- 5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

The remains of the Sayadaw were kept at the Aye Kaba Beikman temporary chamber at the Bhamo Monastery for public obeisance and the final rites of the Sayadaw were held to incinerate the remains on 6 June.

Yesterday morning, the Mandalay Region chief minister and party arrived at the cremation area and paid homage to member of the State Central Working Committee of the Sangha Presiding Patron of Mandalay Masoeyein Taikthit Agga Maha Pandita Bhaddanta Vasettha Bhivamsa and members of the Sangha. Then, disciple monks and the chief minister and officials climbed



MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to 639,379 after 70 new cases were reported on 7 June 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. Therefore, a total of 10,703,628 laboratory samples were examined to date and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached 639,379. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 618,363 including 46 new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered 19,494 on 7-6-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. Illegal consumer goods, foodstuffs, cosmetics and vehicles confiscated

THE on-duty teams under the supervision of the Customs Department impounded 720 kilogrammes of belts (worth K2,721,600) and two kinds of goods (worth K9,357,894) including 320 quartz slabs that exceeded 61 days of VPA from two containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint on 2 June, two kinds of goods (worth K11,049,043) including a Sencon Semi Auto Enamel Rater that exceeded 61 days of VPA from luggage at the Yangon International Airport (Import Desk) and 3,600 bottles of Justus beer (worth K3 million) without official documents at the Yepu permanent checkpoint on 5 June. The action was taken under Customs

procedures.

Action on a tip-off, a combined team under the management of the Mandalay Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force confiscated 51 kinds of cosmetics (worth K321,237,096) including 20,760 PJN hair colour without official documents at warehouse 2 in the Toepywagyi compound in Amarapura township on 4 June. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

An on-duty team captured three kinds of goods (worth K7.09 million) including 9,000 boxes of Lactasoy without official documents from a Nissan Diesel vehicle (worth about K30 million) at the Thanlwin Bridge (Mawlamyine) on 5 June. The

Fuel prices rebounds in domestic market

THE prices of fuel oil (diesel and Octane 92) have risen again to above K2,000 per litre in the domestic fuel oil market.

The prices increased to K2,010 per litre for Octane 92, K2,120 per litre for Octane 95, K1,945 for diesel and K2,025 for premium diesel.

The domestic fuel prices are set depending on the price index set by Mean of Platts Singapore (MOPS), pricing basis for many refined products in southeast Asia, according to the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil.

Last August 2022, the oil prices surged to K2,605 per litre for Octane 92, K2,670 for Octane 95, K3,330 for premium diesel and K3,245 for diesel.

The committee is therefore governing the fuel oil storage and distribution sector effectively not to have a shortage of oil in the domestic market and to ensure price stability for energy consumers. The Petroleum Products Regulatory Department, under the guidance of the committee, is issuing the daily reference rate for oil to offer a reasonable price to energy consumers. The reference rate in Yangon Region is set on the MOPS's price assessment, shipping cost, premium insurance, tax, other general cost and health profit percent.

The rates for regions and states other than Yangon are evaluated after adding the transportation cost and the retail reference rates daily cover on the state-run newspapers and are posted on the media and official website and Facebook page of the department on a daily basis starting from 4 May.

The committee is inspecting the fuel stations whether they are overcharging or not. The authorities are taking actions against those retailers of fuel stations under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law 2017 if they are found

overcharging rather than the set reference rate.

As per the statement, 90 per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. The domestic fuel price is highly correlated with international prices. The State is steering the market to mitigate the loss between the importers, sellers and the energy consumers. Consequently, the government is trying to distribute the oil at a reasonable price compared to those of regional countries.

Some countries levied higher tax rates and hiked oil prices than Myanmar. However, Malaysia's oil sector receives government subsidies and the prices are about 60 per cent cheaper than Myanmar. Every country lays down different patterns of policy to fix the oil prices. Myanmar also levies only a lower tax rate on fuel oil and strives for the energy consumers to buy the oil at a cheaper rate. — NN/EM

HOMAS Henry Digges La Touche (1855-1938) following schooling in Shrewsbury was awarded a degree in Geology in 1880 under Professor Hughes at St. Johns College Cambridge. He joined the Geological Survey of India in October 1881, two years after R. D. Oldham (1858-1936), and was, when he retired, one of the few geologists to complete 25 years in the Geological Survey of India.

