During the period from 1999 to 2014, a total of 19,441,711 youths attended the school, 11,137,318 of whom attended the middle school, accounting for 57.29 per cent and 7,787,412 students joined

the eighth standard, accounting for 40.06 per cent. Hence, it is necessary to enhance education promotion in border regions.

With regard to the health sector, the Union health life ex-

pectancy is 63.4 years for males and 72.2 years for females on average. So, it is necessary to accelerate healthcare services for the people.

208 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 5 May, total figure registers 635,660

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to **635,660** after **208** new cases were reported on 5 May 2023 according to the Ministry of Health.

Therefore, a total of **10,418,900** laboratory samples were examined and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached **635,660**. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **615,046** including **48** new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered **19,492** on 5-5-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. According to the research, it is found that people who have been vaccinated do not suffer severely from the disease, need not be hospitalized and are unlikely to die. If they have received booster shots, the death rates can be reduced more.

As such, people need to follow the new normal way of living with COVID. Hence, all people above five have to fully receive COVID-19 vaccination inoculated by the Ministry of Health free of charge. Six months after the vaccination, they have to take booster jabs at relevant health centres and ward/village administration offices without fail.

Moreover, they have to wear masks while in closed chambers and public places, and when more than one person is in closed chambers, windows should be opened for good ventilation. They need to often wash their hands with soap and water or the hand gel containing alcohol (at least 60 per cent) for 20 seconds. People need to follow the social distancing rule and avoid crowds as much as possible.

While not wearing masks, if they cough and sneeze, they need to cover their mouth and noses with elbows in line with the personal hygienic ways. COVID-19 information can be browsed on the internet page moh.gov.mm of the Ministry of Health. — GNLM

The people are urged to receive vaccination of Covid-19 without fail as full-time vaccination of Covid-19 and receiving booster shots can effectively mitigate infection of the virus, severe suffering from the disease and increase of death rate due to the disease.

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Agriculture and livestock are the primary business of the nation with expectations for food security of the nation as well as respective regions. Value-added products contribute much to regional development.

An emphasis is being placed on the development of human resources for youths from border regions. In this regard, 47 border youth development training schools are training 33,007 students and arrange them to continue learning in higher education and vocational schools. The University for Development of the National Races of the Union produces 14,058 students at different levels of degrees as well as teachership diplomas up to the 2022-23 academic year.

Nationalities Youth Resources Development Degree Colleges in Yangon and Sagaing turned out 4,701 students to ob-

tain BA, BSc, AGTI diploma and BTech degrees and arranged for them to join relevant ministries as service personnel.

Everybody needs to specially take care of restoring peace and stability and national unity in the entire nation through undertakings of border region development which is essential for building the Union based on democracy and federalism the entire people inspire.

Seven NCA signatory ethnic armed organizations and three non-NCA signatory ethnic armed organizations held peace talks and the results from the talks came out for continuing the political peace and stability process. The Senior General noted that the door of peace is always open to ethnic organizations which have not reached the peace talks yet without any pre-restrictions.

While striving for the improvement of education, health,

transport and economic sectors of the border regions, it is necessary to implement peace and stability as well as the rule of law in border regions.

Central Committee Secretary Union Minister for Border Affairs Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung reported on the formation of the central committee, duties and functions, policies, missions and visions, and progress of border regions and national races.

Members of the central committee, Union ministers, chief ministers of regions and states and officials participated in discussions on development undertakings for border regions and national races.

The Vice-Chairman of the central committee SAC Vice-Chairman instructed all to improve MSME businesses, undertake regional development tasks and develop human resources.

After hearing the reports, the Senior General highlighted that it is necessary to prioritize the improvement of school buildings and provide teaching aid to them. Arrangements should be made for running flights and waterway transport to the areas with lesser road transport facilities. Trainees from UDNR and training schools must be trained to have experience in rural administration and regional development.

The Senior General stressed the need to appoint nurses, health assistants and health officers in rural areas and medical doctors at the township level in the remote areas. The central committee must focus on the development of the nation based on rural areas. He underscored that it is necessary to turn out the youths capable of firmly safeguarding Our Three Main National Causes with patriotic

spirit.

In conclusion, the Senior General pointed out that peace and stability of the border regions are of importance in the enhancement of border region development tasks. Hence, officials need to supervise the timely completion of the assignments in the relevant financial years despite restrictions of local situations, climatic conditions and the transport sector.

The Senior General noted that it can be seen that infrastructures of border regions and human resources are being undertaken with the funds provided by India and China as part of international cooperation. The Senior General expressed his thanks to the partner countries and organizations for their assistance in development undertakings contributing much to the ethnic national people from the border regions. — MNA/TTA

FIREFIGHTERS need to constantly study the advancement of firefighting techniques and apply them for the citizens of the nation, said Vice-Chairman of the State Administration Council Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win at the ceremony to mark the 77th Anniversary of Myanmar Fire Brigade Day at the Myanmar International Convention Centre-II in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

Speaking on the occasion, the Vice-Senior General said the Myanmar Fire Brigade under the leadership of the Ministry of Home Affairs is strictly following three important sectors: management, fire safety and rescue works and review.

A total of 18,336 outbreaks of fire happened within 10 years from 2013 to 2022, losing more than K155 billion worth of property, according to the records of the Department of Fire Services. Annually, more than 1,800 times of fire broke out in the whole nation with some K15 billion worth of property.

The Vice-Senior General urged all firefighters to skillfully handle modern fire extinguishers and rescue vehicles and equipment and take training for having better skills in relevant arenas. Firefighters have to value their lives and follow

the prescribed laws, rules and disciplines to become good firefighters.

