Myanmar foreign trade surpasses US\$27B in 11 months

YANMAR's external trade with foreign partners reached over US\$27.758 billion as of 1 March in the current financial year 2023-2024, beginning 1 April, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar's exports were worth over \$13.378 billion, whereas the country's imports were valued at \$14.379 billion between 1 April 2023 and 1 March 2024.

Myanmar's seaborne trade value crossed over \$20.55 billion this FY, while border trade was valued at \$7.207 billion.

The trade figure over the past 11 months shrank from \$31.36 billion recorded in the corresponding period last FY, indicating a sharp drop of over \$3.605 billion.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, and finished industrial goods, while it imports capital goods, intermediate goods, raw materials imported by the CMP enterprises and consumer goods.

Myanmar has been implementing the National Export Strategy (NES) 2020-2025 in order to bolster exports. The priority sectors of the NES comprise agricultural production, garment and apparel, industrial and electronic device, fishery business, forest product, digital manufacturing and service, logistic service, quality management, trade information service, innovation and entrepreneurship sectors. — NN/EM

Myanmar, Russia discuss plans to build edible oil factory

ACCORDING to the Ministry of Industry, discussions are currently underway between Myanmar and Russia regarding the construction of an edible oil factory. It is expected to produce 35,000 tonnes of oil per year from various oil crops.

On 14 March, Union Minister for Industry Dr Charlie Than and representatives of Russian NPP A – Engineering LLC Company met and discussed collaboration in agricultural produce and oil crops.

The talk involved matters related to constructing the edible oil-producing factory that will produce 35,000 tonnes of oil annually from oil crops, producing feedstuffs and fuel pellets from the by-products of grinding oil crops, cultivating crops, conducting processing and packaging training, installing machines in the production lines, testing and monitoring processes.

Furthermore, the discussion covered various topics, including expanding the cultivation of oil crops, ensuring targeted productivity across all cultivation areas, promoting investments in the oil crop sector, selecting high-quality seeds and cultivation systems, determining optimal growing times, preparing the land, providing necessary inputs, managing pest control, and implementing systematic harvesting processes. These measures are aimed at ensuring an adequate supply of domestic edible oil.

The two delegations also discussed upgrading the manufacturing processes for edible oil to comply with international safety standards and regulations, as well as the technological requirements for refineries and the procurement of edible oil refinery machines. — ASH/TMT



45,125 students take Biology, 83,510 students take Economics on 6th day of 2024 matric exam

THE 2024 matriculation examination (new curriculum) continued its sixth day yesterday. A total of 45,125 students sat for the Biology exam, and 83,510 students took the Economics exam across the nation, including overseas exam centres.

This year, a total of 768 exam centres for biology exams, including six overseas exam centres and 762 exam centres at home, are open for students. Altogether, 45,125 students out of 48,482 registered

MoALI Union Minister inspects fishery industry in Myeik

THE Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock, and Irrigation, U Min Naung, along with Taninthayi Region Chief Minister U Myat Ko, regional government ministers, and departmental officials, conducted a field inspection tour of the fishery industry and value-added aquatic production in Myeik district.

During the inspection, the Union minister and his team visited the shrimp hatchery ponds operated by Pyi Phyo Tun International Company Limited. It was suggested that the company focus on farming and producing fish and shrimp rather than relying on capture.

Subsequently, they examined the installation of 3.77-megawatt solar panels for a

floating solar system, a collaboration between Pyi Phyo Tun International Company Limited and Myanmar Solar Power Trading Company Limited.

Additionally, the team observed the harvesting and transportation process of 80-day-old shrimps to a cold storage plant, inspected RT-PCR laboratories, and observed soft crab farming activities.

The Union minister stressed the importance of adhering to overseas export standards, protecting the environment, and complying with current laws to promote the development of fish and shrimp farming production.

Furthermore, they assessed aquatic farming oper-

ations on Payee Island conducted by various companies.

minister convened a meeting with all staff at the office of the Department of Agricul-


The Anti-Corruption Commission has established corruption prevention units within ministries to curb corruption effectively.

AA commits War Crimes for its attacks in Sittway Tsp

AA insurgents intentionally opened fire from Ponnagyun to the wards in Sittway Township of Rakhine State yesterday, and the artillery shells fell into Set Yone Su 2, Konbaung ward and exploded. After the explosion, one male and one female were seriously injured and taken to General Hospital (500-bed) in Sittway Township.

The AA insurgents launched attacks using Drop Bombs and heavy weapons. Villages and public places in Sittway to affect the socioeconomic of locals.

They committed 13 attacks using heavy weapons in Sittway township, including the attacks in villages in Sittway station on 28 February, Myoma Market (locally called Korea jetty) on 29 February, Kathe ward on 9 March, near No 7 BEHS in Padalate village on 11 March, school in Shwepyitha villages on 13 March, and Set Yone Su 2, Kongbong ward on 16 March.

