Thilawa SEZ records US\$6.2M surge in investments for FY2O23-24



THE Thilawa Special Economic Zone saw a US\$6.2 million increase in investment in the 2023-2024 financial year compared to the previous year's amount, according to the zone's management committee.

The zone imports raw materials and manufactures import-replacement and export products.

The zone's export accounts for two per cent of the country's total export volume. It began solar-powered electricity generation in December 2022, with five companies currently involved in this initiative. The Ministry of Electric Power aims to produce 14 megawatts of solar power in the zone.

Chairman of the Central Committee on Myanmar Special Economic Zones Vice-Senior General Soe Win encouraged solar-powered electricity generation in the zone since the surplus can be used elsewhere. A total of 114 companies from 21 countries have invested in the Thilawa SEZ, spanning 667.2 hectares (approximately 1,650.139 acres). It is one of the three economic zones in Myanmar and is reportedly successful. — TWA/NT

Shells of rockets launched by terrorists exploded on the orthopaedic ward of PyinOoLwin People's Hospital on the evening of 14 April 2024, leaving patients, including children, receiving medical treatments and hospital staff wounded and hospital buildings damaged. On the evening of 16 April 2024, terrorists attacked the child ward of Palauk People's Hospital in Palaw Township of Taninthayi Region with the use of drop bombs. In the incident, a child receiving medical treatment and relatives of the patient were wounded.

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the highest level in Thingyan, especially. Tour companies can sell tour packages. So we can say, throughout the tour season, the travel sector reached its highest in Thingyan," said U Naung Naung Han.

In this year's Thingyan, people flocked to Chaungtha Beach and Ngwehsaung Beach, and hotels could provide rooms only for those who reserved them. People who couldn't find rooms at the two famous beaches went to newly developed beaches, and some people took pilgrimage tours.

"Travelling quite escalated in Thingyan holidays. Some other destinations are limited in the current situation, so most people visit Chaungtha, Ngwehsaung, and other beaches,

as well as Bagan, Mandalay, Inlay, and Kalaw, where they can go on pil-grimage. But it is assumed that the visitor arrival was greater than last year," he said.

"Many people flocked to Ngwehsaung and Chaungtha in Thingyan, but rooms were available only to those who reserved, so people who didn't get rooms took day trips to new beaches. We could also explore new destinations that are safe for travel in the current situation," he added.

However, the country's tourism sector has yet to regain the state it was before COVID-19, but it seems to have improved again after COVID-19, he said. — MT/ZS

N this year's tour season, travelling reached its highest during Thingyan, and the tourism sector has improved more than last year, according to the Myanmar Tourism Entrepreneurs Association.

There is a likelihood that the travel industry will be booming this year compared to last year, and it reached its highest during Thingyan, said the association Chair U Naung Naung Han.

"When we looked back to this year's tour season, which begins from 2023's open season, October to this year's Thingyan, we had a good start, and a slight decline in around November and December but continuously increased back as from December new year festive period. It reached

Government pushes for export growth

THE government is focusing on measures to promote export growth for the development of the country's economy. The Ministry of Commerce and the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) are collaborating as part of a government-private partnership. On 19 April, 6,600 tonnes of corn seeds were exported from the Ahlon International Port Terminal (AIPT 3). Additionally, aquatic products, rice, and beans are being exported through the Asia World Port Terminal (AWPT 3).

Moreover, 12,700 tonnes of corn seeds and 2,700 tonnes are going to be exported continuously from The Myanmar Terminal (TMT) and Min Htet Min Port (MHM) on 20 and 22 April, respectively. — MNA/TRKM

DICA report: 1,650 companies fail to file AR in March 2024

A total of 1,650 companies were struck off the register in March 2024 as they failed to submit annual returns (AR) on the online registry system, MyCO, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

DICA notified any registered company that fails to file its AR on the MyCO that it is to be struck off the register from the date of the directive, under 430 (F) of Myanmar Companies Law, according to the DICA's notification.

