DAW KYU KYU HLA, wife of the State Administration Council Chairman Prime Minister and Honorary Patron of Myanmar Women's Affairs Federation (MWAFF), attended the 2024 International Women's Day ceremony, which was held at Myanmar International Convention Centre II in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

The theme of 2024 International Women's Day is 'Invest in Women: Accelerate Progress'.

First, State Administration Council Chairman Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing delivered an opening address by sending a video message to the ceremony.

Charging stations available for EVs on highways


EV charging stations will be installed on highways across the country, according to the Operation of Electric Vehicles and Infrastructure Implementation Committee.

EV charging stations will be installed on highways such as Yangon-Mandalay Highway, Yangon-Pyay, Yangon-Pathein, Phayagyi-Thaton-Mawlamyine, Meiktila-Kyaukpadaung-NyaungU, Meiktila-Taunggyi, and Mandalay-PyinOoLwin-Lashio roads.

Currently, EV charging stations are being operated in Yangon and Mandalay in public areas such as shopping malls, resorts, religious buildings, and highway bus terminals.

Similarly, these stations will be launched in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, and Mandalay, connecting them with the urban road network system facilities, according to the committee.

A total of 1,888 electric vehicles and light trucks have been registered in 2023. — ASH/MKKS

THE Yangon-Mandalay special train started operating on 8 March, according to U Thaung Htaik, Chief Superintendent of Yangon railway station under Myanma Railways.

The special train service will be operated every Friday and Sunday from 8 March, leaving Yangon at 10 am and arriving at Mandalay at 3:15 am. Similarly, it will leave Mandalay at 9:30 pm and arrive back in Yangon at 2:45 pm.

“The Yangon-Mandalay special train starts on 8 March, and the train ticket prices are

set at K12,000 for the ordinary class and K24,000 for the upper class.

The train will stop at Bago, Toungoo, Pyinmana, Nay Pyi Taw, and Thazi stations,” U Thaung Htaik said.

Currently, the Yangon-Mandalay express trains and mail trains that run daily on the Yangon-Mandalay railway have been suspended since 26 December 2023, and No 5-Up train and No 6-Down train on the Yangon-Mandalay railway are in operation. — ASH/TKO

Today, 8 March, is designated as International Women's Day, honouring the women worldwide. Hence, global countries celebrate the ceremony to mark International Women's Day for further emphasizing the rights and capacity of women and profoundly implementing the development of women with acceleration on a yearly basis.

This year's theme for International Women's Day has been set as Invest in Women: Accelerate Progress. In accord with the theme, I would like to urge everyone to explore the best ways and means for women and girls to have a greater chance to participate in the economic sector while also ensuring access to education and health facilities in order to eliminate gender discrimination.

Currently, the theme of such a significant day motivates all global countries to notice that although the international community can enhance all sectors, women are considerably facing tremendous difficulties in participating in the economic sector on equal terms to men. On the other hand, the theme spotlights that if women and girls have equal rights with men in education, health, job opportunities, financial services and literacy, they will be sure to enjoy gender equality.

It can be said that fulfilling the needs of women and girls to enhance their capacity and helping them strengthen their capabilities of studies, earning incomes and leadership can be defined as good investments for the future.

Since 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic, geopolitical conflicts, natural disasters and economic instabilities have been pushing more than 75 million global population into poverty. Reportedly, if nobody conducts the necessary response to such a situation, more than 342 million women and girls worldwide will be under the poverty line in 2030.

Today's majority of Myanmar females are capable of shouldering with males not only in families and societies but in all measures as well, including political, economic, peaceful and societal development. As such, it is necessary to take the strength of women to allow them to participate in the sectors required in order to modernize the country.

Literacy plays a pivotal role in the capacity enhancement of women. According to the surveys, women's literacy rate worldwide scored 73.9 per cent

in 2000, compared with 82.7 per cent in 2020. The literacy rate of women in the ASEAN region accounted for 89.7 per cent in 2000 but surged to 95.1 per cent in 2023. In Myanmar, women's literacy rate reached 73 per cent in 2000 but 85 per cent in 2023.

It is necessary to invest in the education sector for women residing not only in urban but in rural areas and provide for girls and women who missed a chance to learn school education to learn vocational courses in order to stand tall in the community with their livelihoods. If so, they will be capable of independently operating their own businesses so as to develop women's economic sector starting from the manageable-scale businesses.

According to the gender-based job opportunity survey worldwide (2023), the number of males who secured employment scored 66.57 per cent in 2020, and females 43.02 per cent, but the number of males who grasped employment reached 67.86 per cent in 2023 and females 43.82 per cent. It shows a gap in employment situations between males and females.

As such, the government is implementing plans for the development of micro-, small- and medium-scale enterprises (MSMEs) in which the majority of women can participate with the enhancement of necessary skills. The Social Security Law has been enacted to establish nursery units at factories and workplaces formed with more than 100 female workers to enable women to have no worries about family affairs.