Due to the attacks of AA, 18 people, including a 12-yearold child, died, and 47 people, including two matric examinees

were injured. Moreover, schools, houses and departmental buildings were destroyed.

AA terrorists launched attacks in townships, villages, and wards, attempted to start fighting, and successively conducted destructive actions in real situations, saying it was for the sake of the region. They also intentionally shot the students and educational buildings. Their attacks on non-military targets, schools and wards seemed to break the Geneva Conventions and War Crimes. — MNA/KTZH

Brazil to support Myanmar in establishing diplomatic school

BRAZIL has expressed its support for Myanmar's establishment of a diplomatic school. Moreover, discussions are underway regarding potential diplomatic exchange visits between the two nations, as reported by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. On 14 March, Myanmar Ambassador to Brazil U Aung Kyaw Zan and acting head of the Rio Branco Institute under the Brazilian Ministry of Foreign Affairs Ms Mariana Moscardo convened the meeting at the institute to deliberate on bilateral diplomatic collaboration.

They explored avenues for cooperation between the Department of Strategic Studies and Training under the Myanmar Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Rio Branco Institute, particularly in the realm of diplomatic exchange visits. Brazil affirmed its backing for curriculum development, management, administration, teaching, and research for the proposed diplomatic school in

boasts a rich history of training Brazilian diplomats who go on to serve in Brazil's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Additionally, it plays a pivotal role in nurturing young diplomatic officials in the fields of international relations and foreign diplomacy.

Over the years, the institute has produced numerous Brazilian diplomats and has also welcomed foreign diplomats, cementing its status as a cornerstone of diplomatic education and training. — ASH/NT

Counter-argument to false information

Subversive media circulates fake news about conscription for military

THE subversive media is circulating false news on social networking sites claiming that Muslims have died during the battle and that Muslims are being forcibly recruited into the troops. According to an official in Sittway Township, the news is simply false, and the malicious media is intentionally spreading misinformation about Muslims in Rakhine State.

Similarly, false news has been fabricated by Khit Thit, a subversive media outlet that

promotes terrorism, claiming that a monthly fee of K5,000 per household has been collected for young men who will serve in the army in Minmyay Village, Pwintbyu Township.

YGEA calls for trading halt unless gold traders transact below reference price

YANGON Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA) warned gold traders to halt business unless they make transactions below the YGEA's reference price, according to a notification released on 16 March.

Those unscrupulous dealers are manipulating the market by misleading information. Authorities are inspecting the cause of price fluctuations, and legal proceedings against them are underway.

As a result of this, the YGEA requested dealers to make gold transactions below the set reference price and avoid the spread of false news and price manipulation on 12 March.

The YGEA opened the reference price at K3.7945 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) on 16 March.

The pure gold price hit up to K4.16 million per tical in the unofficial market, with the spot gold price rallying US\$2,150 per ounce and Kyat devaluation against the US dollar to K3,680 on 16 March.

The figures showed a gap of K360,000 per tical between the YGEA's reference price and the actual market value.

Earlier, the YGEA calculated the price depending on the Central Bank of Myanmar's interbank reference exchange rate, with some addition, in spite of the US dollar gain in the unofficial forex market, causing the price gap to widen to K400,000-K500,000 per tical.

Following the CBM's liberalization for authorized dealers for online forex trading on 5 December 2023, the gap between the YGEA's reference price and the actual market value narrowed.

The kyat-US dollar exchange rate soaring up to K4,000 drove the gold price up to a record high of K4 million per tical in late August 2023.

Chilli pepper traders likely to achieve profit potential

WHOLESALERS who collect large quantities of chilli peppers at low prices might reap a great profit this year.

Yangon's commodity market saw price decreases of tamarind and chilli pepper in 2023. When the new tamarind price rose in early 2024, the prices of new chilli peppers remained on a downward trend.

The figures for kitchen supplies in the Yangon market in mid-March 2024 showed that only chilli pepper prices were lower than those of the year-ago period. Low prices barely affect consumers amid low consumption. Although it can benefit the wholesalers, growers will earn less income

Buyers are barely seen in the market, the depot owners said.

The wholesale prices of long chilli peppers moved in the range between K6,000 and K8,200 per viss on 15 March. Additionally, Moehtaung chili pepper fetched K8,800 per viss. Bell pepper prices were K10,800-K14,500 per viss.

The prices stood at K10,000-K13,500 per viss for chilli pepper and K12,000-K13,000 for bell pepper in the corresponding period last year.

There is less chance for traders to face losses in 2024, unlike the unfortunate event of 2023.

