Positive outlook for jaggery market as prices rise

When the sugar price was only K900 per viss in 2020, a jaggery combo mixed with sugar was found in the market, which is K300-K400 lower than the organic jaggery, a trader says.

AGGERY market sees optimism in market sentiment along with the price reaching a record high, traders criticized.

The jaggery fetches approximately K5,000 per viss in the jaggery season this year. The wholesale price of jaggery from Yesagyo, which is whiter in appearance, hit a high of K5,900 per viss.

The retail price of jaggery peaked

at K10,000 per viss, a retailer from Nyaungpinlay market from Lanmadaw Township told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

When the sugar price was only K900 per viss in 2020, a jaggery combo mixed with sugar was found in the market, which is K300-K400 lower than the organic jaggery, U Lu Tun, a trader who sent the sugar and jaggery to regions outside Yangon, told the GNLM.

Bayintnaung Jaggery depot's figures showed that the prices stood at K4,800-K5,900 per viss on 18 March 2024, depending on producing areas.

The jaggery prices were registered at K1,500-K2,000 per viss in 2021, K2,100-K2,900 in 2022, K2,800-K3,000 in 2023 and K5,000 in 2024. The jaggery price became higher than that of sugar in 2024.

MGE announces expiry of 12 gem trading licences in May

A total of 12 gem trading licences are due to expire in May 2024, Myanma Gems Enterprise notified.

Under the approval of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation, those holding licences (gems and jewellery trading licence, manufacturing licence for finished gems and carvings and rough gemstone and finished products trading licence) issued by the Myanma Gems Enterprises need to proceed to the renewal process three months before the expiry date. They must renew them at least one month before the expiry.

Additionally, they can inform Myanma Gems Enterprise of winding down a business with one month's notice prior to ceasing the operation.

Moreover, Myanma Gems Enterprise gave the green light to the renewal of the expired gem trading licence in the past three years with a three-year fine until 31 March 2024 in accordance with rules and bylaws stipulated by Myanmar Gemstone Law, under the approval of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation.

Those who want to resume business are notified to proceed to the renewal procedure at the departments concerned of Myanma Gems Enterprise within office hours.

Nonetheless, only those holding a licence with a two-year expiry can be reinstated with the set penalty starting from 1 April 2024. Those licences that expire more than two years at that time will get cancelled, as per the notification.

Licence renewal applications can be processed at Myanma Gems Enterprise (Nay Pyi Taw), Gems and Jewellery Museum in Yangon, Mandalay branch, mining departments in Mogok, Lonkhin/Phakant, Mongshu, and Myitkyina branch, in line with the rules and regulations. — NN/EM

Myanmar media delegation covers information about Presidential Election in Russian Federation

A Myanmar media delegation visited Moscow of the Russian Federation to take documentary news on the Presidential Election of the Russian Federation from 15 to 17 March 2024 and to carry out media cooperation in Russia under the arrangement of the Myanmar-Russia Friendship Association at the invitation of the President of the Civic Chamber of the Russian Federation.

During the election period, the Myanmar media delegation carried out the shooting of documentary records on supervision over the voting cast at the election disciplinary headquarters in the Presidential Election of the Russian Federation, held an interview with Mr Alexsey Valerievich Shaposhnikov, Chairman of the State Duma of the Russian Federation in Moscow and observed monitoring the online voting and casting votes at the disciplinary headquarters, monitoring the polling stations in Mos-

cow, electronic voting and voting techniques, and voting of people in person at polling stations No 410 and 402 in Moscow. The Myanmar media delegation conducted interviews with officials from the polling stations, voters, and international election observers, including Myanmar's Union Election Commission Chairman U Ko Ko. Moreover, the delegation called on Vice-Chairman Mr Sholban Kara-ool of the State Duma of the Russian Federation to ask

about the election measures. The presidential election was held in Russia from 15 to 17 March. Four presidential candidates competed in the election. After completion of counting the votes, Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin secured 87.28 per cent of the votes, Nikolai Mikhailovich Kharitonov 4.31 per cent, Vladislav Andreevich Davankov 3.85 per cent and Leonid Eduardovich Slutsky 3.20 per cent, respectively. Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin clearly won

the election with the excellent voting result.