DICA's statistics showed that 750 companies in January 2024 and 600 in February did not file the AR. A total of 6,400 companies also failed to submit the AR in 2023.

The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018, in

keeping with the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.


All registered companies need to submit AR on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the incorporation), according to Section 97 of the law.

Under Section 266 (A) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017, public companies must submit annual returns and financial statements (G-5) simultaneously. All overseas corporations must submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending under Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017. As per DICA's report, thousands of companies were suspended for failing to submit AR forms before the

due date. Newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for the AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000. If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registerar will strike its name off the register, according to the DICA notice. — NN/EM

Buyers drawn to lacquered pagoda, stupa models

PAGODA and stupa models created by lacquer in own designs have caught the public attention and there are enthusiastic buyers, said an entrepreneur U Thein Naing.

He initially aimed to create lacquered models of famous pagodas and temples in Bagan for Buddhist devotees all around the country, fortunately his creations drew many attentions that led

him to continue creating similar models of pagodas and stupas in some other famous destinations.

At present, he has created about 30 lacquered models of famous pagodas, including Shwedagon Pagoda, Dhammayangyi Temple, Thatbyinnyu Temple, Ananda Temple, Kyauk Myat Hmaw Pagoda, Gupyaukgyi Temple (Myinkaba) and Shwesandaw Pagoda.

"My creations are divided into two categories: Manyun (the creation of Buddha images or stupa with dry lacquer applied layer upon layer) and bamboo-strip pagoda. All of them are lacquered products but differ in a base layer. If it is a piece of wood, it is a wooden lacquerware. Making with pieces of bamboo strip is called a bamboo-lacquered pagoda. Manyun is made of fabric and lacquer. They have gained the public attention, and there are also buyers," said U Thein Naing.

Making a Hnee (bamboo strip) pagoda requires layering small bamboo strips like piling bricks. It takes about four months, and a pagoda or stupa is worth around K2 million. Making a Manyun pagoda takes about a month, and the price is around K1 million.

"Most of the models I've made currently are one and a half feet and 19 inches or 20 inches and two feet in height. Because these sizes are perfect for worship in either shrine or Dhammayon. Buyers need to make an order in advance if they want to make it gold," he said.

Both the Manyun pagoda and bamboo-strip pagoda are strong and magnificent. Manyun is an ancient lacquered technique, while bamboo-strip pagoda is also a traditional Myanmar handiwork, and customers can make any customized size according to their preference. — MT/ZS

Efforts underway to promote domestic konjac consumption

THE Myanmar Konjac (elephant foot yam) Producer and Exporter Association will develop a project to encourage the consumption of konjac in the domestic market while the konjac is exported abroad.

The Myanmar konjac is produced in Myanmar and mainly exported to China. Its consumption in Asian countries, including China, Japan, and South Korea, is high. However, the consumption in Myanmar is low.

"Domestic konjac consumption is lower than in China and Japan. South Korea's consumption is very high. The Myanmar konjac is a healthy

food both in terms of nutritional value and health. In Myanmar, konjac consumption and konjac-related food production are still low. As an association, we are carrying out activities to

promote consumption in Myanmar and reach the domestic market," said Ko Pyae Tha

San, the Secretary of the Myanmar Konjac (elephant foot yam) Producer and Exporter Association.

Besides konjac-based foods produced in Myanmar, such as konjac noodles and salad, konjac is consumed in a few other ways, but compared to countries in the Asian region, consumption remains relatively low.

In addition to this, the association is currently working with relevant departments to obtain a certificate from the General Administration of Customs of China (GACC) to encourage the export of konjac to China. — ASH/MKKS

2020, the government constructed a 56-mile transport passage between the ice-covered town of PutaO and Khaunglanphu, which is located in the northeast of Myanmar, to facilitate the education, health and economic aspects of the local people. The development of the tourism sector will improve the socio-economic life of the local people by allowing domestic and foreign tourists to visit the mountain area, which is covered with snow all the time.