La Touche married Anna (Nancy) Handy in 1891. Although Nancy accompanied him on his early fieldwork, the arrival of children and his appointment to remote field areas led to long separations, often exceeding 8 months and on one occasion last two years. Each year fieldwork started in October and continued to March, and the findings of the work were written up in the recess during the hot summer months in headquarters in Calcutta. Throughout the time of these prolonged separations, Tom and Nancy wrote to each other daily. Tom's letters to Nancy and the children, who lived initially in the hill stations of India, and eventually in Ireland, thus form a fairly

continuous diary of important events and affairs in the office, and in the field. More importantly, they provide an illuminating view of the lifestyle and personal interactions of the dozen Geological Survey Officers who were based in Calcutta. La Touche was appointed Acting Director when Sir Thomas Holland went on leave on 2 August 1909 until his retirement in 1910. He died in 1938 at Cambridge aged 82, two years after Oldham, having just read the proofs of his final work, a massive compilation of geological locations in India with their geographical coordinates. La Touche reported the eco-

nomic minerals of Burma in his "Indian Minerals of Economic Value" in 1918. Of all resources the ruby and jadestone could be extracted as follows:

Ruby

Burma have long been known as the principal source of the world's supply of the gem. Caesar Fredericke, who visited Pegu in 1569, alludes to the brisk trade in rubies that was then carried on; and reference to the mines was also made about the same time (1586) by the English traveller Ralph Fitch who **BV THAN HTUN**

places them in the district 'Caplan' (Kyatpyin), five days journey from Ava. Neither of these travellers was permitted to visit the mines, and the first authentic account of them was given in 1833 by Pere Guiseppe d\(\' Amato. He describes the workings at KYATPYIN (22° 53'30": 96°28'), and the system of mining practised by the Burmese, which may still be seen in operation in that neighbourhood.

Three distinct ruby tracts are known to occur in Upper Burma, widely separated from each other; but in all cases, the original source of the gems is found to be a highly crystalline limestone, probably a member of the Archean group. A fourth tract is reported to have been discovered in the Moemeik State in 1913, but as yet no definite information regarding this occurrence has been published.

Mandalay: Sagyin (22° 17' 96° 7'). About the year 1870, these mines were in charge of a Mr Bredemeyer, whose account of them is referred to by Ball. The locality was reported on by Hayden in 1895. A group of hills, composed of crystalline limestone largely quarried for statuary marble, rises abruptly from the alluvial plain on the left bank of the Irrawaddy, about 16 miles to the N. of Mandalay. Moisture, acting along the joint planes of the rock, has caused it to become scammed with fissures and hollows, filled with the insoluble clayey material supplied by the disintegration of the limestone. These fissures are followed up and the material extracted from them is washed. Sapphires and spinels, as well as rubies, are obtained here.

Myitkyina: Naniazeik (25° 37': 96° 37). Earthquake kills one nun, one woman in Maubin Township



THE Department of Meteorology and Hydrology announced that an earthquake with a Richter Scale 4.8 occurred at a depth of 10 kilometres at a latitude of 16.98 degrees north and a longitude of 95.67 degrees east, about 33 miles west-northwest of Kaba Aye seismological observatory, and about five miles south-southeast

of Nyaungdon at 4:23 pm on 7

June 2023.

As a result of the earthquake, the historical Shwebonmyint Pagoda in Maubin, Ayeyawady Region, was destroyed, and the monastery building of Mogok Meditation Centre 44 and some parts of Maubin University collapsed. A nun and one woman were killed, according to a local.

"The earthquake lasted

some time. It was a little strong earthquake. What we know recently is the collapse of the Maubin Mogok Meditation Centre building. One nun and one woman aged about 60 were crushed by broken bricks and died. There is damage in other places," a rescue official said.

"At around 4:30 pm, the earthquake struck. A nun and



a meditation practitioner were crushed to death by bricks. The building collapsed while the cleaning work was being done. The nun is Daw Wimala, I don't know who the woman is. At around 5 pm when aftershocks followed, the diamond orb atop the Shwebonmyint Pagoda tilted to the right. The Maubin University's convocation was partly damaged, but no one was injured," said a local person.