As technology is crucial in job opportunities and businesses at present, women have to be capable of applying technology in conformity with the modern era. Surveys stated that a total of 27 per cent of the women in the global population are taking part in technology-applied workplaces, and 20 per cent of women are taking a leading role in the technological sector. Although there is no data on women who participate in technology-prone workplaces in Myanmar, female students account for 48 per cent of all students who attend technological universities and universities of computer studies. So, the government should arrange equal terms of rights for women to join employment opportunities in engineering, technology, and computer science without gender discrimination. It is necessary to conduct digital literacy courses for women to be able to apply technology. At present, the Department of Advanced Science and Technol-

ogy under the Ministry of Science and Technology conducts human resource development courses and technological enhancement courses. The recruitment of trainees does not discriminate against gender, and if they conform to designated criteria, both males and females can join the training courses. Hence, it is necessary to arrange plans for women to participate in the training courses.

Moreover, the second term (2023-2032) of the national strategic plan for the development of women is being drafted for the enhancement of women's capacity in the country. When it has been approved, relevant ministries and organizations have to cooperate in the implementation of the plan.

According to the statistics based on the 2014 population and housing census released on 1 October 2023, a total of 56.2 million people in Myanmar comprise 26.8 million men and 29.4 million women, who account for more than 52 per cent of the population. The Union report of the 2019 interim census mentioned 72.5 per cent of the literacy rate of people across the Union above 25 years old at the middle school level, consisting of 73.6 per cent for women and 72.4 per cent for men. The workable people scored 63.2 per cent nationwide, comprising 75.7 per cent of men and 52.7 per cent of women. The unemployment rate across the Union hit 2.7 per cent, including 2.1 per cent of men and 3.4 per cent of women. Moreover, the total population of the Union bears 61.5 per cent of employed persons, comprising 74.1 per cent of men and 50.9 per cent of women. The detailed clarification will be more comprehensive. Such factors show it is necessary to enhance the role of women. Hence, we have to make arrangements for women to have a greater chance to participate in the political, economical, peaceful and societal development undertakings with momentum based on the strength of women.

In conclusion, I would like to urge those in the private sector, non-governmental organizations, civil society organizations and all people to harmoniously cooperate with the government in investing in the women's sector for its development in order to utilize the capacity of women who are more than a half strength of the Myanmar's population and to have overall capacities in accord with this year's theme "Invest in women: Accelerate progress".

Uncertainty looms for Myanmar workers in Malaysia without calling visas by month's end

UNLESS calling visas are received by the end of this month, the prospects of Myanmar nationals wishing to work in Malaysia will be uncertain, according to the announcement by Safe Migration.

Malaysian employers have been informed that they would have to bring in all foreign workers, including Myanmar, who have been granted calling visas by

the Immigration Department by 31 May, it stated.

The government of Malaysia has suspended the approvals of the Human Resources Ministry (KSM Approvals) for factories and enterprises to recruit foreign workers since March 2023, and during the 18 months of the term of already-permitted KSM Approvals, Malay-

sian factories and enterprises wishing to recruit foreign workers have been bringing them into the country after applying for calling visas from the Immigration Department.

According to the resolution of a joint meeting between the Ministry of Home Affairs and the Human Resources Ministry of Malaysia, the deadline for the

application of calling visas has been set as on or before 31 May.

If there are no applications for calling visas for still valid KSM approvals, these approvals will be cancelled from 1 April, and Malaysian employees who have paid levies to the government will be refunded according to the specifications. — MT/ZN

Maximum 3-year prison term for inflating, selling medicinal product prices

ACCORDING to a notification from the Ministry of Commerce, those who raise the prices of medicines and health aids and engage in market manipulation will be sentenced to a maximum of three years in prison.

If it is found that health aids and medicines for the prevention, control and treatment of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) that are designated as essential goods are stored for the purpose of increasing the price and selling them at a higher price, criminal action will be taken in accordance with Section 5 of the Important Goods and Services Law.

Section 5 of the Important Goods and

Services Law stipulates that if a person is found guilty of violating an order regarding important goods, they may be sentenced to a minimum of six months to a maximum of three years in prison and a fine of not more than K500,000.

The above items have been designated as important goods by Notification No 21/2020, dated 30 March 2020 and was issued under the Important Goods and Services Law. Paragraph 2 of the notification prohibits stockpiling of these essential commodities for the purpose of selling and distributing them at a higher price in the market. — TWA/KZL

Gold plates to be donated at Myathalun Pagoda, tender to be called for salvaging gold dust

A gold plates will be offered to the whole structure of Myathalun Pagoda in Magway, and tenders will be called for the first time for salvaging gold dust, according to the Pagoda board of Trustees.