The Fire Brigade has been serving duties focusing on the interests of the State and ethnic people in line with its fine traditions without political colours since its establishment.

The Vice-Senior General praised permanent/auxiliary and separate firefighters for their sacrifices in dutifully serving assignments for the sake of the State and the people despite missing chances to secure honorary titles and medals.

The Vice-Senior General noted that as firefighters must

solve the enormous dangers of the people firefighters, the role of the fire brigade is crucial in urban areas.

The Vice-Senior General said the Myanmar Fire Safety Code 2020 was issued on 30 December 2020 in order to minimize the loss in the outbreak of fire and reduce the danger to firefighters in putting out the fire.

Firefighters were urged to enhance their capacity to overcome the challenges of natural disasters and to stand shoulder-to-shoulder with those from international fire brigades.

The Vice-Senior General stressed the need to study mod-

ern technologies in extinguishing the fire and carrying out search and rescue works while taking training in groups in line with the international search and rescue advisory-INSERAG so as to encounter new challenges of natural disasters.

The Daihatsu (Pyitawtha) three-wheeled motorbike was manufactured by Japan in 1954. Such a vehicle arrived in Myanmar the same year and was used in putting out the fire. It could be used in narrow streets to put out the fire. U Wan Thuang has been serving duties of the auxiliary fire brigade for 69 years in good health from 25 years old to 94 years.

THE memorandum on granting the Republic of the Union of Myanmar the status of a dialogue partner of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) was signed by U Moe Kyaw Aung, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar to the Republic of India, and Mr Zhang Ming, Secretary-General of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization on 5 May 2023,

at the sidelines of the Meeting of SCO Council of Foreign Ministers (CFM) at Goa, India on 4-5 May 2023.

At the signing ceremony, the United Arab Emirates, Kuwait and Maldives also signed the MoU with the SCO Secretariat along with Myanmar.

The Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) is an intergovernmental organization which established on 15

June 2001 in Shanghai, China. SCO currently comprises eight full-fledged members (China, India, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Russia, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan). SCO mainly focuses on promoting effective cooperation in politics, trade, environment protection, culture, education, energy and transport areas among the member countries. — MNA

Brisk sales of Indian export beans hover over Mandalay market

IN early 2023, the prices of Indian export beans in the Mandalay market increased, and transactions were brisk, according to Mandalay beans and pulses dealers.

At the beginning of this year, the sales of Indian export beans (black gram, pigeon pea, green gram, kidney bean, and chickpea) had been good. In the previous year, the prices per bag containing three baskets of them were K150,000, K135,000, K120,000, K145,000, and K135,000, respectively. At this time of year, the prices rose to K215,000, K235,000, K200,000, K295,000, and K215,000, and there is a great demand in the market, according to U Soe Win Myint of the Soe Win Myint Depot in Mandalay.

“Compared to last year, Indian export beans (black gram,

pigeon pea, green gram, kidney bean, and chickpea) fetch handsome prices in the market this year, and the prices are going up. Some record highs. There are needs in India for beans and pulses this year. Crops are yielding as usual since the weather is nice this year. There are also more and more continuous purchases from customer countries,” he added.

At present, imported beans and pulses have entered the market, and the transaction is good. These crops are cultivated in Mandalay, Sagaing, and Magway Regions, regardless of season, and are grown only for one season as a winter crop in Yangon, Bago, and Ayeyawady Regions. — Min Htet Aung (Mandalay Sub-Printing House)/CT

2023 maritime and aviation youth basic, advanced courses continue in townships

WITH the aim to develop the knowledge of new generation students during the summer holidays, spend their holidays efficiently, follow their hobbies and emerge new generation who are mastered in maritime and aviation skills and knowledge, Myanmar Navy has been running the basic maritime youth course and advanced courses, while Myanmar Air

Force, basic aviation youth courses (senior) and basic aviation youth courses (junior) simultaneously at respective townships since 24 April.

Myanmar Navy runs basic maritime youth courses and advanced courses at 11 maritime youth camps in respective townships with 712 trainees in total. It trained 97 trainees at the youth camp in Yangon,



71 trainees at the Coco Island training camp and 60 trainees at the Heinze training camp in Taninthayi Region and so on.

Similarly, Myanmar Air Force operates senior and junior-level basic aviation youth courses at 17 training camps in respective townships with

680 trainees in total.

It trained 40 trainees each at the Mawlamyine camp in Mon State, Mingaladon camp in Yangon Region, Magway camp in Magway Region, Meiktila camp in Mandalay Region, Kengtung camp in Shan State (east) and Taunggyi camp in

Shan State (south).

The relevant regions' chief ministers, commanders and officials inspected the training sites and comforted the youths. They also provided the needed assistance to the trainees. — MNA/KTZH



Illegal industrial materials, consumer goods, foodstuffs, auto parts and vehicles seized

AN on-duty team seized two kinds of goods, including 17,582.4 kilogrammes of mass motor engine oil that were different from the Import Declaration (ID) worth K128.08 million from a container on 2 May and two kinds of goods, including 102.5 kg of display stand, worth K1,678,343

that were submitted to waive by owner for Import Licence needs from a container on 4 May at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 3 May, a combined team led by Dawei Myoma Police

Station conducted a patrol inspection and captured 12,000 kg of Thai-made Tiger fertilizer worth K21.6 million without official documents from a Nissan Condor truck (approximately K20 million) at a bus station compound in Dawei township. The action was taken under

Customs procedures.