The Myanmar media delegation could observe the election system of the Russian Federation, election management techniques, applying technologies in the election, and new media and media sectors of the Russian Federation. Moreover, the delegation had chances to exchange views and experiences among international election observers. — MNA/TTA

Announcement for Oil millers seeking capital

- Under the direction of the State Administration Council, the Oil
 Mills Development Loan Management Task Force is providing
 low-interest loans for working capital and fixed capital to expand,
 upgrade, and develop necessary equipment and new mills. The
 loans are sourced from the State Economic Development Fund.
- Any oil miller may apply for the loans if they meet the following prerequisites:
 - (a) Operational mill.
 - (b) Valid licence.
 - (c) Form 7 for engaging in activities on farmland.
 - (d) Separate collateral for the loans if the owner has already borrowed from private and public banks.
 - (e) Holders of FDA certificates, small industrial enterprise registration certificates, and members of the Myanmar Edible Oil Millers' Association and the Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers' Association will be prioritized.
- 3. Rules and regulations for the loans:
 - (a)Loan amounts:
 - (i) From K10 million to K300 million for working capital.
 - (ii) From K20 million to K300 million for fixed capital investment.
 - (iii) Anyone wishing to borrow more than K300 million must apply directly at the Secretary's Office, Oil Mills Development Loan Management Task Force, Myanma Agricultural Development Bank (Head Office).
 - (b) Repayment periods:
 - (i) One year for working capital loans.
 - (ii) Three years in three instalments for fixed capital loans.
 - (iii) Yearly interest rate of five per cent.
- 4. Oil millers may apply for loans at all branches of the following organizations: -
 - (a) Myanmar Edible Oil Millers' Association.
 - (b) Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers' Association.

Rural development workshop discusses Mekong-Lancang Cooperation projects

THE Department of Rural Development under the Ministry of Cooperatives and Rural Development held a workshop at MGallery Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday. The session focused on sharing experiences related to poverty alleviation and rural water access projects funded through special funds from the Mekong-Lancang Cooperation.

Deputy Minister for Cooperatives and Rural Development, U Myint Soe, along with Mr Wang Xianzhong, the first secretary of the Chinese Embassy in Myanmar, directors-general, responsible officials, businesspeople, and rural residents, attended the event.

In his address, the deputy minister emphasized the ministry's commitment to reducing wealth disparities between urban and rural areas, promoting harmonious development, and addressing poverty alleviation. He also outlined the ministry's efforts to align with the UN Sustainable Development Goals, Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan, and National Comprehensive Development Plan.

The ministry successfully implemented four development projects using special funds from the Mekong-Lancang Cooperation in 2022. Notable achievements include the establishment of a model village in Bago Region, aimed at alleviating poverty within Mekong-Lancang member states, and the implementation of community-based water sanitization and supply systems in three villages in Ayeyawady

Region from October 2022 to October 2024. These projects directly benefited approximately 4,270 rural residents across 954 households.

Following this, Mr Wang and the deputy chairperson of the Mekong-Lancang Cooperation Negotiation Team Myanmar each delivered their remarks. They also watched a documentary video showcasing project implementation. Subsequently, the deputy minister and attendees toured photo exhibitions.

The workshop continued with presentations and discussions involving project directors, attendees, and speakers providing insights on each project, aiming to raise public awareness about the initiative.

Weekly market update of dry groceries at Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre

FOR a week from 13 to 19 March 2024, the price of sugar soared at the Bayintnaung wholesale market, whereas the prices of Shan garlic, Kyukok garlic, potato, chilli pepper, Myittha onion, black gram, pigeon pea and chick pea declined. The palm oil reference price moved up slightly.

Onion

Bayint Naung Wholesale market saw the supply of 180,000 visses of onions on 19 March 2024. The wholesale prices stood at K1,900-3,200 per viss on 19 March 2024, depending on the quality, size and producing areas (Seikphyu and Monywa) that day.

The Pakokku market witnessed an inflow of 75,000 visses of new monsoon onions on 18 March. The highest price was K1,650-2,150 per viss there. The highest price in the Myingyan market was K2,200 per viss, with a supply of 32,000 viss on that day.

Garlic

The prices of Kyukok garlic hit K10,100 per viss, while the garlic from Aungban, Shan State, fetched K5,500-6,500 per viss depending on the variety and quality.

Potato

Shan potatoes were priced at K1,300-1,500 per viss on 19 March. The price of Sinphyukyun potato was K1,200 per viss. Potatoes from the Pakokku area are K200 per viss higher than Shan potato.

Chilli pepper

The wholesale prices of chilli peppers were registered at K68,000-K8,300 per viss for long chilli pepper and Moehtaung variety on 19 March. The prices of bell peppers from the Sinphyukyun and Belin areas were K10,000-14,500 per viss that day.