The gold obtained from the gold dust will be fixed on the 210 copper plates at the banana-bud part of the pagoda at the rate of 1.5 ticals of gold per copper plate.

According to the Pagoda Trustees, tenders will be started on 7 April for the work of salvaging gold dust, and all the work of donating gold plates to the pagoda will be completed by September this year. During the recent Mann Shwesettaw Pagoda Festival, pilgrims can register to stay for free at the lodgings of Magway Myathalun Pagoda. — TWA/KZL

Locally grown potatoes flood Yangon's market in early March

THE locally grown potatoes from Shan State, Sinphyukyun, and Pakokku areas will enter the Yangon market in early March, but there will be no inflow of Chinese potatoes.

The prices of potatoes stood at K1,450-K2,200 per viss. The potato from the Heho area is of better quality, Ko Thein Myint, a potato seller, told The Global

New Light of Myanmar (GNLM). However, the Mandalay market saw a small supply of Chinese potatoes.

The potato from the Sinphyukyun area fetches K1,400-K1,800 per viss on 7 March 2023. Yangon wholesale depot issued the price of Shan potato only. Consumers closely observe price fluctuations. — TWA/KK

Five injured in YBS overturn

A YBS 134 overturned and caught fire at the (Japan-built) Dawbon Bridge in Mingala Taungnyunt Township, and five passengers were injured, according to the Fire Services Department.

On 8 March, the YBS caught fire at 11:56 am, and the fire engines from Dawbon and Pazu-

ndaung townships fire brigades extinguished it.

According to the investigation, a reckless private car crashed into YBS 134, and the YBS bus overturned and caught fire. One man and four women were wounded and taken to Yangon General Hospital. — TWA/KTZH

Sitagu Academy opens water supply hub for monastic communities

A Sitagu water facility with the capacity to supply water to over 100 monasteries, nunneries, and meditation retreats at the foot of the Mandalay Hill was inaugurated with a ceremony at the Sitagu Buddhist Academy in Aungmyaythazan Township of Mandalay Region on 6 March.

Construction on the facility commenced in 2017. It included the installation of two tube wells and two tanks, each capable of holding 35,000 gallons. Initially, the water was distributed to seven monasteries.

Between 2017 and 2021, the number of monastic buildings dependent on the water supply increased to 64. To meet this growing need, relevant officials approached the Mandalay City

Development Committee in 2021 to request access to water from the Mandalay Moat. Upon receiving the approval, the project to install pumps for drawing water from the moat began in June 2022 with support from the regional government.

The construction conclud-

ed in October 2022, and the facility started distributing water to more than 2,000 residents in over 100 monastic buildings in 2024. Sitagu Sayadaw graced the ceremony along with cabinet members of the Mandalay Regional government. — TWA/NT

800,000 tonnes of corn exported in 11 months this FY

ACCORDING to the Ministry of Commerce's lists, 800,000 tonnes of corn were exported during the 11 months of this financial year.

The country exported 891,038 tonnes of corn between April 2023 and February 2024 of the 2023-2024 FY, while 365,472 tonnes of corn were shipped in February.

Nearly 75 per cent of corn

is exported by the general cargo ship in-bulk system, and 25 per cent is conveyed by containers, especially to Thailand and the Philippines.

The corn exports this year are fewer than those of last year, even with zero tariffs (with Form-D) in place between 1 February and 31 August due to difficulties in trading routes.

"Traders from Thailand are buying with the tax exemption, but we can't export through the Myawady border. The costs are rising as we have to export by sea route. It'll become more difficult if we can't even export to Thailand," a corn trader said.

Corn exports are traded through land borders and the sea route. — TWA/TRKM

Fuel prices see slight dip on 8 March

FUEL prices showed a slight decline in the domestic market.

Fuel prices were K2,175 per litre of Octane 92, K2,835 for Octane 95, K2,485 for diesel and K2,525 for premium diesel on 7 March. Then, the prices decreased to K2,680 per litre of Octane 92, K2,790 for Octane 95, K2,430 for diesel and K2,480 for premium diesel on 8 March.

The figures reflected a decrease of K35 to 55 per litre.

The price index set by Mean of Platts Singapore (MOPS), the pricing basis for many refined products in southeast Asia, influences the domestic fuel prices, according to the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil.

In August 2022, the oil prices hit the highest of K2,605 per litre for Octane 92, K2,670 for Octane 95, K3,330 for premium diesel

and K3,245 for diesel.

Therefore, the committee is steering the fuel oil storage and distribution sector effectively so that there is no shortage of oil in the domestic market and to ensure price stability for energy consumers.

The committee is inspecting the fuel stations to see whether they are overcharging or not. The authorities are taking action against those retailers of fuel stations under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law 2017 if they are found overcharging rather than the set reference rate.

