to the respective areas. The vessel

damaged roads and Sittway Point beach ring road and instructed officials to repair the damage as quickly as possible.

At noon, the Deputy Prime Minister and party met the state-level departmental officials of the Rakhine State natural disaster management committee and attended the meeting on clarification on destructions after the cyclone and rehabilitation processes.

Speaking at the meeting, the Deputy Prime Minister talked about the arrival of his team in Rakhine State on 15 May and inspection tours to storm-affected areas and plans to transport the foodstuffs, medicines, medical supplies, shelters and rehabilitation items to the respective regions, to repair the hospitals, schools and monasteries as per the directives of the Prime Minister.

He then urged the local staff and residents to participate in these processes to complete them successfully.

Union Minister for Border Affairs Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung and Rakhine State Chief Minister U Htein Lin reported on the measures to repair damaged roads and communication systems as priorities in storm-hit areas including Sittway and cooperation work with departmental staff and residents in transporting supplies and rehabilitation processes.

The Deputy Prime Minister provided proper instructions and concluded the meeting. — Tin Tun (IPRD)/KTZH

also carried 104 electricians and over 400 staff of the Ministry of Electric Power to Rakhine State.

The Deputy Prime Minister and party then went to U Otta-

ma Park in Sittway Township to inspect the cleaning processes of fallen trees conducted by Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force.

They also headed to the speed boat jetty and encouraged 116 members of Fire Brigade from Ayeyawady Region who will carry out relief work and reha-

bilitation processes in Pauktaw Township and one company of Bago Region Fire Brigade which will do cleaning work in Rathedaung Township.

They also inspected the cleaning up in the compound of Lawkananda Pagoda and the transport of relief items in Tatmadaw aircraft at Sittway Airport.

The flight services resumed yesterday for locals as usual.

They then viewed round the city and comforted the people who removed the fallen trees, cleaning up and repairing works on lamp-posts and power cables.

On arrival at the 500-bed Sittway General Hospital, they checked the repair work at the hospital building and access to clean water.

They also went to Sittway strand road and inspected the

## General health warnings for cyclone-affected areas

AFTER the cyclone, it can cause floods, lightning, landslides, injuries, electrocution, snake bites, cold, pneumonia, mosquito-borne diseases like dengue and malaria, diarrhoea, food poisoning and other health-related problems caused by contaminated water and food. Therefore, people should strictly act according to the following facts: —

1. Follow the notices released by regional administrative bodies in a timely manner without fail.
2. During a flood, there is a risk of drowning and injury after slipping into the ditches and potholes. Therefore, take care of the steps and warn the children.
3. Be aware of the danger of electrocution. Avoid going near the electric wires on the ground or in the water and remind the children.
4. Watch out for snakes.
5. Never enter seriously destroyed buildings.
6. Dirty water and food can cause communicable diseases including diarrhoea and so, drink the FDA-recognized drinking water or boiled water or water systematically disinfected with water purification tablets or chlorine. Don't drink river water, creek water and contaminated water.
7. To prevent food poisoning, don't eat floating food, cans, expired foodstuffs,

8. decayed food, food with mould, overripe fruits and dirty food.
8. Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds using soap before touching and eating the food and after using the bathroom.
9. Take care of personal hygiene, and use toilets.
10. Don't poop near drinking water tanks, wells and lakes.
11. Throw the garbage systematically, bury them, burn them and sprinkle quicklime powder on them.
12. Stay under the shelters to prevent from getting cold, and wear the proper clothes that go well with the weather – for instance, wear warm clothes and take special care of the children.
13. Participate in COVID-19 vaccination processes and healthcare services like regular vaccination programmes.
14. Be aware of the risk of mosquito bites. Use mosquito net, and participate in the fight against Aedes mosquitoes, mosquito larvae and mosquitoes.
15. If you sustain injuries or suffer from certain health problems, go to the nearest health department or clinic.

UNION Minister for Electric Power U Thaung Han inspected repair work for the speedy

distribution of electricity that has been damaged by Cyclone Mocha in Sittway Township yesterday.

A total of 104 electricians of Yangon Electricity Supply Cor-

poration arrived at Sittway by naval ship Mottama yesterday morning.

The Union minister met with 164 electricians from Magway, Bago (East/ West) and Ayeyawady Regions and instructed for speedy implementation of the work and worksite safety.

Then, the Union minister inspected the repair and maintenance of power distribution lines along Mayyu road of Sittway and went to Dhammacariya Tekkatho Monastery to check the accommodation where the staff of YESC will stay.