Rice

The prices hit K86,000-90,000 per sack of non-premium monsoon rice and K100,000 per sack of Pawkywe variety on 13 March. Meanwhile, the new Pawsan rice of premium quality were worth K135,000-160,000 per sack depending on producing areas (Ayeyawady, Pyapon, Myaungmya, Shwebo).

Palm oil

For a week from 18 to 24 March 2024, the wholesale reference price of Yangon Region was set a bit higher to K5,250 per viss like that of last week.

Pulses

The prices of various pulses stood at K2,990,000 per tonne of black gram (Fair Average Quality/RC), K3,200,000 per tonne of black gram (Special Quality/RC), K3,810,000 per tonne of pigeon pea (red gram) RC, K3,965 per viss of green gram (Shwe Wah) and K5,900 -6,200 per viss of chickpea in Yangon's wholesale markets on 12 March 2024. — TWA/KK

GLMS introduced in licensed guesthouses in YCDC area

THE Guest List Management System (GLMS) has been introduced to all licensed guesthouses under the jurisdiction of the Yangon City Development Committee (YCDC). This system enables the simultaneous retrieval of lodging data for both foreign and domestic guests, enhancing traveller safety and promoting tourism development.

Currently, the Ministry of Hotels and Tourism has begun implementing the GLMS in hotels and guesthouses licensed by the ministry, with plans to extend its use to all licensed lodgings within the YCDC.

According to data from the Ministry of Hotels and Tourism, there are guesthouses distributed as follows: 43 in Kachin State, 24 in Kayah State, 48 in Kayin State, nine in Chin State, 50 in Mon State, eight in Rakhine State, 93 in southern Shan State, 76 in northern

ARCH 18 marks the unveiling of the 7th Lancang-Mekong Cooperation (LMC) Week. Tomato price surge anticipated following sharp decline

CURRENTLY, tomato prices have dropped, but it is expected to rise again in the coming month, according to the tomato market.

"Tomato price has declined now. Wholesale centres give a viss free when you buy three visses. It is usual that the price of tomatoes decreases during this period. Farmers who could catch the opening market could make a profit, or they have to give free if they miss. But we can say the market collapsed this year, too. The tomato market usually collapses every year during this period. Tomatoes are mainly produced in Monywa and southern Shan State. This is a transitional time, so farmers from southern Shan State sell at

a discount, so the price plunges down severely," said a tomato farmer from Lashio.

At present, the wholesale price of tomatoes is just K200-K300 per viss, and the tomato market is likely to be good again in April and May.

"The price is just K200 a viss at farms and K300-K400 a viss at wholesale centres. Around April and May, tomato prices usually go up for a while. The price may rise again in the next two weeks. In Mandalay, the price normally goes up slightly when it gets close to Thingyan. Price usually goes up when the supply is going to be short in Monywa and Kyaukse," said a tomato trader in Mandalay.

Due to a decline in toma-

to prices, farmers in Pinlaung, southern Shan State, have suffered losses. The tomato price has drastically fallen this year compared to last year. Last year, tomato price per viss was between K2,000 and K3,000, but it is now just around K300, K400 and K600 to the maximum, according to farmers. — Thit Taw/

You've probably already heard that getting up late every day is a bad habit that can have harmful effects on both mental and physical health.

Stress, irritability, increased risk of illness - the list goes on. The Swedish Gokotta ritual, which could be translated as "getting up early to hear birdsong", involves rising at dawn to enjoy a quiet, peaceful moment

Gokotta is traditionally practised on the first day of Ascension (in May) through

midsummer, but there's no reason why it can't inspire us for mornings during other seasons. Travellers, too, can benefit from

The concept is simple. Ideally, you get up with the birds at the crack of dawn, between 4am and 6am. Gokotta can be practised in a variety of ways, depending on individual tastes.

For example, a 10-minute walk in a park, or a jog along a forest path, or meditation at sunrise, or sitting in your garden with a cup of coffee in hand.

Positive outlook for jaggery market as prices rise

When the jaggery price was a mere K1,500 per viss, it did not cover the general cost, including the wages of the palm tree climbers in production. As the business is physically demanding but less secure financially, the locals migrate to foreign countries for jobs. Ko Aung Tun, who used to be a palm tree

climber in Thalukan village, Yenanchaung Township and who is now working as a vendor in Yangon, told the GNLM.

The shortage of workers and low prices prompted some palm tree owners to cut down the trees for commercial purposes. Consequently, it was hard to find organic jaggery in the market then.

It takes about a decade

from farming to marketable jaggery production. Nonetheless, the palm tree climbing business seems to have developed following the jaggery price hitting a record high.

