- 5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

EOPLE can easily buy the Aungbarlay lottery through an online lottery application by using their mobile phones at any time anywhere, said Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing at the launching ceremony of the Aungbarlay online lottery system at Myanmar International Convention Centre-II in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

In his speech, the Senior General said that people criticize the weakness of the Aungbarlay lottery ticket system, especially requesting to solve the problem of higher prices of lottery tickets than the set price.

In addition to the sale of current Aungbarlay lottery tickets, the Aungbarlay online lottery system was arranged for people to buy them at a set price. People can easily buy the Aungbarlay lottery through an online

lottery application by using their mobile phones at any time an-

People will have easy access to buying lottery tickets and sending payments for lottery tickets through the Aungbarlay online lottery application. SMS will be sent to the mobile phones of winners in the lottery. Small prizes for winning the lottery will be sent to winners online or to the banking accounts of winners through electronic techniques.

The Senior General said that the digital lottery platform linking digital technology and mobile payment system was introduced to the people for launching the Aungbarlay online lottery application. It aims to increase the revenue of the State, develop the digital economic infrastructure and initiate a cashless society.

The Aungbarlay online lottery system was jointly implemented by relevant ministries and departments under the leadership of the Ministry of Finance and Revenue and Telecom International Myanmar Co Ltd.

The documentary video of the Aungbarlay lottery and its online system was introduced to the attendees.

 Surface wind speed in squall may reach 40 mph. Wave height will be about 9-12 feet off and along Myanmar Coasts.



96 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 8 June, total figure registers 639,475

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to 639,475 after 96 new cases were reported on 8 June 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. Therefore, a total of 10,711,639 laboratory samples were examined to date and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached 639,475. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 618,398 including 35 new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered 19,494 on 8-6-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. Perennial trees cannot immediately benefit the people but give shade and safety to posterity

AMILIES of the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army, Navy and Air) and those from relevant military commands have been holding the monsoon tree-growing ceremonies since 2011, aimed at conserving the environment, contributing to easing the impacts of climate change, giving shade and supporting the State economy on one hand.

Monsoon tree-growing ceremonies are held as serving a national duty

Speaking on the occasion, the Senior General said that Tatmadaw has been holding the monsoon tree-growing ceremonies for over a decade on a yearly basis starting from 2011. Such ceremonies aim to sustain the forest resources of the State and conserve the environment and valuable ecosystems as a national duty.

Since 2011, families of Tatmadaw (Army, Navy and Air) have been planting more than 180,000 trees in order to conserve the environs of Yezin Dam and the ecosystem by holding monsoon-tree growing ceremonies, more than 100,000 trees of which are thriving now. The whole Tatmadaw grew more than 21 million saplings from 2011 to 2022, more than 15 million of which are thriving, accounting for more than 70 per cent.

The establishment of a forest needs to take more than 10 years. It cannot immediately benefit the people but give shade and safety to new generations. If a town and then the whole country can be greened, Myanmar will conform to the environment and will have the capacity to overcome natural disasters. Spending a large sum of money, time and labour on growing trees aims to green the State as a natural duty, so all people have to understand it and strive for the successful growing of trees.

MSME businesses must be encouraged with the guarantee for the long run to enhance the State economy: Vice-Senior General



State Administration Council Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win addresses the coordination meeting of the MSME Development Work Committee in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

MSME businesses in regions and states will be provided with monetary capital and technologies for operating their manufacturing through cooperative and private systems, said Vice-Chairman of the State Administration Council Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win at the meeting 1/2023 of the workcommittee at the Ministry of Industry in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday afternoon.

On the occasion, the Vice-Senior General, who is also Chairman of the MSME Development Work Committee, delivered an address, saying that the Senior General has given guidance on the implementation of MSME businesses with primary factors such as encouraging domestic products, the substitution of import goods and increase

of export volume. Region and state agencies need to follow the aforesaid factors in supervising the MSME businesses.

In line with the guidance of the Senior General, efforts will be made for initiating the scheme on the one region-one product. MSME businesses have to set relevant items of products with the export purpose in addition to domestic products depending on the availability of domestic raw materials. Region and state authorities need to implement plans for the potential of products.

MSME businesses in regions and states will be provided with monetary capital and technologies for operating their manufacturing through cooperative and private systems. It is necessary to help smooth

the circulation of money in the investment sector as the work process may face challenges.