In addition, an on-duty team at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint confiscated 7,500 Lippo bottles worth K2.7 million without official documents from a Higer bus (estimated value of K18 million) heading to Yangon from

Myawady. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Therefore, six arrests (estimated value of K192,058,343) were made on three consecutive days from 2 to 4 May, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Watermelon fetches good price during late season

WATERMELONS exported to China are offered at a high price at the end of the watermelon season, fruit traders involved in the Muse trade zone said.

The prevailing prices of watermelons are 40,000-70,000 yuan per 15-tonne truck.

“The watermelon prices remain high when the season ends. The prices of watermelon from Shan State rebound on maturity stage and high quality. The outright purchase of 855 watermelon varieties is on the rise,” Sai Khin Maung from Khwanyo fruit depot emphasized.

Additionally, fruits are moved from border trade to normal trade under the 2.0 system on China’s side. Therefore, exporters are still closely observing the impacts on fruit exports, he continued.

“China has commenced customs duty payment with the 2.0 system for fruit imports via normal trade. If there is more than a 300-kilogramme gap for weight measurement of watermelon, muskmelon and mango fruit trucks stated on the QR code, the trucks are not permitted. China asked the brokers, growers and freight forwarders to carefully check the tonnage mentioned in

the QR code (trade net licence) with the actual weight,” he added.

Myanmar’s watermelon and muskmelon are heavily reliant on the Chinese market. The traders struggled with China’s strict policy sometimes.

In early February, tight inspections by the Chinese Customs hindered truck transport. That being so, only 20-30 trucks were able to pass the checkpoint despite the delays amid the high prices of watermelons and muskmelons.

Consequently, watermelon was sold out at the depots on the China side and more than 500 trucks queued in line on the Myanmar side.

In 2021, the COVID-19 restrictions hindered Myanmar’s watermelon and muskmelon exports to China. Chinese Customs Regulation increased delay. Long delays of trucks caused harm to watermelon quality and only one in five trucks heading to China remained undamaged with quality watermelons.

The traders are observing delivery time, price and profitability as they are perishable fruit, while they are trying to explore new markets besides China.

On 1 April, Nantaw and Sinphyu borders were suspended in the wake of COVID-19 impacts. China has closed down the major border crossing Mang Wein from 30 March 2021 following the COVID-19 cases in Myanmar.

On 8 July 2021, the two-remaining cross-border points Kyinsankyawt and Panseng were suspended. As a result of this, the border trade between Myanmar and China was completely halted.

Among the Sino-Myanmar border points, the Kyinsankyawt border resumed operations on 26 November 2021.

Trade activity at the Muse-Mang Wein crossing point, which performed the majority of trade between Myanmar and China, resumed on 14 January 2023. Additionally, other goods except agricultural products (watermelon, muskmelon), minerals and fisheries products are allowed

to be sent to China through that border point.

Additionally, Nantaw and Sinphyu, which are major border crossings, were reopened on 25 January 2023.

At present, Myanmar daily delivers rice, broken rice, rubber, various beans and pulses, fishery products, chilli pepper and other food commodities to China through the Kyinsankyawt border. — NN/EM

Myanmar foreign trade crosses US\$1 bln as of 21 April

MYANMAR’S trade with foreign trade partners increased to US\$1.625 billion as of 21 April in the financial year 2023-2024 from \$1.536 billion recorded in the year-ago period, the Ministry of Commerce’s statistics showed.

Myanmar’s export was worth over \$606.67 million whereas the country’s import was valued at \$1.018 billion between 1 and 24 April. With border posts between Myanmar and China resuming, the border trade bounced back to \$503.89 million, showing an increase of \$210.3 million as against the year-ago period. Similarly, Myanmar’s seaborne trade amounted to over \$1.1 billion in the FY2022-2023, indicating a sharp drop of \$121.89 million from the year-ago period.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, and



finished industrial goods, while it imports capital goods, raw industrial materials, and consumer goods.

The country’s export sector relies more on the agricultural and manufacturing sectors. The Ministry of Commerce is focusing on reducing trade deficit, export promotion, import substitution and market diversification.

The external trade tremendously grew to US\$33.9 billion last

Financial Year 2022-2023 (April-March), according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The figures surged from \$30.35 billion in the corresponding period of FY 2021-2022.

The external trade stood at \$15.5 billion in the past mini-budget 2021-2022 (October-March) period and \$29.58 billion in the 2020-2021 FY, as per the Commerce Ministry’s statistics. — KK

The Burma Circle of the Geological Survey of India and their Contributions to the Geology of Myanmar

Cyril Sankey Fox, son of John Henry Neat Fox, was born in Calcutta on 24 February 1886. He received his early education in India completing it with a degree from the Civil Engineering College, Sibpur. He then joined the University of Birmingham and in 1908 obtained a BSc degree in Mining. Between 1910 and 1911 he was a lecturer in Mining at that University.

Fox joined the Geological Survey of India in 1911 as an Assistant Superintendent (subsequently the post was redesignated "Geologist") and was engaged in the systematic mapping of parts of Madhya Pradesh, collaborating with LL Fermor. During the 1914-18 World War, Fox was in active service with the army as a gunner, leaving with the rank of Captain, and partial deafness caused by proximity to artillery emplacement. On demobilization, he was seconded to the High Commissioner for India in London, at the same time obtaining his DSc degree in Mining from his old University in Birmingham. His original interest was evidently in Mining but as Geology is clearly an essential facet of the subject, Fox became doubly fitted by training to undertake research in the scientific and economic aspects of mineral occurrences, which proved to be an essential background throughout his career.