The palm trees are primarily found in Kyaukpadaung, NyaungU, Yenanchaung, Pakokku, Yesakyo, Mahlaing and Taungtha areas. — TWA/EM

CBM suspends two money changer licences for three months

TWO money changers (Update Forever and Ngwe Boom) got their licence suspended for up to three months as they failed to comply with the rules and directives issued by the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM), as per its notification dated 18 March.

Additionally, Sint Oh Dan Co., Ltd, which was granted a money changer licence (CBM FEMD -499/ 2020) on 12 March 2020, was found to violate Section 22 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law. Subsequently, the licence of that company was revoked for six months under Section 35 (B) of the Law starting from 18 March 2024.

Furthermore, five money changers got their licences removed, and seven got suspended licences for non-compliance with the rules and directives of the CBM this month.

The CBM will conduct surprise inspections at money changers in a bid to stabilize foreign exchange rates in line with the existing laws, the CBM announced on 11 March.

The CBM initiated an online trading market in which exporters/importers and private banks are engaged, with a view to developing the FX market. Additionally, the authorized money changers sell the foreign currency as petty cash to those going abroad, according to the CBM's notification

Moreover, the surprise visits are being undertaken at money changers to ensure they abide by the directive issued by the Foreign Exchange Management Law.

A combined team led by the Monitoring and Steering Committee on Gold and Currency Market, comprising competent authorities from the CBM, Yangon City Development Committee, the Department of General Administration and law enforcement agencies, has been conducting the surprise inspections.

Black gram, pigeon pea prices head for two-day retreat

THE prices of black grams and pigeon peas have fallen again, indicating a significant drop of K92,000 per tonne of black gram and 113,000 per tonne of pigeon pea.

The prices were registered at K3.02 million per tonne of black grams and K3.863 million per tonne of pigeon peas on 16 March and then plunged to K2.928 million per tonne of black grams and K3.75 million per tonne of pigeon peas on 19 March.

The price fluctuation is closely tied to the demand of the main buyer, India and the kyat-dollar exchange rate.

The price hit a new peak of K3.5 million per tonne of black gram and K4.197 million per tonne of pigeon pea on 5 February 2024.

India also imports the black gram (urad) from Brazil and other countries. Yet, they prefer Myanmar's black grams on account of better quality and higher availability of supply. India extended the free import policy of black grams (urad) and pigeon peas (tur) up to March 2025.

Myanmar conveyed over 1.48 million tonnes of various pulses worth US\$1.256 billion in the past 11 months of the current financial

year 2023-2024, the Ministry of Commerce stated.

Myanmar mainly exports black gram, green grams, and pigeon peas to foreign markets. Of them, black grams and pigeon peas are primarily shipped to India, while green grams are exported to China and Europe.

India has growing consumption requirements for black grams and pigeon peas. According to a Memorandum of Understanding between Myanmar and India signed on 18 June 2021, India will import 250,000 tonnes of black gram and 100,000 tonnes of pigeon peas (tur) from Myanmar for five consecutive years from 2021-2022 financial year to 2025-2026 FY. This G-to-G pact will not affect the pulses' annual quota set by India. Myanmar's exporters are also entitled to deliver the pulses to India under that yearly quota.

The Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association stated that black grams, which India primarily purchases, are commonly found only in Myanmar, whereas pigeon peas, green gram and chickpeas are grown in African countries and Australia. — NN/EM

New tamarind prices fetch higher price than old stocks

THE new tamarind (flesh) prices are K2,000 per viss higher than old ones, reaching K3,300-4,600 per viss depending on different qualities on 18 March. The old tamarinds were worth K1,900-2,500 per viss.

The new ones have more sour flavour than the old ones, while the old ones give more pulp.

The new tamarind supply to Yangon's market is about one month late. Normally, new tamarind entered the Yangon market in December in previous years. They flowed into the market on 22 January 2024, with the price of K3,100 per viss, said a trader engaged in tamarind depot on Kayay Street.

The market sees high demand for the old one on account of its cheaper prices, a seller from Seinpan Street in the Bayintnaung area told the GNLM.

The traders forecast low output of tamarind this year. Yet, the yields in tamarind-producing areas turned out good after two months of harvest, Mandalay's market figures showed.

Tamarinds from Pyay, Thaekon and Padigon areas started to enter the Yangon market. Then, the large supply of tamarind from the Yamethin, Pyawbwe and Tatkon areas flowed into the market. There is an abundant production of tamarind in Pakokku, Myaing, Kyaukpadaung, Popa, Mahlaing, Taungtha, Nyaung U, Dawei and southern Shan State areas.