As per the statement, 90 per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. Domestic fuel prices are highly correlated with international prices. The State is steering the



market to mitigate the losses experienced by importers, sellers, and energy consumers. Consequently, the government is trying to distribute the oil at a reasonable price compared to those of regional countries.

Some countries levied higher tax rates and hiked oil prices than Myanmar's. However, Malaysia's oil sector receives government subsidies, and the prices are about 60 per cent cheaper than those of Myanmar.

Every country lays down different policy patterns to fix oil prices. Myanmar also levies only a lower tax rate on fuel oil and strives for energy consumers to buy the oil at a cheaper rate. — NN/EM

Myanmar's fishery exports top US\$640 mln in 11 months

MYANMAR shipped fisheries worth US\$642 million to foreign trade partners over the past 11 months of the current financial year 2023-2024 beginning 1 April, which shrank from \$690.811 million registered in the year-ago period, the statistics released by the Ministry of Commerce indicated. The figures reflected a decrease of \$48.80 million compared to that of the corresponding period last FY. The fishery exports are steadily going, but they have yet to return to normalcy, like exports in the pre-COVID era.

Myanmar delivers fishery products to Japan, European countries, China, and Thailand through maritime trade channels and exports fish, shrimp, prawn, and other seafood to neighbouring countries at their borders.

More than 20 fish species, including hilsa, rohu, catfish, and seabass, are delivered to foreign markets, according to the Myanmar Fisheries Federation. Myanmar ships fishery products to over 40 countries, mainly to Thailand and China. — NN/EM

Pigeon pea price jumps to approximately K4 mln per tonne

STRONG demand pushed the pigeon pea price up to K3.95 million per tonne in the domestic market.

The pigeon pea price stood at only K3.695 million per tonne on 1 March. The figures showed a rise of K256,000 per tonne in the past seven days.

The pigeon pea price hit a record high of K4.197 million per tonne on 5 February 2024.

Myanmar primarily exports black gram, green gram and pi-

geon peas to foreign markets. Of them, black gram and pigeon peas are mostly conveyed to India, while green grams are shipped to China and Europe.

India has growing demand and consumption requirements for black gram and pigeon peas. According to a Memorandum of Understanding between Myanmar and India signed on 18 June 2021, India will import 250,000 tonnes of black gram and 100,000

tonnes of pigeon peas (tur) from Myanmar for five consecutive years from 2021-2022 financial year to 2025-2026 FY. This G-to-G pact will not affect the pulses' annual quota set by India. Myanmar's exporters are also entitled to deliver the pulses to India under that yearly quota.

Black grams, which India primarily purchases, are commonly found only in Myanmar, whereas pigeon peas, green grams and chickpeas are grown in African countries and Australia, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association.

Myanmar exported more than 1.4 million tonnes of various pulses, with an estimated value of over \$1.2 billion, to foreign countries in the past 11 months of the current 2023-2024 financial year beginning 1 April, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar's pulses exports topped over US\$1.47 billion from over 1.9 million tonnes in the past FY 2022-2023, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics indicated. — NN/EM

Beware of rabies in summer for people from the society

SUMMER poses an increased risk of rabies for individuals in the community, highlighting a critical need for better awareness and prevention efforts. A significant obstacle in combating rabies is the lack of fundamental life-saving knowledge among those most vulnerable. Despite possessing the tools and knowledge to prevent rabies, the disease remains neglected, with organizations addressing the issue often feeling isolated due to insufficient resources.

The initial breakthrough in rabies prevention occurred in 1885 when Louis Pasteur and his team developed the first vaccine. The causative agent, Lyssavirus, is transmitted through bites from infected animals such as dogs, cats, and monkeys, leading to the onset of rabies in humans.

Consequently, people of all ages must exercise caution when interacting with dogs and regularly check for signs of rabies. Implementing preventive measures, such as vaccinating pets, can contribute to an 80 per cent reduction in the risk of infection. Beyond dogs, other animals like bats, squirrels, and foxes can harbour the rabies virus, while domestic animals in close proximity to humans, such as cats, cows, and goats, may also carry the virus. Infection occurs primarily through contact with infected saliva, which enters the cuts, eyes, nose, or mouth. The incubation period varies, lasting weeks or months.

Crucially, raising health awareness is essential to ensuring timely medical intervention. Communities must equip themselves with adequate knowledge on preventing both seasonal and sporadic diseases, fostering a collective effort to safeguard lives. Only through enhanced health consciousness can individuals receive the necessary medical attention when needed, ultimately saving lives.

THE string section is rising, and the camera slowly zooms in on someone who has fallen in love at first sight. We all know how this plays out on the big screen, but can love at first sight truly happen in real life, and what's going on inside our minds as we begin to fall?