C. S. Fox was appointed Director on 25 March 1939 and consisted of Superintending Geologists, E. L. G. Clegg, H. Crookshank, A. L. Coulson, and J. A. Dunn. On the declaration of the Second World War in 1939 Fox rose fully to the occasion. He not only inspired his colleagues to make extra efforts, but convinced the Government that an expansion of the Geological Survey was essential with the increased demands for its services for locating new mineral deposits to replace the imports that had been abruptly cut off, to enable the industry to survive, and thus to further the War effort.

With the opening of the Burma Front, Fox initiated a Strategic Branch within the Survey to help advise the army in unknown terrain on road, bridge, and air-strip construction. This unit was headed by an officer of the Survey with field experience in Burma. Interpretation of air photography played an essential part in these operations, as it did also in civil use in the study of dam sites by a section of the Department at the end of the war that became the Engineering Geology and Groundwater Division. Fox retired on 1 July 1943, having left his mark on the Department in no uncertain manner.

Fox retired to England. While on a professional visit to India, he died in Calcutta after a brief illness on 28 December 1951 in the city of his birth and the country which had been his own, and for which he had done so much.

Burma Geological Department

The officers who were on loan to the Burma Geological Survey Department consisted of E. L. G. Clegg, Superintending Geologist with E. J. Bradshaw, Resident Geologist in the Yenangaung Oilfield, A. B. Dutt, Assistant Geologist, and R. L. Sharma, Assistant Chemist. They carried out mineral investigations on coal, gold, iron ore, petroleum, wolfram, etc., and also attended to engineering geology and water supply questions. Clegg was considering the question of the likelihood of the Mergui, Moulmein, and Mawchi series being equivalent and ranging in age between the Carboniferous and the Cretaceous.

Cretaceous Cephalopods in the Red Beds of Kalaw

C. S. Fox discovered Cretaceous Cephalopods in the Red Beds of Kalaw, Southern Shan States and reported in Record of Geological Survey of India, Vol. LXIII in 1930. The summary account of the report is as follows: -

Red beds, consisting of soft sandstones and shales with calcareous conglomerates, are well exposed around the station of Kalaw (96° 35':

20° 38') in the Southern Shan States of Burma. These 'Red Beds' of Kalaw comprise part of C. S. Middlemiss' 'Purple Sandstone Zone'. T. H. La Touche, writing of the Purple Sandstone zone, considered it "to be the equivalent of the Namyau series... The only difference is the presence in Middlemiss' area, of interbedded conglomerates, of considerable coarseness and thickness, apparently at several different horizons; and thin seams of coal".

The marine (brachiopod) fauna of the Namyau series has been described by S. S. Buckman. He thought the Namyau series might be divided into two parts; a lower fossiliferous limestone part with brachiopods of Bathonian affinities and an upper fossiliferous part with soft purple sandstones and shales. For the former Mr. Buckman suggested the name Namyau Limestones and the latter Namyau Shales.

In 1922 during his examination of the Loi-an coal field, three miles east of Kalaw G. de P. Cotter found the following plant fossils in the coal measures of Middlemiss' 'Purple Sandstone zone': -

Filicales: Cladophlebis denticulate (Brong), Ginkgoales: Ginkgoites digitata (Brong), Coniferales: Pagiophyllum divaricatum (Bunb). Brachyphyllum expansum (Sterub.), Bennettitales: Ptilophyllum sp. cf. P. (non Otozamites) hislopi (Oldh.), Incertae sedis; Podozamites dislans (Morris).

Dr Cotter expressed the view that the 'Red Beds' of Kalaw were considerably younger than the Loi-an coal measures and hinted that they might be Cretaceous in age. His duties in connection with the coal fields of Burma took me to Kalaw in January 1929. He was aware of the possible two-fold character of the Namyau series of the Northern Shan States and the probability that Middlemiss' 'Purple Sandstone zone' might have a three-fold character, as it might comprise (1) the

'Red Beds' of Kalaw, (2) the Loi-an coal-measures and (3) the equivalents of the Napeng beds.

'Red Beds' of Kalaw: At the time of his visit to Kalaw an effort was being made to improve the local Race Course, and, to fill up the hollows in the track, the material was being taken from the Red Beds from the little hillock (with a small pagoda on it) between the Railway Station and the Kalaw Hotel. The strata exposed in the cuttings were very soft, friable sandstones and shales of a purplish-red colour. The beds dip westward (i.e., towards the hillock and the Race Course) at about 25°. The section laid bare probably represented 30 feet of the strata. At this place, with the help of his interpreter, orderly, and a few coolies. He collected two baskets full of fragments of sandstone in which evidence of fossils was visible. Unfortunately, the material was exceedingly fragile and easily crumbled to pieces. In spite of the greatest care, only two specimens survived the train and sea journeys to Calcutta. Dr Cotter, then a Palaeontologist at the Geological Survey of India, examined these two specimens. The specific determinations are of course open to emendation, but Dr Cotter was in no doubt that these Cephalopods were similar to those in the Trichinopoly beds of the Madras Coromandel Coast, which are Upper (Ariyalur) to Middle (Utatur) Cretaceous in age.

Loi-an coal-measures: The terrestrial flora of these beds has been shown that the Loi-an coal-measures are Lower Oolite to Liassic in age. The exact correlation of the Loi-an strata with the Namyau Limestone must always remain uncertain, as the age of the latter is based on marine fauna. The probability is that they are very close in age. There is thus evidence of shore conditions in Liassic times in the Madras region on the one hand and in the Southern Shan States on the other. Fluvial conditions were present in the Rajmahal area and, contemporaneously, marine deposition was in progress in the Northern Shan States.