The domestic market did not see a price rise in tamarind in 2022 and 2023 amid the lack of exports.

U Zaw, a seller in Seinpan Street, guessed that exports might weigh on domestic tamarind prices in 2024. — TWA/KK 20 MARCH 2024

Myanmar Theatrical Association condemns dress concept for Miss Universe 2024

THE Myanmar Theatrical Association (Central) has strongly criticized the decision to pair the traditional dancer turban, a traditional head wrap worn by male dancers in theatrical performances, with the gown intended for the Myanmar representative at the Miss Universe 2024 pageant in Mexico.

The controversy arose when images of the proposed dress concept emerged on the "FAE: Fashion & Artistry Exhibition Page" on Facebook on 16 March. These images showcased conceptual designs of the dress, reportedly created by designer Khin Su Su Aung and presented by contestant Cindy Myat.

The association argued that combining the traditional turban of male dancers with a gown, particularly one featuring a low-cut design, is inappropriate. This is especially so since it was stated that the dress drew inspiration from the attire of Myanmar traditional drama actors. The association's statement further asserted that such actions are disrespectful to Myanmar's theatrical culture.

The statement strongly condemned the dress concept and prohibited any further display or use of it, including its presentation at the beauty pageant. The association warned that failure to comply with this directive would result in action taken in accordance with theatrical rules and Myanmar cultural regulations. — TWA/NT

Scorching weather boosts rush mat sales

RUSH mat manufacturers from TadaU Township, Mandalay Region, have reported a surge in sales turnover for mats, attributed to the increasingly hot weather.

"The prices are also rising due to the hot weather, and mats of various sizes are in high demand. The months of Tabaung and Tagoo are the best seasons to sell mats, with the highest sales turnover during this time. The current prices are K2,000 higher than usual, depending on the size of the mats. Since mat-making can be done at home as a small-scale business, almost all villagers engage in it as a traditional business," a mat producer Ko Aung Aung from TadaU said.

Current mat wholesale prices are K45,000 for the family size, K35,000 for the king size, K30,000 for the queen size, K23,000 for the single size (big), K20,000 for the single size (small), and K17,000 for the smallest size.

Confiscations of illegal items: Timbers, fuel oil, foodstuffs, industrial materials and vehicles

THE on-duty team under the Magway Illegal Trade Eradication Special Task Force confiscated illegal goods in various locations over several days.

On 15 March, the team seized illegal timbers weighing 4.690 tonnes valued at K124,650 in Kanma township and 15 gallons of illegal petrol worth K165,000 in Ngaphe township. This enforcement was carried out under the Forest Law and the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law.

Subsequent inspections on 16, 17, and 18 March led to further confiscations. A Mitsubishi Fuso truck and a Hyundai bus, estimated to be worth K60 million, were intercepted carrying goods worth K14.32 million, including 28 bottles of

Motul engine oil without official documents. Additionally, illegal hardwood weighing 1.685 tonnes and illegal timbers weighing 5.224 tonnes, valued at K645,264, were seized in Toungoo district. These actions were conducted under Customs procedures and the Forest Law.

Further seizures on 16 and 18 March included goods and medications valued at K109.715 million, such as 12,000 boxes of Vita milk soymilk and 19,535 boxes of Lactasoy soy milk without official documents. Unregistered vehicles were also confiscated in various townships. These actions were taken under Customs procedures and the Export and Import Law.

During inspections on 17 and 18 March, the combined

teams seized various goods worth K246.028 million, including 220 bags of seafood without official documents, at the Yadanabon bridge combined checkpoint in Sagaing township. Additionally, in Kanbalu township, goods valued at K8.514 million, including 20 cartons of ABC beer (small cans) and illegal timbers weighing 0.489 tonnes worth K244,700, were seized. These actions were taken under the Export and Import Law, the Myanmar Liquor Law, and the Forest Law. The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 25 arrests over the four consecutive days from 15 to 18 March, with an estimated value of K447.756 million. — MNA/ **MKKS**

26.25 tonnes of restricted chemicals seized in Mohnyin Township

THE Myanmar Police Force reported the seizure of 26.25 tonnes of prohibited chemical (ammonium nitrate) in Mohnyin Township of Kachin State