He also inspected the staff housing and warehouse of the township electric engineering office and 66/11kV sub-power station and comforted the staff and their families, and maintenance works at Satyoekya bridge and Sittway View Point.

At noon, the Union minister and party inspected maintenance at 66kV power line No 1 and along Mayyu road from the government guesthouse and Lawkananda pagoda and from the airport junction to the airport.

The Ministry of Electric Power assigned a total of 1,020 electricians in Sittway, MraukU and Ponnagyun townships to ensure the speedy supply of power and repair work in northern Rakhine State. It also sent 209 electricians from Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay Region, Shan, Mon and Kayin states to electrify the northern Rakhine State by the end of May. Moreover, the Tatmadaw vessels, ships and boats carry the needed materials for the maintenance works to complete in time. — MNA/KTZH

UNION Minister for Immigration and Population U Myint Kyaing received United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Resident Representative to Myanmar Ms Noriko Takagi in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

The meeting was attended by the Union minister, Deputy Minister U Htay Hlaing and officials. The ministry and UNHCR have been working together for the re-acceptance of displaced

persons from Rakhine State for many years. Currently, the ministry and UNDP-UNHCR signed a tripartite Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), and the MoU needs to be extended in order to continue cooperation. Due to broadcasts and statements by some foreign organizations and some foreign media without knowing the actual situation on the ground, there were hindrances and delays. The Govern-

ment has been making consistent efforts for the success of the repatriation of people who left their homes in Rakhine State. In addition to the resettlement of displaced persons, UNHCR will also provide assistance to areas affected by the recent cyclone.

The ministry and UNHCR cordially and frankly discussed and exchanged views regarding the possibility of finding solutions. — MNA/TS

No matter what large volume the world produces, if there is some waste of foods, the whole world will face varieties of losses. Although millions of global people are under starvation, the waste volume of food is growing. In fact, everybody understands the important role of food in their daily routine but they cannot prevent the daily occurrence of millions of tonnes of waste. In Myanmar, yearly waste of foods weighs 4.6 million tonnes.

Indeed, preventive measures against the waste of food are based on personal attitude and social ethics. They have to minimize the waste of food in daily consumption. Only when every family and every society can reduce the waste of food will the whole country stop the unacceptable waste and loss of food as well as unnecessary spending of the State fund. So, let's stop the waste of food!

As such, everybody needs to pay attention to their efforts in agricultural and livestock breeding farming works which play a key role in the supply of food to the people in daily consumption. If everybody knows the difficulties and investment of efforts of farmers in chains of food production, they have to avoid unacceptable waste of food in all arenas.

It is because food is the most basic need among food, clothing and shelter along the life of humans. These foods consist of essential nutritious elements for humans such as protein, vitamins, carbon hydrate, fatty acids and minerals. As such, every kind of food is valuable.

The United Nations Environmental Program-UNEP released a global waste of food report in 2021, saying that the whole world disposed of more than 1 billion tonnes of waste food, which comprises 13 per cent of waste foods from retailers, 26 per cent from food

**A**natural disaster can break out any time anywhere. An event which occurs abruptly from a natural process in the world inhabited by human beings is called a natural disaster. Earthquakes, storms, torrential rains, floods, landslides, volcanic eruptions, tsunami tidal waves, drought, peculiar diseases, heatwaves and cold waves are natural disasters.

The Southeast Asia region which is included in Asia Continent has a southwest monsoon and the northeast monsoon, because of which there is enough rainfall, thereby contributing to agriculture. Myanmar faces the Bay of Bengal and the Andaman Sea has enough southwest monsoon. With the rise in temperature in the dry summer, there are also rises in the temperature of the seawater in the Bay of Bengal. As a consequence, the atmosphere has become unstable with low-pressure areas, small storms and cyclones occurring, and they would enter the inner land only to weaken and cease. The Bay of Bengal is a place where the cyclones start. And monsoon ushers in along with the cyclones. The cyclones that commence from the Bay of Bengal will move west and northwestward in the beginning and then move north and northeastward. And sometimes, cyclones will encroach on Myanmar.