The Vice-Senior General stressed the need to disseminate information to MSME businesspersons and the people in real-time and develop human resources for MSME business. MSME businesses must be encouraged with a guarantee for the long run to enhance the State economy, and these MSME businesses have to manufacture many products for economic development. As MSME businesses are still facing difficulties in manufacturing, market promotion, dissemination of information and transfer of money in trading through digital technology, it is necessary to seek the best ways and means for them.

Secretary of the work com-

mittee Deputy Minister U Yin Maung Nyunt reported on the accomplishment of the minutes of the meeting 1/2022 and the work progress of the work committee.

Deputy ministers, the Chairman of Nay Pyi Taw Council and the Chief Minister of Shan State reported on letters to be submitted to the MSME Development Work Committee.

Vice-Chairman of the work committee Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Win Shein discussed monetary affairs for the disbursement of loans to MSME businesses and loan rules and regulations.

The joint secretary of the work committee director-general of the Industrial Supervision and Inspection Department reported on approval for the letters.

Work Committee Vice-Chair-

man Union Minister for Industry Dr Charlie Than explained the amendment of the MSME development law, assignment for regions and states to prioritize the production of import-substitute goods and value-added products, trademark measures, expression of commodity facts and export information for MSME businesses into the Stateowned media, the establishment of an information mechanism to disseminate MSME information and data on the report of ASEAN SME policy index.

At the ceremony U Than Swe, Union Minister for Foreign Affairs, delivered the commemorative speech. Mr Chen Hai, Ambassador of People's Republic of China, also delivered the commemorative remarks. Union Minister for International Cooperation U Ko Ko Hlaing, Union Minister for Science and Technology Dr Myo Thein Kyaw, Union Minister for Health Dr Thet Khaing Win, Union Minister for Sports and Youth Affairs U Min Thein Zan, Union Minister for Hotels and Tourism U Aung

Thaw, Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs U Kyaw Myo Htut, Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation Dr Aung Gyi, Deputy Minister for Sports and Youth Affairs U Myo Hlaing and senior officials from the ministries concerned were also present at the ceremony. Four Agreements were signed and exchanged at the ceremony.

The Handover and Acceptance Certificate for China aided

COVID-19 Vaccine between the Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar and the Government of the People's Republic of China was signed by Dr Thet Khaing Win, Union Minister for Health and Mr Chen Hai, Ambassador of the People's Republic of China in which China provides three million doses of vaccine and syringes, worth of US\$6.9 million, for the peoples of Myanmar.

Dr Myo Thein Kyaw, Union Minister of the Ministry of Science and Technology and Mr Chen Hai, Chinese Ambassador to Myanmar exchanged the Letters on the project to provide equipment and online service to the Government Technological College (Mandalay). This project is worth RMB 717,200.

U Min Thein Zan, Union Minister of the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs and Mr Chen Hai, Ambassador of Peoples' Republic of China to Myanmar also exchanged the Letters on the project to conduct a feasibility study on the reconstruction of Aung San Stadium. As per the agreement, China will provide a grant of RMB2,000,000 to Myanmar.

The Agreement on the Transfer of Fund for Mekong-Lancang Cooperation Special Fund (2023) Projects was signed by U Kyaw Myo Htut, Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs and Mr Chen Hai, Chinese Ambassador to Myanmar. In accordance with the agreement, China will transfer over US\$3.8 million to Myanmar for 14 Mekong-Lancang Cooperation Special Fund projects to be implemented in Myanmar by seven line Ministries in the fields of agriculture, livestock research, electricity supply, environmental conservation, capacity building, science and technology, trade, and tourism. The total number of MLC Special Fund projects received by Myanmar since 2017 to date has reached to 106. Myanmar has received assistance worth US\$31.4 million through the MLC Special Fund supported

During the event, Union Minister Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung, Union Minister U Myo Thant, Union Minister Dr Thet Thet Khine, and Rakhine State Chief Minister U Htein Lin presented cash awards and certificates of honour to the athletes who won silver and bronze medals.

Then, the members of Myanmar Sepak Takraw and coaches donated K2 million to Mocha victims and the Rakhine State chief minister received the cash donation.

Then, the team led by Union Minister Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung attended the coordination meeting on relief and rehabilitation processes together with members of the Rakhine State disaster management committee and Tatmadaw senior officers.