Napeng beds: The age of the Napeng beds of the Northern Shan States was finally established as Rhaetic by Miss M. Healy. These beds in the Southern Shan States should therefore underlie Dr Cotter's Loi-an coal measures and overlie the Upper Plateau limestone. A series of hard sandstones and conglomerates, quite distinct from the soft 'Red Beds' of Kalaw, occur south-south-west of Legaung (96° 30': 20° 50'), roughly east of the Thazi-Kalaw road, about 38th mile from Thazi. My examination of these beds was very hurried, but there is little doubt that they underlie the coal measures in the synclinal of the Legaung ridge.

From the evidence now available the stratigraphical succession of the Mesozoic formations of the Shan plateau may provisionally be classified as follows: -

Distribution of Cretaceous beds

Although no Cretaceous fossils have previously been found on the Shan Plateau there are records of the discovery of ammonites, of

believed Cretaceous forms, in the Arakan Yoma and the Assam hills bordering Burma. W. Theobald secured a single specimen, Ammonites (Schanbachia) inflatus near the village of Ma-I (94° 13':19" 20") in the Sandoway district, Arakan. F. Noetling picked up an ammonite (evidently derived from beds in the Patkoi range) in the Hukong Valley. H. H. Hayden found an ammonite in the Naga Hills and recorded that T. H. La Touche had found Cretaceous echinoids in the Lushai Hills. Fossiliferous Cretaceous strata have long been known from the southern scraps of the Shillong plateau about Tharia Ghat (91° 45': 25° 11') and Jowai (92° 12': 25' 27') in Assam.

General Conclusion

Spengler concluded that both in Assam and in the Pondicherry (Madras) areas the Cretaceous fauna indicated a Senonian age. From the fact that Cretaceous fauna in the Himalayan and Tibetan strata is quite different from that in the rocks of the Assam and Madras areas, it must be concluded that these two marine areas were separated by a land barrier in Cretaceous times. This belief is supported by the evidence of the coal seams, suggestive of a shoreline, of Upper Cretaceous age in the Garo Hills tract of western Assam.

It is difficult to trace the changes in the distribution of sea and land in this region previous to the Senonian epoch of the Cretaceous period. However, it is clear, from the widespread occurrences of an Anthracolithic (Permian) fauna in Burma and the Himalayan region, followed by the almost isolated position of the Napeng (Rhaetic) marine fauna in the Northern Shan States, that extensive land conditions were prevalent in the early epochs (Bunter and Keuper) of the Mesozoic era.

A similarly restricted sea evidently existed in the Lower Jurassic period (as indicated by the marine fauna of the Namyau Limestones) but with the closing epochs of the Cretaceous period, a great marine transgression was in progress. This ocean appears to have attained its maximum extent about the time of the eruption of the basaltic lavas (the Deccan volcanic period) in the Peninsular region of India.

Aungmyintmoh & Thilawa low-cost housing to sell flats by drawing lots

A total of 204 flats in Aungmyintmoh low-cost housing in Dagon Myothit (South) and Thilawa low-cost housing in Kyauktan township will be sold through lot drawing, according to the Ministry of Construction.

There are 2,788 customers on the list of having deposited K3 million and above with the Construction, Housing and Infrastructure Development Bank (CHID) until end-December 2023.

The previous price of 900 and 1,300 square feet is K29.6 million-K55.6 million but it changed to K32.6 million-K61.2 million for building maintenance after these flats were used as COVID-19 treatment centres. In addition, the price of 468 square feet area has been adjusted from K11.1 million-K18.6 million to K12.2 million-K21.6 million.

The first 25 registrants out of 699 registrations to purchase the flats will be allowed to attend lot-drawing events at the Urban and Housing Development Department on Bogyoke Aung San Road in Yangon on 9 May in order to avoid overcrowding as per Covid-19 rules and regulations. — TWA/MKKS

Onion wholesale price jumps to K2,100 per viss

A total of 156,000 visses of onions flooded the Bayintnaung market in Yangon and the depot opening price was K2,100 per viss on 4 May.

The prices of Seikphyu onions, Monywa onions, and Pakokku onions ranged between K1,700 and K2,100 per viss, depending on the quality. After the weekends, the

price of large-sized onions increased by around K500 per viss. In addition, 22,500 visses of onions entered the Seikphyu market with the highest price on 4 May.

A total of 5,000 visses of onions entered the Pakokku market on 3 May for K1,700 per viss. Then, the next day, it gradually rose to 66,990 visses

with the highest rate of K2,000 per viss, according to the market data.

On 4 May this year, the price of onions was up three-fold compared to the same period of the previous year. Thus, the onion growers are enjoying the benefit of a price increase this year. — TWA/CT

Japan's child population falls for 42nd straight yr to new record low

JAPAN'S estimated child population fell for the 42nd consecutive year to hit a new record low, government data showed Thursday, as Prime Minister Fumio Kishida calls for implementing "unprecedented" measures to boost the birthrate.

The number of children aged 14 or younger, including foreigners, was 14.35 million as of 1 April, down by around 300,000 from a year earlier, the data from the internal affairs ministry showed.

The ratio of children to Japan's overall population was 11.5 per cent, down by 0.2 percentage point, also the lowest figure since 1950 when comparable data became available, according to the figures.