As the Rakhine Mountain Range is serving as a natural barrier, cyclones coming from the Bay of Bengal and the Andaman Sea can rarely enter Myanmar. But if they happen to enter Myanmar from the Delta Area or

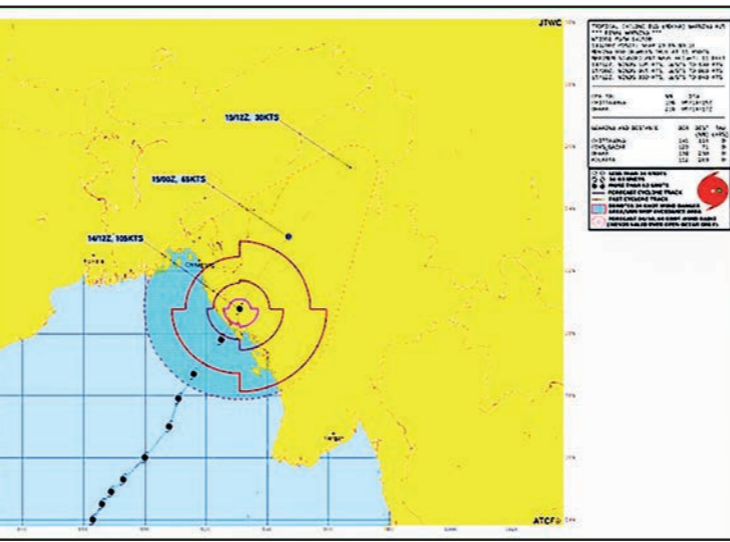
the low land area in the Rakhine coastal area, Myanmar can suffer from dramatic damage.

I come from Sittway, which is, therefore, my native town. Sittway is the main vein of Rakhine State. Additionally, this is a city where the culture of Rakhine has flourished since the foundation of Myanmar Proper. On the East, there flows the Kaladan River (Kissapanadi). On the South, there lies the Bay of Bengal whereas on the West, there flows the Mayyu River. And on the West, there are creeks that join the two river mouths. This is the one and only town in Rakhine State that has wide beaches with no mountains and hills.

Geographically, our town is vulnerable to torrential rains, storms and tidal waves. We have witnessed cyclones, namely Komen, Malar, Giri and Nargis and the one called Nargis hit us the worst in 2008. Cyclone Nargis was the most severe, causing the death of more than 130,000 people with the value of the damage amounting to over US\$12.9 billion in toto.

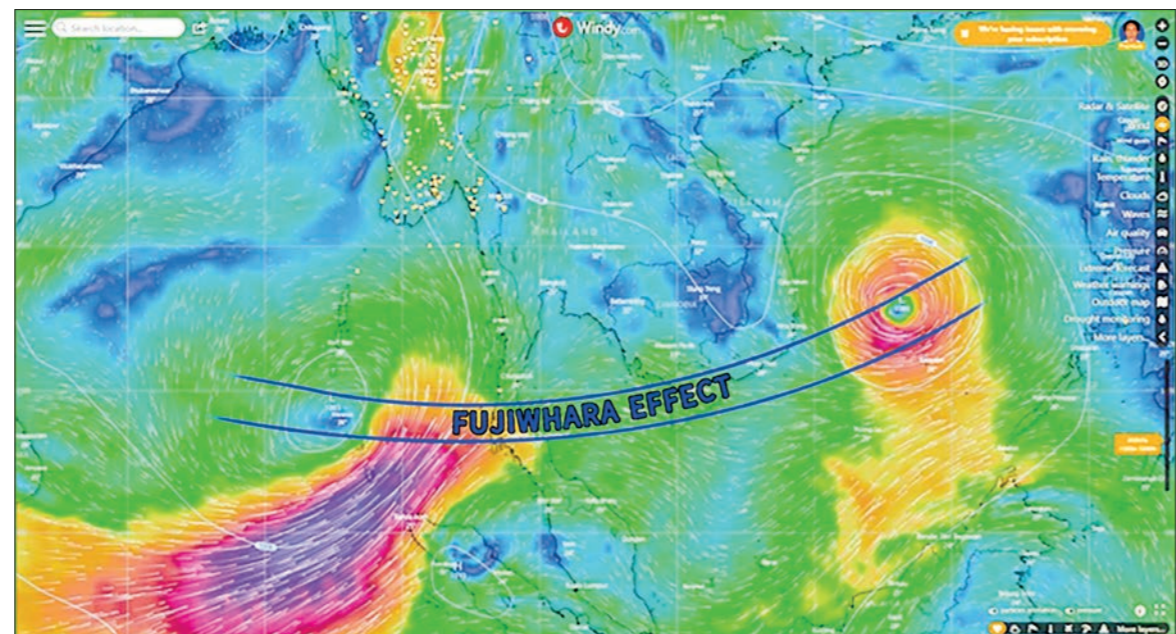
This time, we met with a very severe cyclone called Mocha. There was news that there could arise a low-pressure area in the Bay of Bengal starting from the afternoon of 5th May 2023.