During the meeting, Union Minister Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung highlighted the intention of the meeting to approve the number of losses and inventory lists of Mocha-hit townships, timely distribution of relief items by sea routes or air, systematic distribution to the people who really need the items in prioritized

groups and completed work procedures and ongoing work plans for rescue and rehabilitation processes.

Then, the military senior officers who are closely supervising the rehabilitation processes in Buthidaung, Rathedaung, Kyauktaw, MraukU, Thandwe, Pauktaw, Manaung, Yanbye,

Ponnagyun, Minbya, Myebon, Maungtaw and Sittway townships explained the current work plans and deputy ministers and officials of respective committees coordinated the discussion.

The Rakhine State chief minister also reported on the effective use of allotted funds, separate inventory of affected MSMEs and distribution of relief and rehabilitation materials.

Union Minister Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung made proper instructions and concluded the meeting.

He also attended the regular coordination meeting held at the Rakhine State government office in the evening and gave certain

Special medics and rapid response teams were sent to Rakhine State to offer healthcare services after Cyclone Mocha and there were 13,881 outpatients and 26,850 inpatients at the general hospitals and 68,750 patients at the rural health centres and branches between 16 May and 8 June. Rapid response teams also added water purification tablets 4,572 times and conducted 7,996 health awareness campaigns.

Special medical units offered healthcare services and a total of 5,748 patients—318 in Rathedaung, 746 in Sittway, 1,150 in Minbya, 961 in Kyauktaw, 275 in Ponnagyun, 727 in Pauktaw, 848 in Manaung, 190 in Buthidaung and 533 in Maungtaw township-received medical treatment.

Health workers in Rakhine State also conduct preventive measures and health awareness programmes to prevent diarrhoeal disease and other communicable diseases after the storm. — MNA/KTZH

STROKE occurs when blood circulation is cut off in the brain—causing a medical emergency that warrants immediate attention. When blood doesn't reach brain cells, they don't get the oxygen and nutrients they need and begin to die within minutes.

As a result, you can experience facial drooping, weakness in the limbs, confusion, slurred speech, and severe headache, among other symptoms. Knowing the symptoms of stroke and seeking medical care quickly is critical to prevent serious complications or death from occurring.

Common Symptoms

There are two main types of strokes: ischemic and hemorrhagic. Generally, symptoms of stroke tend to be similar despite the type of stroke you or someone else is having. However, symptoms can range in severity depending on the artery (blood vessel) in the brain that is affected.

Strokes can be very dangerous-and not only can they lead to permanent disability, but they're also the fifth leading cause of death in the US That's why it's important to look out for the following symptoms:

- Numbness: Feeling numb, having a droopy face, or experiencing paralysis on one side of the body is common. You may feel weak or unable to move during this time.
- **Cognitive (brain-related)** symptoms: Cognitive symptoms of a stroke can set on quickly. These include sudden bouts of confusion, slurred or abnormal speech, difficulty understanding what others are saying, and problems with
- Visual symptoms: A stroke can also disrupt your eyes, causing symptoms such as temporary loss of vision in one or both eyes, blurriness, and difficulty seeing and focusing
- **Motor symptoms:** It's also common to experience difficulties with movement, such as a loss of balance, difficulty walking, dizziness, and loss of motor control.
- Other symptoms: Some people might have a severe headache that suddenly arises with no other known cause, nausea, and vomiting.

Illegal timbers, consumer goods, foodstuffs and vehicles seized

COMBINED teams under the management of the Taninthayi Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force confiscated a Honda Fit car (estimated value of K1.7 million) without official documents near Zaha village in Dawei township, a Hijet car (estimated value of K3 million) without official documents at the 10th-Mile checkpoint in Kawthoung township, a Toyota Probox car (approximately K2.5 million) without official documents near the 7th Junction traffic light in Dawei township, a Honda Fit car (estimated value of K2.5 million) without official documents near the market in Dawei township, 1,920 bottles of Chang beer (worth K3.52 million), 720 bottles of Leo beer (worth K372,000), 36 bottles of Black and White whisky (worth K1.11 million) and 12 bottles of Bland 285 (worth K480,000) at the Manyadana bus stand in the highway bus terminal compound in Dawei township on 5 June. The action was taken under relevant procedures.