Chilli pepper price is expected to increase depending on exports like onion. Transport disruption at borders hindered chilli pepper exports this month.

The prices hit an all-time high of K20,000 per viss of Moehtaung chilli pepper processed in cold storage and K31,000 for bell pepper processed in cold storage in late 2022. — TWA/KK

Premium Myittha onion price starts falling

THE price of premium Myittha onion (large size) dipped to K3,500 per viss on 15 March after it was stable at K3,700 during the past ten days of market opening.

About 1.08 million visses of onions from various regions entered the Yangon market between 11 and 15 March. The wholesale prices of onions are K2,700-K3,500 per viss.

It touched a high of K3,800 per viss on 27-28 February. Meanwhile, Seikphyu onion was valued at K2,400 per viss on 15 March, plunging drastically from K3,200 per viss on 4 March.

The highest prices of onion were K1,850-K2,000 per viss in Pakokku, Seikphyu and Myingyan markets.

Myittha onion was valued at K3,000 per viss on 15 March in Mandalay's market. Although they fetch the highest price in the market, they are not included in the traders' inventory list.


The prices of summer onions peaked at K5,100 per viss in December 2023, whereas monsoon onions hit a high of K4,400 for Myingyan onion and K4,800 for Myittha onion. — TWA/KK

Myanmar passport office updates procedures for PP applicants



Processing to issue UID in Kangyidaunt Township of Ayeyawady Region in 2023.

THE Myanmar Passport Office has announced that applicants who have made online bookings for passports need to have their UID (Unique Identity) numbers verified by the respective township office.

Passport processing is being carried out as usual by the Myanmar Passport Office, with the Yangon office processing passports for approximately 2,700 individuals using the QR

system. Additionally, passport offices in Nay Pyi Taw, Myit-kyina, Haka, Loikaw, Magway, Mandalay, Monywa, Taunggyi, Kengtung, Lashio, Tachilek, Hpa-an, Myawady, Mawlamyine, Dawei, Kawthoung, Pathein, Sittway, and Bago townships are issuing passports to a specified number of applicants on weekdays.

Starting from 26th February, branches in Mandalay,

Pathein, Nay Pyi Taw, and Bago will enable applicants to schedule appointments online using a KBZ Pay/MPU card, providing convenience for applicants listed in the relevant state or region's household register.

It has been advised that appointments will not be scheduled for applicants who are not listed in the household register of the relevant state or region.

Two local companies licensed for EV, motorcycle production

THE Directorate of Investment and Company Administration permitted two companies with K31.4 billion total investment for the production of electric vehicles and motorcycles.

They are both locally owned companies, with one additional local EV company and one electric motorcycle company awaiting licences, according to the Myanmar Investment Committee.

The National-level Leading Committee on Development of Electric Vehicles and Related Businesses analyzes the businesses and hands its findings over to the Myanmar Investment Committee, which verifies them, and issues licences in line with relevant laws and by-laws. The National-level Leading Committee on Development of

the Electric Vehicle and Related Businesses has granted licences to 83 companies for EVs and related ventures. Additionally, it will consider import licenses for any companies that meet the necessary criteria, allowing electric vehicle (EV) importers to operate brand showrooms since 1 February to sell their products.

The licensed companies include Amazing Auto, Aunggaba Motor, Auto Top Power, Myanmar Brilliance, Yaungnioo, Super Seven Stars, Dongfeng Motor, and Htet Waiyan Hein Company. — TWA/NT

Myanmar-China border trade surpasses US\$3.1 bln

FIGURES from the Ministry of Commerce indicate that Myanmar-China border trade exceeded \$3.1 billion, marking a \$324.7 million increase compared to the same period last year. Similar increases were observed at other border checkpoints, including Chinshwehaw (\$395.3 million), Kanpaikti (\$75.5 million), and Kengtung (\$99.1 million).

K-Pop stars, artistes to participate in Nay Pyi Taw Walking Thingyan 2024

AS part of the special programme for the Nay Pyi Taw Walking Thingyan 2024, the government, in collaboration with the Boss and Jobs Company and other South Korean entertainment companies, will invite K-pop stars and artistes to the Central Pavilion. The Ministry of Information announced the organization of the national-level Thingyan Water Festival in Nay Pyi Taw, featuring four zones: Ethnic Thingyan, Complementary Feast Thingyan, Ministries Thingyan, and Youth Thingyan.

Online streamers required to register

ACCORDING to an announcement from the Ministry of Information on 13 March, individuals streaming videos on social media platforms must register. This activity has been classified as an important service, with each registration valid for one year. The ministry has set a one-month registration window starting from the date of the announcement.

Temporary power outage in Yangon

YANGON Region experienced a temporary power outage at 3:33 pm on 16 March due to grid malfunctions, as reported by the Yangon Electricity Supply Corporation. Power was restored by 6 pm.