Next up, our bodies are filled with the feel-good hormones dopamine and oxytocin when we see someone that we're attracted to. This emotional rush feels really good, and the chemical reactions that are happening also play a role in romantic attachment and bonding, giving us that sense of closeness. But that's just the practical side of love at first sight. The full picture is much broader.

"One way of understanding why love at first sight, or initial deep connection, happens is that we all have a wish to return to a primitive love that reminds us of the unconditional love between the mother and baby," says Soulma Bashirinia, a psychotherapist, sharing her own theory. "This is a time when the mother is not felt as separate from oneself but part of ourselves, and all our needs can be met in this intense cocoon of love. This is why we might feel we have found our 'soulmate' or that we are 'one' because we have regressed into a comfortable place where there is no difference. This can be a powerful feeling that gives us energy and makes us believe anything is possible. It may give us a great sense of fulfilment and happiness; it makes us feel as if we are among the clouds. This energy can be used in other areas of our life and can make us more confident."

It's also worth considering what impact stories of love at first sight can have on us. When we see examples of bold, immediate, true love that inevitably leads to happily ever after, it can prompt us to lean into feelings that we may otherwise be more cautious around.

Unravelling the Chemistry, Illusions, and Enduring Stories of Instant Connections

So, can love at first sight ever last? When trying to land on an answer to these questions, psychologist Robert Sternberg's 1980s 'triangular theory of love' is often pointed to. His theory suggests that all relationships are built on varying levels of three components: intimacy, passion, and commitment. You can apply these ideas to your own relationships. For example, think of a friend. You may be able to tick off 'intimacy' as you've grown to know each other very well, but not the other two.

Another example is what Sternberg names 'compassion-

faith in the concept. Topping the list was Slovenia, but the UK was right up there - coming 6th out of the 46 analyzed countries. One such person who would fall into this category of love-at-first-sight believers is Dr. Hana Patel.

"I met my husband, Surinder, online," she shares. "I joined the website on a Friday and saw his profile that day. On Saturday, we contacted each other, and as Surinder's subscription was about to end the next day, he offered to give me his email and telephone number. We started chatting via email and on the phone. I thought that - if Surinder were as nice in person as he was via email, as he sounded really fair, genuine, and a lovely guy - he would be the man I would marry. It felt fated, actually."

Hana and Surinder had an adventurous first date on a mystery tour of London, all the while covering important topics such as religion, values, morals, career, and finance. By their third date, Surinder had met Hana's parents - and she met his parents on their fourth. Three months later, they eloped to Barbados to get married. In November 2023, they celebrated their 10th wedding anniversary.

Hana and Surinder's story is an example of how love works out at first sight. But, when it comes to assessing the validity of love at first sight, 'success' doesn't have to be the marker. As long as it is safe and healthy, there's nothing wrong with falling head over heels for someone. Yes, deep connections take time, and if that's what you're looking to pursue, you should take note to curb the urge to rush in. But, whether it lasts ten years or ten days, as long as we're in a secure and self-aware place, being open to love can be an utter joy.

Furthermore, the concept of love at first sight is a fascinating topic that stirs our emotions and captivates our imaginations. As we explored the neurological and

hormonal aspects of falling in love, it became evident that our brains play a significant role in making quick judgments based on visual stimuli. The initial rush of feel-good hormones like dopamine and oxytocin adds to the intensity of the experience, creating a sense of closeness and attachment.

Psychotherapist Soulma Bashirinia's theory sheds light on the primal desire for a love reminiscent of the unconditional bond between a mother and a baby. This regression to a state of comfort and unity may explain why some people feel they have found their 'soulmate' during love-at-first-sight encounters, as it transports them to a place where differences fade away.

However, it is crucial to acknowledge the potential pitfalls of idealization during this phase. Soulma warns that the romantic illusion may blind us to certain aspects of the other person, preventing a clear view of their true nature. Healthy relationships, she emphasizes, involve mutual expression, respect for independence, and a balance of giving and taking.

Delving into psychologist Robert Sternberg's 'triangular theory of love,' we discover that true love, or 'consummate love,' encompasses intimacy, passion, and commitment. Love at first sight, according to Sternberg, may be categorized as 'infatuation or limerence,' focusing mainly on passion, while intimacy and commitment take time to develop.

Despite the scepticism surrounding love at first sight, stories like Dr. Hana Patel's prove that such connections can evolve into lasting and meaningful relationships. Hana's adventurous journey from an online encounter to a 10th-anniversary celebration with her husband, Surinder, exemplifies that, with the right conditions, love at first sight can indeed stand the test of time.

In the end, the success or longevity of love at first sight should not be the sole measure of its validity. Whether it lasts for years or days, as long as the relationship is safe, healthy, and brings joy, there is no harm in embracing the excitement of falling head over heels for someone. While deep connections may require time to develop, being open to love can be a fulfilling and joyful aspect of our lives.