Meanwhile, there was a low-pressure area in the South China Sea. If these two areas are mutually enforced, there can arise the Fujiwhara Effect, which will cause greater damage. Fortunately, however, the low-pressure area in the South China Sea died down on 10 May.



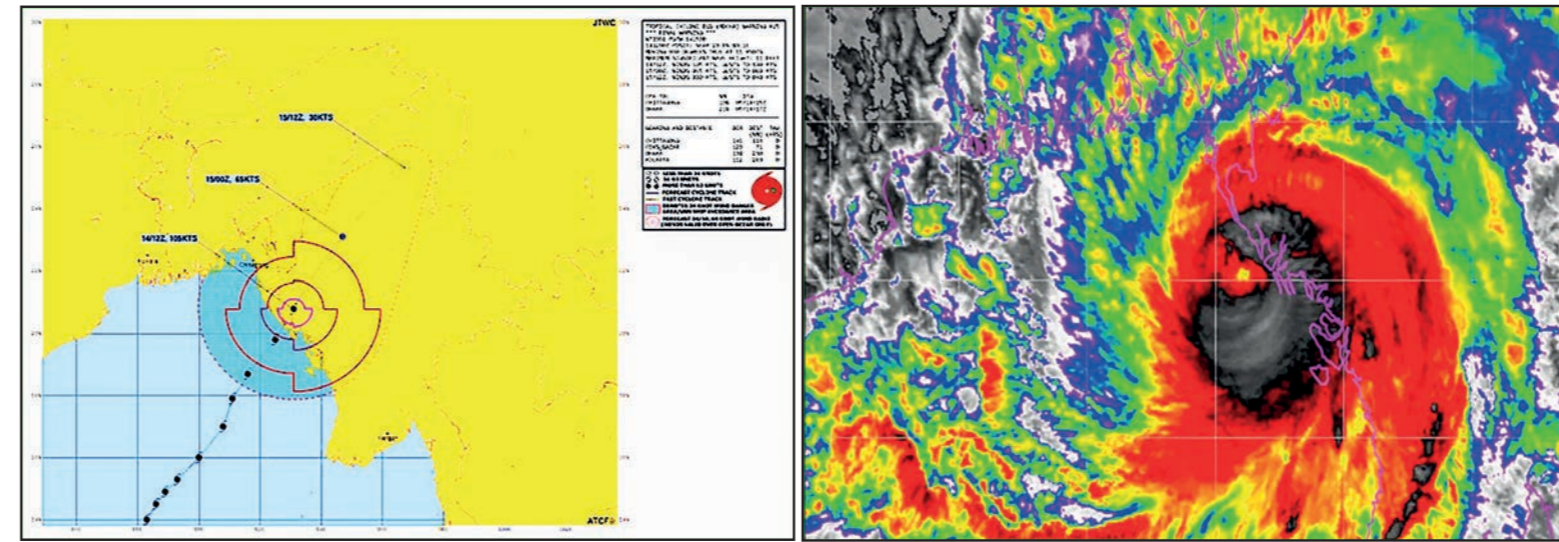
No sooner did the Prime Minister hear the news of the Cyclone Mocha than he ordered the Deputy Prime Minister the Deputy Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services to hold an emergency work coordination meeting of the Natural Disaster Management Committee. The latter obeyed the former's order, holding the emergency meeting with the union ministers and the senior military officers in personal attendance while the chief ministers from all regions and states including the chief minister of Rakhine State attended the video conferencing. The meeting has three agendas. The first agenda is concerned with preparation while the second and the third agenda are related to rescue and rehabilitation correspondingly. The Deputy Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services was heard on Myawady TV news to also emphasize the fact that the people are required on their part to join hands with the authorities concerned in making the preparations.

# The Strength Mocha Gives to Myanmar

are concerned, the region/state governments and the departments involved have made all the necessary preparations nine days in advance, doing the rehearsal exercises and having the relief equipment and support materials ready, for example.