Among the ASEAN countries, mountain climbers frequently visit the Phonkanrazi and Khakaborazi ice-capped mountains located in PutaO, which is characterized by its snowy landscapes.

A road has been constructed from PutaO to Hsanhlutchet Hill of Khaunglanphu, spanning a distance of 76 miles. The remaining 56 miles of road have been completed by the Ministry of Border Affairs, enabling travellers to journey freely day and night.

"The mountain road that once posed various difficulties for travellers from Khaunglanphu, Nagmon to PutaO is now accessible. Bridges have also been constructed. Landslides occur during the rainy seasons and in severe weather condi-

"However, after recent repairs following a landslide that blocked the road a few days ago, goods began flowing to PutaO on 17 April. Since there is no border gate, PutaO remains the primary destination for commodity flows. Some goods are redistributed to other regions and states after being transported from PutaO.

"Due to the lack of flat lands or plains, it is challenging to engage in other agricultural activities. Many locals on the hills and mountains survive themselves from growing spices. With the development of the tourism sector, employ-

ment opportunities for locals will increase.

Opening up the tourism sector in the Khaunglanphu region, which is abundant in natural beauty, will raise awareness of Myanmar's tourism potential worldwide," U Than Tun, Deputy Director of PutaO District Administration Body, explained.

Khaunglanphu Township, situated at an altitude of 4,680 feet, is a hilly town. Locally grown produce such as rice, of plants like ginger, are often sold at the PutaO local marknown for grapefruit cultivation, along with the production

Post-Thingyan sales at **Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre** indicate stable onion prices

DESPITE the supply of over 100,000 visses of onions from various regions to the Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre on 18 April, the market prices remain unchanged at K1,600-K3,000 per viss, trad-

The figures showed the flat rate of the pre-and-post-Thingvan deals.

Prior to the Thingvan holidays (on 12 April), 30,000 visses of onions flowed into some warehouses in the Bayintnaung area. Additionally, 360,000 visses of onions on 8 April, 240,000 on 9 April, 120,000 on 10 April and 30,000 on 11 April entered the Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre, respectively.

The onion-producing areas increased supply to Yangon's market in early April. As summer onions fetched a good price in early 2024, the majority of the growers harvested them.

The wage at the harvest

time was equivalent to the value of seven visses of onions in the previous years.

It is worth only fiveviss onion market rate upon higher price this year, Ko Khin Maung Myint, an onion grower from Nyaungpintha village, Pale Township, told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

Production per acre costs

K3 million while the yield per acre is estimated at 4,000-6,000 visses.

This year, summer onion growers are expected to earn greater profits compared with those of the previous years, he added.

The new monsoon onions were valued at K3,000 per viss in late 2023 and 2,000 in early January 2024. — TWA/KK

THE Department of Meteorology and Hydrology (DMH) has issued a notice that there may be untimely rain in some regions and states, including Yangon Region.

According to a statement released by the DMH, untimely rains may occur between 17 and 23 April due to the swift movement of whirlwinds from the west, the eastward motion of clouds, and the vigorous formation of thermal clouds.

Until 9:30 am on 19 April, according to weather gauges, in the past 24 hours, there were scattered thundershowers in Chin State, Nay Pyi Taw, upper Sagaing Region, Kachin State and Shan State, and scattered thundershowers in lower Sagaing Region, Mandalay Region, Magway Region, and Bago Region.

THE domestic gold market price was opened at over K4.82 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) on 19 April despite the closing price of around K4.71 million per tical on 11 April before Thingyan holidays.

The peak in the opening price was attributed to the spot gold price rally and kyat depreciation against the US dollar.

The spot gold price climbed to US\$2,380 per ounce on 19 April, while the kyat-US dollar exchange rate was K3,890.