In addition, a combined duty at the Mayanchaung per-

team captured 450 packages of illegal second-hand clothing (worth K112.5 million) at the H-220 warehouse in Chanmyathazi township, Mandalay Region, on 5 June. The action was taken under Customs procedures

The action was taken under the Forest Law and Export and Import Law.

The Customs team on duty at the Mayanchaung per-

manent checkpoint captured two kinds of goods (worth K3.75 million) including 1,200 Lady Wear without official documents from a Hyundai bus (estimated value of K30 million) heading to Yangon from Myawady on 6 June. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Timely repair to power lines damaged by Mocha in Rakhine State

Relief materials are being delivered in time by planes and helicopters of Tatmadaw (Air), and as of yesterday, 483 tonnes of relief materials plus 3,254 military and departmental personnel who will assist in the rehabilitation work were transported.

675 million people worldwide without electricity: report

A full 675 million people worldwide still lack access to electricity, mainly in sub-Saharan Africa, according to a report published Tuesday by several international organizations. Despite significant efforts and some progress, the world continues to face a dramatic energy access gap, according to the report by the **International Energy Agency** (IEA), the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA), the United Nations Statistics Division, the World Bank and the World Health Organization.

The report cautioned that the world remained off track to ensure clean and affordable energy access for all by 2030 one of the so-called Sustainable Development Goals set by all UN countries in 2015.

The world has seen "a recent slowdown in the global pace of electrification," World Bank vice president for infrastructure

ple living without electricity has been cut in half in the past decade, from 1.1 billion in 2010, 675

million people were still doing without in 2021, the report said. Around 80 per cent of them live in sub-Saharan Africa, where the electricity access deficit has remained basically unchanged since 2010, the report said.

It highlighted progress elsewhere though, in particular the increased rate of using renewables in the power sector, but warned this progress was "insufficient" to reach the UNset targets.

"While the clean energy transition is moving faster than many think, there is still a great deal of work needed to deliver sustainable, secure and affordable access to modern energy services for the billions of people who live without it," Fatih Birol, IEA executive director, said in the statement.

Citing IRENA data, the report also cautioned that public financial flows supporting clean energy in poorer countries had been decreasing even before the Covid pandemic hit.—AFP

THE growth outlook for Italy's expected to last through the end of this year, the country's main statistical entity said on Tuesday. The country's National Institute

of Statistics (ISTAT) said in its "Prospects for the Italian Economy in 2023-2024" report that gross domestic product (GDP) is projected to grow by 1.2 per cent this year and by 1.1 per cent in 2024.

Both figures are well below the 3.7 per cent growth rate registered in 2022, but above ISTAT's earlier estimates for both years.

The estimate also shows that the economy is expected to continue its recovery from its 0.1 per cent contraction in the final quarter of 2022. ISTAT data released last week showed that the economy grew by 0.6 per cent in the first quarter of 2023, meaning that the country has avoided a technical recession, which is defined as two consecutive quarters of negative growth. Combined with the projection for the full year, economic growth should speed up.—AFP

US steps up crypto crackdown with Coinbase suit

IN their second major action against a big crypto player in two days, US regulators sued Coinbase on Tuesday, alleging its failure to register as a securities exchange venue exposed investors to risk.

The Securities and Ex-

change Commission charged that the largest digital currency trading platform in the United States had made billions of dollars by "unlawfully facilitating the buying and selling of crypto asset securities."

Shares of Coinbase tumbled

on news of the lawsuit, which comes on the heels of charges unveiled Monday against cryptocurrency exchange Binance and founder Changpeng Zhao for numerous alleged securities law violations.

Hackers issue 'ultimatum' over payroll data breach

A cybercrime gang reportedly based in Russia has issued "an ultimatum" to British and other companies targeted in a recent large-scale hack of payroll data, the BBC reported on Wednesday.

The Clop group has been blamed by cybersecurity experts for the breach announced last week, which saw payroll data of more than 100,000 staff stolen at firms including the BBC, British Airways and high street pharmacy Boots.

The hacking gang is now said to have posted a notice on the dark web in broken English warning those affected to email them before June 14 or face the private data being published, the BBC said.

"This is announcement to educate companies who use Progress MOVEit product that chance is that we download a lot of your data as part of exceptional exploit," a blog post purportedly by Clop stated, according to the broadcaster.

It went on to urge victim organisations to send an email to the gang to begin a negotiation on its dark web portal, it added.—AFP

Pullback in exports widens US trade gap in April

THE US trade deficit grew in April on a pullback in exports, bringing the gap to its widest since October 2022, according to government data released on Wednesday.