The State Administration Council Chairman on 9 May founded the Disaster Management Centre - DMC with representatives from the respective departments. The prompt action taken by the head of state and the State Administration Council has reflected their love for their country. The storm warnings were issued in the breaking news, reaching the ears of all people across the country. On 11 May, a special warning about the tidal waves was issued, indicating the possible areas of flooding. As a consequence, people from the flood-prone areas have been evacuated. This is the reason why only a very few lost their lives. It is said only a handful of people were killed in the cyclone.

In this regard, what I would like to point out is that the union government, the local authorities, the people and the Tatmadaw have been united in making sys-

tematic preparations with their minds focused on the danger of the storm from the very beginning. It would not be improper to go so far as to say that we have seen the Unity of Myanmar Spirit in this event. Within an hour after the issuance of the red alert for seven townships in Rakhine State, the local authorities, responsible personnel and Tatmadaw started to take necessary measures to do the evacuation of the victims. They have been seen to have the victims moved to the designated shelters with the help of the storm relief teams formed township-wise. The township emergency relief teams have moved the elderly people living on the riverside, the sick, the children and the pregnant first. There are the relief teams, the chef teams and the medical cover teams at the shelters. And the people on their part are mostly found to be actively cooperating in taking preparatory measures like tying things that

can float, moving things that can be damaged, and moving the cattle, the valuable property and their personal belongings. The Tatmadawmen and the relief teams have also been found to have lent their helping hands to the people in the latter's movement of things. Thanks to the concerted effort exerted by the government, the Tatmadaw, Myanmar Police Force, the Fire Brigade, the Red Cross Society, the Social Assistance Associations and the people, evacuation to safer places in a short period has been made possible.

As expected, the extremely severe cyclone called Mocha started as Tropical Disturbances in the southwest of Nicobar Island in the southeast of the Bay of Bengal at 18 hours on 7 May. At 0030 hours the next day, it became a low-pressure area, which turned into a depression at 2130 hours on 9 May at about 340 miles south of Port Blair in India. And it turned into a deep depression at 1030 hours on 10 May, then into a severe cyclonic storm at 0630 hours on 11 May, then into a very severe cyclonic storm at 0930 hours on 12 May and finally into an extremely severe cyclonic storm at 0330 hours on 13 May. The cyclone started to touch the coastal area at about 1230 hours on 14 May. The cyclone went past Sittway from near Kyaukpantaw in the northwest only to turn into an inland storm in the direction of the northeast. As Sittway falls in the dangerous semicircle, it has suffered the worst. The first track of the cyclone witnessed a storm blowing for one hour at a

speed of 60 to 100 miles per hour (mph). Afterwards, it met with a gust of wind at a speed of 130 mph. Luckily, however, the tides were seen only at a height of 3 to 4 feet. Thanks to the united effort exerted by the government, local authorities, people and Tatmadaw, preparations are quite good, and this has made us lucky. The majority of the victims are in the shelters in time. And the storm fall coincides with the time of low water levelling. And the storm surge abated because of the low volume of water. The tides sub-

ed gradually in the evening. The experts from the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology and the Navy have issued timely warnings from the very beginning. And this has contributed a lot to the reduction of losses and damage as well as the casualties.

Just one day after the storm, the head of state issued an order to clear the aerodromes for the aircraft to be able to land as and where necessary. Only two hours after the issuance of this order, the Y-8 aircraft from the Tatmadaw (Air) landed at the Sittway Airport. On the same day, the aeroplane carrying the head of state on board landed at the Sittway Aerodrome followed by the arrival of other aeroplanes carrying the emergency relief supplies. We are encouraged by the directions given by the SAC Chair, who said, "No citizen is to be left behind in providing the relief."

Similarly, one 29-metre landing craft transported

# Casualties, losses and damage registered across nation

THE casualties, losses and damage in Myanmar caused by the severe cyclonic storm Mocha in the Bay of Bengal on 14 May are being released in a timely manner.

According to the investigation until 18 May noon, 12 houses, three religious buildings, one monastery, three schools, one airport building, eight lamp posts, one transformer, one departmental building, one wall were damaged and destroyed in 44 wards and villages of Nay Pyi Taw Council Area while 129 houses, one religious building, two monasteries, one school, two hospital/clinic, four lamp posts, 30 departmental buildings and one football field in 24 wards and villages of Chin State, three houses, six telecom towers, two lamp posts, one transformer, 26 walls and three bridges in 23 wards and villages of Sagaing Region, 113 houses, two telecom towers and one lamp post in 72 wards and villages of Bago Region, four houses, 14 lamp posts, 67 walls, 156 seasonal crop cul-