Following a tip-off, a combined team comprising members of the security force intercepted and searched two Yangfond vehicles. The first vehicle, driven by Than Soe Aung (also known as La Pyae) with Thet Naing Oo (also known as Phoe Pain) as the passenger, and the second vehicle, driven by Phyo Thu Kyaw with Win Hein as the passenger, was stopped near Kyagyi Kwin

village in Mohnyin township at 2 pm on 16 March. During the search, the security force discovered 26.25 tonnes of prohibited chemicals. Legal action has been initiated against the offenders, and an ongoing investigation is underway to apprehend other individuals involved in the case. — MNA/MKKS

Misinformation circulated that Tatmadaw security forces destroy funeral service vehicles in Madaya

SUBVERSIVE media outlets are intentionally spreading false information, alleging that Tatmadaw security forces destroyed vehicles belonging to a funeral service organization in Ywaysu Village, Madaya Township, Mandalay Region on 18 March.

In response to these claims, a security officer in Madaya Township has refuted them, confirming that no security forces damaged the vehicles of the funeral service organization and no shootings took place. In reality, Tatmadaw personnel are working alongside locals to maintain stability in Madaya Township and prevent any People's Defence Force (PDF) terrorists from entering the town. On

BOJ ends negative rate policy in shift from bold monetary easing

THE Bank of Japan on Tuesday ended unorthodox monetary easing steps of the past decade, scrapping its negative interest rate policy and yield cap program, convinced by robust wage growth leading towards its long-elusive two per cent inflation goal.

In its first rate hike since February 2007, the BOJ decided to guide shortterm interest rates within a range of zero per cent and 0.1 per cent, but said financial conditions will remain "accommodative". The decision made the BOJ the last among major central banks to terminate the negative rate policy.

The Policy Board said the Japanese central bank will dismantle its programme to keep long-term interest rates at rock-bottom levels, allowing them to be determined by market forces unless they

spike. The bank will also discontinue buying exchange-traded funds.

The symbolic move signals that the dovish BOJ is gravitating toward policy normalization, which analysts still expect to be slow at best.

"Unprecedented monetary easing is now over," BOJ chief Kazuo Ueda told a press conference after a two-day monetary policy meeting. — Kyodo

DPRK top leader guides superlarge multiple rocket launcher battery firing drill

THE top leader of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) guided a firing drill by the country's super-large multiple rocket launcher battery on Monday, the first company-level salvo firing demonstration of the powerful weapon, the official Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) reported Tuesday.

The drill was designed to verify the might and the real

war capabilities of the 600 millimetres multiple rocket launchers through sudden maneuvers and salvo firing and check and enhance the readiness posture of the artillery force, the report said

The firing practice was followed by a test to simulate an air explosion of a super-large rocket shell at a preset altitude above the target, KCNA said.

Calling the weapon system

a deterrent to completely remove the possibility of armed conflict and war, Kim Jong Un, general secretary of the Workers' Party of Korea and president of the State Affairs of the DPRK, stressed its important role in war preparations and instructed the country's artillery forces to expedite modernization process with the powerful weapon as the core, the report said. — Xinhua

Qatar 'cautiously optimistic' as Gaza truce talks progress

NEGOTIATIONS for a Gaza ceasefire and hostage release are progressing in Doha and a counter-proposal could soon be presented to Hamas, Qatar said on Tuesday.

Israel's spy chief has left the Qatari capital but technical teams are now discussing details of a potential deal, foreign ministry spokesperson Majed al-Ansari said.

Mossad head David Barnea had flown in for talks with the Qatari premier and Egyptian officials on Monday, the first since mediators failed to secure a truce before the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, which began last week. "We are at the point now where we are expecting that the counter-proposal would be presented to Hamas, but this is not the final step in the process," Ansari said.

"I don't think we are at a moment were we can say we are close to a deal. We are cautiously optimistic because talks have resumed, but it's too early to announce any successes," he added.

On Monday, a Hamas official said the Palestinian militants would accept a partial Israeli withdrawal before exchanging prisoners, easing previous demands for a complete pullout from Gaza. — AFP

African Union mulls follow-on mission in Somalia in 2025

THE African Union is considering a follow-on mission after the official exit of the current mission in December, a senior envoy in the country said.

The African Union Special Representative for Somalia Mohamed El-Amine Souef confirmed in a statement issued Tuesday in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, that the African Union Transition Mission in Somalia (ATMIS) will exit the country in December but a new follow-on mission is being planned following a formal

request by Somalia.

"Somalia's formal request for a follow-on mission underscores the need for continued international support in stabilizing the region," Souef said in a statement issued in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia.