Prior to the Myanmar New Year (Thingyan holidays), gold prices hit a record high of K4.84 million per tical on 10 April.

YGEA notified on 30

March that inspections were underway against those allegedly manipulating the market through a verbal deal.

Seven big gold shops in Yangon issue daily market rates three times a day. Nonetheless, those price speculators are attempting to raise the price by misleading price information that is not an actual transaction rate in the market. YGEA condemned those unscrupulous traders and their dishonest acts. YGEA asked its members to inform law enforcement agencies of the news regarding those manipulators.

The market exchange rates are officially announced on the online trading platform of the foreign exchange market. Additionally, CBM lets authorized money changers sell foreign currency as petty cash to those studying abroad, going on a pilgrimage, and working abroad, according to CBM's notification on 30 March.

Some unscrupulous individuals are attempting to manipulate the gold and currency market by spreading misinformation from the verbal deal or sparking public concerns with malicious news about the volatile exchange rate. Some are also engaged in transactions without a valid licence, violating the existing laws.

They will face legal action under the Foreign Exchange Management Law. The CBM also informed the people of assessing accurate information and data released by the departments concerned and authorized money changers.

CBM constantly states that it is essential to dispel false news. Upon tips off, the authorities inspect the price speculators, and legal proceedings against them are officially declared, according to its notification released on 30 March. - NN/EM

Petrol prices slightly increase, diesel prices dip

PETROL prices showed an uptick, while diesel prices moved down in the domestic fuel market on 19 April.

The fuel oil prices stood at K2,850 per litre of Octane 92, K2,960 for Octane 95, K2,435 for diesel and K2,480 for premium diesel on that day.

The petrol prices were set at K2,820 for Octane 92 and K2,930 for Octane 95, whereas the diesel prices were registered at K2,485 for diesel and K2,530 for premium diesel on 18 April. Domestic fuel prices are closely tied to the price index set by Mean of Platts Singapore (MOPS), the pricing basis for many refined products in southeast Asia, according to the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil. The diesel oil prices hit the highest of K3,245 for premium diesel and K3,330 for diesel in August 2023.

The committee is, therefore, steering the market to ensure price stability and fuel oil security. Under the supervision of the committee, the Petroleum Products Regulatory Department has been issuing daily reference prices to ensure price stability for energy consumers.

The committee is inspecting the fuel stations to see whether they are overcharging. The authorities are taking action against those retailers of fuel stations under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law 2017 if they are found overcharging rather than the set reference rate. As per the statement, 90 per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. Domestic fuel prices are highly correlated with international prices. The State is steering the market to mitigate the losses experienced by importers, sellers, and energy consumers. Consequently, the government is trying to distribute the oil at a reasonable price compared to those of regional countries.

Some countries levied higher tax rates and hiked oil prices than Myanmar's. However, Malaysia's oil sector receives government subsidies, and the prices are about 60 per cent cheaper than those of Myanmar. Every country lays down different policy patterns to fix oil prices. Myanmar also levies only a lower tax rate on fuel oil and strives for energy consumers to buy the oil at a cheaper rate. — NN/EM

Higher domestic wheat yield reduces imports

THERE is enough domestic wheat without importing from abroad because of the increase in wheat acreage and improved yields in this year's wheat season, said U Soe Win Myint, the owner of Soe Win Myint Warehouse in Mandalay.

Even wheat flour or wheat seed has to be bought and imported from abroad at the expense of foreign currency. While domestic wheat consumption has been rising annually, wheat cultivation has been modest in the past years. This year, wheat, which is the second most consumed millet crop after paddy in Myanmar, has expanded its acreage and improved yields. As a result, there is no need to import from abroad, and there is enough wheat produced locally. "Wheat from all across the

nation is entering the Mandalay market this year. Both flatlands and mountains are suitable for wheat cultivation, with primary farming areas located in the Sagaing region, Shan State (North), and Shan State (South). While there are several wheat varieties, the highest grade is found in wheat produced at Budalin and Myaung townships in Sagaing Region. Previously, we relied on importing wheat flour and seeds. By 2024, our domestic wheat production will satisfy our needs, eliminating foreign exchange wastage. Additionally, wheat factories are operating smoothly. The price of wheat is set at K150,000 per bag," he said.