Man vaccinated for Covid 217 times reports no side effects: scientists

Researchers observed that his immune system did not have any negative reactions even though he received a very high number of shots.

A GERMAN man who deliberately got vaccinated for Covid-19 a whopping 217 times did not report any side effects from his many jabs, according to researchers studying possibly the "most vaccinated person in history".

The immune system of the 62-year-old man from the central German city of Magdeburg — who has not been named — is still firing on all cylinders, the researchers said in *The Lancet Infectious Diseases* journal.

They said the man voluntarily received so many shots against all medical advice, and warned against jumping to far-reaching conclusions from this single case.

The man first came to the attention of the German-led researchers due to news reports in 2022, when he had only received 90 jabs.

over the case but no criminal charges were filed, according to the scientific paper published earlier this week.

The prosecutor collected evidence of 130 vaccinations over nine months, it added.

But the man claims to have received 217 vaccine doses of eight different Covid vaccines — including all mRNA versions — over 29 months. Kilian Schober, a virologist at Germany's University of Erlangen-Nuremberg and study co-author, said in a statement that when they contacted the man, he was "very interested" in undergoing a range of tests to examine the effect of so many vaccinations.

Most vaccinated person ever?

The case allowed the researchers an extremely rare chance to study what is known as "hyper-vaccination".

Media reports at the time said the man was suspected of getting so many doses to collect the completed vaccination cards, which could then be forged and sold to people who did not want to be vaccinated.

A public prosecutor in Magdeburg opened an investigation into allegations of fraud

Some scientists have theorised that after being hit by so many vaccinations, a body's immune cells would become less effective as they became accustomed to the antigens.

But that was not the case for the German man, the researchers found.

Patheingyi, Shwebo, Thedaw, and Wundwin townships. The types of chickpeas are classified as V2, V7, 929, Mya Kyaymon, and Bamar chickpeas. At present, the price of V2 three-basket bags is K25,000, V7 three-bushel bag is K250,000, 929, Mya Kyaymon and Bamar chickpeas are priced at K238,000 per bag, and they are in high demand in the market, according to U Soe Win Myint, the owner of Soe Win Myint Warehouse in Mandalay.

“Chickpeas are in high demand in Mandalay’s market, and they have good sales. At present, over 3,000 bags of chickpeas are continuously entering Mandalay’s market.

The sales are in high demand without decreasing the

prices. There are many benefits for farmers this year compared to last year. India, Bangladesh and Pakistan are the biggest buyers of chickpeas.

Chickpeas are the main dishes of the people of Myanmar. Chickpeas provide nutrition with good taste. Chickpeas are mostly grown for domestic consumption, and this year’s yield is good,” he said.

Chickpeas are mainly grown in Mandalay, Sagaing and Magway Regions. These chickpeas are grown as a winter crop for domestic consumption only once a year. At present, the Mandalay bean market is swelling due to domestic and foreign demand. — Min Htet Aung (Mandalay Sub-printing House)/TKO

Confiscations of illegal items: Timbers, industrial materials, consumer goods and vehicles

THE combined teams under the Nay Pyi Taw Council Illegal Trade Eradication Special Task Force confiscated illegal timber weighing 10.785 tonnes worth K391,963 in Patheingyi township and two unregistered vehicles worth K6 million in Zegon village of Pyapon Township on 6 March. This enforcement was carried out under the Forest Law and the Export and Import Law.

During inspections on 6 March, the combined teams impounded 80 jerrycans of chemical liquid and a Dilong electrical control panel board that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) and 2,480 sets of Jinko solar panels that were different from the ID from five containers at the Myanmar Industrial Port and a Volvo Tractor head with a trailer (approximately K75 million) carrying seven kinds of goods valued at K41.1 million including 2,850 lady clothes without official documents at the Ywathagyi Dry Port. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 7 March, the combined team captured two Dongfeng trucks (approximately K90 million) carrying 7,200 litres of benzyl cyanide and 720 litres of dichloromethane worth K77.04 million without official documents at the 16th-Mile Kyaukchaw checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported that 13 arrests were made on 6 and 7 March, with an estimated value of K1,027,301,963. — MNA/MKKS

An administrative official and a resident from Ottarathiri Township discredited the claims by clarifying that such incidents did not happen.

Similar misinformation has also accused Tatmadaw of drafting 50 residents from each village in the Upper Zaiganaigyi

village-tract, spanning across ten villages in Bago Township. These false reports have sparked fears among the public.

Malicious media outlets and terrorist groups have reportedly been spreading baseless claims accusing security forces of forcibly conscripting and seizing citizens, aiming to undermine law and order. — MNA/NT

Japan to revise official romanization rules for first time in 70 years

The country will transition from the Kunrei-shiki rules to the Hepburn rules, reflecting English pronunciations more accurately.

JAPAN is planning to revise its romanization rules for the first time in about 70 years to bring the official language transliteration system in line with everyday usage, according to government officials.