There were five earthquakes

in Maubin Township yesterday, once at 2:50 pm, once at 4:20 pm, once at 4:55 pm and once after 5:00 pm.

The earthquake also hit Nyaungdon, Bogale, Pantanaw, Mawlamyinekyun, Wakema, Pyapon, Hinthada, Kyaiklat, Kyonmangay, Kyonpyaw, Danubyu, and Yangon. — Htun Htun/ KZL

Mumbai costliest city to live for expatriates in India: Mercer Report

MUMBAI emerged as the most expensive Indian city to live for expatriates for the second year in a row, a new report showed on 7 June. Mumbai and Delhi were among the top 35 most expensive cities in Asia for expatriates.

According to Mercer's 2023 Cost of Living survey, Mumbai has witnessed an increase of 13 to 15 per cent in rental prices in 2023 as compared to 2022. This was the highest among all other cities surveyed for the report.

In Bengaluru (Bangalore), New Delhi, Pune, and Chennai, housing rentals rose five to seven per cent. In Hyderabad and Kolkata, the rents rose a modest two to three per cent. Notably, Kolkata had the lowest cost of living for expatriates in India.

The survey was based on an analysis of 227 cities across five continents. Hong Kong retained its spot as the most expensive city to live in as an expat. It was

followed by Singapore and Zurich.

The least expensive was Cuba's Havana. It was followed by Pakistan's Karachi and Islamabad.

Almost all the Indian cities surveyed showed a rise in the cost of living. It is mainly due to a rise in rents and the cost of essential commodities like fruits, vegetables, and milk.

Rahul Sharma, India mobility leader at Mercer, said: "We have observed a change in the relative positioning of Indian cities in the global ranking, which can be attributed to multiple factors. In particular, the shifting order is partly influenced by currency volatility and the inflationary increase in prices of goods and services in other regions, such as Europe, that has

played a role in pushing down the overall rankings of Indian cities."

The cost of essential food items at home, including fruits, vegetables, milk, and dairy products, has risen across all cities, with Kolkata and Pune being the most budget-friendly options.

Meanwhile, Bangalore, Chennai, and Hyderabad have experienced an increase in alcohol prices, with Chennai having the highest prices in this category.

Personal care expenses have increased in all cities, with Mumbai being the most expensive and Kolkata offering more affordable options.

Additionally, utilities such as electricity and internet/broadband have seen an upward trend in most surveyed Indian cities. Finally, Delhi and Mumbai have the highest costs for dining out, while Pune provides the most economical options, followed by Bengaluru and Hyderabad.

However, despite a rise in costs, Indian cities continue to be less costly as compared to other countries globally.

"Mumbai (147) and Delhi (169), offer a cost-efficient destination for global multinational corporations (MNCs) looking to set up operations overseas, with a lower cost of living and expat accommodation costs compared to major cities in the Asia Pacific region like Shanghai, Beijing, and Tokyo," the report said.

OECD slightly raises world GDP growth forecast to 2.7%

THE OECD slightly raised its growth outlook for the world economy on Wednesday as inflation eases and China has dropped Covid restrictions, but it warned the recovery faces a "long road".

The Paris-based organisation forecast an economic expansion of 2.7 per cent, up from 2.6 per cent in its previous report in March, with upgrades for the United States, China and the eurozone.

But it is still under the 3.3 per cent growth recorded in 2022.

"The global economy is turning a corner but faces a long road ahead to attain strong and sustainable growth," OECD chief economist Clare Lombardelli wrote in the OECD's Economic Outlook

"The recovery will be weak by past standards," Lombardelli wrote.

The growth forecast for

2024 remains unchanged at 2.9 per cent.

Signs of stress

A drop in energy prices, the untangling of supply chain bottlenecks and China's sooner-than-expected reopening are contributing to the recovery, the OECD said.

But core inflation, which strips out volatile energy and food prices, is higher than previously expected, according to the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development.

The OECD said this may force central banks, which have already raised interest rates in efforts to tame consumer prices, to further hike borrowing costs.

"Central banks need to maintain restrictive monetary policies until there are clear signs that underlying inflationary pressures are abating," Lombardelli said.