Although the country's imports have been boosted by resilient consumer spending, analysts expect this trend to weaken as well going forward, while tighter lending conditions weigh on investments.

The anticipation is that trade could bring negative growth to gross domestic product in the second quarter of the year.

In April, the overall trade deficit was \$74.6 billion, expanding slightly less than expected by \$14 billion, according to Commerce Department data.

Exports fell by \$9.2 billion to \$249 billion in the month, while imports edged up by \$4.8 billion to \$323.6 billion.

"Net foreign trade

often is sidelined in discussions of headline GDP growth, but it has been a huge swing factor since Covid," said Pantheon Macroeconomics economists Ian Shepherdson and Kieran Clancy in a recent report.

They added that weakening in foreign trade will likely be "accompanied by a further drag from the inventory component, and a steep drop in investment in business equipment, making an outright drop in headline GDP more likely."

The slide in exports came on the back of a decrease in value of goods shipments, such as crude oil and fuel oil, along with some consumer goods.

Imports of goods picked up with support from auto vehicles and parts, as well as some industrial supplies and materials. — AFP

Rights group sues Ethiopian Airlines for 'discriminating' against Tigrayans

NATIONAL flag carrier Ethiopian Airlines has been summoned for a court hearing Friday over claims by a human rights group that it discriminated against travellers from Tigray, according to court documents seen by AFP.

The airline, which has

a monopoly on domestic flights, resumed air links between the capital Addis Ababa and the Tigray region after a peace deal was signed in November 2022 ending two years of conflict in northern Ethiopia.

But according to Ethiopian organization Human Rights First, the airline banned the sale of tickets for flights from two working airports in Tigray -- in the capital Mekele and the city of Shire -- to Tigrayans aged between 15 and 60. The "only exceptions" were for mothers travelling with

children, or people with a medical letter, according to a member of Human Rights First, who spoke to AFP on condition of anonymity.

According to the group's lawsuit, Ethiopian Airlines also systematically applied the maximum fare for flights from Tigray to the Ethiopian capital.

Ethiopian Airlines, which is wholly stateowned, has rejected the claims in a written response to the civil court, and called for them to be dismissed. — AFP

Japan dumps seawater into tunnel built for Fukushima nuke wastewater discharge

JAPAN has started dumping seawater into an underwater tunnel built to release nuclear-contaminated water into the ocean from the crippled Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant, local media reported on Tuesday.

Tokyo Electric Power Company (TEPCO), the plant's operator, said the process started on Monday afternoon, according to the national broadcaster NHK.

While Japan's plan to discharge radioactive

water into the ocean has been facing raging opposition from home and abroad, Monday's move was conducted without

any early announcement.

According to TEP-CO, the tunnel, the structure of which was completed in April, is expected to be filled with about 6,000 tonnes of seawater by around Tuesday noon. Once filled with water, it will guide nuclear-contaminated water from the plant to a point about one kilometre offshore. — Xinhua

EU countries try to thrash out refugee burden-sharing

EU interior ministers meeting Thursday will seek agreement on a long-stalled revision of the bloc's asylum and migration rules that is aimed at making burden-sharing fairer.

But diplomats cautioned the odds of a deal were still "50-50", with increasing numbers of European Union members adopting hardline policies on the issue.

The proposal on the table at the meeting in Luxembourg calls for compulsory solidarity among EU countries, but with an option of showing that in one of two ways.

Its priority is for EU countries to share the hosting of asylum-seekers, taking in many that arrive in nations on the bloc's outer rim, mainly Greece and

A preliminary agreement of the EU's 27 countries on that basis would open the way to negotiations with the European Parliament for legislation that could be adopted before European elections in June next year.

The difficult reform has jumped up the bloc's agenda as the number of asylum-seekers rises, after a pause caused by travel restrictions during the Covid pandemic.

'Well-balanced' compromise

The European Commission put forward its suggestion for a new migration and asylum pact in 2020 based on a quota system for taking in asylum-seekers.

But that plan quickly hit the buffers after refusals from Hungary, Poland and other countries that objected to any requirement to take in migrants. — AFP

Sunak announces first AI summit, pitching UK role from US

BRITISH Prime Minister Rishi Sunak on Wednesday announced a world-first summit on artificial intelligence, seeking a leading role for the UK in limiting potential doomsday risks as he visited Washington.