Loyalty: Diplomat's most essential quality, says MoFA Union Minister

UNION Minister for Foreign Affairs U Than Swe emphasized loyalty as the most essential quality for a diplomat during the 77th-anniversary ceremony of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Nay Pyi Taw on 15 March. He also stressed the importance of continuous learning in communication, language, negotiation skills, strategic thinking, courage, and confidence. Myanmar currently maintains diplomatic relations with 126 countries and operates 51 embassies and consular offices worldwide.

Establishment of nationwide shoe entrepreneurs federation

THE Nationwide Shoe Entrepreneurs Federation, representing all shoe businesses in Myanmar, was established on 16 March. Chairman U Kan Nyunt expressed the federation's goal of reclaiming the market share currently dominated by Chinese and foreign shoemakers. — Htun Htun/NT

77th Anniversary of Ministry of Foreign Affairs commemorated

HE Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) is proud to celebrate the 77th Anniversary of its founding on 17 March 1947, a year before the country gained Independence on 4 January 1948.

Although the history of MoFA as an institution is only 77 years old, Myanmar's diplomatic history can be traced back to more than 2,000 years ago, in the 2nd century BC. Over seven decades, MoFA has expanded in its strength at home and its Missions abroad. Along with this growing strength, flourishing diplomatic relations and activities, enhanced capacity and achievements of Myanmar Diplomats are also discernible.

At its founding, the "Department of Foreign Service" had a total strength of 9: one official (Secretary) and eight rankers under the leadership of Bo Gyoke Aung San. On 4 May 1948, the department was renamed as the "Foreign Office", and the Secretary was also renamed as "Permanent Secretary". The Ministry got its current name as the "Ministry of Foreign Affairs" (MoFA) on 25 May 1967. Nowadays, MoFA is functioning with a total strength of more than a thousand, two-thirds of which are serving at headquarters, and more than one-third are serving at 51 Myanmar missions across the world.

Over seven decades, the Ministry has been consistently pursuing "Independent, Active and Non-Aligned Foreign Policy" and making remarkable contributions to the interest of the people, the country and beyond by fulfilling its foreign policy objectives for *Peace*, *Prosperity and the Image* of the nation.

Under post-independence administrations, a historical recognition of Myanmar as a contributor to global peace was brought by the outstanding Myanmar diplomat, U Thant, who played a major role as the Secretary General of the United Nations for two consecutive terms from 1961 to 1971 in diffusing the Cuban Missile Crisis, terminating the civil war in Congo, easing tensions between major powers. The country's image was significantly enhanced by the outstanding Myanmar Diplomat, who is well respected globally today.

Another significant joint initiative Myanmar took together with China and India in June 1954 was "the Five Principles of Peaceful Coexistence", which has now become the basic norm for state-to-state relations. The principles include mutual respect for sover-

eignty and territorial integrity, mutual non-aggression, non-interference in each other's internal affairs, equality and mutual benefit, and peaceful coexistence. These principles ensure the peaceful conduct of mutual relations and their relations with other countries in Asia and the world.

Building on this joint initiative, MoFA was able to set another significant milestone demonstrating Myanmar's diplomatic leadership by co-organizing the Bandung Conference (also known as the Asian-African Conference) on 18-24 April 1955 together with Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India and Pakistan. The Conference brought together representatives from 29 countries, which account for more than half of the global population. The Conference laid out the Ten Principles of Bandung, which expanded the Five Principles of Peaceful Coexistence.

Myanmar played an active role in the founding of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) in 1961, and continuing commitment to NAM was made known by Myanmar at the Ministerial Meeting of NAM on 17-18 January 2024 in Kampala, Uganda, ensuring to work more closely with its members for greater peace, prosperity, justice, equality and development of the developing countries and globally.

Under the administration of the State Law and Order Restoration Council and State Peace and Development Council, MoFA was able to manoeuvre amidst the Western sanctions while bringing about security and economic development outcomes.

The Ministry has been able to project the image of Myanmar as an active contributor to international peace and security by signing and promoting universal adherence to the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) and Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty (CTBT) and acceding to the Convention on Nuclear Safety and the Convention on the Physical Protection of Nuclear Material in 1996. Particularly, Myanmar diplomats in Jakarta, Geneva and New York frontlines are actively promoting the agenda of disarmament, specifically nuclear disarmament adhering to and promoting the Southeast Asia Nuclear Weapon Free-Zone Treaty (SEANWFZ). Also, Myanmar has been tabling a draft resolution on Nuclear Disarmament in the First Committee with the support of the majority of UN member states

MoFA was joining the Association of South East Asia Nations (ASEAN) in 1997. Since its joining ASEAN, Myanmar has been part of the success story of regional integration in many aspects of the regional community. The issues of common interests were addressed while respecting the spaces and pace with which each member was comfortable.