The AU envoy's remarks follow a visit to Dhobley, in Jubaland State, Monday to reinforce ongoing peace support operations and uplift the spirits of the African Union troops stationed in southern Somalia. — Xinhua

US-flagged vessels in Middle East advised to turn off transponders amid Houthi threat

THE US Maritime Administration (MARAD) has advised vessels under the US flag to turn off automatic identification systems (AIS) transponders while crossing the southern part of the Red Sea, the Bab al-Mandab Strait and the Gulf of Aden amid attacks by Yemen's Houthi rebels.

"US-flagged commercial vessels transiting the southern Red Sea, Bab el Mandeb Strait, and Gulf of Aden with AIS transponders on are at increased risk of targeting by adversarial actors. US-flagged commercial vessels operating in these areas are strongly advised to turn off their AIS transponders, unless vessel Masters believe that doing so would compromise the safety of the vessel," the agency said in an advisory late on Monday.

Since November 2023, there

have been at least 47 separate Houthi attacks on commercial vessels and one ship was seized, the authority estimated.

Turning off AIS transponders complicates tracking a vessel and accurately targeting it, the agency said, advising US-flagged commercial ships to remain "as far as possible from Yemen's coastline without compromising navigational safety."

The Ansar Allah movement, also known as the Houthis, which controls large parts of northern and western Yemen, vowed in November 2023 to attack any ships associated with Israel until it halts military actions in the Gaza Strip. — Sputnik

Raducanu pulls out of Miami Open with back injury

BRITAIN'S Emma Raducanu has withdrawn from the Miami Open with a lower back injury, tournament organizers said on Tuesday, the latest setback for the 21-year-old.

Raducanu spent eight months out with wrist and ankle problems last year but returned to action in January and had an encouraging performance at Indian Wells last week where she reached the third round.

"I have been experiencing lower back pain and at this stage of my return to competition I don't want to risk anything happening," said Raducanu.

"I really tried my best to be ready and I'm sad to be pulling out of Miami as it's a cool tournament but wish the event all the best."

The 2021 US Open winner, a wildcard entry at Miami, was scheduled to play China's Wang Xiyu in the first round on Tuesday. Raducanu had surgeries on her ankle and both wrists during last year. She was beaten in the Indian Wells third round by world number two Aryna Sabalenka. — AFP

Messi to miss Argentina friendlies due to hamstring injury

ARGENTINA captain Lionel Messi has been ruled out of friendlies against El Salvador and Costa Rica due to a hamstring strain, the South American country's football association said on Monday.

The 36-year-old suffered the injury while playing for Inter Miami in the team's 3-1 home victory over Nashville in the CONCACAF Champions Cup last Wednesday.

"Lionel Messi will not be in the squad for the friendlies in the United States due to a minor right hamstring injury sustained in the Inter Miami game against Nashville," the association said in a social media post.

Confirmation of Messi's absence comes after Roma forward Paulo Dybala, Bayer Leverkusen midfielder Exequiel Palacios and Bournemouth defender Marcos Senesi were forced to withdraw from the Albiceleste squad because of injuries.

Argentina will meet El Salvador in Philadelphia on Friday and Costa Rica in Los Angeles four days later. — Xinhua

Man Utd won't sign marquee stars like Bellingham, says Ratcliffe

MANCHESTER United co-owner Jim Ratcliffe has revealed he will not target marquee stars like Jude Bellingham as he bids to revive his club's fortunes.

Ratcliffe has taken control of football operations at United following his recent £1 billion (\$1.2 billion) purchase of a 25 per cent stake in the Premier League side.

With United struggling in Erik ten Hag's second season as manager, British billionaire Ratcliffe had been expected to make big-money signings in the close-season.

United have not won the Premier League since 2013 and currently sit in sixth place, although they are through to the FA Cup semi-finals after beating Liverpool on Sunday.

Appearing as a guest on Geraint Thomas' Cycling Club podcast, the 71-year-old was asked whether he would try to sign England midfielder Bellingham from Real Madrid.

"He is a great footballer. It's

not where our focus is, the solution isn't spending a lot of money on a couple of great players," Ratcliffe said.

"They have done that, if you look at the last 10 years, they have spent a lot of money on a couple of great players.

"The first thing we need to do is get the right people in the right boxes who are managing and organizing the club.

"And make sure we get recruitment right, it is such a vital part of football today." — AFP

Ghana beat Senegal to reach African Games women's football final

GHANA beat Senegal 3-1 at the Cape Coast Stadium on Monday to reach the 13th African Games women's football final.