The wheat crop is a winter crop that can only be grown once a year. It is cultivated in

mountainous areas such as the Sagaing Region, Shan State (South), Shan State (North), and Kayah State. Additionally, it is grown in Chin State and the

upper regions of the Chindwin River. Mainly, cultivation occurs in Shwebo, Monywa, Wetlet, YeU, KhinU, Myaung, and Myinmu townships of the Sagaing Region and Thedaw, Wundwin, and Myittha townships of the Mandalay Region. — Min Htet Aung(Mandalay Sub-printing House)/MKKS

Or, think of changing the land title names at the land registration office.

Taiichi Ohno, father of the famous Toyota Production System, once said the primary reason for creating standards is to develop and maintain standard work. Improvements cannot be made and refined without a standard baseline. If some departments or individuals do not complete work the same way, it will be nearly impossible to improve their processes. Standard work will lead to better quality and happier cus-

When it comes to standardizing work and service levels, there is a lot to lose by doing nothing.

World Bank aims to expand health services to 1.5 billion people by 2030

Key strategies include reaching remote and underserved regions, as well as collaborating with governments to eliminate financial barriers to healthcare access. World Bank Group President Ajay Banga stressed the importance of this endeavour for overall development, highlighting the necessity of a collective effort involving public and private sector partnerships.

HE World Bank Group has announced an ambitious plan to support countries in delivering quality, affordable health services to 1.5 billion people by 2030.

The strategy to reach 1.5 billion people is focused on three core elements: Expanding focus from maternal and child health to include coverage throughout a person's lifetime, including non-communicable diseases.

The other two are expanding operations to hard-to-reach areas, including remote villages, cities, and countries; and working with governments to cut unnecessary fees and other financial barriers to health care.

"Providing a basic standard of care for people throughout their lives is critical for development," said Ajay Banga, World Bank Group President.

"This ambition won't be realized with a solo effort. It will require partners, a coalition of public and private sector, working together to expand access

to healthcare services," Banga

Park official spots Popa langur recovery signals

THE Popa langur, an endangered species of monkey distinguished by its long tail, has shown signs of recovery, according to Forester Daw Khin Myo Htwe of the Popa Mountain National Park.

The monkeys are endemic to Myanmar and found chiefly in the Popa Mountain in Mandalay Region, Bago Range, and Panlong, Padalin Caves and Yathaepyan Cave in Shan State.

The forester explained: "We have two endemic monkey species in the park. The Popa langur lives mainly in the volcanic valley. At the Taung Kalat (the site on the volcanic plug), you may find rhesus monkeys. The park officials monitor the langur's nature and habitat to keep track of their population. The volcanic valley is home to three groups of monkeys, each with more than 50

members. We noticed an increase in the number of infants each year, with a total of 250. So, it's good news, given their endangered status."

Officials also conduct knowledge-sharing sessions in 44 adjacent villages to conserve the biodiversity of the region.

The Popa langur primarily feeds on leaves, and their population is estimated to range from 200 to 250 individuals. This species faces significant vulnerability due to hunting pressures and habitat loss.

The Gottingen-based German Primate Centre and Fauna and Flora International have studied the genetics and morphology of the Popa langur and published their findings annually. — ASH/NT

Shwe Padauk Fish Market: Hub of fish and prawn distribution in Myanmar

EVERY day, over 300,000 visses of fish and prawns arrive at the Shwe Padauk Fish Market in Hlaing Township, Yangon Region, accounting for 70 per cent of the country's total fish market distribution, according to U Wai Lin, who oversees the market.