Energy efficiency investments need to triple: IEA

INVESTMENTS in improving energy efficiency must triple this decade if the world is to keep the goal of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 Fahrenheit) within reach, the IEA said Wednesday.

The investments would allow a doubling of annual gains in energy efficiency to four per cent, resulting in a drop in energy demand and fuel consumption that would benefit consumers and provide greater energy security to nations.

The efficiency gains would "deliver vital reductions in greenhouse gas emissions and at the same time create jobs, expand energy access, reduce energy bills, decrease air pollution, and diminish countries' reliance on fossil fuel imports — among other social and economic benefits," the International Energy Agency said in a report.

The IEA, which advises nations on policy, was hosting

Wednesday an energy efficiency conference outside Paris bringing together officials and businesses from over 80 countries.

The agency noted that if existing government policies on energy efficiency were accelerated and fully implemented, that would cover about three-quarters of the necessary effort to double annual efficiency gains.

investments are expected to reach record levels this year of over \$600 billion, the IEA noted that growth in slowing due to higher interest rates, saying the level needs to reach \$1.8 trillion by 2030. "Often governments don't give (energy efficiency) as much focus as we think they should," the head of the IEA's energy efficiency division, Brian Motherway, told AFP last week.—AFP

China's exports fall 7.5% in May, adding to stimulus talk

CHINA'S exports fell in May for the first time since February, data showed Wednesday, breaking a two-month growth streak as a post-Covid rebound faded and adding to speculation that officials will unveil fresh stimulus measures. Rising global inflation, the threat of recession elsewhere and geopolitical tensions with the United States have weakened

demand for Chinese prod-

That resulted in overseas shipments sinking 7.5 per cent on-year last month, Customs figures showed, marking a sharp drop from an increase of 8.5 per cent in April and much steeper than the 1.8 per cent forecast in a Bloomerg survey.

China's exports grew in March and April, snapping a run of five straight declines, when production was disrupted by sweeping lockdowns and delays at ports when authorities enforced their strict zero-Covid policy.

And the Chinese economy expanded by 4.5 per cent in the first quarter of the year.—AFP

First restaurants in Viet Nam awarded Michelin star

Vietnamese booming food scene was awarded its first ever Michelin stars Tuesday, with four restaurants selected by the prestigious dining guide.

Three eateries in Hanoi — Gia, Tam Vi and Hibana by Koki — and one in Ho Chi Minh City — Anan Saigon — were each awarded one Michelin star.

Although there were no stars handed out to traditional street food eateries serving classics such as pho — a noodle soup — or bun cha — a vermicelli noodle dish with grilled pork — Vietnamese flavours feature heavily among the winners.

Tam Vi largely focusses on northern Vietnamese dishes including ham with periwinkle snails — served with fresh herbs, rice vermicelli noodles and fish sauce — and crab soup with spinach, a popular summer meal.

Nguyen Bao Anh, whose mother, Tam, owns the restaurant and named it after herself, said her mum "had a dream of opening a restaurant where customers could come and feel like they were eating a homecooked meal".

"The restaurant serves traditional food and I think now not many restaurants serve that kind of food that remind people of familiar flavours," Bao Anh told AFP after the awards ceremony in Hanoi.

"This award is for my mum and I'm proud of her," she added.—AFP

Heavy industrial enterprises eye green, innovative shift

IT only took a few years for a private company in north China's Tian-jin Municipality to make the transition from the steel industry to the big data sector.

This transformation stands as an example of the city's heavy industrial sector embracing a green revolution.

"Faced with challenges including the steel overcapacity and environmental protection pressure, we made up our mind to change our business," said Zhang Jian, general manager of the Tianjin GiantDC Data Technology Co Ltd.

Founded in 2019, the company's predecessor is a steel enterprise with decades of history in the Beichen District.

Both the steel and big data industries demand high in the supporting electricity facilities, making the shift possible.

In recent years, the district, a traditional industrial hub of Tianjin, has been looking for eco-friendly innovative upgrades, especially in its private sector, in a bid to respond to China's top design of sustainable development and to attract more investors.In the first quarter of this year, Beichen's private sector posted more than nine billion yuan (about 1.27 billion US dollars) in output value, accounting for 55 per cent of the district's total GDP in the period.