The country will switch to the Hepburn rules from the current Kunrei-shiki rules, meaning, for example, the official spelling of the central Japan prefecture of Aichi will replace Aiti. Similarly, the famous Tokyo shopping district known worldwide as Shibuya will be changed in its

official presentation from Sibuya.

The Hepburn system, which better reflects English pronunciations, has long been predominantly used in society as well as in officialdom, including on passports and road signs, despite the Cabinet deciding in 1954 that the Kunrei-shiki rules would be used in principle.

Still, the country's elementary school curriculum guidelines call for teaching third-year students romanization of Japanese based on the decades-old state designation. — Kyodo

Low-end internet auctions upend art market: sector-tracker

A boom in internet sales has boosted the lower end of the art market and could ultimately doom showroom auctions, said the boss of sector-tracker Artprice, which published its annual report Wednesday.

Artprice, a market analysis firm, said there were fewer blockbuster auctions in 2023 compared with the previous year, and the overall turnover of \$14.9 billion was down 14 per cent.

But the number of overall transactions hit a record high of 763,000, with "an explosion" at the lower end of the spectrum where there were 423,000 sales of art for under \$1,000.

"The market has clearly shifted to the internet, driven by new buyers whose average age has fallen from 63 to 41 (over the last two decades)," Artprice CEO Thierry Ehrmann told AFP. — AFP

Malta issues Chinese zodiac stamp for first time

This marks the first time Malta has issued such a stamp since establishing diplomatic relations with China in 1972.

A ceremony for the issuance of a special zodiac stamp for the Chinese Year of the Dragon was held in Malta on Wednesday.

It's the first time Malta has issued a Chinese zodiac stamp since the establishment of its diplomatic relations with China in 1972.

In traditional Chinese culture, the Loong, or the Chinese dragon, represents strength, courage and wisdom, and the year of the dragon is a symbol of luck and prosperity, said Peng Yijun, counsellor of the Chinese Embassy in Malta, at the ceremony.

He added that the issuance of the stamp will enable more Maltese people to understand the traditional Chinese culture and enhance the mutual understanding between the two peoples.

Ireland votes in family, gender equality referendums

IRELAND votes on Friday on constitutional references to the family and women's role in the home after campaigns that have honed in on vague wording, "mansplaining" and panic over polygamy.

The proposals, called the family amendment and the care amendment, would make changes to the text of Article 41 in the EU member's consti-

tution that was written in 1937.

The first asks citizens to expand the definition of family from those based on marriage to include "durable relationships" such as cohabiting couples and their children.

The second proposes replacing old-fashioned language around the role of "women in the home" with a clause recognizing care provided by family

members to one another.

For Orla O'Connor, head of the National Women's Council of Ireland, the votes, which coincide with International Women's Day, are about "moving another step forward for equality in Ireland". "It's about equality for families and equality for women and it's also about putting in a value for care but it's talking about it in the context of family members," she told AFP. The 1937 references are "archaic and outdated" said Catherine Cox, from Family Carers Ireland which is also campaigning for a double "Yes". According to Yvonne Galligan, a political scientist at the Technological University of Dublin, the family amendment represents a "logical progression" after recent era-defining referenda in Ireland, where the Catholic Church was once all-powerful. — AFP

China's FM reveals trade with Russia hit record high



Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi emphasized the record bilateral trade of \$240 billion last year, surpassing the \$200 billion target.

CHINA'S top diplomat Wang Yi held a news conference Thursday on the sidelines of a political gathering in Beijing.

With Russian gas powering thousands of Chinese homes and Chinese cars cruising along Russian roadways, Wang Yi said on Thursday, that he believes that this fully reflects the stability and broad prospects of cooperation.

"Last year, bilateral trade reached a record level of \$240 billion, reaching the set target of

\$200 billion ahead of schedule... Russian natural gas is being supplied to thousands of households in China, and Chinese cars are driving on Russian streets: this fully reflects the strong sustainability and broad prospects for mutually beneficial cooperation between the two countries," Wang said at an annual news conference at a session of China's parliament, the National People's Congress.

The second session of Chi-

na's 14th National People's Congress opened in Beijing on Tuesday and will last until 11 March. Mutual political trust between Moscow and Beijing continues to strengthen under the leadership of both countries' presidents, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi said. He emphasized that Russia and China (PRC) have established a new model of relations between major countries that is markedly different from the Cold War era. — SPUTNIK


Nigeria plans to apply for

EU proposes \$1.6 bln plan to prop up defence industry as stocks dwindle

The EU has devised a strategy to strengthen its struggling military-industrial sector, with funding expected to come from member states.

AS the ongoing NATO proxy war against Russia continues to bleed the stockpiles of Kiev's patrons dry, and Ukraine aid remains stalled in the US Congress, the European Union has been fixated on how to continue fueling the conflict while kick-starting its own defence industry.