tivation fields and one bridge in 34 wards and villages of Magway Region, four religious building in one village of Mandalay Region, one house, one monastery, one school and 14 lamp posts in four wards and villages of Mon State, 182,598 houses, 300 offices, 1,352 schools, 220 hospitals and clinics, 1,701 religious buildings and 1,014 losses in 17 townships of Rakhine State, 31 houses, one religious building, one monastery, seven schools, two telecom towers, 60 lamp posts, two transformers, six departmental buildings, two football fields and 34 walls in 65 wards and villages of Yangon Region, two houses, one monastery and one school in one village of Shan State, 131 houses, one religious building, five monasteries, 32 schools, five hospital/clinic, nine lamp posts, three departmental buildings and four losses in 114 wards and villages of Ayeyawady Region.

Therefore, according to the data on 18 May noon, a total of 183,024 houses, 1,711 religious

buildings, 59 monasteries, 1,397 schools, 227 hospitals and clinics, 11 telecom towers, 119 lamp posts, five transformers, one market, two airport buildings and 340 departmental buildings

were destroyed in respective regions and states, and 54 locals were killed.

In the cyclone-affected areas, the rescue teams in respective regions and states are

undertaking rescue and relief measures together with volunteer organizations, and officials concerned went to the sites and provided necessary assistance. — MNA/KTZH

Officials from the township's electricity supply enterprise repaired the pylons damaged by Cyclone Mocha in Kyaukpyu.

Officials from departments and charitable organizations have been working together to clear and remove fallen tree branches on the roads and inside the departmental offices, schools, and monasteries since the storm hit. — Tin Tun Oo (IPRD)/KZL

## UK airline EasyJet cuts losses on strong demand

BRITISH airline EasyJet said Thursday it had slashed first-half net losses on strengthening demand from holidaymakers, as the aviation sector recovers from Covid.

The group faced a loss after taxation of £307 million (\$382 million) in the six months to the end of March, a results statement said.

That compared with

a loss of £431 million in the same period a year earlier, when the sector was hit by staff shortages as demand rebounded after the lifting of Covid restrictions.

The carrier, which is based in Luton north of London, added that revenues soared 80 per cent to £2.7 billion on higher ticket prices and increased capacity, and gave a bright summer outlook.

Costs, however, leapt 52 per cent to £3.1 billion on a “significantly” increased jet fuel bill and “industry-wide” inflationary pressures.—

## China establishes national financial regulatory administration

THE National Administration of Financial Regulation (NAFR) was officially set up on Thursday as China’s new financial regulator, marking an important step in the country’s institutional reform on financial supervision.

The NAFR, directly under the State Council, is formed on the basis of the China Banking and Insurance Regulatory Commission.

The new administration is in charge of regulating the financial industry, with the exception of the securities

sector. It will take over certain functions of the People’s Bank of China and the China Securities Regulatory Commission.—

## Energy firm warns S Africa to brace for ‘difficult winter’

SOUTH Africa’s struggling state-owned power firm Eskom on Thursday forecast a “very tight winter” starting in weeks, with demand set to rise in the continent’s most industrialized but energy-starved country.

Eskom warned that it may ramp up crippling power outages to prevent a national grid collapse.

“It’s going to be a difficult winter,” Calib Cassim, the company’s interim CEO told a news briefing in Johannesburg.

A total “blackout is unlikely”, he said, allaying fears of South Africans as the southern hemisphere winter which start in June, sends energy demands soaring. Winter demand for power is expected to surge to around 33,000

megawatts but Eskom is only able to produce 26,000 megawatts. “This is going to be a very, very tight winter in terms of supply and demand,” said Segomoco Scheppers, who is the Eskom executive responsible for transmission.—

## Deutsche Bank to pay \$75 mln in Epstein victim settlement: report

DEUTSCHE Bank will pay \$75 million to settle litigation alleging the German lender financially benefited from supporting Jeffrey Epstein’s sex trafficking scheme, according to a report Wednesday.

The settlement concerns an unnamed defendant who launched a proposed class-action suit in November 2022, alleging Deutsche Bank did business with Epstein while knowing he used funds in the account to support sex-trafficking activity, the Wall Street Journal said Wednesday.—

### Papua New Guinea to sign security pact with US, PM says

PAPUA New Guinea will sign a security pact with the United States that gives American troops access to the Pacific nation's ports and airports, its leader said Thursday, as Washington jostles for influence in the region with Beijing. US President Joe Biden has placed more importance on the Pacific over concerns about an increasingly assertive China, which is trying to woo nations with an array of diplomatic and financial incentives in return for strategic support. Prime Minister James Marape said two agreements focusing on defence cooperation and maritime surveillance had been agreed with Washington and would be formally signed at the earliest opportunity after parliamentary approval.