The government last month

created the Children and Families Agency to oversee child care policies and is considering various measures, such as securing financial resources for child-rearing households, although doubts persist about whether such initiatives will be effective in reversing the declining birthrate.

According to UN data, Japan has the lowest ratio among 36 countries with a population of over 40 million, behind South Korea with 11.6 per cent and Italy with 12.4 per cent.

By gender, boys accounted for 7.35 million of the total number of children, with girls making up another seven million, according to the data from the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications.—Kyodo

'Remarkable' Alzheimer drug reduces cognitive decline, results show

US drugmaker Eli Lilly on Wednesday announced its experimental Alzheimer's drug significantly slowed cognitive and functional decline, results hailed as "remarkable" by experts.

In a placebo controlled trial of nearly 1,200 people with early forms of the disease, donanemab slowed the progression of symptoms by 35 per cent over a period of 18 months, as measured by their ability to carry out daily tasks like managing finances, driving, engaging in hobbies and conversing about current events.

This follows a 27 per cent

reduction in decline found for Biogen and Eisai's lecanemab, which was also declared a blockbuster and was approved by the US in January.

Lilly said it would rapidly submit its results to the US Food and Drug Administration as well as other global regulators.

"We are extremely pleased that donanemab yielded positive clinical results with compelling statistical significance for people with Alzheimer's disease in this trial," said Daniel Skovronsky, Lilly's chief scientific and medical officer, in a statement.—AFP

Nigerian politician faces sentencing in landmark UK organ plot

NIGERIA'S former deputy Senate president faces up to life in jail in Britain on Friday when he is sentenced for plotting to harvest a man's kidney for his sick daughter.

In the first UK case of its kind, Ike Ekweremadu, 60, was found guilty in March at London's Old Bailey criminal court of conspiring to traffic the young street trader into Britain for his body part.

Also convicted were Ekweremadu's wife Beatrice, 56, and Obinna Obeta, 50, a doctor who acted as a middle man in the plot. They too will be sentenced Friday.

The Ekweremadus' daughter Sonia, 25, shed tears as she was cleared of the same charge

after jurors deliberated for nearly 14 hours.

In Britain, it is legal to donate a kidney, but not for financial or material reward.

It was the first time organ

harvesting conspiracy charges had been brought under the UK's 2015 Modern Slavery Act.

The maximum sentence under the legislation is life imprisonment.—AFP

Florida lawmakers bar treatment for transgender minors

LAWMAKERS in the southern US state of Florida on Thursday approved a proposal barring physicians and health workers from offering transition-related medical care to transgender minors.

The proposal, a priority for conservative Governor Ron DeSantis, who is nearing a likely campaign for the presidency, will

become law once he signs it.

The proposed ban, approved by both chambers of the Florida legislature, prohibits gender confirmation surgeries or the offering of treatments such as puberty blockers or hormone therapy to transgender minors.

These methods are used to combat gender dysphoria: the

sense of distress that people whose gender identity differs from their biological sex may feel.

DeSantis, 44, a rising star in the Republican party, has promoted a conservative agenda on issues related to education, immigration and abortion rights.—AFP

Japan pledges \$25 mln for ADB's new climate financing scheme

JAPAN will contribute \$25 million to help countries in the Asia-Pacific region address the issue of climate change via a new financing mechanism by the Asian Development Bank, Finance Minister Shunichi Suzuki said Thursday.

The funds will go to the Innovative Finance Facility for Climate in Asia and the Pacific, through which the ADB plans to extend loans of up to \$15 billion for incentivizing action on the issue in a region that is vulnerable to climate-related disasters.

"In recent years, the region has frequently suffered damage from extreme weather events and large-scale natural disasters caused by climate change. Therefore, a balanced approach toward adaptation, in addition to mitigation measures, is also essential," Suzuki said at a meeting of the ADB's board of governors.

Suzuki also emphasized the need to achieve "ambitious" net zero emissions targets while

preventing or managing trade-offs between climate action and other important development objectives in areas such as health and education.

Besides Japan, Denmark, South Korea, Sweden, Britain and the United States are the initial partners of the ADB's new financing scheme.

More than 40 per cent of all climate-related disasters that have occurred in this century took place in the Asia-Pacific region, according to the ADB, which

has set a goal of providing \$100 billion in climate financing to developing member states between 2019 and 2030.

Climate change is among the key agendas for Japan, which holds the rotating presidency of the Group of Seven. Other areas considered important include issues related to debt and the provision of universal health coverage. In his speech, Suzuki acknowledged the higher risks faced by low- and middle-income nations concerning debt vulnerabilities amid the COVID-19 pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

He welcomed the recent launch of a coordinated debt restructuring programme for the bilateral creditors of crisis-hit Sri Lanka, with Japan, India and France announcing the start of the process in April. China is also a major creditor.

"It is essential to improve debt data transparency and accuracy to prevent future debt crises," the minister added. — Kyodo

German exports slump in March

GERMAN exports fell sharply in March compared to a month ago, a sign of fragility in Europe's biggest economy, which recently reported stagnating growth for the first quarter.

Germany exported 129 billion euros' worth of goods in March, down 5.2 per cent from February, data published by federal statistics agency Destatis showed.

The drop came after two

straight months of growth. Imports fell as well during March, by 6.4 per cent to 113 billion euros, leading to a trade surplus of 16.7 billion euros for the month. Demand for German goods was down across the board, with exports to EU states slumping 6.2 per cent.