The Shwe Padauk Fish Market reportedly receives not only saltwater fish and prawns from Rakhine State, Ayeyawady Region, Mon State, and Taninthayi Region but also freshwater fish and prawns from Yangon Region, Bago Region, and Ayeyawady Region on a daily basis.

"The market distributes fish and prawns to Mandalay Region, Shan State, and Kachin State in Upper Myanmar. It also redistributes saltwater fish and prawns to Rakhine State, Taninthayi Region, and Ayeyawady Region. Additionally, the market exports them to Bangladesh via Rakhine State and to China via Shan State and Kachin State. China mainly imports hilsa, while Bangladesh primarily imports rohu and sturgeon," elaborated U Wai Lin.

The Shwe Padauk Fish Market comprises nine sheds housing over 400 shops. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, the market saw a daily influx of more than 400,000 visses of freshwater and saltwater fish and prawns. — ASH/TKO

Number of S Korea's farming households falls below 1 mln for 1st time

The decrease in farming households is attributed to the aging population, prompting more farmers to leave the profession in recent years.

THE number of farming households in South Korea fell below 1 million for the first time last year, statistical office data showed Thursday.

The number of farming families slipped 2.3 per cent from a year earlier to 999,000 in December 2023, according to Statistics Korea.

The figure declined below 1 million for the first time since relevant data began to be compiled in 1949. It had about 10,000 households in margin of error.

The farming households had been on the decline in recent years as the rapidly aging population encouraged more farmers to quit farming

The proportion of farming households to the country's total households stood at 4.6 per cent in December last year, down 0.2 percentage points from a year earlier.

The population of farming families retreated 3.5 per cent to 2,089,000 in the cited period, accounting for 4.0 per cent of the total population.

Of the total farming family members, the highest share of 36.7 per cent was those in their 70s or older, followed by those in their 60s with 30.7 per cent and those in their 50s with 14.9 per cent each. — Xinhua

COLORADO on Wednesday expanded its privacy law to include brain data gathered by the booming array of gadgets people use for feedback about sleep, fitness, sports, and lifestyle.

Nonprofit Neurorights Foundation said it worked with the state on the unprecedented legal protection for neurological data gathered by devices not governed by privacy laws applied to medical information.

A bill signed into law by the

Colorado governor expands a 2021 privacy act to include protection of neural data, defined as "measurement of the activity of an individual's central or peripheral nervous systems and that can be processed by or with the assistance of a device". The foundation strives to warn authorities to risks posed by devices, such as headbands for improving sleep, earpieces to aid meditation, sensors for improving golf swings and the like. — AFP

Taylor Swift fans in frenzy over alleged 'Tortured Poets Department' album leak

TAYLOR Swift fans are in a frenzy over alleged leaks from her upcoming album, 'The Tortured Poets Department', set to be released this Friday.

According to Page Six, snippets of the album's tracks surfaced online, purportedly originating from a Google Drive link containing 17 songs. Swift previously confirmed that her 11th studio album would indeed feature 11 tracks.

The leaked snippets have sparked a divide among fans, with some questioning their authenticity, speculating whether they were generated by artificial intelligence. While some urged fellow fans to refrain from listening to the leaks and report them, others expressed frustration, labelling the leak spreaders as "fake Swifties".



World economy faces massive income reduction due to climate change: study

Estimated global annual damages by 2050 are approximately \$38 trillion, primarily attributed to rising temperatures, changes in rainfall, and temperature variability.

THE global economy faces an income loss of 19 per cent by 2050 due to climate change, even if greenhouse gas emissions are drastically reduced immediately, according to a new study published on Wednesday.

The study, published in the scientific journal Nature by the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research (PIK), shows that these losses are six times larger than the cost of the mitigation measures required to limit global warming to two degrees.