At the production workshop of the Masterwork Group Co Ltd a world-leading die-cutting machine, newly developed by the company, can make 9,000 sheets of products per hour.—Xinhua

Turkish lira hits new dollar low after election

THE Turkish lira sank to a new low against the dollar on Wednesday, more than a week after the re-election of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan.

The currency, which was propped up by the central bank before the presidential election, fell five per cent to 22.77 lira per dollar at around 0645 GMT. Erdogan was sworn in on Saturday after winning a historic election runoff on 28 May and named a new cabinet appointing market-friendly politician Mehmet Simsek as finance minister.

The former Merrill Lynch economist is known to oppose Erdogan's unconventional policies. He served as finance

minister between 2009 and 2015 and deputy prime minister in charge of the economy until 2018, before stepping down ahead of a series of lira crashes that year. Simsek said: "We have no choice but to return to rational ground" soon after he took office, a sign of shifting away from the unorthodox policy of lowering interest rates in order to fight inflation.—

Secret cable debunks Biden claim of being caught off guard by Kabul's sudden 2021 collapse

THE United States and its NATO allies were forced to accelerate their withdrawal from Afghanistan in the late summer of 2021 after the Taliban launched a Blitzkrieg offensive and overran all of the country's major cities in less than two weeks, prompting the NATO-backed puppet government and security forces to disintegrate.

A classified State Department assessment written on the eve of Kabul's fall to the Taliban in July 2021 challenges publicly-stated claims by Biden administration officials that the White House didn't expect the Afghan government and security forces to crumble as quickly as they did.

"What we saw was their prediction, with great accuracy, of exactly what was going to happen and what the outcome would be if they did not change their directions," House Foreign Affairs Committee member Representative Darrell Issa told media of the document, which the Biden administration agreed to let committee lawmakers look at after a months-long struggle.

According to Issa, the document also indicated that the State Department appeared to have pretty much resigned itself to the fact that billions of dollars in US military hardware would be seized by the Taliban. The battle over the so-called 'dissent cable' - an outlet for officials to express views which are contrary to official policy, was waged in Washington over the space of several months, with the House Foreign Affairs Committee threatening to hold Secretary of State Antony Blinken with contempt if he did not allow lawmakers investigating the Afghanistan withdrawal to view it.— SPUTNIK

Record 13 mln Chinese take college entrance exam

Their exams will last from two to four days, depending on their choice of subjects.

The annual exam is deemed the most important event for high school graduates, as it provides an opportunity to set the direction for their future careers.

This year's college entrance exam is the first one after China adjusted its COVID-19 response measures.—Xinhua

'World's best restaurant' to reopen in Spain as museum

SPAIN'S elBulli, repeatedly voted the world's best restaurant before it closed over a decade ago, is set to reopen as a museum dedicated to the culinary revolution it sparked.

Nestled in an isolated cove on Spain's northeastern tip, the museum is dubbed "elBulli1846" — a reference to the 1,846 dishes ground-breaking chef Ferran Adria says were developed at the eatery.

"It's not about coming here to eat, but to understand what happened in elBulli," the 61-year-old told AFP near the kitchen of the restaurant he ran for over two decades.

The museum will open on 15 June, nearly 12 years after the restaurant served its final dish to the public.

Visitors will be able to see hundreds of photos, notebooks, trophies and models made of plastic or wax that emulate some of the innovative dishes which were served at the eatery.

Adria pioneered the culinary trend known as molecular gastronomy, which deconstructs ingredients and recombines them in unexpected ways.

The results are foods with surprising combinations and textures, such as fruit foams, gazpacho popsicles and caramelized quails. -AFP

UK PM heads to Washington to meet Biden and talk tech

PRIME Minister Rishi Sunak headed to Washington Tuesday lobbying for Britain to take a lead role in regulating artificial intelligence, after a dire warning of the technology's existential dangers.

Sunak will meet President Joe Biden on Thursday for a White House summit, pledging unstinting support for Ukraine after Russia was accused of blowing up a major dam to thwart an apparent counter-offensive. But while the United States and Britain are inching closer on giving Ukraine air support, and on a robust approach to China, Sunak faces a harder sell with Biden about the UK's post-Brexit relevance elsewhere.