Particularly concerning was a 10.9 per cent drop in exports to the United States, a key market for Europe. — AFP

US pick Ajay Banga confirmed as new World Bank president

THE World Bank confirmed Wednesday that Ajay Banga will be its next president, handing him the reins at a pivotal time as it looks to reshape its role to better address climate change.

"The Board looks forward to working with Mr Banga on the World Bank Group Evolution process," the development lender wrote in a statement published shortly after executives voted to approve his leadership for a five-year term.

The bank said it looked forward to working with Banga on its "ambitions and efforts aimed at tackling the toughest development challenges facing developing countries."

David Malpass who is stepping down early amid criticism over his stance on climate issues. — AFP

Africa eyes potential bounty from space

AFTER decades on the sidelines, African countries are venturing into the space industry, hoping to reap rewards in agriculture, disaster prevention and security.

Ivory Coast, which recently hosted a "NewSpace Africa" conference organized by the African Union, has announced the creation of a space agency and plans to build

the country's first nanosatellite by 2024. In April, Kenya's first working satellite was put into orbit by a SpaceX rocket launched from the United States.—AFP

Adidas posts loss as Kanye West split ‘hurts’ business

GERMAN sportswear giant Adidas reported Friday a hefty first-quarter loss, acknowledging its split from controversial US rapper Kanye West was “hurting” its bottom line.

The company booked a net loss of 39 million euros (\$43 million) from January to March, compared to a profit of 482 million euros in the period a year earlier.

The end of its highly successful Yeezy line, designed in collaboration with West, hit sales by about 400 million euros in the quarter.

But overall sales were not as bad as feared,

with analysts seeing early signs of improving fortunes, and Adidas’s share price rose 7.5 percent in the afternoon on the Frankfurt Stock Exchange.

Adidas halted its tie-up with West — now known as Ye — in October after he made a series of anti-Semitic outbursts.

The loss of Yeezy, along with falling revenues for its lifestyle brands, “are of course hurting us”, said new CEO Bjorn Gulden in a statement. But there was no news Friday about what it would do with its huge stock of Yeezy trainers. — AFP

“The Corolla is quick, their metal is bold, they work well,” the 50-year-old told AFP. Other cars “are flimsy like paper” by comparison, he insists. — AFP

terly net profit, boosted by rising interest rates and its rescue of the UK arm of failed US lender Silicon Valley Bank. — AFP

Thai parties in financial bidding war as election heats up

IN the searing hot sun, Preeya Phunatung toils long hours on a rural Thai construction site to support her family of four.

It is a struggle for Preeya to buy even staples such as rice, fish sauce and cooking oil because her \$9-a-day income is not keeping pace with inflation.

Thailand goes to the polls on 14 May with major parties promising to ease poverty as low-income households struggle for survival in the face of soaring prices and deep-seated inequality.

But analysts warn that the populist policies being bandied about will do little to address structural problems that have left Thai economic growth lagging behind its Southeast Asian neighbours.

“I live from hand to mouth,” Preeya told AFP at her small house in the eastern province of Sa Kaeo, where the number of people living below the poverty line jumped by almost 25 per cent between 2020 and 2021, according to official data.

“Life after the pandemic is very hard.”

Thailand has nearly 30 billionaires, according to Forbes magazine, but it also has one of the highest rates of income inequality in East Asia and the Pacific.

In the wake of the 2014 military coup that brought current Prime Minister Prayut Chan-O-Cha to power, momentum in reducing poverty that had built up since the 1990s was lost.

The Covid-19 pandemic

deepened the stagnation and the kingdom has struggled to bounce back.

Thailand is the only country in Southeast Asia apart from coup-hit Myanmar where GDP

has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels, according to the World Bank.

‘Suffered enough’

As the election campaign

enters the home straight, parties across the political spectrum are locked in a bidding war to attract the country’s millions of low-income voters — pledging higher wages, pension increases and debt relief.

The main opposition Pheu Thai party has promised a \$300 handout to every Thai over 16 to stimulate the economy.

Srettha Thavisin, a wealthy former real estate mogul and one of Pheu Thai’s candidates for prime minister, insists the \$16 billion policy can be paid for without tax increases.

Pheu Thai, linked to the ultra-rich Shinawatra family whose patriarch Thaksin won two elections on a raft of populist economic pledges, is leading in the polls. — AFP

Russia says US masterminded drone attack on Kremlin

RUSSIA on Thursday accused the US of masterminding a drone attack on the Kremlin and said sabotage attacks by Ukraine behind Russian lines had reached

“unprecedented momentum”.

The Kremlin has said Ukraine carried out the attack with two drones aiming to kill President Vladimir Putin — a

charge which Kyiv has denied.

“Decisions on such attacks are not made in Kyiv, but in Washington,” Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said.

“Kyiv only does what it is told to do.”

“Washington should understand clearly that we know this,” he said.

Peskov said Putin was working in his office in the Kremlin as normal on Thursday but added that security measures in Moscow would be beefed up following the attack, which the Kremlin said occurred in the night between Tuesday and Wednesday.

“Of course, everything will be strengthened. Everything has already been strengthened in preparation for the Victory Day parade” on 9 May, he said. — AFP

Ukraine ‘realistic’ about not joining NATO during war: Zelensky

UKRAINIAN President Volodymyr Zelensky said Thursday that Ukraine was “realistic” that it would not be able to join NATO while still fighting Russia.

“We are realistic, we know we will not be in NATO during the war,” Zelensky said after meeting Dutch and Belgian Prime Ministers Mark Rutte and Alexander De Croo.