Global annual damages are

estimated to be around 38 trillion US dollars in 2050, with a likely range of 19 to 59 trillion US dollars. "These damages mainly result from rising temperatures but also from changes in rainfall and temperature variability," said the study. The researchers analyzed data from the past 40 years, from more than 1,600 regions, on how weather extremes and changes have influenced economic growth. Next, they calculated how these are likely to affect global economic activity over the next 26 years. — Xinhua

India's tariff removal on several US products benefiting farmers: Katherine Tai

US Trade Representative Katherine Tai said on Tuesday that India's decision to remove retaliatory tariffs on several US products has improved access to chickpeas, lentils, almonds, walnuts, and apples and is benefiting farmers across the country.

In her testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee Hearing on the President's 2024 Trade Policy Agenda, Tai mentioned that India and the US resolved the final outstanding WTO dispute in September last year, and India agreed to reduce tariffs on several US products.

"Last June, India and the United States terminated six WTO disputes, and India agreed to remove retaliatory tariffs on several US products. This means improved access for chickpeas, lentils, almonds,





This means more market access for turkey, duck, blueberries, and cranberries, benefiting farmers in North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Wisconsin," she added.

African countries urged to harness opportunities in battery, EV sector

She said the initiative will add value to the minerals crucial to manufacturing EVs, attract domestic and foreign direct investment in the sector, create sustainable jobs, and contribute to overall economic transformation. — Xinhua

Netflix beats expectations on profit and subscribers

NETFLIX topped expectations Thursday as it reported 9.3 million new subscribers and profits of \$2.3 billion in the first three months of the year.

Silicon Valley-based Netflix had bet heavily on its content lineup to win fans, with subscribers now totalling 269.6 million. "With more than two

people per household on average, we have an audience of over half a billion people," Netflix said in a letter to investors.

"No entertainment company has ever programmed at this scale and with this ambition before." Netflix shares slipped more than three per cent to \$589.64 in

after-market trades, apparently due to the company saying sales in the current quarter might be less than market expectations.

Netflix took in \$1 billion more in profit in the quarter than it did in the same period a year earlier, according to earnings figures. — AFP

Nissan lowers FY 2023 net profit forecast on weak sales volume

NISSAN Motor Co on Friday lowered its net profit forecast for fiscal 2023 to 370 billion yen (\$2.4 billion) from an initial 390 billion yen, citing a larger-than-expected fall in sales volume and cost relief measures. The automaker also revised downward its operating profit estimate for the year ending March 2024 to 530 billion yen from the 620 billion yen forecast in Febru-

US votes against Palestinian request for full UN membership at Security Council

This marks the Palestinian mission's second unsuccessful attempt for full UN member state status, following their initial effort in 2011, which also fell short of the required support.

The 15-member council voted on a draft resolution that recommends to the 193-member UN General Assembly that

"the State of Palestine be admitted to membership of the United Nations."

The draft resolution received 12 votes in favour, two abstentions, and one vote

A council resolution needs

at least nine votes in favour and no vetoes by the United States, Britain, France, Russia or China to pass. The United States was compelled to use its veto power after the draft secured 12 votes in favour. — Xinhua

Commercial ships not targeted by Israeli strike against Iran

COMMERCIAL ships transiting the Arabian Gulf and Western Indian Ocean were not the "intended target" of Israel's attack against Iran on Friday, the UK Maritime Trade Operations (UKMTO) said.

Earlier in the day, US media reported that Israel had carried out an airstrike on the Iranian province of Isfahan in response to Tehran's missile and drone attack against the Jewish state over the week-

"UKMTO are aware of media reports of an Israeli military strike against Iran. Vessels transiting the Arabian Gulf and Western Indian Ocean may observe increased UAS activity in the region. There are currently no indications commercial maritime vessels are the intended target," UK- MTO said in a statement.

Ship masters are required to report "any suspicious activity" in the region, the statement read. — SPUTNIK

Dubai Airports urges passengers not to arrive at the airport unless flights are confirmed

DUBAI Airports urged passengers not to come to the airport unless their flight has been confirmed and recommended arriving only two hours before their scheduled departure.