The need for a coordinated response on AI was underlined by Downing Street task force advisor Matt Clifford, who warned the chances of the fast-learning systems wiping out humanity within two years were "not zero". Interviewed on TalkTV, he said the world needed "to regulate them on a global scale, because it's not enough I think to regulate them nationally". - AFP

UK court rejects bid for legal review of Saudi arms sales

LONDON'S High Court on Tuesday rejected a bid for a judicial review of the UK government's decision to renew arms sales to Saudi Arabia that could be used in the war in Yemen.

A pair of judges at the court dismissed the case brought by the Campaign Against Arms Trade (CAAT), after hearing arguments earlier this year.

The UK-based NGO accuses the government of contributing to breaches of international law and the world's largest humanitarian disaster in Yemen, where conflict has claimed tens of thousands of lives in recent years.

But the judges sided with the British government, concluding there had been "continuing rationality" in a risk assessment performed by officials before restarting arms sales to Saudi Arabia in 2020.

Riyadh has intervened militarily in Yemen since 2015, leading a regional coalition supporting pro-government forces opposed to the Iran-backed Houthi rebels.

The NGO launched the legal challenge after Britain an-

nounced the sales resumption, with ministers insisting there was no clear risk that weapons would be used in a serious violation of international humanitarian law.

The government has licenced sales to Riyadh of weaponry including combat aircraft, guided bombs and missiles, with a published value since 2015 of £7.9 billion (\$9.8 billion), according to CAAT

Emily Apple, a spokesperson for the NGO, said it was "obviously disappointed with the verdict".—AFP

Beyond sushi: Japan expands veggie options to tempt tourists

EVEN on a weekday, there's a queue at Tokyo's vegan Izakaya Masaka, including many tourists eager to try meat-free versions of Japanese classics like fried chicken and juicy dumplings.

While millions of visitors have happily savoured Japan's fish- and meat-heavy cuisine, options for vegetarians and vegans are harder to find. Now, Tokyo and other cities are on a mission to show the country's renowned gastronomy is not off-limits to those who don't eat meat. Tina Bui, a 36-year-old vegan from San Francisco, said she was very excited to order the signature "karaage" soy fried chicken at Izakaya Masaka. She said plantbased options were limited in Japan compared to the United States, with just "enough for me to survive" a short trip.—AFP

Mexico authorities confirm human remains belong to eight missing coworkers

MEXICAN authorities said Tuesday that human remains discovered in bags in a ravine in the western state of Jalisco last week belong to eight call centre employees reported missing.

The gruesome discovery was made last week at the bottom of a 40-metre (120-foot) ravine in the municipality of Zapopan, a suburb of Guadalajara, a large industrial hub.

The authorities had launched a search for two women and six men, all aged around 30 years, who had been reported missing since around 20 May. —AFP

2 dead, 5 injured in US school graduation shooting

TWO people were killed and five injured Tuesday during a shooting near a high school graduation in the US state of Virginia, police said, the latest in an epidemic of mass shootings plaguing the country. The shooting took place around 5 pm (2100 GMT) outside a theater in the state capital of Richmond, where students from a local high school were celebrating their graduation, Richmond interim police chief Rick Edwards told reporters.—AFP

A US court on Tuesday will hear a case filed by a conservative think tank seeking to know more about the awarding of a visa to Britain's Prince Harry despite the admission in his memoir that he had used illegal drugs.

The hearing will address a complaint filed by the Washington-based Heritage Foundation under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) asking for the release of the British royal's immigration records.

The 38-year-old Harry will not be in court for the hearing -he was in London's High Court on Tuesday complaining about the "incredibly invasive" media coverage that he has endured from the British press.

The younger son of Britain's King Charles III accuses Mirror Group Newspapers — publisher of The Mirror, Sunday Mirror and the Sunday People tabloids — of illegal information gathering, including phone hacking.

In its complaint being heard in US District Court, the Heritage Foundation noted that Harry "has publicly admitted to the essential elements of a number of drug offences in both the United States and abroad."

"United States law generally renders such a person inadmissible for entry to the United States," the complaint says.—AFP