"We are elevating to a specific defence cooperation agreement, something that is falling short of a treaty," he told a press conference.

"We are moving ahead, we are signing with the best military on the face of planet Earth." — AFP

### Moldova wants to join EU 'as soon as possible'

MOLDOVA wants EU membership "as soon as possible" as protection against a threat from Russia and hopes for a decision to start negotiations "in the next months", President Maia Sandu told AFP in an interview. The small nation of 2.6 million people, nestled between EU neighbour Romania and war-ravaged Ukraine, will on 1 June hold its first major summit of wider Europe.

That gathering of the European Political Community — a forum created last year that brings together leaders of all 27 EU countries with 20 neighbours of the bloc — will be an occasion for Moldova to burnish its candidate credentials. — AFP

## UK aircraft carrier returning to Pacific in 2025: Sunak

BRITAIN will send an aircraft carrier back to the Pacific as part of a Carrier Strike Group in 2025, Downing Street said Thursday as Prime Minister Rishi Sunak visits Japan.

The HMS Queen Elizabeth passed through Asia in 2021, making port calls in Japan, as Western allies push back against China's growing military power in the region.

Sunak, who is in Japan

for the G7 summit in Hiroshima, stopped first in Tokyo to visit a naval base, where he announced Britain will double the number of UK troops in upcoming joint exercises.

London and Tokyo will also agree a formal "consult clause", committing them to discuss regional and global security issues and measures in response. — AFP

## Thai opposition leader confident of forming govt

THE head of Thailand's progressive Move Forward Party said Thursday he was confident of becoming prime minister despite junta-appointed senators saying they will block his appointment.

MFP stunned observers by emerging as the largest party at Sunday's election, which saw a record turnout deliver a thumping defeat for army-linked parties who had run the kingdom for nearly a decade. Two more small

parties joined the new coalition formed by MFP leader Pita Limjaroenrat, giving it 313 out of 500 seats in the lower house.

"We have a lot of momentum, my coalition is taking shape," the Harvard-educated, 42-year-old Pita told reporters in Bangkok on Thursday.

"All parties support me, as the Move Forward Party leader, to become the 30th prime minister of Thailand," he said.

While the coalition has a large enough majority to govern, to secure the PM's job it has to muster a majority across both houses — including the Senate, whose 250 members were hand-picked by the last junta.

MFP's determination to amend Thailand's tough laws against insulting King Maha Vajiralongkorn has spooked the royalist-military conservative establishment. — AFP

## Tunisian president evokes 'tolerance' after synagogue attack

TUNISIAN President Kais Saied has hosted Jewish, Muslim and Christian leaders following a deadly mass shooting outside a local synagogue, telling them Tunisia was a country of "tolerance and coexistence".

The 9 May attack on the resort island of Djerba killed five people and sparked panic during an annual Jewish pilgrimage at the historic Ghriba synagogue, Africa's oldest. The interfaith meeting on Wednesday "attests to the tolerance and coexistence that have characterized Tunisia for centuries", Saied said, according to a video released by the presidency. It included Tunisia's Grand Rabbi Haim Bittan, Mufti Hichem ben Mahmoud and Archbishop Ilario Antoniazzi. The gunman, a police officer, killed three other officers and two wor-

shippers, a French-Tunisian and an Israeli-Tunisian man, before being shot dead himself by police.

During the meeting, Saied said a probe was underway to determine whether the shooter had any accomplices.

Four people linked to the gunman and suspected of in-

volvement in the attack have so far been arrested, the private Mosaïque FM radio reported late Wednesday. Tunisian officials have denounced the attack as "criminal" but refrained from referring to it as a "terrorist" operation which would imply anti-Semitic motives. — AFP

## Chinese, Kyrgyz presidents hold talks, elevate bilateral relationship

CHINESE President Xi Jinping on Thursday held talks with visiting Kyrgyz President Sadyr Japarov in Xi'an, northwest China's Shaanxi Province, where the two presidents announced the elevation of the bilateral relationship to a comprehensive strategic partnership for a new era.

Japarov is in China for the China-Central Asia Summit and a state visit.