Emirates has also decided to suspend check-in for all customers across its network travelling with onward connections through Dubai, until 23:59 GMT on 19 April. This is to support operations recovery from the recent bad weather at its Dubai hub.

In a statement, Emirates said that passengers already in

Dubai and in transit will continue to be processed for their flights. Customers travelling to Dubai as their final destination may checkin and travel as usual.

Emirates advised all customers to check the latest flight schedules on its website, as delays to departures and arrivals are expected. The carrier advised impacted customers to contact their booking agent or Emirates Office for rebooking options, acknowledging the current high call volume and apologizing for any delays in response. — ANI

Sports federations condemn Olympic prize money for athletics

The Association of Summer Olympic International Federations (ASOIF) released a statement which made clear how unhappy it was at the announcement by World Athletics president Sebastian Coe that track and field gold medallists at the Paris Games will receive \$50,000 (47,000

World Athletics' move, announced last

"This disregards the less privileged athletes lower down the final standings."

It said other Olympics ports cannot afford to offer prize money. —

Voting begins in India for first phase of general elections

VOTING for the first phase of India's general elections began Friday, kicking off a seven-phased process lasting until 1 June.

India's general elections commenced with the first phase of voting on Friday, initiating a seven-phased process extending until 1 June. Citizens queued up with their Election Identity Cards to cast their votes, with polling continuing until 18:00 hours local time.

Commission of India, the second phase of the elections is scheduled for 26 April, the third phase on 7 May, the fourth phase on 13 May, the fifth phase on 20 May, the sixth phase on 25 May and the last phase on 1 June. The counting of votes will be held on 4 June. — Xinhua

Russia's role in global trade grows despite Western sanctions

WHILE the United States and its allies keep making futile attempts to ruin Russia through rounds upon rounds of economic sanctions, the Russian economy continues to thrive in no small part due to shifting focus to

trade with Asia and the Middle East.

Russia's focus on developing two major trade routes linking Europe and Asia may put the country "at the heart of much of international trade", as

Bloomberg put it.

The two routes in question are the International North-South Transport Corridor – a network of railways, roads and shipping lanes that links Europe and India via Russia, Azerbaijan and Iran – and the Northern Sea Route, which connects Europe and Asia via Russia's Arctic waters.

Both of these transportation arteries bypass the Suez Canal and are thus unaffected by the current volatile situation in the region, not to mention that using them could drastically reduce transit times and costs as compared to the Suez Canal route.

Though the United States and its Western allies have so far refrained from using these trade routes, "major Asian and Gulf economies" have already displayed interest, the media outlet notes. — SPUTNIK

RETALIATORY STRIKES

IAEA confirms no damage to Iran's nuclear sites amid Israel attack

IRAN'S nuclear sites are unharmed, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said on Friday after Israel allegedly launched retaliatory strikes overnight.

In a statement released today, the United Nations Atomic Watchdog said it is monitoring the situation very closely. It further said that IAEA Director-General, Rafael Mariano Grossi has emphasized the ongoing need for utmost restraint from all parties, adding that nuclear facilities should never be a target in military conflicts. An US official confirmed to ABC News outlet that Israel carried out airstrikes against Israel. Al Jazeera cited Mehr news agency reporting that "sounds were heard over the city" in Isfahan early today adding that "several miniature UAVs were shot down." However, the official could not confirm whether Syria and Iraq sites were hit as well. The report came shortly after local sources reported blasts in Isfahan region in central Iran.

Following this, Iran fired air defence batteries and shut down flight operations in several cites including Tehran, Shiraz and Isfahan that was later lifted.

The latest development comes after Iran on 13 April fired a barrage of over 300 missiles and drones against Israel, which Tehran said was in retaliation for a presumed Israeli strike on its consulate in Syria on April 1 in which 13 people were killed. — ANI