Sunak will meet President Joe Biden at the White House on Thursday for talks during which he will also voice unstinting support for Ukraine, as the young

Conservative leader wages an often uphill battle to show the UK's post-Brexit relevance.

Opening his two-day trip, the prime minister announced that Britain would hold the world's first summit on artificial intelligence in the second half of the year. "AI has an incredible potential to transform our lives for the better. But we need to make sure it is developed and

used in a way that is safe and secure," Sunak said.

"Time and time again throughout history we have invented paradigm-shifting new technologies and we have harnessed them for the good of humanity. That is what we must do again," he added.

"We knew where the hazards were," said Erik Tollefsen, head of the Weapon Contamination Unit at the International Committee of the Red Cross. "Now we don't know.

"All we know is that they are somewhere downstream."

"This is a major concern because it will affect not just the population, but also all of those that are coming in to help," he added. Tollefsen was speaking as the ICRC presented a new drone that uses artificial intelligence to locate mines and other explosive remnants of war from the heat they emit.—AFP

Russia accuses Ukraine of blowing up key ammonia pipeline

MOSCOW said Wednesday that a Ukrainian "sabotage" group had blown up a section of the Togliatti-Odesa pipeline that Russia used to export ammonia before the start of the offensive.

The 2,500-kilometre (1,534 mile) pipeline is part of the international talks on allowing grain exports from Ukraine amid the conflict with Russia.

Ukrainian officials have accused Russian forces of firing at the ammonia pipeline near Masyutivka, as the village is known in Ukrainian. "A Ukrainian sabotage and reconnaissance group blew up the Togliatti-Odesa ammonia pipeline" near the village of Masyutovka in the northeastern Kharkiv region on Monday evening, Russia's defence ministry said.

The ministry said that some civilians had been wounded, adding that "they received the necessary medical care". -AFP


Sovereignty fears delay Pacific-Australia security pacts

AUSTRALIA'S bid to lock in security pacts with two Pacific neighbours and curb China's growing regional clout has hit a stumbling block, with island leaders voicing sovereignty concerns.

Leaders in Papua New Guinea and Vanuatu have raised issues with the proposed security agreements, which had appeared all but finalized, putting their approval in question. Both pacts are aimed at shoring up Australia's position as a first-choice security partner for Pacific neighbours, who are also being courted by China. Vanuatu Prime Minister Ishmael Kalsakau on Tuesday said some in his nation believed a

pact agreed last year, but not yet ratified, could give the Australian military too much power.

"We must remove the stigma that the agreement is one-sided and does not reflect Vanuatu's sovereignty," he said. "Thinking that some troops from Australia will enter the country without visas and access our sovereign data will not happen, unless we agree and give our informed consent." His comments came after Papua New Guinea rejected a draft defence treaty, with Prime Minister James Marape saying that certain, unspecified provisions encroached on his country's "sovereign rights". — AFP

China, India expelling each other's journalists amid tense ties

CHINA and India have been kicking out each other's accredited journalists recently, according to the Chinese Foreign Ministry, amid tense bilateral relations that could affect their cooperation as members of the BRICS grouping that also includes Brazil, Russia and South Africa.

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Mao Ning said last week that New Delhi has refused to review and approve visa applications for Chinese journalists since 2020 and there is only one Chinese reporter in India, for whom the visa has not been renewed.

With the number of Chinese journalists stationed in India about to drop to zero, Beijing has "no choice but to take appropriate countermeasures to safeguard the legitimate rights and interests of Chinese media organizations," Mao said at a press conference on 31 May. The Wall Street Journal reported on 30 May that Indian media outlets had four remaining journalists based in China at the beginning of the year, but at least two of them had not been granted visas to return to the country, citing a Chinese official. — Kyodo

Prosecutors tell Trump lawyers he is target of classified docs probe: reports

US prosecutors have told Donald Trump's lawyers that he is the target of a probe into his handling of classified documents after leaving the presidency, in a sign he might be indicted, US media reported Wednesday night.

The notice came from the office of special counsel Jack Smith, The New York Times, CNN and other new outlets said, and gives the clearest sign yet that prosecutors are moving closer to charging the former president, who is seeking a return to the White House in 2024. The Times, citing "two people familiar with the matter", said it was not clear when Trump's team had been told he was subject in the investigation.