When the country took a democratic turn in 2011, MoFA contributed to regaining diplomatic glory by hosting the visits of statesmen from Western capitals; Prime Minister David Cameron of the United Kingdom, President Barack Obama of the United States, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton paid respective visits in 2012, 2013 and 2014.

MoFA was able to promote Conference Diplomacy, hosting the World Economic Forum for Asia in 2013, the ASEAN Summit and BIMSTEC Summits in 2014. The lifting of sanctions followed. From 2011 to 2015, the country's Official Development Assistance (ODA) profile was tripled, and its trade value, FDI and tourist arrival increased. The very first elected government of the country since 1960 built a firm foundation for the country's external relations.

Under succeeding administrations from 2016-2020, greater diplomatic gains were made as the United States and the European Union lifted the economic sanctions imposed on Myanmar for decades. The country was able to foster better relations with world superpower the United States, economically powerful Japan, and emerging power China.

Under the State Administration Council, MoFA took a vibrant approach by following the guidance of the Chairman of the State Administration Council to abide by Section 41, 42(a) and (b) of the State Constitution to practice independent, active and non-aligned foreign policy aiming at world peace and friendly relations with all nations and upholds the principles of peaceful coexistence among nations and fulfil its international commitments.

At this age, when every nation is exposed to more complex and challenging domestic, regional, and global circumstances, disruptive technologies, and adversarial hazards of information and social media, Myanmar is no exception. Despite the challenges the country is facing domestically and their repercussion in ASEAN and UN, MoFA has been trying its best to achieve its foreign policy goals in promoting the interests of its people and nation.

Promoting the interests of Myanmar nationals, particularly those abroad, is one of the major tasks of MoFA, and thus, it gives careful attention to this matter. Since 2020, MoFA has facilitated the safe return of 2075 Myanmar nationals from Thailand and 26,716 from China. MoFA also made necessary arrangements with local authorities of respective countries for the return of 146 Myanmar migrant workers who faced difficulties due to employer-employee issues in some Middle Eastern countries.

Similarly, MoFA facilitated the safe return of 52,823 foreign nationals (from 24 countries) who were illegally living or trapped in Myanmar territory for several reasons, including falling victim to online job scams.

The resilience of MoFA and Myanmar Diplomats is more telling in the face of the multi-dimensional challenges. Particularly, the country's commitments to multilateralism and regional and international cooperation have also tested and proven that Myanmar abides by agreed principles even in the toughest situations when some other countries in the UN and ASEAN ignore some principles. The Ministry has been redoubling its efforts to turn this resilience into greater strength.

It is important to learn from the country's history that the soft skills of statesmen made it possible to stand in unity, in dignity and at peace, even at a time when its physical strength was incomparable to its three neighbouring mighty Empires. MoFA and Myanmar Diplomats today will continue to strive to overcome current day's challenges of complex nature, geopolitical situation, transnational crimes, climate change, disruptive technology, etc., through strengthened cooperation in bilateral, regional and international contexts.

Taking the opportunity of the 77th Anniversary of MoFA, this article pays tribute to the exemplary works of Myanmar diplomats under successive administrations. It also calls new generation Myanmar diplomats to take bolder steps in fulfilling the country's Foreign Policy objectives for greater peace, progress and a stronger image of Myanmar by making use of diplomatic tools made available by the new technology, innovation, creativity and renewed vigour of seasoned diplomats as well as that of the new generation diplomats.






fewer employment opportunities exacerbate the challenges faced by individuals who grapple with the persistent costs of daily life.

Researchers develop simple blood test to quickly recognize sarcoidosis

ESEARCHERS have develnoped a technique for quickly and cheaply identifying sarcoidosis, a chronic inflammatory illness characterized by the growth of microscopic lumps called granulomas in the lungs and other organs.

The technique, which uses a simple blood test, may allow for the selective use of more intrusive diagnostic tests that are commonly employed to identify the disease. The results were reported in the American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care Medicine.

"Currently, diagnosing sarcoidosis isn't a straightforward process and requires tissue removal and testing with additional screenings to rule out other diseases, such as tuberculosis or lung cancer," said James Kiley, PhD director of the NIH's Division of Lung Diseases at the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI).

"Using a blood test will help diagnose faster, particularly in those organs that are more challenging to biopsy and with less harm to the patient."

Though the exact cause of sarcoidosis is unknown, researchers suspect it is an immune disorder triggered by a group of specific antigens, which are generally foreign substances that incite an immune response in the body. In the United States, an estimated 8-11 people per 100,000 are affected by sarcoidosis each year, according to previous research.