Looking to secure victory on home soil, Ghana started strongly, and their efforts paid off when Tracey Twum scored the opener in the 18th minute. The Black Princesses kept up the pressure and Ophelia Amponsah scored Ghana's second in the 45th minute to end the first half 2-0.

Senegal lifted their game in the second half and pulled a goal back through a penalty in the 54th minute.

However, Amponsah's second goal just one minute later saw Ghana restore a two-goal lead that they would keep to the final whistle.

Ghana now face Nigeria in the final, while Senegal will play Uganda in the bronze medal match. — Xinhua

Olympic champion Jacobs to compete in relay worlds

OLYMPIC 100-metre champion Lamont Marcell Jacobs will compete in his first race of the year next month and in May's world relay championships, the Italian told the Gazzetta Dello Sport on Tuesday. "I think I will begin my season around mid-April with one or two 100m races, although nothing is definite yet," said Jacobs, who has been based in Jacksonville, Florida where he is trained by American Rana Reider. Jacobs has as training partners American Trayvon Bromell, Olympic 200m champion Andre De Grasse and Japanese sprinter Abdul Hakim Sani Brown.

"Since coming to Florida, everything has changed in five months in terms of strength, technique and execution... I'm happy with my choice," added Jacobs.

"Having champions by my side when I train is useful... I appreciate what I'm experiencing, I'm not under pressure and I have a good feeling, but if that doesn't translate to performances at the Olympics then I won't be happy."

At the relay worlds Jacobs will compete in the 4x100m in which he is also Olympic champion. — AFP

UN chief calls on nuke weapon states to champion disarmament

Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Monday called on nuclear weapon states to lead the way toward nuclear disarmament, including an agreement on no first use.

Nuclear weapons are the most destructive weapons ever invented, capable of eliminating all life on Earth. Today, these weapons are growing in power, range and stealth, he told a Security Council meeting on nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation.

An accidental launch is one mistake, one miscalculation, one rash act away. And ultimately, all of humanity will pay the price. A nuclear war must never be waged because a nuclear war can never be won, he said. "There is one path, and one path only, that will vanquish this senseless and suicidal shadow, once and for all. We need disarmament now."

Guterres asked nuclear weapon states to lead the way in six areas.

First, nuclear weapon states must

re-engage to develop transparency and confidence-building measures to prevent any use of a nuclear weapon.

Second, nuclear saber-rattling must stop. Threats to use nuclear weapons in any capacity are unacceptable.

Third, nuclear weapon states must reaffirm moratoria on nuclear testing. This means pledging to avoid taking any actions that would undermine the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty. — Xinhua

UN warns 'planet on the brink' after warmest decade on record

GLOBAL heat records were "smashed" last year, the UN confirmed Tuesday, with 2023 rounding out the hottest decade on record, as heatwaves stalked oceans and glaciers suffered record ice loss.

The United Nations' World Meteorological Organization issued its annual State of the Climate report, confirming preliminary data indicating that 2023 was by far the hottest year ever recorded.

And it came at the end of "the warmest 10-year period on record", the WMO report said.

UN chief Antonio Guterres said the report showed "a planet on the brink".

"Earth's issuing a distress call," he said, pointing out that "fossil fuel pollution is sending climate chaos off the charts", and warning that "changes are speeding up".

The WMO said the average near-surface temperature was 1.45 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels last year — dangerously close to the critical 1.5-degree threshold that countries agreed to avoid passing in the 2015 Paris climate accords.

"Never have we been so close... to the 1.5C lower limit of the Paris Agreement," WMO chief Andrea Celeste Saulo warned in a statement.

The report, she said, should be seen as a "red alert to the world". – AFP

Israeli army says takes over Gaza's Al-Shifa Hospital, kills 20 militants

THE Israeli military said on Monday that it had taken over the Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City, claiming it had killed at least 20 militants.

Israeli troops have been continuing the military operation since overnight into Monday afternoon.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has expressed concern about the developments in the hospital. "Hospitals should

never be battlegrounds. We are terribly worried about the situation at Al-Shifa Hospital in northern Gaza, which is endangering health workers, patients and civilians," Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, the WHO director-general, said on social media platform X. Heavy gunfire could be heard in videos circulating on social media, and Palestinian health authorities confirmed that Israeli troops had utilized heavy

weaponry to attack the hospital, causing multiple casualties.

Israel Defence Forces Spokesman Daniel Hagari announced the raid in a video statement in the morning, claiming that Hamas militants were regrouping in the Al-Shifa complex.

A total of 20 militants were killed and dozens of "suspects" were arrested and are undergoing interrogation, according to the military. — Xinhua