The European Union has come up with a strategy on how to give the bloc's struggling military-industrial sector

a much-needed leg up.

The funding for stronger EU defence will have to come from the pockets of member states, and procurement outside the bloc was pronounced "no longer sustainable".

The EU's executive branch, the European Commission, has put forward a plan worth around €1.5 billion (US \$1.6 billion) to boost defence production on the continent. — SPUTNIK

French Ambassador to the UN, Nicolas de Riviere, backs the candidacy of G4 countries for permanent UNSC seats and advocates for a more representative council.

THE Permanent Representative of France to the UN, Ambassador Nicolas de Riviere, extended support for the candidacy of the G4 countries — India, Brazil, Germany and Japan, as permanent members of the United Nations Security Council, stressing that France is in favour of a reform of the UNSC.

Ambassador Nicolas de Riviere further supported the strengthened participation of Af-

rican countries as permanent and non-permanent members of the UNSC. "France is in favour of a reform of the UN Security Council to make it more representative of today's world. We support the candidacy of G4 as permanent members, and a strengthened participation of African countries as permanent and non-permanent members," Ambassador Riviere posted on social media X. Earlier today, External Af-

fairs Minister S Jaishankar, while speaking at the Nikkei Forum in Japan, highlighted that if the most populous countries in the world and some of the biggest resource providers for the UN are kept out, it is not good for the United Nations Security Council.

He emphasized the need for the realization to give India and Japan the kind of seats or positions they deserve in the council. — ANI

Sweden officially joins NATO, becoming alliance's 32nd member

Sweden officially joined NATO, becoming its 32nd member, as Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson handed over accession documents to the US State Department in Washington, DC.

SWEDEN officially joined the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and became the newest and 32nd member of the military organization on Thursday, CNN reported.

Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson formally handed over accession documents to the US State Department in Washington, DC, the final step of a months-long process to gain the approval of all

members to allow his country to become the alliance's 32nd member.

According to the report, the documents are put into a vault at the State Department, which serves as the treaty depository for NATO.

"With receipt of this instrument of accession let me be the very first to welcome Sweden as a party to the Washington Treaty and the 32nd member of

the North Atlantic Treaty Organization," Secretary of State Antony Blinken said alongside Kristersson.

Kristersson thanked his allies for welcoming Sweden into the bloc.

Sweden's bid to join the bloc was for months obstructed by Türkiye and Hungary, which enjoy friendly relations with Moscow and delayed ratifying Sweden's accession. — ANI

Train services in New Zealand's Auckland cancelled due to heat

COMMUTERS in New Zealand's Auckland city were faced with disruptions and travel delays as authorities cancelled multiple trains in the city due to soaring summer heat, which led to "hot tracks", local media reported.

Kiwi Rail, which owns the tracks on Auckland's Rail Network imposed speed restrictions in place as temperature of the tracks reached 48 degrees Celsius in some places leading to the cancellation of many train services, including those during peak hours, on Monday. — ANI

Brazil seeks to curb AI deepfakes as key elections loom

AI-GENERATED videos and photos used for political disinformation are the scourge of a busy global election year, and Brazil is scrambling to regulate the technology ahead of municipal polls.

In a country of 203 million, which counts more phones than people, Brazilian authorities last week banned the use of deepfake technology and set out guidelines for uses of AI for electoral purposes.

"Video montages can be used to manipulate public opinion, to defame individuals, or to interfere in the democratic process," Ana Carolina da Hora, a computer specialist at the PUC Catholic University in Rio de Janeiro, told AFP.

INAUGURAL FLIGHT MU2152

China's homegrown C919 jetliner flies on third regular rout

CHINA'S self-developed large passenger aircraft, C919, commenced operation Friday on a new route connecting Shanghai with the historic city of Xi'an in northwest China's Shaanxi Province.

The flight MU2152, operated by China Eastern Airlines, took off from the Shanghai Hongqiao International Airport at around 8:40 am and departed for the Xi'an Xianyang International Airport, marking the launch of the third regular route for the C919.

The C919 completed its first commercial flight in May 2023 and has since maintained regular operations between Shanghai and Chengdu, the capital of southwest China's Sichuan Province. Its second regular route connects the megacities of Beijing and Shanghai. As of 29 February, the China Eastern Airlines' C919 fleet has completed 1,131 commercial flight trips, accumulating more than 3,272 safe flight hours and transporting more than 145,000 passengers. — Xinhua

ITB Berlin travel trade show focuses on AI, climate change

FOLLOWING the COVID-19 pandemic, the travel industry “continued the trend of rapid recovery at a remarkable pace”, with the Asia-Pacific region returning to a “positive balance once again”, a spokesperson for the ITB Berlin's organizers told Xinhua on Thursday.