Indian Navy foils Somali pirates' hijacking attempt

An Indian Navy warship engaged the pirate vessel, which opened fire in response. Naval officials swiftly reacted to neutralize the threat and ensure maritime security.

IN a daring operation to safeguard maritime security, the Indian Navy successfully thwarted Somali pirates from using a ex-merchant vessel Ruen to hijack ships traversing the region, the Indian Navy spokesperson said.

The ex-MV Ruen, which had been commandeered by Somali pirates on 14 December 2023, was reported to have reappeared as

a pirate vessel, threatening merchant shipping in the high seas. Responding swiftly to the threat, an Indian Navy warship engaged the pirate vessel on 15 March.

According to a statement issued by the Indian Navy, it was revealed that upon interception, the Ruen when intercepted opened fire on the Naval warship, prompting a response from naval officials.

The Indian Navy stopped Somali pirates from hijacking ships in the area by stopping the ex-MV Ruen. This ship had been taken over by pirates on 14 December 2023. It was trying to carry out piracy again. The Indian Navy followed international laws to stop them with as little force as needed, protecting sailors and shipping routes. - ANI

Houthis attack three US, Israeli ships in Indian Ocean

"The Yemeni Armed Forces, within the framework of implementing these directives, carried out three operations against three Israeli and American ships in the Indian Ocean, using a number of suitable naval missiles and drones, and all three operations successfully achieved their objectives," the statement said.

The Houthi movement,

northern and western Yemen, vowed in November 2023 to attack any ships associated with Israel until it halts military actions in the Gaza Strip.

This led the United States to announce a multinational operation to secure freedom of navigation in the Red Sea. US and UK forces later launched multiple strikes against Houthi positions in a bid to degrade their ability to target commercial vessels.

Judge pushes back Trump's 'hush money' trial by 30 days

THE judge overseeing former US President Donald Trump's 'hush money' trial delayed it by 30 days after new evidence was turned over to the parties, The Hill reported.

Jury selection was set

to begin on 25 March, which would have marked Trump's first criminal trial. However, judge Juan Merchan agreed to delay the trial after prosecutors consented to the one-month delay. The court's decision came

after the parties told the judge that the US Attorney's Office for the southern district of New York turned over more than 70,000 pages of records in recent days, some of which are relevant to the case. — ANI

War games in Arctic: What's driving the West's new passion?

Thirteen NATO nations participate in the Nordic Response 2024 exercise in Finland and Sweden, while the US Army conducts a separate training event near Fairbanks, Alaska.

The US exercise was conducted within the framework of the Joint Pacific Multinational Readiness Centre (JPMRC) and involved 8,000 American servicemen from the 11th Airborne Division and an unspecified smaller number of "foreign allies". — SPUTNIK

Nippon Steel defends US Steel buyout deal after Biden's opposition

Nippon Steel promised no layoffs or plant closures until September 2026 under specific conditions and pledged to make further investments totaling \$1.4 billion after the acquisition.

NIPPON Steel Corp said Friday it is committed to its \$14.1 billion plan to acquire United States Steel Corp. after US President Joe Biden voiced opposition to the buyout plan.

"Our transaction delivers clear benefits to US Steel,

union workers, the broader American steel industry, and American national security," Nippon Steel said in a statement. "We are determined to see this through and complete the transaction."

Japan's largest steelmak-

er also announced there will be no layoffs and plant closures until September 2026 under certain conditions and pledged to make additional investments worth \$1.4 billion after the completion of the deal. — Kyodo

Bitcoin not invented by computer scientist Wright: court

AUSTRALIAN computer scientist Craig Wright is not "Satoshi Nakamoto", the pseudonym used by the creator of the cryptocurrency bitcoin when it launched in 2008, a UK court ruled Thursday.

The decision follows a trial in London's High Court after the Crypto Open Patent Alliance (COPA), a nonprofit organization set up to keep cryptocurrency technology free from patents, sued Wright.

Wright, 53, has claimed since 2016 that he was Satoshi

Nakamoto and the author of a white paper that unveiled what would grow to be the world's most popular cryptocurrency—and which Thursday reached a record high.

But in his ruling handed

down Thursday, judge James Mellor dismissed Wright's claims, calling the evidence for his decisions "overwhelming". "Dr Wright is not the author of the bitcoin white paper," Mellor said. — AFP

El Salvador stashes \$406 million in bitcoin in 'cold wallet': Bukele

Bukele explained that a significant portion of their bitcoin holdings has been moved to a cold wallet stored in a physical vault within the country, providing added security against hacking attacks.

EL Salvador's President Nayib Bukele said Thursday that his country has stored more than \$400 million in bitcoin in an offline "cold wallet" as the cryptocurrency forges new record highs.