“But we want a very clear message that we will be in NATO after the war,” Zelensky added. — AFP

Berlin police probe Zelensky visit leak

BERLIN police said Thursday they would open an investigation after details of a possible trip by Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky to Germany attributed to the force appeared in the media.

Investigators had launched a probe “into a suspected betrayal of secrets... in relation to a possible visit by a state president”, police said in a statement.

Local daily BZ on Wednesday reported that law enforcement in Berlin were readying for a visit by Zelensky to the German capital in mid-May. — AFP



M6.5 quake rocks central Japan amid Golden Week holidays, 1 dies

AN earthquake with a preliminary magnitude of 6.5 rocked

Ishikawa Prefecture in central Japan and its vicinity on Friday, leaving one person dead, while some buildings collapsed and traffic and events were disrupted during the nation’s Golden Week holidays.

The quake occurred at 2:42 pm, registering an upper six on the Japanese seismic intensity

scale of seven in Suzu, at the tip of the Noto Peninsula in the Sea of Japan coast prefecture, according to the Japan Meteorological Agency.

It was the largest among a series of quakes that have been hitting the Noto area since December 2020. — Kyodo

Maduro accuses Biden administration of 'looting' Venezuelan oil firm

VENEZUELAN President Nicolas Maduro on Thursday accused US President Joe Biden's government of "looting" over the proposed sale of Caracas' most valuable overseas asset, oil refiner Citgo.

A court in the US state of

Delaware ruled that shares of Citgo, a subsidiary of Venezuelan state oil company PDVSA, can be sold to pay off its creditors, with the US Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control endorsing the move on Monday.

"What Joe Biden's govern-

ment is doing is one of the thefts, one of the biggest lootings that has ever taken place against any nation in the world and we reject it," Maduro said during an event in Caracas.

Venezuelan Vice-President Delcy Rodriguez indicated Wednesday that the acts "are absolutely null and void," while accusing Washington of green-lighting the "judicial auction of Citgo".

Maduro's 2018 reelection was not recognized by Washington, which considers the results of those polls fraudulent, and for some time recognized opposition candidate Juan Guaido as the country's leader. The next year, Washington ramped up sanctions against Caracas, which were first imposed in 2015 over the brutal repression of anti-government protests. — AFP

Pomp and protests as UK holds first coronation in 70 years

BRITAIN'S first coronation in 70 years takes place on Saturday, with Charles III crowned king in an elaborate Christian ceremony steeped in solemn ritual and more than a millennium of history.

The coronation, the first of a British king since 1937, is the religious confirmation of his accession after the death of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, last September.

Much of the Anglican service at London's Westminster Abbey — which will also crown

Charles's second wife Camilla as queen — would be recognizable to the 74-year-old king's forebears 1,000 years ago.

But there will also be a clear departure with the involvement of women bishops, minority faith leaders and a more diverse and representative guest list of British society than the lords and ladies of old.

So too is the environmental theme at the ceremony, including vegan anointing oil and recycled ceremonial garb, reflecting Charles's lifelong championing

of sustainability and biodiversity.

Coronation organizer the Earl Marshal, Duke of Norfolk Edward Fitzalan-Howard, called the event "a proud moment" in British history.

"During the coronation, the king will swear before God and the nation to serve our country as head of state, upholding our laws and maintaining justice for all," he told reporters this week.

Opposition

The duke, whose family has organized state events since 1483, said the coronation was also a chance to unite Britain and the 56-nation Commonwealth grouping, which Charles also heads.

Not everyone is in the mood to celebrate, however. Republican opponents who want an elected head of state plan to protest on the day with signs declaring "Not my king".

Younger people, too, say the coronation — and the monarchy in general — leaves them cold, according to polling. — AFP

China, Russia pledge to boost ties, SCO cooperation

CHINA and Russia have agreed to further develop bilateral relations and build the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) into a platform for mutually beneficial cooperation.

At a meeting with Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov Thursday on the sidelines of the SCO foreign ministers' meeting, Chinese State Councilor and Foreign Minister Qin Gang said that China is ready to join hands with Russia to implement the important consensus reached between heads of state of the two countries and strengthen strategic communication.

The two countries have conducted frequent exchanges at all levels and strengthened cooperation in various fields, said Qin.

Lavrov said that Chinese

President Xi Jinping's visit to Russia in March has injected great impetus into the development of bilateral relations. Russia is willing to jointly push forward cooperation with China in various areas and elevate bilateral ties to a new high.

Both sides agreed to plan and arrange high-level exchanges and exchanges at various levels, enhance economic and trade cooperation, deepen cultural and people-to-people exchanges, and facilitate personnel exchanges.

They vowed to enhance communication and coordination with other SCO member states, and maintain the SCO solidarity and cooperation so as to build the SCO into a platform for mutually beneficial cooperation. — Xinhua

Top Colombian court nullifies election of key Petro ally

COLOMBIA'S top administrative court annulled on Thursday the election of the Senate president, Roy Barreras, a key figure in the ambitious reform drive of President Gustavo Petro.

The court, known as the Council of State, declared that Barreras did not leave his old political party soon enough to seek re-election with his current party, violating electoral rules.

The senator breached "his duty to quit his seat 12 months before the registration deadline

for congressional elections for the period 2022-2026", the court said.

Barreras was a congressman for the Union Party for the People between 2018 and 2022, but was reelected in March 2022 as a senator for the Historic Pact for Colombia, the leftist coalition that Petro heads.

Barreras said on Twitter that he would respect the decision since "court rulings must be respected even when they seem unjust to me". — AFP