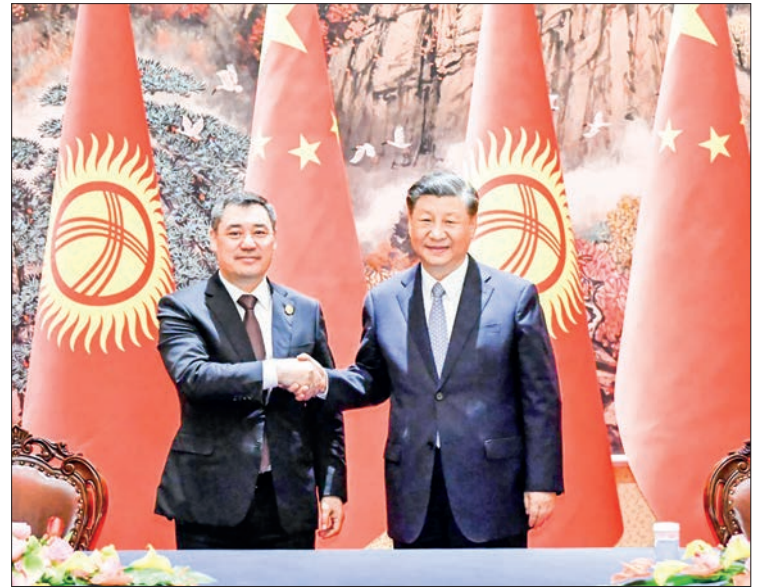
Xi welcomed Japarov to China for the summit and the state visit. He recalled their two meetings last year, which pro-

duced important common understandings on China-Kyrgyzstan relations and cooperation in various areas. These common understandings are being implemented effectively, providing strong momentum for bilateral relations, Xi said.

The national-conservative party seeks to prevent the further transfer of power to the EU and maximize Sweden's influence to achieve better negotiation results.

According to the top Sweden Democrats, their country has become so malleable and loses so many negotiations in Brussels

The duo ventured that 60 per cent of the Swedish municipalities' decisions originate

## Rival claims over Prince Harry, Meghan NY 'car chase'

COMPETING claims surfaced Thursday over Prince Harry and his wife Meghan's purported involvement in a "near catastrophic car chase" with paparazzi in New York.

A spokesperson for the couple drew global attention by announcing Wednesday that they had endured a "relentless" two-hour pursuit that resulted in "multiple near collisions involv-

ing other drivers".

The account of Tuesday's incident prompted comparisons to the circumstances around the Paris car crash in 1997 that killed Harry's mother, Princess Diana, which the prince blames on paparazzi pursuing her.

However, New York police, the city's mayor and a taxi driver who briefly transported the couple have played down the

danger and duration of the reported pursuit.

In an interview aired Thursday on Britain's ITV, one of the photographers involved in the drama alleged the couple's vehicle entourage were to blame for any danger.

"It was very tense trying to keep up with the vehicles," said the photographer, who asked to remain anonymous. — AFP

#### Colombia says four kids found alive in Amazon after plane crash

FOUR Indigenous children, including an 11-month-old baby, have been found alive in the dense Colombian Amazon after a plane crash more than two weeks ago, President Gustavo Petro said Wednesday, declaring "joy for the country".

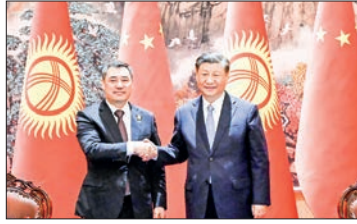
Petro said on Twitter the children were found after "arduous search efforts" by the military, which has yet to confirm the rescue.

More than 100 soldiers had been deployed with sniffer dogs to search for the minors who were travelling in an airplane that crashed on 1 May, leaving three adults including the pilot and the children's mother dead. — AFP

#### Migrant girl, 8, dies in US custody at Texas border

An eight-year-old migrant girl died in US custody in Texas on Wednesday, a tragedy that tempered news of a sharp drop in attempted illegal crossings of the southern US border.

The girl died in Harlingen, a Texas border city near the Gulf of Mexico. "The child and her family were in custody at the Harlingen Station where she experienced a medical emergency," US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) said in a statement. — AFP

- (d) To comprehensively promote the education sector to make it capable of producing the human resources necessary for building a modern, developed, and progressive democratic nation.

Australia's top mixed martial arts fighter, featherweight king Alexander Volkanovski, will defend his belt at UFC 290 in July in Las Vegas against Mexico's Yair Rodriguez.—AFP