"We've decided to transfer a big chunk of our bitcoin to a cold wallet, and store that cold wallet in a physical vault within our national territory," Bukele said on social media site X.

"You can call it our first bitcoin piggy bank," he added.

The cold wallet protects cryptocurrency investments by keeping them offline to prevent hacking attacks.

Bukele shared a screenshot of the investment showing a total of 5,689.7 bitcoin, with a valuation of \$406.6 million.

El Salvador became the first country in the world to legally circulate bitcoin as legal tender on par with the US dollar in September 2021.

"It's not much, but it's honest work," Bukele said about the cold wallet initiative.

Bitcoin surpassed \$73,000 this week — before shedding some of its gains — in a rampant rise after US authorities eased mainstream investor access to the cryptocurrency. Other cryptocurrencies such as ether or ethereum have also registered increases in their price.

Eighty-eight percent of Salvadorans did not use bitcoin in their transactions in 2023, according to a survey by the private Central American University (UCA) in January. — AFP

IMF chief Georgieva says 'available to serve' for second term

THE managing director of the International Monetary Fund has told AFP she is making herself "available to serve" for a second five-year term running the Washington-based financial institution, shortly after she received the backing of European finance ministers.

"I'm not running to force people to choose me, I'm making myself available to serve, if people want me to serve," IMF managing director Kristalina Georgieva said in a video call interview ahead of a speech in the UK city of Cambridge on Thursday.

"I would bring to the job a determination for the Fund to be an institution that leans forward in addressing the most challenging problems we face," she said. - AFP

Nissan, Honda explore partnership in electric vehicles

JAPANESE arch-rivals Nissan and Honda said Friday they were exploring a strategic partnership in electric vehicles to face up to a "once-in-a-century" upheaval in the car industry.

Analysts said the move was aimed at catching up with Chinese competitors who have stolen a march in EVs while Japanese firms have lost ground by focusing more on hybrid vehicles.

"We are not competing only with the traditional car makers, but also with new players... with innovative products and new business models" as well as "overwhelming

price competitiveness and amazing speed," said Nissan CEO Makoto Uchida.

"We cannot win the competition as long as we stick to conventional wisdom and traditional approach," he told a joint news conference announcing a feasibility study of the partnership.

The scope includes automotive software platforms, core components related to EVs, and complementary products, the companies said. — AFP

China's coastal bulk freight index down in February

CHINA'S coastal bulk freight index fell 7.4 per cent month on month in February, data from the Shanghai Shipping Exchange (SSE) showed.

Last month, the composite index for coastal bulk freight, which measures transportation costs in the coastal shipping market, stood at 961.66, according to the SSE.

During this period, the sub-index for grain logged the most notable monthon-month decrease of 15.6 percent, followed by that for coal and metal ore.

The sub-index for crude oil edged up 0.1 percent from the previous month, while the figure for refined oil dipped by 0.9 percent monthly.

The SSE initiated the index in 2001 under the guidance of the Ministry of Transport to fully reflect fluctuations in the Chinese coastal transport market. — Xinhua

EU chief outlines more concessions for bloc's farmers

Smokes and votes: Could menthol cigarette ban sway US election?

In the US presidential election, menthol cigarettes have become a hot topic, especially among African Americans. President Biden's plan to ban menthol cigarettes has upset some Black voters, who fear it could lead to over-policing and racism.

IN a quintessentially American tale of race and politics, the lowly menthol cigarette is playing a curiously large role in the US presidential election this year.

A proposed ban from President Joe Biden's administration on the mint-flavoured smokes has miffed some African Amer-

icans, a key Democratic Party base. To complicate matters, narratives linked to the tobacco lobby have ginned up fears that the ban could lead to over policing and racism.

Those are normally leftwing concerns, but in an election year, anything goes — and Republicans are using the issue to try to appeal to Black voters.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 2022 released draft plans for axing the production and sale of flavoured tobacco, to deter future smokers and help current smokers quit. — AFP

German economy threatened by wave of traffic strikes: association

Strikes affect not only affected companies but the entire economy.

FREQUENT strikes by rail and air staff in Germany could bring negative consequences for the country as a business location, an employers' association warned Friday.

Steffen Kampeter, managing director of the Confederation of German Employers' Associations (BDA), told Rheinische Post newspaper: "The strikes in critical infra-

structure are not only annoying, they are also a brake on growth." The economic damage "not only concerns the companies directly affected, but the entire economy," he added.

The German Economic Institute (IW) estimates that a single day of a nationwide rail strike costs up to 100 million euros (109 million US dollars) in economic output.

"The loss of confidence in the reliability of the infrastructure is a disadvantage for the location," said Kampeter, criticizing the unions' actions as "disproportionate". He called on legislators to "make a clear commitment that industrial action must remain the exception".