Special counsel Smith, named by Attorney-General Merrick Garland, has been looking into a cache of classified documents that Trump had stored at his Mar-a-Lago residence after leaving the White House.—AFP

Several children injured in mass stabbing in French Alps

A man armed with a knife attacked a group of preschool children playing by a lake in the French Alps Thursday, wounding four as well as an adult and sending shock waves through the country.

The suspect is a Syrian in his early 30s who was granted refugee status in Sweden in April, a police source said.

Witnesses described the suspected knifeman running around in a frenzy, apparently attacking people at random, before he was shot by police near the banks of Lake Annecy. "He wanted to attack everyone. I moved away and he lunged at an old man and woman and stabbed the old man,"

former professional footballer Anthony Le Tallec, who was running in the park, told the local Dauphine Libere newspaper.

Another witness, named Malo, told the BFM television channel that the culprit attacked the children before the old man and was "shouting, but it wasn't really comprehensible". — AFP

JAPAN'S Miyu Kato became a French Open champion on Thursday, four days after she was controversially disqualified from the women's doubles for accidentally hitting a ball girl.

Kato and her German partner Tim Puetz defeated Bianca Andreescu and Michael Venus 4-6, 6-4, 10-6 in the mixed doubles final at Roland Garros.


"It has been challenging mentally in the last few days after my unjust disqualification from the women's doubles," Kato told the Court Philippe Chatrier crowd, reading from a prepared statement. "Thanks to all the players for their heartfelt

messages of support. I used that positive energy on court here today.

"I am now looking for a positive result to my appeal so I can reclaim my prize money, points and my reputation."

Puetz said he hoped the title would help Kato after the drama of the default. "I hope this is redemption for you after what happened. The support you received was well deserved." The 28-year-old Kato and her Indonesian teammate Aldila Sutjiadi were defaulted on Sunday after a gentle lob from the Japanese player left a ballgirl in tears and shaking.—AFP

Liverpool sign Argentine World Cup winner Mac Allister

LIVERPOOL signed Argentine World Cup winner Alexis Mac Allister from Brighton on Thursday for a fee that could rise to a reported £55 million (\$69 million).

The 24-year-old is the first piece in a midfield rebuild for Liverpool, who finished a disappointing fifth in the Premier League.

"It feels amazing," said Mac Allister, who is understood to have signed a five-year deal at Anfield. "It's a dream come true. It's amazing to be here and I can't wait to get started. "I wanted to be in from the first day of pre-season, so it's good that everything is done. I'm looking forward to meeting my teammates. "It was a fantastic year for me — World Cup, what we achieved with Brighton — but now it's time to think about Liverpool and try to be a better player and a better human being every day."

Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp is seeking to bolster his midfield options after the departures of James Milner, Naby Keita and Alex Oxlade-Chamberlain.

The club were priced out of a move for England teenage star Jude Bellingham, who is set to join Real Madrid after the clubs agreed a fee of 103 million euros (\$110 million).

Liverpool, who struggled last term after nearly completing an unprecedented quadruple in 2021/22, have been criticized for failing to reinforce their ageing midfield over recent transfer windows

Klopp is excited about the arrival of Mac Allister, who reportedly cost an initial fee of £35 million.—AFP

Rice set to leave West Ham, says club chairman

WEST Ham chairman David Sullivan has confirmed captain Declan Rice will be sold during the summer transfer window, just hours after the club ended their decades-long trophy drought.

The England midfielder became only the third Hammers skipper to lift silverware after a 2-1 victory over Fiorentina in the Europa Conference League final on Wednesday.

However, Sullivan admitted a gentleman's agreement means they will allow the 24-year-old, who has been strongly linked with a move to Arsenal, to leave.

Asked whether lifting the trophy in Prague was Rice's last action as a West Ham player, Sullivan told Talksport: "I think it has to be. We promised him he could go.

"He set his heart on going and in due course he has to get on and we have to get a replacement.

"It is not something we wanted to happen. We offered him £200,000 (\$249,000) a week 18 months ago and he

months ago and he turned it down. You can't keep a player who doesn't want to be there.

"I think the offers will start to come today. Three or four clubs have shown interest but out of respect to West Ham, while we're still playing, you don't make offers for players."

West Ham's win in Prague ended a 43-year wait to win a major trophy.— AFP