True Italians: Children left waiting for citizenship

WHEN rapper Ghali sang "I'm a true Italian" to 10 million television viewers last month, he spoke for hundreds of thousands of people born to immigrants in Italy who struggle to obtain citizenship.

The 30-year-old musician, born in Milan to Tunisian parents, sang a version of Toto Cutugno's global hit "L'Italiano" (The Italian) at the Sanremo music festival, one of the biggest cultural events in Italy.

In doing so, Ghali — who was naturalised only at 18 — put the issue of the so-called "New Italians", as second-generation immigrants are often known, centre stage.

Italy has one of the toughest citizenship regimes in Europe, with children born in the country to foreign parents unable to apply for an Italian

passport until they are 18.

They have only one year to apply under a streamlined system, otherwise they must enter a costly and lengthy process, during which time they are left in limbo. "I feel Italian, I went to school here, Italian is the language I speak every day but I wasn't a true Italian by law until I was 24, when I obtained citizenship," said Daniela Ionita.

Now a spokeswoman for campaign group Italians Without Citizenship, she describes the failure to allow children to become citizens as "psychological violence". But she has little hope of a change in the law under the current hard-right government of Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni, whose deputy, Matteo Salvini, regularly rails against immigration.— AFP

Team Myanmar to start training for Asia Cup futsal tournament on 18 March

THE Myanmar national futsal team will begin training on 18 March for the final stage of the 2024 Asian Cup futsal tournament to be played in April.

South Korean scientists create lab-grown beef as sustainable source of protein

It's one small step for this lab, and one giant leap for protein.

Researchers in South Korea have successfully infused raw grains of rice with beef cells to create what they believe is a sustainable, affordable and environmentally friendly source of protein.

This "beef rice" is the first product of its kind, says Professor Jinkee Hong of Yonsei University in Seoul, who led the research published in the journal Matter this month.

This protein rich grain, which looks like fluffy pink rice, was first coated in fish gelatin allowing the beef muscle and beef

fat cells to attach to the grain.

Then, the researchers in-

serted cow muscle and fat stem cells into the rice grain which

was left to culture in a petri dish for nine to 11 days.

Rice grains are porous and have an organized structure which means they can provide a solid scaffold to house animal-derived cells.

Rice grains, which have a low incidence of allergy, have molecules that can help nourish and prompt the growth of these new cells, making it an ideal source for this meat-alternative meal.

Beef rice offers a more environmentally friendly alternative to traditional beef, with significantly lower CO2 emissions and costs. It also contains higher protein and fat content than regular rice.

Despite its low food safety risk, researchers aim to enhance its nutritional value before market release. Livestock farming's impact on CO2 emissions underscores the importance of sustainable food options like beefrice.

Women bus drivers, a first for Uzbekistan

SAODAT Shermatova "cried with joy" after Uzbekistan, a predominantly Muslim former Soviet republic, lifted a ban last month on women working as bus drivers. "I was waiting a long time," said the 49-year-old, who used to work in public transport maintenance in the Uzbek capital, Tashkent. Shermatova now drives the number 51, an electric bus, around Tashkent — the biggest city in Central Asia with a population of three million. She said her husband, also a bus driver, was concerned at first but has given her "full support" although he "tells me every day to be careful". — AFP

An extension of the Hokuriku Shinkansen line connecting Kanazawa and Tsuruga in central Japan opened on Saturday, establishing bullet train services in Fukui Prefecture for the first time and carrying hopes for a tourism boost in areas hit by the New Year's Day earthquake.

The new section shortens travel time between Tokyo and the city of Fukui by 33 minutes to as fast as two hours and 51 minutes. Passengers now no longer must transfer to high-speed and limited express trains after Kanazawa. The 125-kilometre section from Kanazawa in Ishikawa Prefecture to Tsuruga in Fukui adds six new stations to the shinkansen line. Two are in Ishikawa — Komatsu and Kaga Onsen stations — while the other four are Awara Onsen, Fukui, Echizen-Takefu and Tsuruga stations, all in Fukui. At the opening ceremony of the first Kagayaki 502 service from Tsuruga Station to Tokyo, Kazuaki Hasegawa, president of West Japan Railway Co, expressed hopes for increased shinkansen usage. Passengers, including Satoshi Masuda, are traveling for leisure and to support areas affected by the Noto Peninsula earthquake. At a separate event in Tokyo Station, actress Minami Hamabe, from Ishikawa, expressed hopes of bringing people closer to the Hokuriku region and creating memorable experiences during trips there. — Kyodo

Extension of Hokuriku Shinkansen line opens, tourism hopes boosted

Travel time from Tokyo to Fukui is now as fast as 2 hours and 51 minutes, eliminating transfers after Kanazawa. Six new stations are added along the 125-kilometre route.
